## "Browsing With Bev"

HOW TO PREPARE AND BAKE FROZEN DOUGH

(1) As soon as you remove the rolls from the freezer, place them in warm greased muffin tins over hot water, out of any draft, to rise. You may wish to remove the rolls from the paper cups because paper is a good insulator and tends to allow the warming of the dough; or you may wish to set the cups of dough on racks where

the warm, moist air can circulate around them. Rolls spread out on baking sheets where they have no support tend to increase in size by spreading out rather than rise.

(2) Let the rolls rise in a warm, moist place until light (from one to two hours). If the rolls rise slowly, "off" flavors may develop and coarse flattened cells and thick, tough crusts may form.

(3) Bake the rolls in the usual way at 400 degrees F. If desired, package the dough for rolls without shaping it into rolls in a flat sheet in the same manner as bread dough then thaw and shape the rolls in a similar manner.

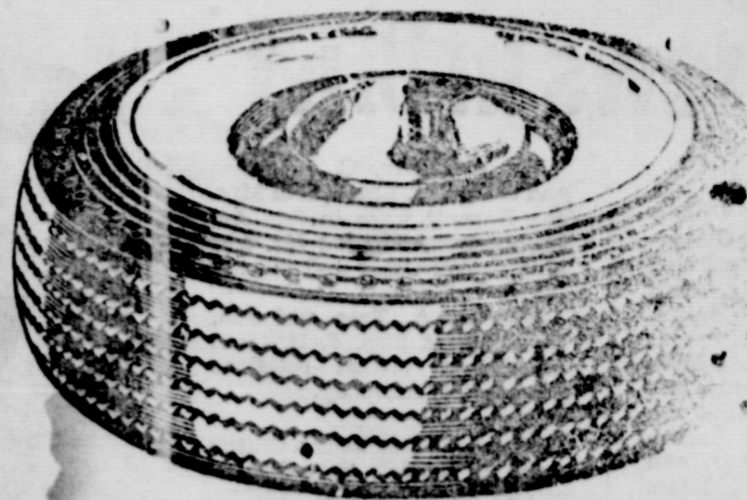

### Quail Raising Booklet Ready

WACO With the close of all hunting seasons and spring on the way, many quail hunters and landowners are seeking ways to better their quail hunting habitat.

A new booklet, Bobwhite Quail in Texas, authored by Game Fish Commission biologists A. S. Jackson, Clyde Holt and Dan Lay offer many management suggestions for improving pasture and farm lands for bobwhite production. The brochure, No. 101, is available from Game Fish Commission, Region II, 3725 Franklin, in Waco.

Printed in a pocket-sized edition, mention is made of the range of the birds, the requirements that the landowners may realize to be needed to produce quail, and depicts several types of weed seeds and farm grains that may be cultivated to produce cover and food.

Biologists feel that mistakes are often made in quail production that may be avoided and still not impair the function of the landowners utilization of farm acreage production. These mistakes are mentioned, and suggestions are made on types of cover and locations.

## WHAT IS POOLING?

In spite of all the jokes about "oil-rich Texans," most Texans aren't rich. Relatively few of them have even one oil well.

All Texans have a stake in the oil business, however, because it makes jobs, puts money into circulation, and pays taxes.

Texas oil operators have to compete with those in other states and foreign countries. This competition is tough and growing tougher. Improvements in production methods for greater efficiency are necessary in Texas. It is a question as to whether Texans prefer to do this job themselves or let the federal government do it.

Many of the most responsible people in the oil industry believe the Texas Legislature can solve some of the most troublesome problems by passing House Bill 510, an oil and gas pooling bill. "Pooling" in oil field language simply means putting separately-owned pieces of acreage together, sharing costs of drilling a well, and splitting any income proportionately.

A fair pooling law would create drilling blocks of uniform and proper size (according to the spacing pattern of the field). It would help the industry to cut down on unnecessary development drilling and thus free capital for more "wildcat" drilling. It would provide a legal way for landowners to divide their minerals in proportion to their holdings.

An outcry has been raised against House Bill 510 by the professional "small-tract drillers," who for many years have enjoyed the legal sanction to produce oil and gas which rightfully belonged to someone else. Advocates of pooling do NOT think that property rights should be confused with the "right" to take another man's property — or that free enterprise should cover the FREE CONFISCATION of another's oil and gas. 450

Contrary to claims of persons who, for reasons of their own, want to retain the outmoded methods of the past, House Bill 510 does NOT tie up large blocks of acreage with one well; it does not affect any wells already drilled or reservoirs already developed; it does not take away the landowner's bargaining power or change the terms of any lease except to the extent necessary to form a drilling block. House Bill 510 would merely give all landowners an opportunity to have their properties developed when some owners cannot be located or one owner seeks to obtain an unfair advantage. The rights of all would be EQUALLY protected.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510 — so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure each landowner his FAIR SHARE.

### Plan Ahead Of Time For Your Retirement Day

It is never too early to make plans for your future retirement, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene. He said the folks in the social security office will be glad to tell you what papers you will need when you file your claim for payments.

"You should make your claim for social security retirement payments two or three months before you actually retire," Tuley said. By doing this, you will get your payments on time when you retire.

Tuley warned older workers against waiting until after retirement to make their first visit to the social security office. Some often find that they could have gotten benefit payments even though still working. The best way to avoid this kind of loss is to check into social security before you retire.

If you are near age 62 and have never checked into your social security, do so today. Even if you are not ready to retire, you should check on your social security when you reach age 62, 65, and 72. Tuley advised. The social security office in Abilene is located at 203 Fannin Street.

### APPLICATIONS BEING TAKEN FOR LIONS CHILDRENS CAMP

Applications for eligible boys and girls are now being accepted for the Texas Lions Camp in Kerrville, according to local Lions Club. The camp is sponsored and owned by the Lions of Texas to provide a summer camp for the physically handicapped boys and girls of Texas.

Facilities at the Kerrville camp are equipped to handle 144 campers each two weeks and age limits are from seven through 16 years of age. Three camping periods for ages seven through 11, and two camping periods for boys and girls ages 12 through 16 are held each summer. The first period begins on Saturday, June 15.

Located east of Kerrville in the Texas hill country, the camp is situated on a 504 acre tract of land. Children attending the camp have the opportunity to observe wildlife such as deer, turkey, quail and other animals. A beautiful swimming pool with one counsellor supervising each two swimmers is available in addition to facilities

for leathercraft, ceramics, basket weaving and other handicrafts. Group activities and competitive sports such as archery, miniature golf and other games are available.
