Mr. Smith, Rising Star orchardist, said the all day event will begin at 9:30 a. m. in the conference room of the First National Bank, Cisco.

After lunch, the group will go to the Dale Carlisle pecan orchard near Nimrod.

Ben McKinnis, Eastland, Secretary-treasurer of the group, said that two outstanding pecan authorities, T. E. Denman, Stephenville, and L. D. Romberg, Brownwood,

would appear on the program. Topics to be discussed during the morning session include fertilizing native soil, can grove, latest search developments in U. S. Pecan Field, Brownwood, and method of determining to spray for the case bearer.

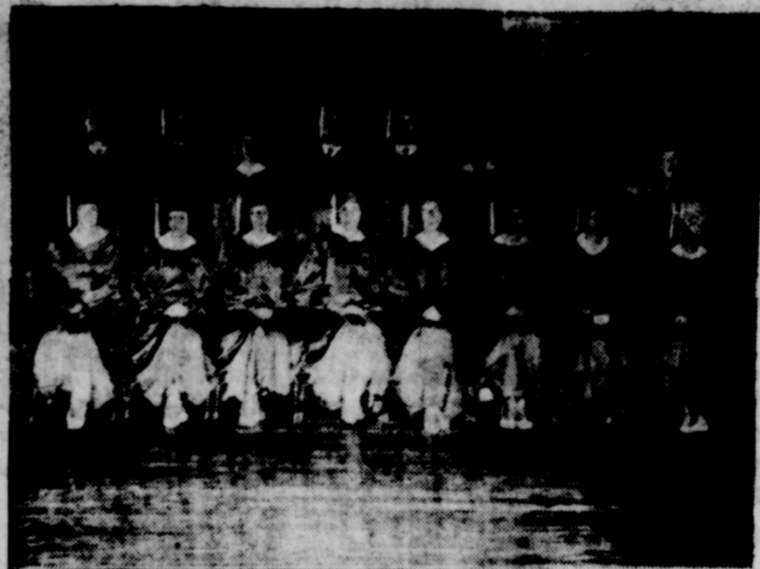

**LAST GUN OF CONFEDERACY**

The last shot of the Civil War was fired over the icy waters of Bering Sea on June 28, 1865, more than two months after Lee surrendered to Grant at Appomattox. It halted a squadron of Yankee whaling ships and was fired by the cruiser Shenandoah, last of the Confederate raiders.

Her incredible story is told in an April Reader's Digest article, "Last Gun of the Confederacy," by Charles E. Hinkson of Douglas, Alaska. After destroying the New England whaling fleet, the Shenandoah turned southward with the idea of capturing San Francisco and holding it for ransom.

But on Aug. 2, she met a British bark with definite word that the war was over. The Shenandoah had destroyed 21 U.S. vessels after the end of hostilities, 11 of them on June 28, and was being hunted as a pirate.

To avoid falling into Yankee hands, "Big Jim" Waddell,

her commander, took the raider around Cape Horn to England. As she had sailed from there by way of the Cape of Good Hope and the Indian Ocean to the Pacific, the ship had circled the globe.

She was the last cruiser outfitted by James D. Bullock, the Georgian who represented the Confederate Navy in England. Lieutenant Waddell, her commander, was born in Hillsboro and went to school in Hillsboro, North Carolina, before attending the U. S. Naval Academy.

In 13 months at sea, the Shenandoah logged 58,000 miles. She effected 38 captures, destroying 32 ships and bonding six, but never killed a Yankee nor suffered a casualty.
