

When cards and packages arrive, the five digit return address codes should be added to Christmas lists for use in the future. ZIP coded mail from a

smaller post office will generally be sent to the nearest main post office or "sectional center". From there, it is sent directly to the sectional center nearest the final destination. In most instances, this eliminates at least one further seperation of mail.

The Secretary of Agriculture has proclaimed marketing quotas for the 1965 crop of Ipland Cotton and has set the 15th of December, 1964 as, date for farmers to vote in the cotton referendum.

The eligible Yoakum Co. cotton farmers may vote at any one of the nine gins in the county or at the old Court house in Plains. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. two - thirds or more of the farmers voting vote yes, Marketing Quotas and Acreage Allotments will be in ffect, Excess cotton will be subject

to a Marketing Quota Penalty.

Price Support for those staying within their allotment will range from 65 to 90% of parity and Price Support Payments will be made to those complying with the Domestic Allotment Program.

Farmers on the High Plains are faced with decreasing water supplies. Strong wells are getting weaker each year. There are more small wells drilled each year. Many far-mers are wondering what they can do with a number of low producing wells.

The Soil Conservation Service technicians are assisting farmers who have this problem of small wells to establish what is known as collector irrigation systems. With this system all the wells are pumped independently to a central gathering tank and a booster pump builds pressure for the

its maximum output at all times. Usually each well discharges its water into the gathering tank seperately and its flow can be checked each day. If one well were to fail for some reason, it does not shut down the entire operation. There is less loss time during the irrigation season. Another advantage is the lower installation cost of a col-lector system. All that is needed in each well is a pump big enough to surface the water. Pressure will be built up in the booster pump which consists of a centrifugal pump

pressure. Once the wells are adjusted for maximum flow into the gathering tank, only seasonal changes need to be made, whereas with wells tied together, adjustments need to be made frequently. The greatest advantage to

the collector system is that the sprinkler system can be operated at the designed pres-sure at all times. The sprin-kler system is designed to utilize the combined production of all the wells. This usually gives the owner of several small wells the same capacity irrigation system as he would have with one strong well.

low - pressure pipe needed to bring the water from the wells to the centrally located gathering tank. If a main line is needed for the sprinkler system, cost share is also available. Cost share payemnts are available under the GPCP on a new gathering tank, however most landowners in this area can usually find a used oilfield tank for less cost to them.

Farmers who have more than two wells tied together under pressure may find that they have more water when they change over to a collector system. Some of their wells may not be pumping to
