

Drivers License Suspensions

A total of 15 citizens of Yoakum County had their driver's license either suspended or were denied a license during the year 1963. Of this total, 11 persons had their licenses suspended and 4 persons were denied a license.

Some of the major reasons for suspensions and denials of licenses included driving while drinking, 11; automatic suspension offense in other states 2; driving while license sus-pended, 1; and committed automatic suspension offense 1.
