

ING THE USE OF AND MAN-NER OF MAKING CONNECT-ION TO THE SANITARY SEWER AND WATER SYSTEMS OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, GOVERNING THE INSTALLATION OF PLUMB-ING WORK TO BE DONE BY LICENSED PLUMBERS; CREAT-THE OFFICE OF PLUMBING INSPECTOR; PROVIDING FOR PERMIT AND INSPECTION FEES; PROVIDING THAT ANY PERSON. FIRM OR CORPORA-TION WHO SHALL OMIT OR REFUSE TO COMPLY WITH, OR WHO VIOLATES ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE SHALL BE DEEM-ED GUILTY OF A MISDE-MEANOR AND UPON CON-VICTION THEREOF SHALL BE FINED IN ANY SUM NOT MORE THAN \$100 FOR EACH OFFENSE, AND EACH DAY SUCH VIOLATION SHALL E-XIST SHALL CONSTITUTE A SEPARATE OFFENSE: AND RE-PEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH THIS OR-

CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEXAS:

Section 1. The sanitary sewer system of the City of Plains, Texas consists of main and lateral conduits of salt glazed vitrified earthware or other similar pipe, with necessary accessories, and are known herein as sanitary sewers. They are designed to carry off all liquid house wastes. The sewers in the alleys or streets ad= jacent to the various lots are are called main or lateral sewers to the property on either side are called house sewers. Section 1a. That, the of-

fice of Plumbing Inspector is hereby created, which office shall be filled by appointment by City Council. The person chosen to fill the office shall be of good moral character, shall be possessed of such executive ability, training and experience as is required for the performance of his duties of enforcing this ordinance. The Plumbing Inspector will designate the position of the branch in the streets or alleys, as shown by the records in the City Hall. All connections made with the sanitary sewers or drains and all plumbing connected therewith shall be made under the direction of the Plumbing Inspector, or his authorized agent.

Section 9. STATEMENT OF WORK DONE. The plumber shall on the completion of the work file in the office of the Plumbing Inspector a correct statement of the work done under the permit.

Section 10. CESS POOLS AND OVERFLOWS. No open gutter, cess pool or privy vault shall be connected with any sewer or drain. Section 11. No person,

firms or corporations shall injure, break, or remove any section of any manhole, la hole, flush tank, catch bas or any part of the sewer system, or throw or deposit or cause to be thrown or deposited in any sewer openings or receptacle connecting with the sewer system, any garbage, offal, dead animals, vegetables, paring, ashes, cinders, rags, or other matter of thing whatsoever, except faeces, urine and the necessary waste toilet paper, liquid

street or alley upon which se-wers are laid, shall give at least twenty-four hours notice to the Plumbing Inspector before opening the street or alley and the manner of excavating for the laying and backfilling over such pipe shall be ubject to the approval of the Plumbing Inspector. All such work shall be planned and executed so thet no injury shal 1 occur to any house sewer or drain connected therewith.

Section 13. OBSTRUCT-IONS. The City acting through the Plumbing Inspector or other authorized officers, shall have the power to stop and prevent from discharging into the sewer system and private sewer or drain through which substances are discharged which are liable o injure the sewers or obstruct the flow of the sewersge, or interfere with the operation of the disposal plant.

Section 14. CONNECTIONS OF OLD DRAINS. Before any old private drains shall be connect with the sewer system the owner of the private drain shall prove to the satisfaction of the Plumbing Inspector that it is clean and conforms in every respect with these rules and

Section 15. The house sewer trench shall be dug so as to meet the public sever at the

position of the "Y" branch, if there be one, so located by the City Inspector. The material thrown from the trench shall be placed so as not to obstruct and so as to cause the least nconvenience to the public Proper barriers and lights must be maintained on the banks of the trench which shall be dug so as to avoid accidents during the progress of the work In back filling the earth shall be carefully rammed or flooded so as to keep the pipe in proper position and avoid settling and no stone shall be used in filling until there has been a depth of two feet of fine earth placed over the pipe.

Section 16. MATERIAL FOR SEWERS AND DRAINS. The house sewers from a point two feet outside the house to the street or alley severs, shall be of first quality salt glazed, vitrified earthen pipe, not less than four inches in diameter, unless laid less than six inches deep, when it shall be of cast. iron not less than four inches in diameter. E ch house must have independent drain to sewer unless more than one house is located on a single lot and a permit is granted by the Inspector of Plumbing. Section 17. PIPE LAYING

The covering of the "Y" branch of the sewer shall be carefully. removed, so as not to injure the socket. The first length of pipe attached shall be curved so as to give a good fall into the sewer. The pipe shall laid on an even grade of less than one-tenth (1 1/10) an inch to the foot unless special permission of the Plumbing Inspector, in which case provisions may be made for regular and efficient flush-Curved pipe shall be used

fro every deflection from a straight line of more than six inches in two feet.

The joints of earthenware pipe shall be made with portland cement of first quality, the joints of iron pipe shall be of oakum and lead if cast iron is used, or white lead if screwed joints are used.

The end of all private sewers not immediately connect ed with the plumbing fixtures shall be securely closed by w. ter tight imperishable mater-If lead pipe, the end must be soldered, if cast iron pipe a cast iron plug must be calked with lead.

No connection for basement drain or cellars shall be allowed until owner of the building has executed and signed a written release to the City of Plains, Texas releasing it from all damage that may result from said basement or cellar flooded by the stoppage of sew ers, which release and agreement shall be filed with the City Secretary and when such connection is allowed it shall be done by means directly with any drain pipe carring foul sewage, or with sewer or cess pool unless properly: tapped to prevent back gases.

Water service and water distribution pipes laid underground shall not be closer to to sanitary drains and sewers than five (5) feet, where possible, and when laid in approximate alignment with each other, the water pipes shall be laid at an elevation above all sanitary drains and sewers. In cases where buildings are located less than five (5) feet from property lines duced accordingly.
Section 18. PLUMBING

RULES. All materials must be of good quality and free from defects; and the work must be executed in a thorough and workmanlike manner.

From a point two feet outside the foundation wall no material may be used within the building and connected with the sewer for the silt, or waste pipes, other than cast iron pipes with securely threaded or leaded joints, or lead pipes with wiped joints. Cement or putty joints, tin or sheet iron pipes, whether galvanized or not shall not be

No soil or waste pipes shall have a fall of less than one inch in ten feet. Section 19. House Drains

within and to a distance of two feet outside of the exterior wall of the building shall be standard weight cast iron soil pipe, except in buildings to two or more stories in which case all soil pipe shall be extra heavy cast iron up to the water level of the highest fixture after which same may be standard weight soil pipe, extending up through roof, said pipe to be calked with oakum and molten lead, and to have waste and vent pipes shall be a uniform fall of not less than one quarter inch per foot.

All fittings used in connection with such pipes shall correspond with it in weight and quality. Where lead pipe is used to connect fixtures with vertical vent pipes, it must not be lighter than "light pipe "."

The arrangement of soil. and waste pipes must be as direct as possible, the drain, soil and waste pipes and trap should if practicable, be ex-posed to view at all times ready for inspection and for convenience or repairing When necessarily placed with in partitions or within recess of walls, soil and waste pipe should be covered with wood-work so fastened with screws as to be easily removed.

All stacks or vertical pipes must be ties or anchored at every other floor by means of cast iron floor rests. When they run parallel or against the wall they shall be supported by clamps of 1/8 x 1 inch iron horizontal runs of waste or vent lines must be supported with

permanent hangers, placed at intervals not less than fivefeet for cast iron pipes and ten feet for wrought iron pipes. Lead pipes must be supported the entire length with a bridge of sufficient thickness to pre-. vent sagging. Pipe hanger made of wood or sheet iron, or that do not meet the requirments of this ordinance and the approval of the Plumbing Inspector, will be rejected.
Section 21. MAIN SOIL

AND WASTE PIPES. A main waste pipe into which wash basins, bath tubs or kitchen sinks discharge must be of soil pipe at least two inches in diameter with one and one-half inch branches.

The main line from the sewer connections to the house tap must be at least four inches in interior diameter at every point. No trap or any manner of obstruction to the free flow of air through the whole course of the house sewer will be allowed when the closer sets more than four feet from the main stack or two of the closets are on the same stack, on different floors, this shall be secured by an untrapped main house sewer and soil pipe by a ventilating pipe leading to the roof from the lower side of the trap and a fresh air inlet connecting the floor of the floor of the main soil pipe just above the trap. Every vertical soil and waste pipe must be extended at least ten inches above the roof or coping. It must be of and undiminished on the earth, or those having size without return bend. It cast iron enameled receptors, must not open near a window

or an air shaft which ventilates living rooms. Soil, waste and vent pipes in an extension must be extended above the roof of the main buildings, when other-wise they would open within sixteen feet of the windows of. the main house or adjoining

Section 22. JOINTS. All' joints in iron drain pipes, soil pipes and waste pipes, except where screw joints are used must be filled with oakum and lead and hand calked so as tomake them gas tight.

All connections of lead pipes with iron pipes must be with a brass or lead sleeve or ferrule of the same size as the lead pipe, put in the hub or the branch of the iron pipe and calked with lead. The lead pipe must be attached to the ferrule by a wiped joint. All connections of lead,

made by means of wiped joints, all fixtures to be lead stubbec

Section 23. INSPECTION. Before fixtures are placed in connection with the plumbing of any house or building and before the soil pipe is connected with the sewer, the outlet of the soil pipe and openings into it below the top shall be hermetically sealed; the pipe shall be filled with water to its top and every joint be carefully examined for leaks. Defective pipes discovered must be replaced with sound ones and all defective joints made tight and every part of the work made to conform tothese rules and regulations, and subject to the approval of

the inspector. In cases, where plumbing. work has been completed in a building before these rules and regulations came in force, if the plumbing has been donein accordance with these rules and regulations, permits will-be granted for making con-

For ordinary dwellings or residences, these traps are not compulsory. When there are no grease traps, the waste must be connected with a pipe not less than two (2) inches in diameter for horizontal runs or vertical runs over eight (8) feet in length with a clean out plug in all horizontal changes of direction placed

in an accessible location. Public garages washing automobiles and motor trucks, shall install proper catch basins or sand traps constructed of any approved material, made water tight and the discharge of same shall be taken off in a manner that will provide a water seal of not less than twenty-four (24) inches. Such trap shall be protected against syphonage or back pressure, by proper reventing made continuous when possible, and accessible blean outs for discharge line shall be provided.

Section 25. A protable water supply distributing system shall not be connected to or with any water-closet tank flush valve, combination or other faucet, or any other plumbing fixture or receptacle for waste or surplus water, which is connected directly or indirectly with any sewer, soil or waste of a plumbing system except (1) by discharging over and not less than 3/4 inch above the level at which the fixture would overflow on the floor unless the supply pipe thereto be provided with a complete air break of the full area of the supply pipe and located at least 6 inches above the highest water containing part of the fixture. (2) Pro-vided that in lieu of a full area inlet there may be a combination of check and air inlet so disposed and arrange in location and size that the air inlet shall be sufficient to supply full relief for any leakage that might occur past a defectively

or other means of sealing be installed which will provide a cross connection between a distributing system of water for drinking and omestic purposes and a drainage system soil, or waste pipe so as to permit or make possible the back flow of sewage or waste into the water supply system. No pipe or fittings that have been used for other purposes shall be used for distributing

Traps must be protected from syphonage, or the waste leading from them ventilated by a special air pipe taken out of the crown of the trap, in no case less than four inches in diameter for the water closet traps, and one inch and a quarter for other traps, except when more than fifteen feet in lengthe, the pipe shall not be less than one and one-half inches in diameter. All floor traps must be dry vinted. All sinks shall have cleanouts accessible from the outside. The verticle vent pipes for traps of water closets in buildings more than four stories in height must be at least three (3) inches in diameter, with two(2) inch branches to each trap and for traps of other fextures not less than two (2) inches in diamet-

Section 26. VENT TRAPS.

Section 27. Batteries of water clostes or urinals in toilets rooms on same floor from three to twenty in number may be installed by system of loop venting by extending the horizontal line of soil pipe up and return full size to main vent stack at a point one foot above highest fixture or continue seperate through roof full size, thus forming a circuit vent system. When more than ten closets are urinals in

a battery are vented in this manner, there will be an additional connecting line between waste and vent full size in center of such battery for the purpose of relieving air

Section 28. Where two water closets are located on the same floor and sischarge into double "Y", "TY" are sanitary cross, and they are three feet or less from the stack said water closet will be considered the same as top fixture and it will not be necessary to back vent either water closet No trap or vent pipe shall

be used as waste or soil pipe No brick, sheet metal, earthenware or chimney flu shall be used as sewer ventilator, nor to ventilate any, trap, drain, soil or waste pipes.

Section 29, OVERFLOWS
FROM FIXTURES. W ter closets must be of the approved pattern, in all cases the tank must discharge into the open air of the basin of the closet. and not into the soil pipe directly. Direct service a water closet is prohibited. All interior water closet

compartments shall be ventilated into air shafts where possible. All outside water closets must be vented and trapped with running "P" trap. Section 30. All vent pipes passing through roof shall be

flashed with two and one-half pound sheet lead. Section 31. STRAINERS Exit pipes to all fixtures except closets shall be furnished with suitable permanently at-

tached strainers. Nosteam exhausts, blow-off or drain pipes shall be connected with house drains, soil drains or vent pipes within any building, but shall discharge into a open tank or condenser, from which a safe connection to the sewer outside the buildsealed check should the washer may be made.

Waste pipes from refrigators or other receptables shall not be connected direct with the drain pipe system, but can be run into open sink or basin, from which place drain pipes must be trapped.

section 32. All charges shall be payable monthly on the first day of each month at the office of the City of Plains at the City Hall. Any person, persons firm, or corporation who shall hail to pay the sewer charges on a hafter the 10th charges on or before the 10th day of the month the same is due, shall be subject to have his sewer discontinued from the City system, and if discontinued no connections will be made there after with the City sewer system until such party shall have payed all a-mounts due, and all costs of disconnecting and reconnecting with said system.

Section 33. Inspection Fees All plumbers doing work under this ordinance shall pay inspection fees as follows: (a) For inspection of any

one single fixture issued under one permit, five dollars (\$5). (b)Where there is more than one fixture, the inspection fee shall be twenty - five cents. (25¢) for each additional fixture roughed in.

(c) Where Plumbing Inspector is required to go to the same job more than once for the same inspection, he shall charge an extra fee of One Dollar and Fifty Cents (\$1.50) for each and every inspection thereafter, if construction is contrary to this ordinance, the work is defective, the wrong address is given or the work is not ready for inspection.



Section 34. It shall be the duty of the Plumbing Inspector when granting permits for connection with the sewer system to issue with said permits a copy of these rules and regula tions in printed form, and it shall be the duty of the plumber making said connections to deliver said rules and regulations to the party having the work done for his guidance and instructions in the use of sewer and maintenance of the public health.

Section 35. Every owner of a building or part thereof occupied by people for any purpose, any part of the day or night, situated on any city block in the City, where a public sewer is laid and maintained within 150 feet of such building, or any building on acreage tracts where buildings are within 150 feet of a public sewer and having no water closet or privy connected with said sewer, shall, within thirty days after the enactment and legal publication of this ordinance, put up wh



Agriculture Big Business

COLLEGESTATION, July--Although the number of people on Texas farms and ranches is declining, many of those leaving the country are not leaving the agricultural industry, says John G. McHaney, Extension economist, Texas A&M University.

Today nearly 40 percent of all Texans derive their income wholly or in part from farming and ranching or connected businesses, reports the economist. These businesses supply the production needs of farmers and process and distribute agricultural products.

Many agricultural processes once handled on the farm are now performed by these businesses and much labor once needed on the farm is used by them, Mchaney points out. For example, farmers today purchase most of their power in the form of gasoline and machinery instead of raising animals and feeding them.

workers that supply these production needs perform a service for the farmer and are partially dependent on him for their living. About 96 percent of the agricultural production in Texas must pass through th business firms of the state be fore reaching the final consumer, says the economist.

Agriculture and business are becoming more and more enterdependent, says McHaney, Some reasons for this interde-pendence are that farming and ranching require a large capital investment, more cash is spent for living expenses and crop production today, and farmers are more dependent on the market place.

Increased efficiency in farm and ranch production has released much labor to the urban areas but much of this labor retains ist connection with agriculture, McHaney concludes.

Say Witness Important

By far the most vital people in our system of justice are witnesses. Everyone else in a trial exists to hear what they have to say.

Our courts need witnesses. A jury to find the facts. The judge to apply the law. The lawyer to tell his client's story. Chances are you worry about

stepping up, taking an oath, and telling your story in court. On come rare occasions you could be called upon to testify about something affecting

your own standing in the com-

As a witness you too may have the right, for example, not to testify against yourself in somebody else's lawsuit or crime trial.

If you are ever in such a bind, consult a lawyer of your own choice on what to do. The lawyer who called you to testify has a sworn duty to proform his client, not you. But your lawyer is sowrn to keep what you tell him secret and to advise you in your own interests with in the law.

Wise lawyers tell their wit-

nesses to obey twelve rules: 1. Go to the place (say the scene of the accident). Check your memory before you go to court. People forget and get caught up on details. But if you check what you saw and heard you are on

other witnesses testify. It will help you see your role on the witness stand.

3. Wear clean, conserva-

tive clothes. 4. Don't memorize your story word for word. That is the surest way to sound bad. But think of what you saw and

5. Listen to the questions you are asked with care and answer thoughtfully.

7. If you err, and people often do, correct yourself at once. If you can't remember a detail, say so. Don't bluff. 8. Tell the truth. Don't

help. Don't identify yourself with either side. 9. Stop when the judge breaks in, and don't try to sneak an answer in before he can stop you. What you might say caould end in a "mistrial".


