Show Starts Friday **Auction Sale Starts** 1PM Saturday

Directors of the Yoakum Co. Livestock and Agriculture Improvement Association met on Monday night to make final plans for the 1964 Fat Stock Show which begins Thursday afternoon with the weighing of animals. All lambs and pigs will be weighed in officially between 1:30 and 6 p. m. on Thursday, February 20. The calves will be weighed Friday morning between 7 and 11 a. The actual judging begins at 1:30 Friday afternoon and the fat lamb classes will be first in the arena. Mr. Calvin Hol-comb, County Agent at Sem-inole, will select the winners in three classes of lambs, one of mutton lambs and two of fine wool lambs. The two first place lambs in the fine wool classes will compete for champion fine wool lamb and no reserve champions will be selected. The first place mutton will auto-

champion mutton lamb.

Pigs will be judged immediately following the lambs and Mr. Paul Gross, assistant Co. Agent at Seminole, is to be the official judge of this division. The pigs will be divided into three or four classes according to weight. If more than 60 fat barrows are weighed in there, will be four classes but with 60 or less there will be only three. The rules state that not more than 20 animals will be exhibited in a single class. The first place animal in each class will compete for grand champion barrow, and the reserve grand champion will be selected by bringing in the second place animal from the class producing the grand champion to compete with the remaining first place animals. From this group, the reserve champ will be selected.







Those applying will receive a poll tax receipt marked "not paid". They must have these with them when they appear at the polls to vote.

Registration Inderway

Residents of Yoakum County who did not pay their poll tax qualifing themselves to vote in all elections in 1964, but wishing to vote in the Federal Elections may qualify for this privilege now, said E. W. Craig, Yoakum County Tax Assessor-Collector. Those persons wanting to

vote in the federal elections but not in State elections, must register with the county tax office in Plains or in Denver City by March 6.

There is no fee for this registration.

Because of a recent amendnent to the Constitution of the United States there is now a ruling which bans the state poll tax as a pre-requisite for voting in elections of United States Congressmen, United States Senators, Presidents or Vice-Presi-

dents.

The following qualifications must be met:

They must be residents of the state a year and of the county six months to be an eligible voter. They also must meet the regualr state requirements pertaining to mental capabilities and citizenship.






