# Rep. George Asks Support of 10 Constitutional Amendments

State Representative Jesse T. George, Yoakum County's Austin lawmaker, has urged the voters of his five-county legislative district to turn out in large numbers at the polls, November 2, to cast their ballots in the Constitutional Amendments Election.

Lawmaker George, who stated he will support all ten amendments, has given approximately 43 speeches to various groups in his district explaining the amendments and giving both pro and con views on each.

George said approval of Amendment No. 1 increasing the state ad valorem tax by 5 cents on the \$100 valuation to be used for building construction by state institutions of higher learning, is necessary to provide adequate school plants to meet the increasing enrollments in Texas colleges and universities. George said further that, "Amendment No. 1 gives consideration to the growth factor

of an institution in making allocations of the tax money, whereas at the present time the allocations are made over a five-year period preceding the date of allocation. In our West Texas area, passage of this amendment would mean an additional \$12 to \$15 million for Texas Technological College."

Amendment No. 3 is of vital importance to the elderly segment of Texas, George continued. The amendment provides that the legislature shall enact appropriate legislation to enable Texas to continue cooperating with the Federal government in providing assistance and medical care on behalf of certain aged, needy, and handicapped persons. "Approval of Amendment No. 3 is essential if Texas is to continue its participation in a medical care program for old age assistance recipients, which use federal funds. A withdrawal of federal funds would result in great hardship to participants and final death

to the Texas medical care program," George stressed.

Representative George said that approval of Amendment No. 4, authorizing a 4 year term of office for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, and other state officials elected in state-wide elections, would give the people of Texas more efficient utilization of their state officers and would enable executives more time to formulate state policy essential to productive operations. George said similar approval on Amendment No. 10, providing four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives, would serve to keep an equal balance of power between the legislative and executive branches of state government, and would reduce burdensome campaign expenditures every two years. George urged that voters either vote for both Amendment 4 and 10 or against both.

Of extreme importance according to George, to the teaching profession in Texas is public approval of Amendment No. 5, which gives constitutional stature to both the Texas Teacher Retirement System and the Board of Trustees of the Teacher Retirement system. It would further serve as an attraction to the teacher profession, as well as keeping experienced teachers in the teaching ranks.

Amendment No. 6, another in the education field, and one which George served as a co-author, provides for the issuance of bonds to be used in creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund as a loan fund for Texas students attending public and private institutions of higher education in the State.

According to George, "Amendment No. 6, if approved, will allow the issuance of \$85 million in bonds to be used by students who are financially unable to complete their college education. The single greatest natural resource in the State of Texas is its young people, and such a loan as this amendment provides would assure many of these students the college training they deserve. The loans would be repaid, principal and interest, after the student completes his college training. This is an area where the state has assumed a vital responsibility in the greatest American investment, Education."

Representative George concluded his plea for a heavy voter turnout by emphasizing "It is a vital responsibility of all responsive and responsible citizens to familiarize themselves with these amendments, as they are a basic part of our representative form of government. Often amendments are not defeated because of opposition to them, but because of voter apathy and complacency. This, of course, can result in a government by default. Regardless of your stand please make your stand count by going to the polls on Nov. 2. Remember that an alert and knowledgeable citizen will remain a free citizen."

# Cowboys Smash Eagles 65-0 in District Rout

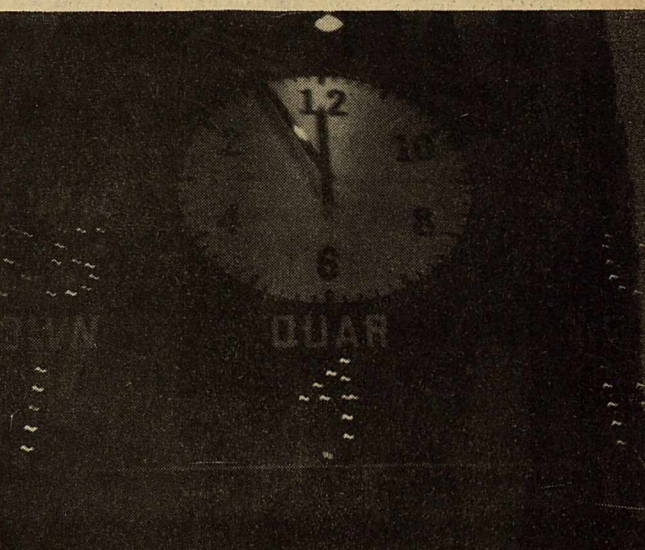
The Plains Cowboys sent the Eagles from O'Donnell home last Friday night looking like a plucked bunch of birds to the tune of 65-0.

Plains hammered the hapless Eagles throughout the game with a relentless ground attack, scoring the first play from scrimmage on a 63 yard run.

The Cowboys released an attack that was overwhelming in netting over 600 yards in the game. The aerial bomb and field goal were used in making the defeat a sound one.

The game was decided early in the contest as the first 12 minutes of the game showed the Cowboys with a 28-0 lead. O'Donnell found the Plains defensive unit just as hard to cope with as their trying to contain the powerful offense. Time after time throughout the contest, Eagles were thrown for big losses.

Coach Rip Sewell, head mentor for the Cowboys, stated that he had played 22 different boys in the first 15 minutes of the grid match. The Plains coach said that the team is looking good and that he expects a good effort from the team when they meet the Seagraves Eagles this Friday at Seagraves. The local pigskin mentor talked reluctantly about the ever increasing possibility that the Cowboys will win district and enter the battle for the State Crown. He

said that Seagraves is one of the biggest hurdles which his team must cross, but added that if the boys are championship material that they will find a way to overcome that hurdle. Coach Sewell stated that the Seagraves team is strong on defense, and that the Cowboys must watch their missiles to beat the Eagles. If the Cowboys team defeats the Seagraves team they will have an almost certain tie for the District title. The Cowboys have been installed as a 13 point favorite to do just that, and are heavily favored

to win the district crown. Joe Dan Cooke, leading scorer and ground gainer for the Cowboys has netted a total of 1003 yards for the season, and will break the school record if he hasn't already in yards gained. Cooke has scored 120 points and needs 31 more to set a new school record in the scoring department.

Other Cowboy scorers and the total of points are; Bobby Taylor, 6; Ronnie Elmore, 30; Butch Gayle, 34; Dennis Crutcher, 30; Greg Jones, 12; Ricky Elmore, 6, and Milton Romans, 6. The team total is 244 points and they have given up only 65 points to have the best overall team in the district.

# Cotton Loan Rule Change

All Form-A Cotton Loans this year will be made by ASCS County Offices. All loan documents will be kept in the ASCS County Offices until the loan matures of the cotton is redeemed. The Form-G loans which is handled through Cotton Cooperatives, Marketing Associations, ect. will not be made by ASCS; and most all ginner in the County have advised that it is their opinion that cotton ginned by their gins and placed in the loan will be Form-G loans.

Clerk's in both banks have been approved by the County ASCS Committee to prepare loan documents and farmers wanting Form-A loans may, if it is more convenient, take the cotton receipts to the bank

or to any clerk outside the county who is approved to make Form-A loans for the county. Both tenants, landowners and lienholder's must sign the loan documents.

The loan rate for middling 1" inch cotton stored in nearby Texas warehouses is 28.95 per pound; with premiums and discounts for higher and lower grades of cotton.

The 1965 farm cotton marketing cards are being prepared as the farms are cleared for a card and may be picked up at the county office or will be mailed on request. Under the regulations it is necessary for farmers to have an approved marketing card when selling or placing cotton in the CCC loan.

# The Texas Poll

## 4-Year Terms Given Approval of Majority

Texans favor extending the terms of office to four years for governor and other state officials, and for state representatives.

According to results of a statewide survey of public opinion completed last month, a representative cross section of Texas adults favored a change from 2-year to 4-year terms. This reaffirms similar findings of a study last February which first revealed that a shift in public opinion had taken place since 1962.

In January, 1962, the Texas Poll found a majority of voters favored limiting the governor to two terms of two years each and opposed two 4-year terms.

THE INFLUENCE of Gov. John Connally in the present political scene and the general trend to 4-year terms in other states have probably contributed to this shift of opinion.

In the current survey the question posed was: "Soon we will be asked to vote on several changes to the Texas Constitution. The first is on making the term of office for governor and other state officials four years; read it over, and tell me whether you would vote for or against it if you were voting today?" (Respondents were shown a card quoting the ballot wording of the amendment.)

All Adults  
For 4-year term for Governor and other officials..... 54%  
Against ..... 38  
No opinion ..... 8

The 4-year term for state representatives was also favored, though by a slightly smaller majority. According to the current survey:

For 4-year term for state representatives ..... 51%  
Against ..... 41  
No opinion ..... 8

On the governor's term, majorities of self-styled Democrats, Republicans and Independents favored the lengthened term, although Republicans were more evenly divided.

For state representatives, 6 out of every 10 Democrats with an opinion favored the 4-year term, 6 of every 10 Republicans opposed it, and Independents were evenly divided.

THE SURVEY was made in anticipation of the election Nov. 2 to amend the state constitution but, having been made nearly two months before the election, the results cannot be regarded as a prediction of the election.

If the two constitutional amendments are passed, the election in 1968 would provide for the first 4-year term for the governor, following the trend established by most of the other states. Some states prohibit the governor from succeeding himself, or limit the number of terms to two. The Texas proposition does not mention such limitations.

Until recent times, governors were elected to no more than two terms of two years each, but since Allan Shivers' administration third-term talk begins almost as soon as the second-term election is over.

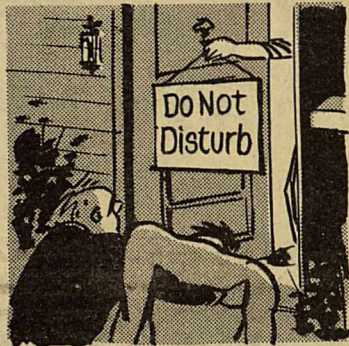

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### Duty of a Doctor

Imagine what would happen if a doctor, awakened by urgent knocking at the front door of his home at midnight, refused to give medical aid to an auto accident victim who later bled to death on his doorstep. In such a very unlikely event the cries of indignation would ring out mightily. The doctor's indifference would outrage both the ethics of medicine and the morals of religion.

Yet, the doctor would not be acting unlawfully. For a doctor has no legal duty to "take all comers." Unless he has some special, pre-existing relationship with an individual patient, he has the right to turn him down. For various reasons, part historical, part practical, our law does



not ordinarily require a doctor (or anyone else, either) to lend a helping hand to the stranger in distress.

But once a doctor does take over, his legal position changes. From then on, he owes the patient an affirmative duty to be diligent.

Consider this case: A physician applied a cast to the fractured arm of an elderly woman patient, who immediately complained that the cast was too tight. Despite continuing complaints, the physician did not split the cast. He then left the country for a two-week vacation trip without arranging for another physician to care for the patient. As a result, she suffered partial paralysis of her arm.

For the physician's negligence and abandonment of the patient, a court later held him liable for damages.

On the other hand, even after a doctor takes a case, his duty to be attentive has reasonable, common-sense limits.

For instance: A woman's finger became so badly infected that it had to be amputated. Suing her doctor, she complained that for more than a week he had been unavailable to his patients.

But in court, it turned out that the doctor had taken time off only because his own father had died. It also turned out that he had given the woman the name of a competent substitute, whom she had simply refused to see.

The court decided that, in these circumstances, the doctor had properly fulfilled whatever duty he owed. As one judge commented: "After all, doctors are human."
