Child Dies From Freak Fall In Auto Accident

Little Rebecca Lyne Field, two three year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel D. Field died from severe head injuries which she suffered when she fell from the door of a moving car Monday morning in Plains. Rebecca would have been 3 years old in February. She was in the car with her grandmother, Mrs. S. C. Kee when the accident occurred. The child fell from the front right door as her grandmother was backing the car away from her place of business at the Western Grill Cafe and the front wheel of the moving car ran over the child's head.

Deputy Sheriff Don Rogers investigated the accident and said that the child was taken immediately to the clinic and that every effort was made to save her life, but that there was just nothing that could be done.

Little Rebecca is survived by her mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Samuel D. Field, of Plains and one sister, Patricia

Suzanne. The maternal grand parents are Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Kee, Plains, and the paternal grand parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Field Hondo, Texas.

The injured child was rushed to the office of Dr. Walker by Mr. G. Chapman, owner of Chap's Gulf Station and the Western Grill. Mrs. Kee was driving her 1962 Ford at the time of the accident.

Man Dies in Plains Wreck

Stanley Fortenberry, 44, former Plains resident and presently a mechanic at the Plains Farm Supply was killed Wednesday night when the car in which he was a passenger crashed into the side of a loaded grain truck on the Lovington highway in front of Plains Chemical Company a few yards out of the city limits of Plains, at about 8:40 p.m. Critical injuries were suffered in the accident by the driver of the automobile, L. J. Bundrant, Lubbock attorney. Bundrant was rushed to the hospital in Denver City by Barrett's Ambulance, Willy Davis, driver of the loaded grain truck was un-injured.

Eye witnesses accounts reported that the truck was turning and the Rambler automobile driven by Bundrant traveled west and had picked up speed to about 50-60 miles per hour when the collision occurred. The eye witness accounts said that the truck was attempting to get off the road at the time of the wreck. The skid marks on the pavement showed that the breaks were applied about 20 feet before the moment of impact. The speed zone where the collision occurred is 45 mph.

The driver of the truck, Willy Davis, Seminole was arrested the following day and charged with negligent Homicide. Bond was set at \$1,500 by Judge Duval and the accused was released. He is being represented by Cleatus Phelan, local attorney.

Other eye witness reports stated Fortenberry was killed instantly in the crash. He was officially declared dead in route to the hospital, as a result of head injuries.

Funeral services were conducted in Denver City for Fortenberry last Sunday. He is survived by his widow and four children still living at home, and had other children who have married or have left home.

Bundrant was reported to be an attorney for the Texas Highway Department. Highway patrolmen investigating the case went to Denver City and talked to Bundrant after investigating the accident scene. The state officers filed charges on the truck driver the next day.

The truck was owned by Lovington Storage Company and sustained damage to the rear right wheels. The back wheels froze and were in a locked position when it was removed from the highway. Tingles wrecking Service removed the automobile from

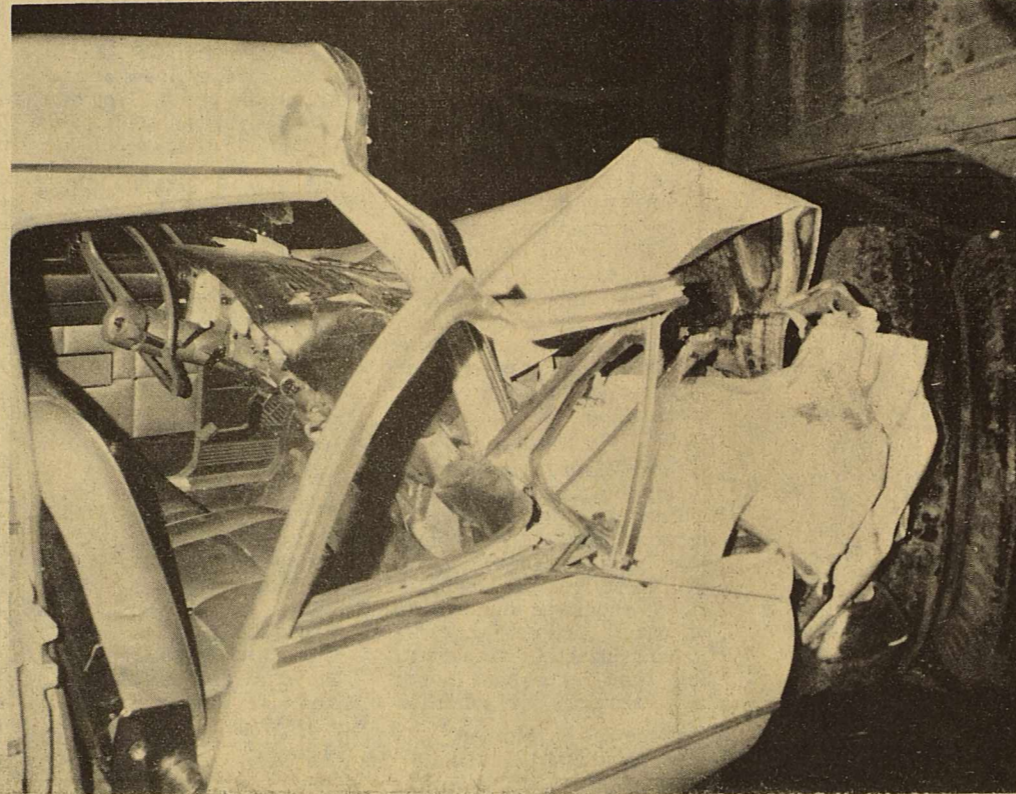
moved the automobile from the road. Fortenberry was the manager of the Judge Bean Courts when he lived in Plains and also worked at the Plains Farm Supply here.

The editor of The Record interviewed the driver of the truck after bond was set the following day at the court-

house. He stated that he lives in Seminole and is married and has a family. Mr. Davis is a negro. He stated that he is an experienced driver and that he sped up as fast as the loaded truck could pick up speed but could not get it off the highway before the crash. The rear of the truck was in about the center of the road

at an angle on the north side of the highway coming east. The cab was off of the road in the bar ditch.

It was believed that Mr. Bundrant was taking Mr. Fortenberry to his car at the Plains Farm Supply which is located further west from the scene of the accident.

City Explains Cause For Water Turnoff

Bob Long, City Secretary, reported that the water supply in Plains was cut off for about an hour and 45 minutes last Thursday from about 6:00 p. m. until 7:45 p. m. due to a leak in a two inch line. The City Secretary also said that a six inch main and a four inch line connected the smaller one and that the line could not be isolated without cutting the entire supply of water off.

Long further stated that with the new mains which are being

installed that it will be possible to isolate the leaks in the future. He said that the leak was in the old part of Plains, and that a section of the line had to be cut out.

Long said that it had to be done or the water supply in the tank would have been depleted. The City Secretary said that he realized that it caused the housewives an inconvenience, but that the emergency repair could not wait.

Sheriff Heath Reports Crimes Solved

Officers from the Yoakum County Sheriff's office cracked a ring of young burglars this week who were charged with three cases in Denver City and the recent break-in at Horky L. P. Gas Company and Chaps Gulf Station in Plains.

The four youths ranged in age from 16 to 21 years old. They also admitted taking a Dodge auto in Plains last week. After recovering a stolen auto from Levelland, Deputy Sheriff Rogers saw the youths near the scene and followed up the lead. It proved to be accurate and the arrests were made.

The four young men were taken into custody in Denver City and were charged. They were released on \$1000 bond

and are no longer in jail. Sheriff Heath's administration has been known for quickly solving many such crimes in the county, and several rings have been put out of operation and behind bars. The records show that not only burglar rings have been smashed, but that the bootleggers of the county have been put out of business. The crime rate has decreased in Yoakum County and many unsolved cases have been cleared up and closed.

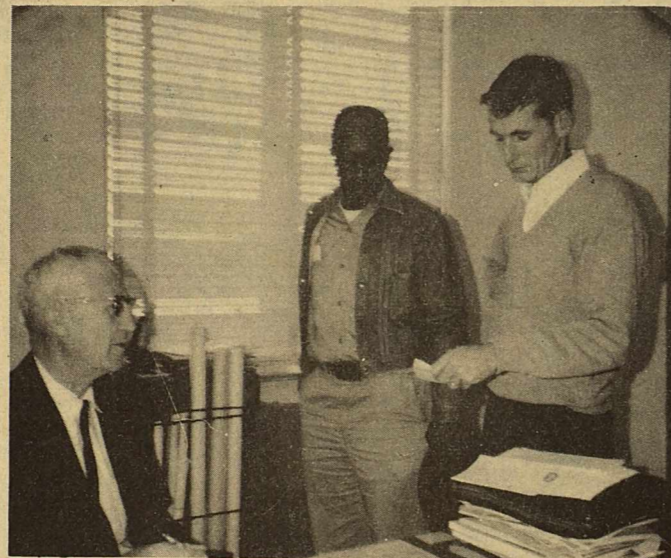
A spokesman from the sheriff's office also stated that the Ford car which was stolen in Levelland could probably be credited to the youths who were arrested this week.

61 Counties Can Transfer Cotton Allotments By Dec. 31st

In the referendum held on November 23rd, producers in the 61 counties listed below voted to permit the transfer, by sale or lease, of farm upland cotton allotments to other counties within the state during 1966, 67 and 68.

Eligible farmers in Yoakum interested in leasing or buying cotton allotments from farmers in any of the above counties or from other producers in Yoakum County should keep in mind that December

31, 1965 is the final date to have the transfer of allotment documents filed.

In considering the price to be paid for a lease or purchase it appears that a farmer should consider the price to be paid per pound, the expected price to be received for cotton produced in 1966 and later, the payments that may be earned by reducing the acreage 1 1/2, 25 or 35 percent, and the feed grain payments that may be lost if complying with the feed grain program.

The support price for 1966 upland cotton is 21¢ per pound average location, midling one inch cotton. The maximum amount that may be transferred by lease or sale is 100 acres over the original 1965 cotton allotment, per farm. If a Yoakum County farmer leased or purchased 100 acres allotment from one of the eligible counties with an approved projected yield of 250 pounds per acre to be transferred.

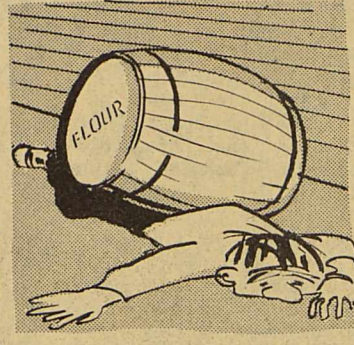

Plaintiff's Secret Weapon

Just as scientists tell of the famous apple that fell on Isaac Newton's head, so do lawyers tell of a famous barrel that fell on the head of a certain Mr. Byrne. If you should ever have occasion to sue for damages, the case of the falling barrel may well give you your strongest single weapon in the courtroom.
Byrne was walking past a warehouse in an English town when a



barrel of flour dropped out of a second-story window and laid him low.

Suing afterward for damages, Byrne was faced with the task of proving negligence on the part of the warehouse employees. But he had no way of knowing why the barrel had fallen. Nor would any of the company's employees admit fault.

Luckily for Byrne, the judge came to his rescue with an apt Latin phrase: "res ipsa loquitur." That means "the thing speaks for itself." The judge reasoned that barrels simply don't fall out of warehouses that are being run in a careful manner.

Res ipsa loquitur, or something roughly similar, is now recognized in all American courts. It does not excuse an injured claimant who is charging negligence from proving his charge. But if he lacks direct proof, it does give him the benefit of common-sense deductions from the facts that he can prove.

A girl, eating a candy bar, bit on a pin embedded in the chocolate. Neither she nor anyone else knew how the pin had gotten there.

Yet, with no sign that the bar had been tampered with, a court ruled—"res ipsa loquitur" that the accident itself was good evidence of negligence at the candy factory.
However, the res ipsa loquitur doctrine, being based on common sense, is also limited by common sense. The bare fact that the plaintiff suffered an injury does not necessarily justify an inference that the defendant was negligent. There may be other plausible explanations for what happened.

For example:
A passenger in a car was injured when one of the tires had a blowout. This fact alone was held not grounds for finding the driver guilty of negligence. Blowouts, said the court, can and do befall even the careful driver.

If the projected yield on the receiving farm does not exceed the yield for the transferring farm by more than 10 percent, acre for acre would be transferable. Cropresidue management, the system of leaving the residue on the land as a shield or cover against the loss of both soil and moisture, is still gaining in popularity. As much as two inches of moisture has been saved in the past and several inches of top soil with one crop of grain sorghum stubble. The savings per acre to each farmer amounts to a fair crop when the residue is used instead of being destroyed by shredding and plowing.

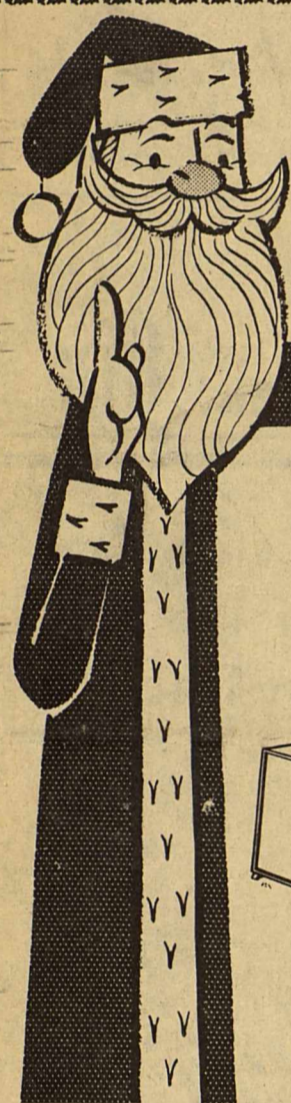

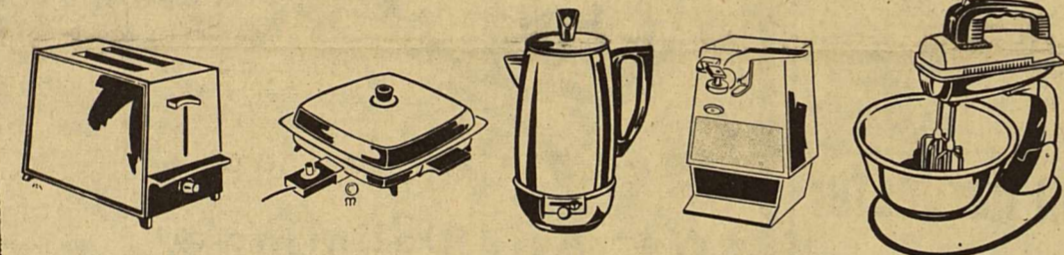

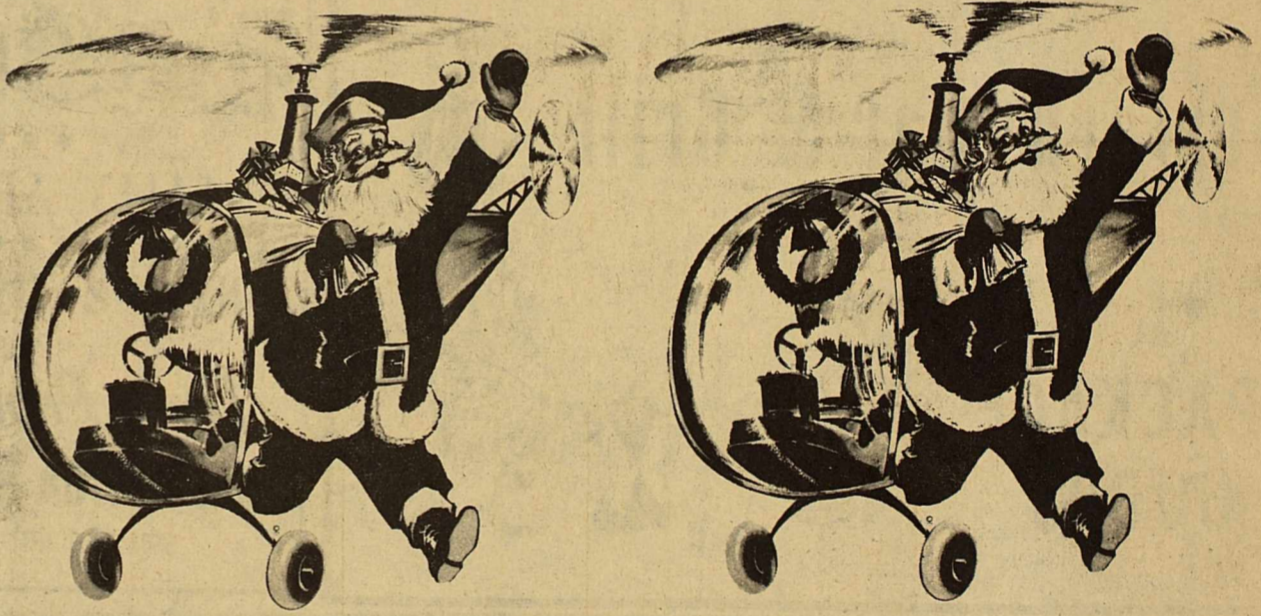
