#### O K COUNTY BUDGET

A public hearing on the Yoakum County budget for the fiscal year, 1964-65 was held at 10 a.m. Monday in the Commissioners' Court Room in the Courthouse here.

The budget, as drawn up, amounts to \$1,069,643, which is a \$15,000 increase over the budget for the county last year, but it was reported that no need for increase in taxes

is anticipated at this time, In the Monday meeting, approval, as was expected, for the budget was unanamously given.

In ohter business conducted by the Court that day, it was decided that Gene Bennett, his wife, Vera, and theri minor children, should be granted full use of the facilities of the proposed Yoakum County Park but that they should not be charged for their use.







# Begin Price Support Payments

first Price Support payment in Yoakum County issued under the new 1964-65 Domestic Cotton Allotment Program.

The check in the amount \$365.76 is the tenant's 3/4 hare of the farm's domestic allotment payment; and is based on the normal yield established for the farm times three and one-half cents per pound times the domestic allotment. The above check County farmer by W. M. Ov-erton, ASCS Office Manager, on August 17.

Dallas farms the cropland on the Murphey Luna Ranch, and the cropland is dry land not irrigated. The farm's effective cotton allotment is 113.7, and the domestic allotment is 76. 2.

According to the local ASCS records, most all the dry land farmers will be in compliance

Law enforcement officials, editors and any of the public concerned with the appalling toll of traffic accidents feel a common futility about

how to cope with the problem.

There are many causes, and various remedies have been advanced by experts.

But a Dallas citizen, in a letter to a newspaper in that city, speaks more truth in blunt language than all of the learned dissertations on the subject we have seen.

Speaking of drivers' tests, the Dallas man

"Wrecks are not caused by people who do not know how to drive. Most of them are caused by the idiot who doesn't care. Grounding the habitual lawbreaker is more important than

Drivers' tests are essential, and serve a good purpose, but they alone do not guarantee traffic

The intent of the driver behind the wheel, toward law enforcement and toward the rights of others, unquestionably is the greatest factor bearing on traffic safety.

Texas' toll of accidents and deaths is increasing and unless the trend is reversed, and it seems unlikely, this will wind up a grisly year

This problem deserves the most careful attention of the 59th Texas Legislature which will convene next January. Every cause and every measure relating to improving traffic safety should be considered.

If the laws need to be stricter on revocation of licenses of incorrigible drivers, it should be

Let us hope that the legislature does not become so burdened and preoccupied with the problems of congressional redistricting, legislative redistricting, teachers' salaries and higher education that the crisis on our streets and highways is slighted.

# Review Social Security History

More than \$35 billion in monthly social security benefits have been paid out to wage earner's dependents and survivors during the past 25 years, Anthony J. Celebrezze, Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, said on the 25th anniversary of the amendments to the Social Security Law adding protection for the families of workers. The original Social Secur-

ity Law, enacted in 1935, provided only retirement benefits for workers with only a lump sum payable to the worker's estate in case of his

Following up on recommendations of the Committee on Economic Security, appointed by President Roosevelt in 1934, and taking note of the experience gained in administering the retirement progress, the Congress, in the summer of 1939, enlarged the scope of the social security program, making it a program

for the whole family.
Signing the legislation on August 10, 1939, President

Roosevelt described it as "Another tremendous step forword in providing greater security for the people of this country. " The expanded program, said would now give "lifetime family security instead of only individual old - age security to the workers in insured occupations. In addition to the worker himself, millions of widows and orphans will now be afforded some degree of protection in the event of his death whether before or after

his retirement. " In 1939 amendments also provided benefits for the wives and children of retired workers and for the aged dependent parents of deceased workers. Further, the date fof the first payment of monthly benefits to retired workers and to the newly added categories of survivors and dependents was moved ahead two years, from 1942 to 1940.

Three million aged widows, widowers, and aged dependent parents are now receiving benefits amounting to almost \$150 million a month. An additional 3 million persons, the dependents of retired workers, are receiving close to \$120 million a month in benefits.




