

"Browsing With Bev"

BAKE FROZEN DOUGH (1) As soon as you rentove the rolls from the freezer, place them in warm greased muffin tins over hot water, out of any draft, to rise. You may wish to remove the rolls from the paper cups because paper is a good insulator and tends to allow the warming of the dough; or you may wish to set the cups of dough on racks where the warm, moist air can circulate around them. Rolls spread out on baking sheets where they have no support tend to increase in size by spreading out rather than rise

CARBON

(2) Let the rolls rise in a warm, moist place until light (from one to two hours). If the rolls rise slowly, "off" flavors may develop and coarse flattened cells and thick, tough crusts may form

(3) Bake the rolls in the usual way at 400 degrees F. If desired, package the dough for rolls without shaping it into rolls in a flat sheet in the same manner as bread dough then thaw and shape the rolls in a similar manner.



IS POOLING?

Quail Raising **Booklet Ready**

WACO With the close of all hunting seasons and spring on the way, many quail hunters and landowners are seeking ways to better their quail hunting habitat.

A new booklet, Bobwhite Quail in Texas, authored by Game Fish Commission bio-logists A. S. Jackson, Clyde Holt and Dan Lay offer many management suggestions for improving pasture and farm lands for bobwhite production. The brochure, No. 101, is available from Game Fish

Commission, Region II, 3725 Franklin, in Waco. Printed in a pocket-sized edition, mention is made of the range of the birds, the requirements that the landowners may realize to be needed to produce quail, and depicts several types of week seeds and farm grains that may be cultivated to produce cover and food.

Biologists feel that mistakes are often made in quail pro-duction that may be avoided and still not impair the function of the landowners utilization of farm acreage produc-tion. These mistakes are mentioned, and suggestions are made on types of cover and locations.

Many of the most responsible people in the oil industry believe the Texas Legislature can solve some of the most troublesome problems by passing House Bill 510, an oil and gas pooling bill. "Pooling" in oil field language simply means putting separately-owned pieces of acreage together, sharing costs of drilling a well, and splitting any income proportionately.

A fair pooling law would create drilling blocks of uniform and proper size (according to the spacing pattern of the field). It would help the industry to cut down on unnecessary development drilling and thus free capital for more "wildcat" drilling. It would provide a legal way for landowners to divide their minerals in proportion to their holdings.

An outcry has been raised against House Bill 510 by the professional "small-tract drillers," who for many years have enjoyed the legal sanction to produce oil and gas which rightfully belonged to someone else. Advocates of pooling do NOT think that property rights should be confused with the "right" to take another man's property - or that free enterprise should cover the FREE CONFISCATION of another's oil and gas. //

Contrary to claims of persons who, for reasons of their own, want to retain the outmoded methods of the past, House Bill 510 does NOT tie up large blocks of acreage with one well; it does not affect any wells already drilled or reservoirs already developed; it does not take away the landowner's bargaining power or change the terms of any lease except to the extent necessary to form a drilling block. House Bill 510 would merely give all landowners an opportunity to have their properties developed when some own cannot be located or one owner seeks to obtain an unfair advantage. The rights of all would be EQUALLY protected.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510 - so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure each landowner his FAIR SHARE,
