



thing. The most stylish dwelling can be a real headache if it isn't built to control noise. Mounting noise of modern living is making sound conditioning a most important consideration in selecting a place to live.

W. A. Janssen, acoustical specialist for The Celotex Cororation, suggests the following hecklist for home buyers: 1: If the bedroom area is located over the garage,

stand in the bedroom and have someone op-erate the garage doors. If the door action is noisy, you can be sure it will be a serious disturbance to sleepers. The floor-ceiling between bedrooms and garage should include rated sound insulation board to reduce sound passage.

Door action will be quieter if rollers are nylon,

2: Turn on kitchen appliances (dishwasher, gar-bage disposer, range fan, etc.). Add to this the normal level of a kitchen — clattering dishes, chattering children—and you can understand why the kitchen is often the most nerve-wracking room in the house if it isn't sound conditioned.
A ceiling of acoustical tile will ease this prob-lem. The ceiling is the logical place to soak up extra sound waves and

reduce noise level within a room. New plastic coated tiles are recommended for the kitchen because of their high washabil-

3: Leave the appliances on, close all kitchen doors and sit in the living room. This will tell you how much the kitchen activity will intrude in your living area. A sound conditioned wall between kitchen and liv-ing area, built with rat-

ed sound insulation board, will reduce sound passage. Solid core doors with gaskets for tight fits will also mute kitchen sounds.
4: If the family room has a

standard ceiling (usually gypsum board), it can well become a racket room. Hard surfaces reflect sound waves, building up noise to uncomfortable levels. This is double true in the family room, where televi-sion, radio, children's activities are often cen-

tered. As in the kitchen, the family room ceiling should be acoustical. Modern acoustical tile can absorb up to 70% of the sound striking its

surface. Here are some other things that help to quiet a home: Thin plastic foam strips glued around door casings eliminate noises. Heating-air conditioning ducts lined with 1/2-in. glass wool muffle noise transmitted from the power unit. Special

flushing noise. Air cushion de-vices installed on water lines yard picnics. Cut a slice from quiet the sound of flowing water the top of a long unsliced hot and eliminate hammering noices dog bun. Scoop out the center when the fauest is abruntly of the bottom half of the bun






