Local Cotton Farmers Favor Marketing Quotas

Yoakum County cotton farmers went along with cotton farmers over the cotton belt and voted to retain cotton marketing quotas for the 1965 cotton crop. The vote in this county was 216 for and 61 against.

W. M. Overton, local ASC manager, reports that the election holders at the ten Yoakum County voting boxes had reported the following vote:

For marketing quotas to be effective at least two-thirds of the farmers voting had to cast a yes vote. In Yoakum County this vote was 78% for and 22% against quotas. This compares with a 71% to 29% vote in the referendum held one year ago.

The county office manager stated that, in looking at the register of voters, most all cotton farm operators voted in the referendum, with many wives not voting, and stated that good turn-out was highly appreciated.

This yes vote means that marketing quotas and acreage allotments will be in effect for the 1965 crop of cotton. Excess cotton will be subject to a marketing quotas penalty. The penalty for this year is 20.4 cents per point. The 1965 penalty rate will likely be about the same. It will be based on 50% of parity as of June 15, 1965. Excess cotton

will not count as history. A cotton price support at a level within a range of 65 to 90% of parity will be available to growers who do not exceed their effective farm allotment. The domestic cotton allotment program as we had in 1964 will be in effect and price support payments will be available to growers who voluntarily plant within their farm's domestic allotment. For most farms the domestic allotment will be 65% of the 1965 effective farm allotment. For the small farms it will be the smaller of 15 acres or the '65 effective allotment.

Cotton marketing quotas being in effect will, of course, mean much more work on the county office employees than if quotas were not in effect; however, all persons connected with the county ASCS office will do their best to see that the program is administered fairly and impartially to all interested producers. The office manager states that just criticism is always appreciated. He also stated that the county office work load has increased many times over since he came to Plains in 1949, and that the farmers' splendid cooperation and understanding is appreciated.

Christmas Concert Monday

\$55,000 Loss In Fire Here

An early morning alarm sent nine Plains Volunteer Firemen 7 miles west and 1-mile south of Plains to a fire, reportedly a barn fire, which turned out to be a pulling unit servicing a newly drilled oil well, just completed by the Bob Moran Drilling Co. of Hobbs, New Mexico.

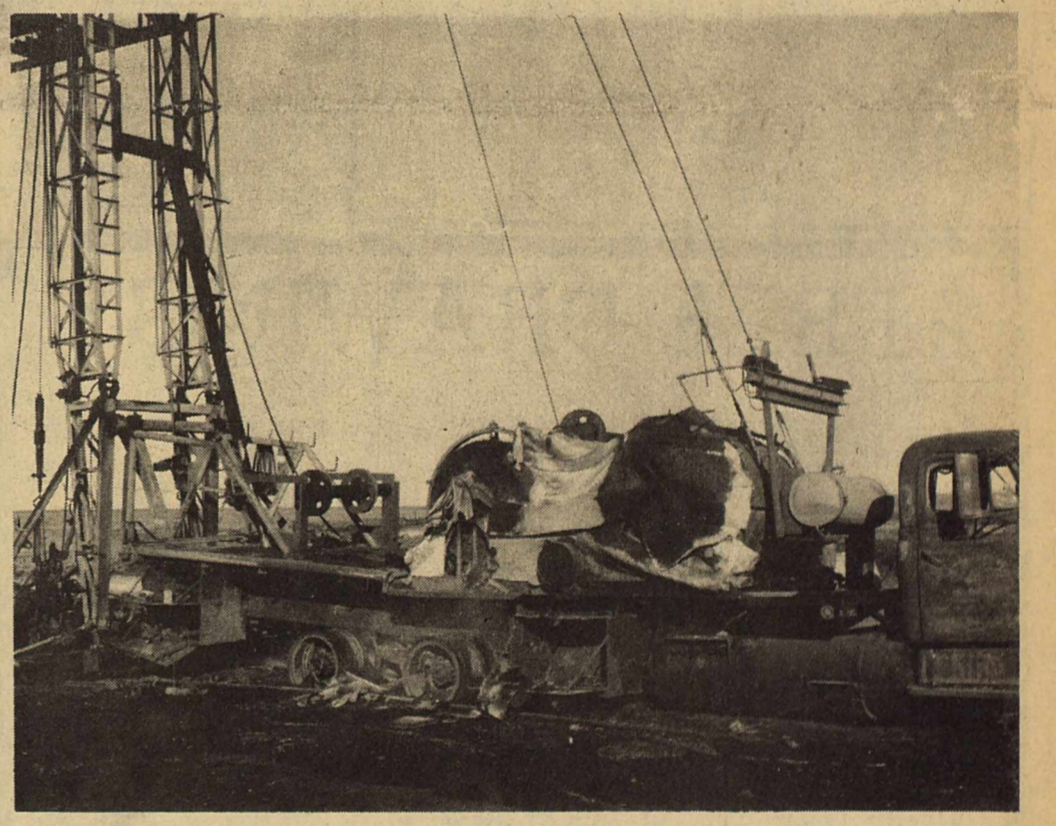
Reported cause of the blaze was the collapse of the alemitic gasket on the well head, which allowed "live" oil to be sprayed out of the well to an area surrounding the well and the pulling unit approximately 60 yards in diameter.

Two men, whose names were not known, one an employee of Dowell Chemical Co., who was bracketing the well, and the other a worker with Baker Oil Tool Co., reportedly received minor burns on the face and hands, when the spraying oil was ignited as a part of it sprayed onto the motor of the pulling unit and caught everything with which it came into contact on fire.

The fire occurred on Shell Oil Co.'s Pike Lease, and the pulling unit was reported to belong to Sun Rise Service, Inc., of Levelland.

Damage estimates placed the loss resulting from the fire at about \$55,000. Lost in the blaze was the pulling unit, with its entire hydraulic system, along with the truck on which it was mounted, and a 1965 Ford sedan, parked near the unit, belonging to Baker Oil Tool Co.

Plains firemen received the call at 5:30 p. m. Monday morning, and the blaze was brought under control by 6:10 a. m. One unit of the Denver City Fire Department also answered the call arriving at the scene at about 5:55 a. m.



\$55,000 damage was approximated in the fire which, Monday, razed the pulling unit above belonging to the Sun Rise Co. of Levelland. The fire occurred some eight miles southwest of Plains at 5:30 a. m. Monday. Below is the 1965 Ford belonging to Baker Oil Tool Co. that was also a total loss in the fire.

Cowboys In Denver City Tournament

Area basketball fans saw a real thriller here Tuesday evening when the Plains Cowboys hosted the Indians of Morton.

Morton jumped out to a commanding nine point lead in the first quarter of play, which the Cowboys were able to narrow down only to a 6 to 11 score at the end of the first period of play.

In the second quarter, however, Plains scored 22 points, and the halftime score was all tied up at 28 all.

The third period saw both teams score 11 points each, leaving the score tied at the end of that period 39 - 39.

In the final quarter, lead in the contest went back and forth between the two teams, but Plains was finally overcome by Morton who won the thriller 49 to 53.

Although the Cowboys lost the decision to the AA school, Coach Sewell stated that he thought the game was one of the team's finest efforts of the entire season to now.

In the B game which preceded the varsity game, the Cowboys won handily over Morton by 19 points, final score being, Plains 58 and Morton 48.

High point man for Plains in the B game was Ricky Elmore with 11 and he was followed by Myron Goehry with nine.

High pointer in the varsity game was Jack Lowe with 12 points. He also was the leading rebounder with 8, followed by Bruce Long with 7.

Monday afternoon Plains fishermen hosted the freshmen from Denver City here and

won 46 to Denver City's 32. High point men for Plains were Dan Field with 18; Jimmy Massey with 13; and Joe Beal with 9.

Last weekend, the Cowboys were in the Eunice tournament where, in their opening game they were beaten by NMMI, the eventual winners of the tournament, by a score of 62 to 37.

In their next game, Plains completely overpowered Dexter, N. M. 82 to 35.

In their final game in the tournament, Plains lost to the quintet from Lubbock Christian High School 51 to 61.

This weekend, Friday and Saturday, Plains is entered in the Denver City tournament. The Cowboys meet Denver City on Friday evening at 8:45 p. m.

Local Business

The role of free newspapers is perennially misrepresented by politicians who lose elections.

Often the distorted picture is deliberate, because experienced public officials know better. They know that the press attempts to be as fair as possible in its news columns.

But a public which does not always understand the various functions of its newspaper may be misled by half-truths.

Traditionally, the free editor reserves the right to express his own opinion in his editorials. The "stand" of the newspaper is judged by editorials expression. Yet, in news sections, and in letters to the editor, more space is often given to an opposing viewpoint.

In spite of victories during the Roosevelt and Truman elections, Democrats attacked the press. Supporters of Mr. Goldwater have given similar vent to their frustrations.

Both parties, unwittingly, have commended the press. For, as every editor knows, news columns have far more to do with the formation of opinion than editorial expression.

Like the advertiser, the politician presents his offerings. Newspapers give space worth billions of dollars to opposing sides. Before a campaign ends the American voter is saturated with information about major candidates.

For one reason or another, choice of candidates are based on public demand at a particular time.

The "stand" of a newspaper probably has no more final effect than the generalized claims of an advertiser who faces a competitor which promised to meet the needs of the consumer with specific benefits.



Stubble Coverage Is Important

The above photo shows Mr. John L. Fitzgerald in a good cover of grain sorghum stubble. This crop was planted by Jess and Carter Snodgrass on the Fitzgerald farm 7 miles south of Plains. The grain sorghum was planted in 27" rows, irrigated twice after planting and one preplanting irrigation. The crop produced 3,500 lbs. of grain and 4,000 lbs. of residue per acre in the area where the photo was taken. Good crop residue like this can be managed and

used to provide adequate protection from wind and water erosion next spring or it can be used as cow feed. Some grazing by livestock does not hurt the land but care must be taken that the entire crop is not harvested, that is, grazed off the land. Conservation farmers know that it takes 5,500 lbs. per acre in 40" rows of grain sorghum or in similar crops to give good protection from wind erosion, add organic matter, hold soil moisture and help maintain soil condition. This has been proven in the field and by

research by the use of wind tunnel that produced wind velocity up to 75 miles per hour. I. S. Chism, guardian for the Dorcus O. Moore Estate, made application for a Great Plains contract this week. 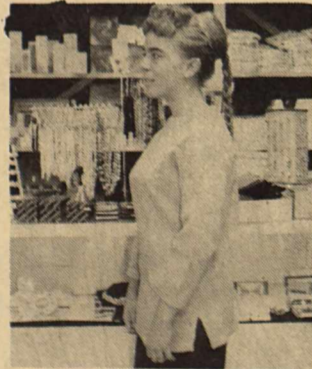

He devised a method of aiding construction in virgin terrain and under adverse arctic weather conditions through the use of explosives which materially reduced construction time and costs. The distinctive accomplishments of Capt. Light reflect credit upon him self, the Alaskan Air Command, and the United States Air Force."

He is now stationed at the Minor AFB in North Dakota. Capt. Light, with his wife Elsie, will visit during the Christmas Holidays, in the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Light, Sr. of Lubbock, and with Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Carpenter of Plains.

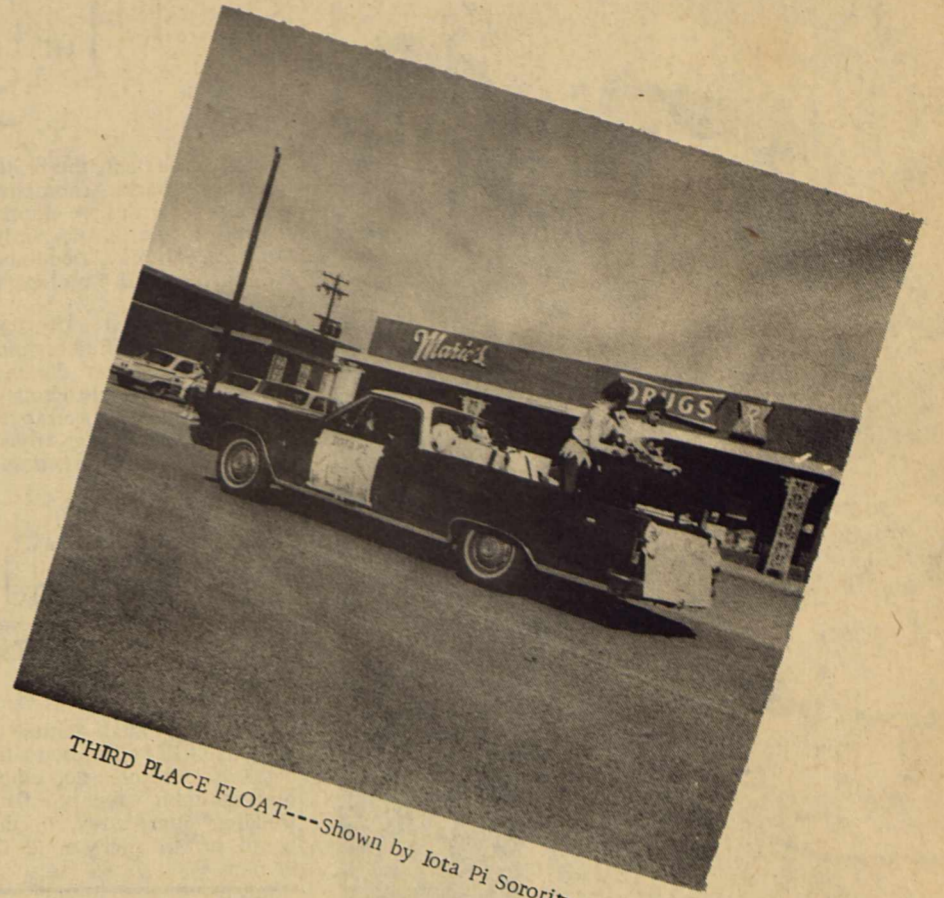

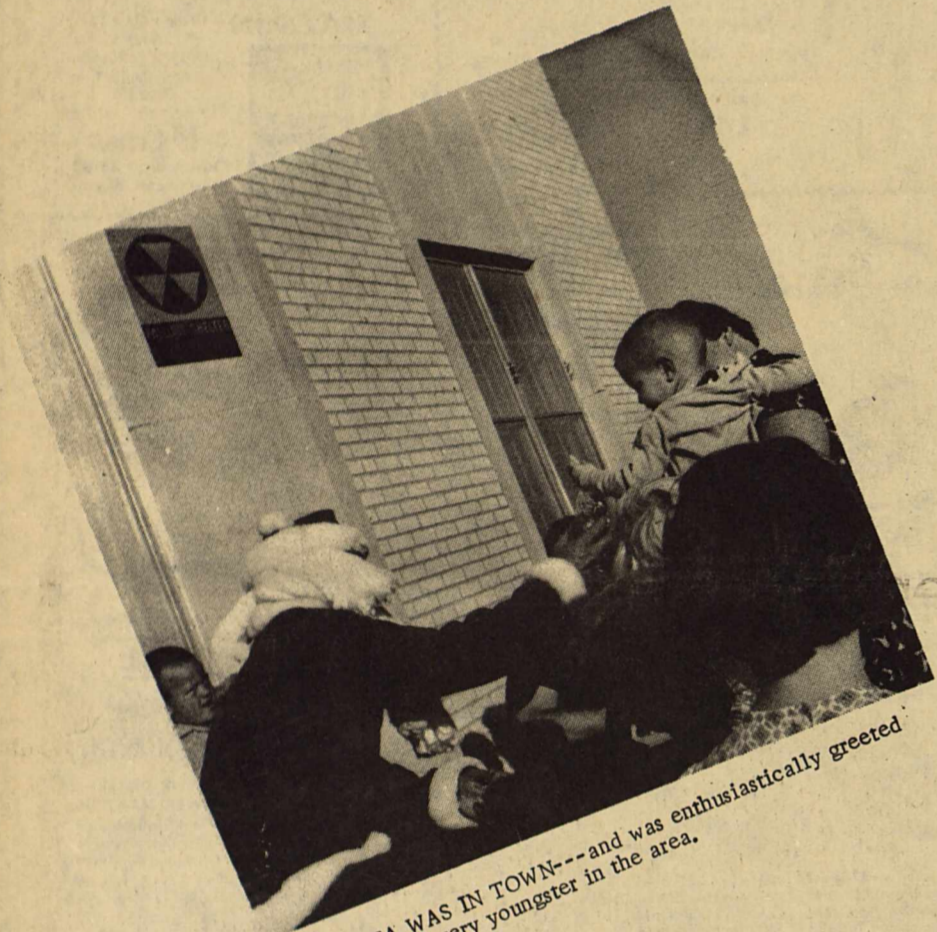

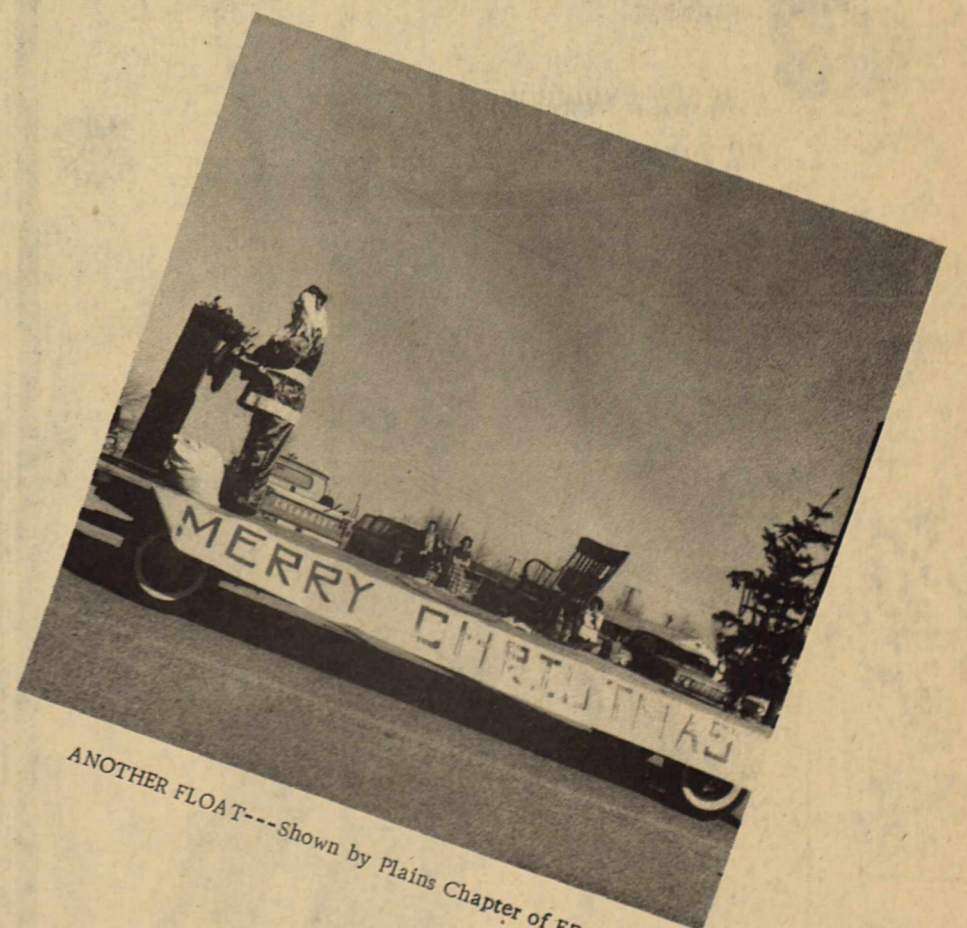

However, there still is a small mountain of holiday mail which must be delivered," he said.
