Shell Announces \$40.5 Million Water Flood Project

It was learned this week that plans for a unitized water-flood operation, ditch cutting and pipe laying for which have already been begun, are all but completed on behalf of Shell Oil Co. The Wasson formation of Yoakum and northwest part of Gaines County is the object of this undertaking.

The concrete pipeline, that is being built south of Denver City is to presently be 9 miles long and will be built of four, six and eight inch pipe.

The water-field from which the fresh water is to be taken is located 7.2 miles southwest of

Denver City on the Higginbotham Road (F-M 2055).

Shell officials report that initially the project is to cost some \$5,000,000. Estimated total cost of the project is set at \$40,500,000 and it is further estimated that the project will return 265,000,000 barrels of oil from 25,144 acres of land.

A unitization project for the southern portion of the 63,500 acre Wasson field here. This, however will be done in five separate portions.

Fresh water from Ogallala sand is to be used for the project and it was reported that at the beginning 15 input wells

are to be in operation and that this number is gradually being increased to 88 wells.

At present, 25 injection wells are to be in operation along the nine miles of water line. Injection wells are oils wells into which the fresh water is pumped to flush out and recover oil

that might otherwise not be recovered.

Laying of the pipeline is to be completed by Oct. 1, and the project, permission for which is presently being sought from the Texas Railroad Commission, is to begin, according to plans, by about the first of the year.

Mrs. Duet was fatally injured in an automobile accident which occurred on Labor Day.

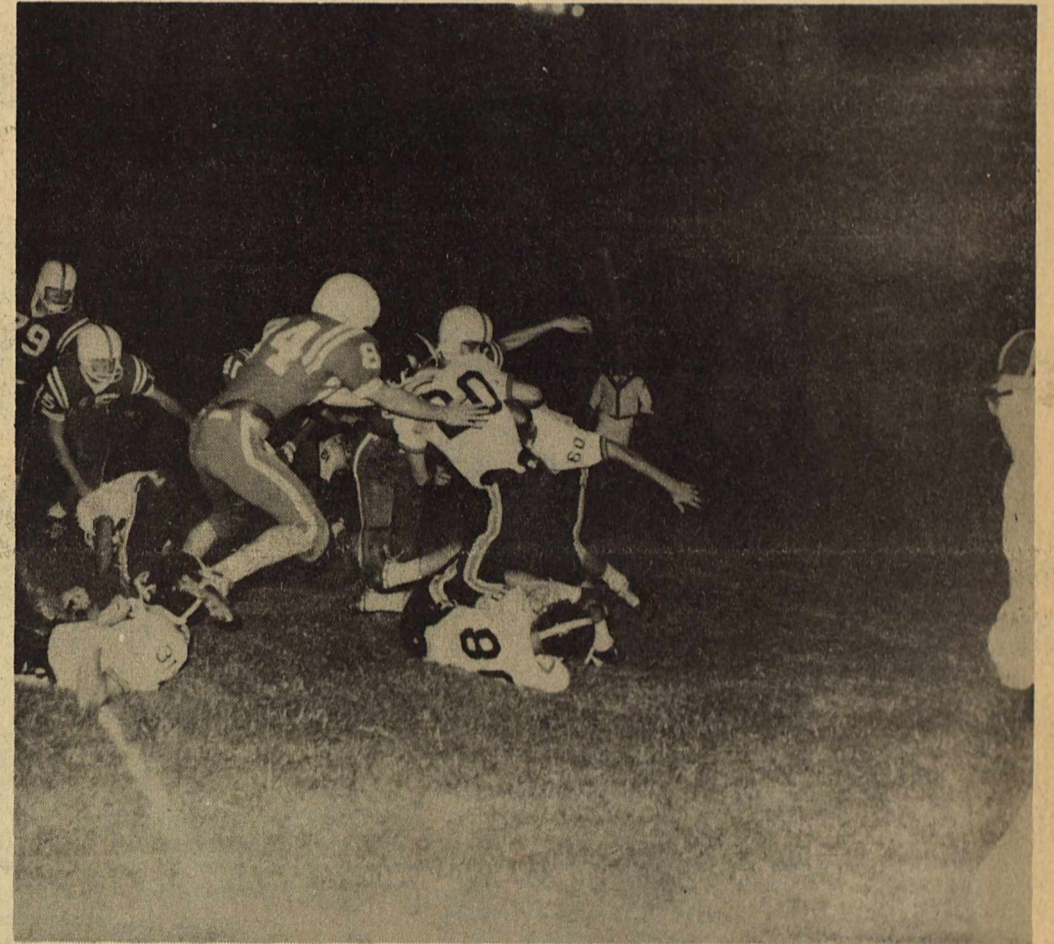
The funeral services were held on Wednesday, September 9.

LOSE SQUEAKER TO FRIONA Cowboys Meet Steers Here

The Plains Cowboys lost a real close one last Friday night to a mighty respectable Friona team.

Friona drew first blood in the first half, scoring six on a power play run by their one-man team, Dodd, from the 2 yard line. Their try for extra point failed and for several game minutes, the score stayed just at that point. Then in the closing seconds of the first half freshman halfback, Gregg Jones ran an impressive 36 yards to set a TD up for the Cowboys on the 3 yard line, from where HB Dennis Crutcher ran it over. Quarterback, Jack Lowe kicked the extra point and the half ended with the score Plains 7 and Friona 6.

The rest of the game was a back-and-forth situation, with neither team able to overcome the other.

Finally with just a little over two minutes left in the game, the Friona team was able to kick a field goal for 3 points, and when Plains lost the ball on the ensuing kick-off, it was about all over but the shouting and the final score wound up at 7 for Plains and 9 for Friona in a really tough battle for both.

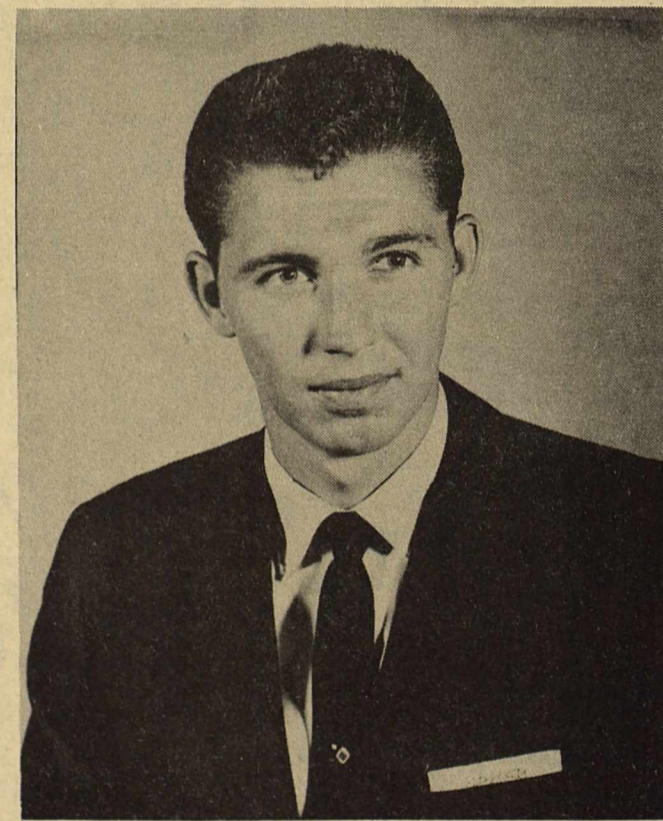
Statistical by the Cowboys, racked up 141 yards rushing and Friona only 118 and Plains totaled 17 in the air to their 6.

The only area where Friona out-distanced the Cowboys in the game facts was in first-downs, which were 12 to 10. Plains made 2 penetrations to Friona's 1; Plains only lost the ball once on fumble while the Chiefs lost it 4 times; and finally, Plains was penalized 35 yards while Friona gave up 53 yards in penalties.

This week, the Cowboys are to meet the Farwell Steers here in Plains, game time set at 8 p. m.



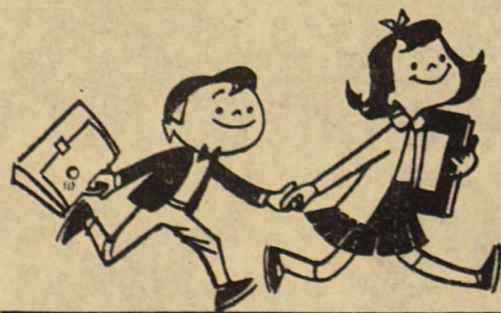
Baptist Sets Youth Revival

SEEK COUNTY PARK NAME

County Judge Stanley Duvall is requesting that citizens of the county make suggestions to the Commissioners' Court as to the formal name the county park should have after it is completed.

Duvall stated that already two names have been submitted but that he feels many persons should be involved in selecting the name. The names that already have been sent in are: Yoakum County Park and Bennett Park.

Judge Duvall requests that suggestions be sent in to him, addressed to Stanley Duvall Yoakum County Judge, Plains, Texas. Also, it was pointed out that even is a citizen's preference is a name that already has been named, it would be good to send it in again as the final selection may well be made on the basis of the name submitted the most times.

Much concern has been evident in connection with the small amounts of water which have been obtained in drilling the wells on the site for the proposed park.

Judge Duvall reported today

that so far three wells have been drilled and that a fourth one is presently being drilled.

The first well, drilled on the southwest corner of the 160 acre site went to a depth of 137-1/2 ft and produced 155 gallons of water per minute. It was discovered though that the salt content in this well, 2200 parts per million, was a little high, but opinion is that if its water is mixed with that of the other wells it is usable.

Well number 2 was drilled in the northwest corner of the property and produced 110 gallons per minute of good water.

Number 3 well, that was drilled in the draw, was sunk to a depth of 122 ft and now is producing 200 gallons of good water per minute.

Well number four also is being drilled in the draw and the opinion is that it should be the best well of all.

Judge Duvall said that possibly we may be better off with several small wells this way, as small submersible pumps can be used with very little upkeep and that the original plans already call for the building of a large storage facility.

COFC ACTIVELY SEEKING DR

Plains Chamber of Commerce is actively taking hold and trying to do all possible to solve the number one problem of the Plains area, securing a doctor for the local citizenry. Several applicants have, in the past several weeks, looked over the facilities, which they all laud as being very adequate, but, however, none has definitely committed himself to coming to Plains as the resident physician here.

A committee composed of Bill Loyd Chairman, Alf Carpenter and Joe Curry was appointed to look into the possibilities of the construction of a small, privately-owned hospital facility here as an incentive to a doctor's moving to Plains.

In a director's meeting this week, a letter of authority was also given to Mr. D. C. Newsom, looking forward to his going to Galveston, to the State School of Medicine seeking to secure a doctor for Plains.

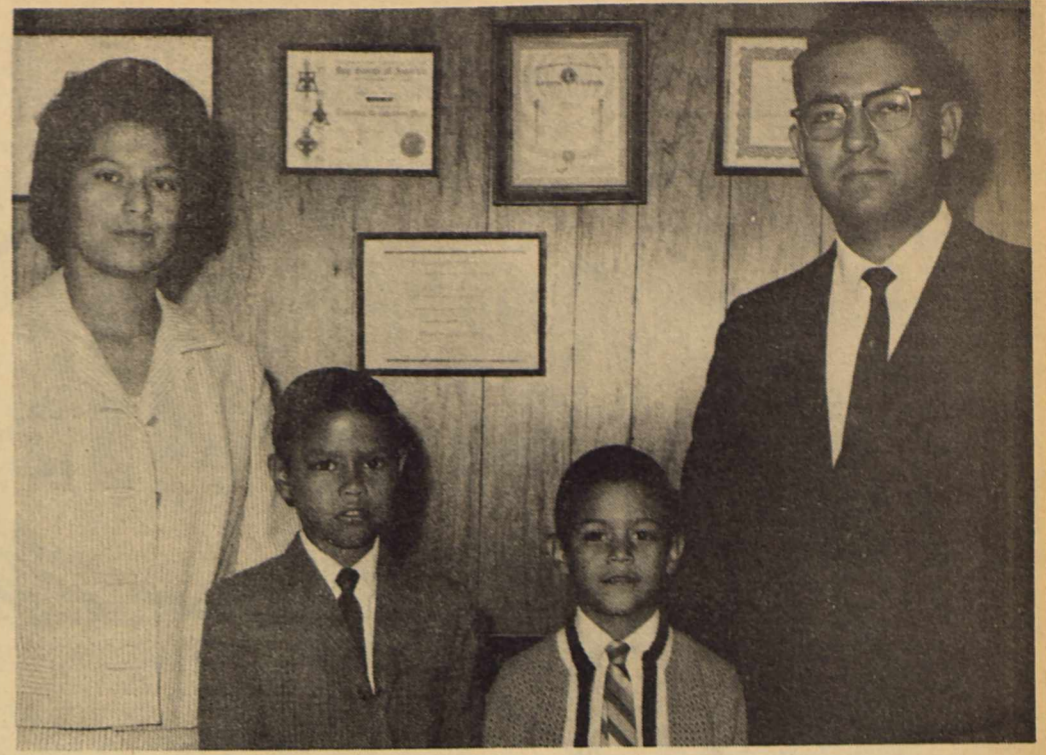

- 1961—Weevil damage in Rolling Plains and along edge of Cap Rock.
- 1962—Damage in Rolling Plains and 10 miles or so above the Cap Rock.
- 1963—Damage below the Cap Rock and to over 150,000 acres of cotton above the Cap Rock, some within a few miles of Lubbock and Hale counties.
- 1964—Moved as far west by August as by October in 1963.
- 1965—WITHOUT DIAPAUSE CONTROL PROGRAM — no one knows, or wants to know, whether he would reach Lubbock, Littlefield, Muleshoe or the New Mexico line.
- 1965—WITH DIAPAUSE CONTROL PROGRAM — Weevil infestations reduced over 90 percent above and below the Cap.
- 1966—WITH DIAPAUSE CONTROL PROGRAM — Eliminated as an economic factor above the Cap Rock.
- 1967—WITH DIAPAUSE CONTROL PROGRAM — Eliminated as an economic factor above AND below the Cap Rock.

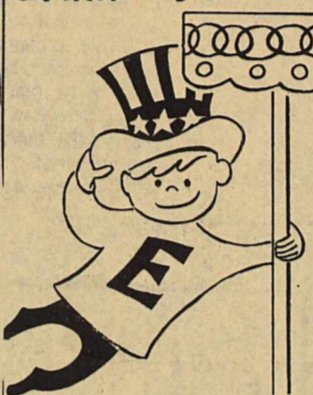

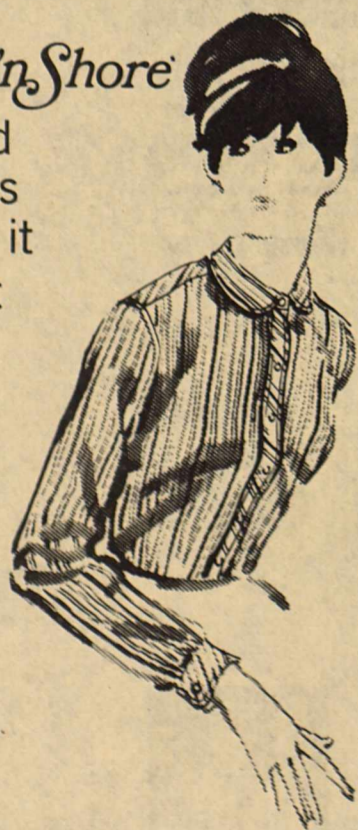

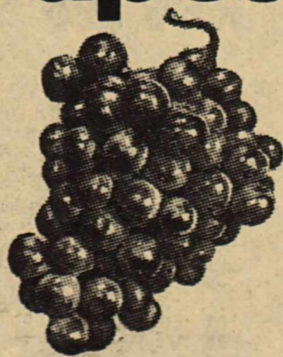
