

THE CANDIDATES

The polls open at 8 a. m. Saturday April 2nd at the Plains High School Library and will remain open until 7 p. m. for the Plains Independent School District election for four members for the Board of Trustees.

Seven candidates will be vying for seats on the board of education at the election. The four incumbent members are seeking re-election to the board of trustees and three hopeful candidates are also in the field. The four positions are elected at large and the four top vote getters in the field will win the seats on the board of education.

All seven men are well known in the community. Each candidate was asked to make a statement to the paper stating why he is seeking to be elected to the school board. As a public service, the editor of The Record is printing the statement of each candidate and each candidate's picture in order that the electorate can have more information about the candidates.

Also as a public service, The Plains Record is sponsoring a "Get Out the Vote" campaign, without endorsing any candidate, in order to attempt to get a large representation of the voters to the polls to voice their opinion with a vote. Each candidate interviewed expressed his desire that the public go to the polls in big numbers to exercise their constitutional privilege of casting a ballot.

If any person desires transportation without obligation to the school to vote, they may call 456-4116 or 456-2929 and a car will be dispatched to their house and transportation will be furnished to and from the polls.

The Record has taken the stand that in order to be a good citizen a person should exercise his constitutional right of casting a ballot and has urged the public to vote for the candidate of their choice on Saturday April 2nd at the Plains High School Library.

Under each picture of the candidates is the statement which the candidate issued concerning his candidacy for office. This news story has been offered as a community service to those who are interested about their schools.



Cleveland is sponsoring the beef calf gain contest. Showmanship awards will be given by A. E. McGinty for Beef Calves, Bill Gray in Swine and Tex Parrott in Lamb division. The directors will meet on April 25 to begin making plans for the 1967 Junior Fat Stock Show.

The Plains State Bank presented each exhibitor in the 1966 show with a cash award. Those who exhibited calves received \$5.00, those who had barrows and no calves received \$3.00 and those who had only lambs received \$2.50.

Autopsy Report

Autopsy reports were complete this week concerning the death of Bill White, five year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert White, of Tokio. The report showed that the child died from a Pullmanian Virus. The virus is a rare type, which is considered lethal. Several cases have been reported in West Texas recently. One other case was of a football player from Lubbock. The report showed that nothing could have been done to save the child's life.

Little Bill died last week in the Yokum County Clinic in Plains, after receiving emergency treatment to save his life. The autopsy was made in Lubbock.

Funeral services were conducted last Thursday at the First Baptist Church in Plains and burial was in Brownfield under the direction of Barrett's Funeral Home.

Cowboy Relays Start Here At 3:30 P.M. Tomorrow

Coach Rip Sewell announced that the Cowboy Relays will get under way at Cowboy Stadium at 3:30 p. m. tomorrow with the field events, and the track preliminaries at 4 p. m. The finals will start at 7 p. m. sharp, and Coach Sewell said that the fans should plan on being there on time because the events will come off as scheduled.

The teams entered are: Friendship, Jai, Tatum, Eunice, Wink, Seagraves, O'Donnell, Gail, Klondike, and Plains. Coach Sewell said that the event is one of the best track meets on the South Plains.

The Cowboys Relays are being co-sponsored by the Lions Club in Plains, and local Lions will assist in officiating the meet. The Lions Club will also prepare a meal for the athletes in the Cafeteria between the preliminaries and the finals.

There will be a small admission fee charged at the meet and if paid in the afternoon it will be good for the finals. Admission will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

Coach Sewell announced that fine efforts on his team's part netted a victory and first place honors at the Roughneck Relays in Sundown last Saturday. Plains garnered a total of 78 points to edge Cooper with 66, and Morton with 58 points. The 440 sprint relay squad set a meet record in running away with first place with a time of 45.1 in an excellent run which is most respectable in any event. The


old record was set in 1963 by Plains. Calvin Smith paced the Plains squad with an amazing 42 point performance. Calvin set a new record in the pole vault with a height of 12 feet 1 inch. The old record was 12 feet even. He also won the low hurdles, second in the high hurdles, second in the broad jump, third in the high jump. Smith won an outstanding award trophy as high point man of the meet.

Dennis Crutcher placed 4th in the 100 yard dash, Ronnie Elmore 2nd in the 220, the mile relay team finished sixth, N. C. Clatohan 5th in the discus. Plains placed in 10 of the 14 events to sweep to victory in the meet.

The Cowboy squad has improved all year placing fourth at the Gas Capitol Relays, 2nd in the Wink Relays, third in the Hale Center Relays, and first in the Roughneck Relays.

The Cowboy team will travel to Wink next Thursday for the District meet. Barring injuries this week, Coach Sewell expects the Cowboys to be a strong contender to sweep the district crown. The Cowboys have improved in each track meet, and show power at this point of the season. The Pokes have faced strong competition in all of their meets and have consistently edged 2-A and 3-A teams to place strong on the road.

Strongest competition in the district meet is expected to come from two strong teams, Tahoka and Wink.

Editorial

The electorate will go to the polls on Tuesday April 5th to elect a mayor and two members to serve on the city council. The election has become a heated one with issues which must be decided at the polls. The picture in Plains is clear cut. The mayor is seeking to be elected to a new term and the two incumbent members on the city council are asking the voters to be returned to office.

These races are filled with opponents. We urge the good citizens of Plains to use simple logic before voting next Tuesday. The logic is this: If you are of the opinion that the present administration has given you sound government based on equality and fiscal stability, then return the incumbents to office for another term. If you believe the people seeking the offices for the first time are more qualified and will be able to become better servants of the people, then by all means vote your convictions.

Do not vote for change's sake and by all means do not cast a ballot for a person because he is already in the office. Examine the issues in the race and talk to the candidates seeking re-election and to those who are running for a first term. It is our duty as American citizens to know what our office seekers stand for and what their beliefs are. And above all, it is our duty to go to the polls and vote for the candidate of our choice.

Let us not go to the polls in order to cast spiteful ballots, but instead let us use logic and search for something of value to support, whether it be a new or an old idea. Let us cast prudent intelligent ballots and walk away from the polls knowing that we have demonstrated our willingness to support progress in our community.

And finally let us urge the good people of this community to employ good old fashioned horse sense and separate the men from the boys on election day.

Water District Board Meeting

The Directors of the South Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 4 at the first meeting of the Board, elected the following Officers: President, John Kendrick, Brownfield; Vice-President, Bob Lee, Plains; and Secretary, Joe Anderson, Seminole.

Other directors include Claude Hearne from Seagraves and M. R. Stewart from Lamasa. In other business, the board set the election date for the voters to vote on conformation of the District, that date being Tuesday, April 26, 1966. Polling places in Yokum County include: PLAINS - City Hall, for residents of the City of Plains.

PLAINS - County Courthouse, residents of rural area at Plains. DENVER CITY - City Hall, for residents of the City of Denver City. DENVER CITY - Community Building, for rural area residents. Qualifications of voters include: Must be a resident of the Water District area, property owning tax-payer or property owner who has rendered taxable property, and having a poll-tax receipt or having registered free under the recent free registration period, or qualifying for exemption.

ELECTION DAY

City elections in Plains have shaped up with incumbent mayor Kenneth Hale bidding for re-election, challenged by Billy Kennedy. Two Aldermen will be elected at the polls and six candidates are vying for the two seats up for grab. Alvie Faulkenberry, Frank Spencer, James Barnett, and Tommy McDonnell are bidding to win the two seats held by incumbents Roy Edwards and Ed Hunter. Both Hunter and Edwards are seeking re-election.

Faulkenberry and Spencer are both businessmen in Plains and Jim Barnett works for L. O. rkey L. P. Gas, and Tommy McDonnell is an employee of Shell Oil Company. Both Hunter and Edwards are Pharmacists.

Dwane McDonnell is unopposed for City Marshal. In the race for Mayor both men are well known in the community. Hale has served as mayor since Mayor Pro Tem Neil Taylor left office, and has eight years experience on the council. Kennedy is civic minded and has entered the

Teacher Group Pictures Ideal Board Candidates

Voters in school districts across Texas will soon be voting in school board elections and school boards, as always, need the best qualified citizens.

The ideal school board member should be an open-minded, fair, and intelligent citizen with a deep understanding of education's importance, the Texas State Teachers Association says.

TSTA has compiled a list of qualifications for the ideal school board member.

The qualifications would rule out extremists on both the left and the right.

In publishing the qualification list TSTA urged voters in Texas's 1,350 school districts, to avoid those candidates who seek places on school boards for political gain or personal prestige.

Unselfish

Here is TSTA's summary of an ideal candidate:

- He has an unselfish interest in the welfare of the child, the schools and the community.
- He possesses the will to represent the school district as a whole rather than a political clique, a geographical section or a political cause or party.
- He has courage to explain and back up rulings which are proper but perhaps unpopular.
- He can think independently and objectively.
- He understands the need and has the desire to work with other board members even when he is on the minority side of a question.
- He can carry on cheerfully

when his sincere efforts do not stimulate public opinion.

Full Partners

● He believes that the professional staff of the school is a full partner in the process of achieving excellence in education.

● He can recognize and abide by the lines of authority which distinguish the powers and functions of the school board and the administration.

● He is willing to give up liberal amounts of his own time.

● He is able to withhold judgment on critical issues until all the facts are known.

● He respects and listens to the opinions of those with specialized preparation.

Dignity

● He has the ability to recognize his own errors and change his mind without considering it a loss of personal stature or as a sign of weakness.

● He has a demonstrated respect for the dignity of each individual and for the opinion of others.

● He understands the vital relationship between high caliber education and high caliber teachers and administrators.

● He supports policies which contribute directly to highest standards and thus high morale among students and teachers.

● He understands that leadership in his community's schools often will require him to redirect public opinion into more constructive channels.

The Plains presentation was The Glass Menagerie. It was directed by Robert Ferrer, O'Donnell and Seagraves placed.





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

BARBECUE HAMBURGER MIX

- 4 medium onions, chopped
- 3 cloves garlic finely chopped
- 2 cups chopped celery tops
- 4 pounds hamburger
- 1/4 cup fat
- 4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 3 tablespoon worchestershire sauce
- 2 - 12 oz. bottles catsup

Pan fry the onion, garlic and celery in fat. Add hamburger and cook until all redness of meat disappears. Add salt, worchestershire sauce, pepper, catsup. Simmer 20 minutes. Skim off excess fat.

TO FREEZE: Cool quickly; spoon mixture into five 1-pint containers. Seal, label with name and date. May be stored in freezer 2 months.

BARBECUED HAMBURGER BUNS: Heat Mix slowly in skillet. Use as filling in hot buttered hamburger buns. (Allow 1/2 cup per bun)

CHILI CON CARNE: Heat barbecued mix in skillet with an equal amount of red kidney beans. Season with chili powder.

SPAGHETTIE WITH BARBECUED HAMBURGER MIX: Heat Mix in saucepan. Add a dash of Cayenne pepper and garlic salt. Serve on hot cooked spaghetti and top with grated Parmesan Cheese.

HAMBURGER NOODLE SKILLET: Heat 1 pint of Mix in saucepan with 2 cups cooked noodles and 1 cup canned mixed vegetables. Stir to combine. Sprinkle 1/2 cup shredded quick melting cheese and 1/2 teaspoon chopped parsley over the top. Do not stir. Heat to melt cheese, 4 to 7 servings.

HAMBURGER RICE SKILLET: Heat 1 pint of Mix. Add 2 cups cooked rice, 1 cup canned whole kernel corn, 1/4 teaspoon thyme and 1/2 cup green pepper. Simmer to blend flavors and to cook the pepper, 4 to 6 servings.

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS: Stuff 8 hollowed out green peppers with Mix. Bake in shallow pan 50 minutes at 375 degrees.

MOCK PIZZA: Spoon Mix generously over lightly toasted English muffins. Cover with sliced or shredded Italian or American Cheese and sprinkle with oregano. Broil until cheese is bubbly.

HOT STUFFED ROLLS: Mix shredded cheese in Mix and spoon generously into hollowed out frank buns or French rolls. Wrap individually in foil and heat in oven 350 degrees or on a picnic grill for about 30 minutes.

HAMBURGER STROGONOFF: Heat 1 pint of Burger Mix in table skillet. Add 2 cups sliced mushrooms (1-6 oz pkg) and a 10 1/2 oz. can of Cream of Mushroom soup. Stir and simmer 5 minutes. Carefully spoon 1 cup commercially soured cream over the surface. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Do not stir. Simmer 1 minute more. Serve over hot cooked rice. Serves 6.
