## Chamber Awards Given to Mrs. Gross and J.B. Ashburn

Dr. C. L. Kay delivered the principal address at the Plains Annual Recognition Banquet sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce last Tuesday evening in the school cafeteria. Dr. Kay spoke about the importance of the free enterprise system and the cause for a moral breakdown in our nation.

Dr. Kay is Vice-President of Lubbock Christian College, and has twice been the recipient of the George Washington Medal of Honor by Freedom Foundation, and has received a special recognition from General Dwight D. Eisenhower, former President of The United States for his work in Americanism.

The outstanding citizen of the year honor went to Mrs. Bob Gross this year. Bill Loyd in awarding the gift brought out how it is an honor for the town for the volleyball coach to win five regional state sponsored volleyball tournaments in a row. This is the best known record of any volleyball coach in class A in the state.

The outstanding farmer of the year award was given to J. B. Ashburn, who has made an outstanding farming record. Ashburn is active in civic affairs, being a member of the County hospital board, and being a worker in community projects. He is a strong believer in sound soil conservation practices. Ashburn also received an engraved plaque.

City Councilman T. J. Bearden submitted his letter of resignation to Mayor Billie Kennedy and the members of the council this week. A special meeting was called at 7:00 p. m. Tuesday to take action on the resignation.

The reason given by Bearden was that after he lost his county race that it was apparent to him that the city opposition was too much.

Councilman Ed Hunter moved that the council disapprove the request and ask Bearden to stay on. Neil Taylor and Roy Edwards made seconds to the motion. The Council then heard from Bearden who agreed to stay if the members wanted him, and the vote was unanimous.

G. W. Cleveland and Bob Loc were both honored by the Chamber for their work in creating the water conservation district. Roy McGehee presented the awards.

Mrs. All Carpenter, president of Tsa Mo Ga, presented Dr. C. L. Kay with a certificate in behalf of the local study club for his work in Americanism.

The Directors wives were in charge of the decorations for the evening and Mrs. Kenneth Hale presented special music selections.

# Yoakum County Vote Heavy In Close Primary Races

Gene Bennett, well known Yoakum County rancher and member of the board of regents of Abilene Christian College, lead a field of four to win a place in the run-off for the office of County Judge in the primary election Saturday. Incumbent Judge Stanley Duvall managed to also keep hope for re-election alive by edging Plains lawyer Cleatus Phelan for second place on the ticket. Dr. Boyd finished fourth. Bennett held his own in the balloting in the Denver City precincts and far outdistanced Duvall in the rest of the county. It was apparent that the recent re-districting of the county precincts played more than a major role in the election, since out of almost 700 votes cast in county precincts three and four, Judge Duvall only polled 33 votes, while Bennett received 267 votes and Phelan 318 votes. Bennett will challenge Judge Duvall in the special run-off election next month and the race will be decided between the two at that time. Duvall received majorities in all of the Denver City boxes except one, and he lost it by only three votes to Bennett.

Veteran County Treasurer Vicie Hinkle was defeated for her bid for re-election by Wilda Hancock of Denver City. The vote ended in a close contest with Mrs. Hinkle losing 1015-1163. A close contest had been predicted in this race.

Long time County Commissioner Pearl Loe will face Johnnie Fitzgerald in the special run-off election. Fitzgerald lead the field of four in the race with 192 followed by Mrs. Loe with 132, T. J. Bearden with 113, and Allan Wagley with three votes.

In the race for County Clerk Ruby Heald lead the field with 698 votes, and will face Marguerite Barron who polled 549 votes. It was a close contest with the other candidates receiving many votes. Buford Dulin polled 506 votes and Wanda McCrary received 440 votes. Long time clerk J. W. O. Aldridge did not seek re-election.

## Cleatus Phelan Endorses Bennett

Cleatus Phelan, Plains Lawyer, and a former candidate for county judge issued a formal endorsement of Gene H. Bennett for the office of county judge. Bennett opposes incumbent Judge Stanley Duvall in the run off election.

Phelan said he was endorsing Bennett because he believes Bennett to be the most qualified man in the race. The Plains attorney carried the northern end of the county in the first election, but did not receive enough votes to get into the run off.

Phelan stated he is asking the people who supported his candidacy to vote for Bennett in the run off election. The Plains lawyer said he believes if elected that Bennett will serve the county as a whole

and will make a good judge. When contacted by the editor of The Record, Bennett said he was aware that Mr. Phelan was endorsing his candidacy publicly, and that he accepts the endorsement with gratitude.

Both Phelan and Bennett stated the re-districting of the precincts in Yoakum County was one of the major issues in the race and that the expenditures at the County Park were also major issues in the campaign.

Judge Duvall is seeking his second term as judge of Yoakum County.

Bennett is a well known rancher, bank director, and member of the board of regents at A. C. C. where he took his college work.

Our County requested this Unit sometime ago and we feel fortunate in getting it on these dates as the X-Ray Mobile Unit serves Lubbock and Hale Counties as well as neighboring communities.

As a case-finding project the x-rays have located many cases of emphysema, bronchitis, heart abnormalities, and tumors; several of which have proven malignant. If found in the early stages much can be done. Pulmonary emphysema now ranks second to heart disease in the number of working people it disables.

The Committee and Clubs are urging everyone 10 years of age and over to have a chest x-ray.

The benediction will be presented by Rev. Walter Driver, minister of the First Methodist Church.

Commencement exercises will be at the Plains High School Auditorium on the evening of May 17th.

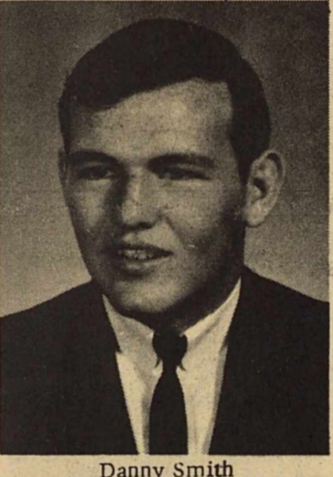
Mrs. J. E. Cooke will play the invocation offered by Rev. Walter Driver. The Salutatory address will be given by Danny Smith.

Pam Long will present the class history, followed by the Valedictory given by Bobby Taylor.

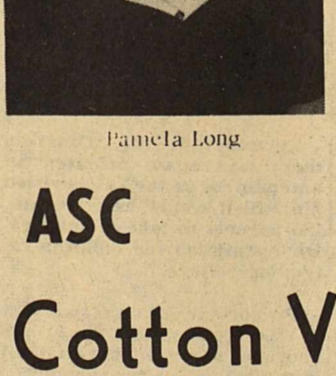
The awarding of the diplomas will be given by Johnnie Fitzgerald, president of the school board, and by Neil Taylor, High School Principal.

## Jesse T. George Day Set

Monday, May 16, has been proclaimed Jesse T. George Day in Terry County by Mayor C. E. Ross, Brownfield. A public reception, sponsored by the Democratic Women of Terry County and honoring State Representative Jesse T. George, will be held at 7:30 p. m., in the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Hinson, 1702 Gilharr Drive, Monday, Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, will be guest speaker.

George, youngest member of the Texas Legislature, served on the Education, Agriculture, Aeronautics, Highways and Roads, and Examination of Comptroller's and Treasurer's Accounts committees during the 59th Legislative Session.

He authored the measure creating the Terry County Hospital District, co-authored bills increasing the load limit for cotton trailers, creating the Texas Student Loan Program for needy college students, making it a felony to possess certain deadly stimulants, raising teacher salaries, and supported the Texas Tech law school bill and increases for junior and senior college expansion.

Presently serving as manager of the Morton Area Chamber of Commerce, George was recently elected State Vice - President of the Texas Jaycees, and will appear in the 1966 editions of Outstanding Young Men of America and Who's Who in American Politics. He also has been appointed to the board of director of the Texas Law Enforcement and Youth Development Foundation, in conjunction with his work with the Attorney General's Youth Conference on Crime.

Yoakum Countians are invited to attend the reception. Several state officials are expected to be present.

## ASC Cotton Vote Soon

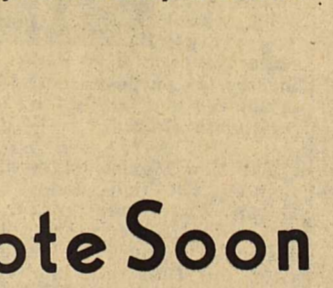
Cotton Farmers in Yoakum County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county. This year the referendum will be conducted by mail during the period of May 16th thru May 25th. Ballots may also be delivered in person to the ASCS County Office.

The question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred by sale or lease during the next three years to other farms outside the county (Texas counties) which are owned or controlled by someone else. A yes vote by at least 2/3 of the counties cotton farmers who vote will permit transfers out of the county for 1967, 1968, and 1969 crop years.

A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall at which time Yoakum County farmers did not approve the transfer by sale or lease of Yoakum County cotton allotments to other counties in the state.

Under the 1966 program cotton farmers in 60 Texas counties voted to sell and lease allotments and operators of 82 Yoakum County farms purchased acreage allotments from the counties eligible

## 4-H Horse Show Plans Made

A group of County Extension Agents got together at Brownfield recently and made plans for the 1966 District 2 4-H Horse Show. This will be the second time a 4-H Horse Show has been held in the 20 county district. Last year the show was at Levelland and this year it will be at Tulia. The date is Thursday July 28. Most contests of this nature are held on Saturday but Highway Patrolmen have continually warned us to schedule our meetings during the week rather than on the weekend.

Some recently released statistics for 1965 show that more than 50% of the highway deaths last year occurred during the weekend from Friday through Sunday. The 4-H Club members, their parents and leaders will be pulling their loaded trailers to Tulia on Wednesday afternoon or early Thursday morning if they live near Swisher County. The program is planned to be completed by 3:30 p. m. so everyone can get home with a minimum of night travel.

Some Yoakum County 4-H members will probably be participating in the contest again this year. Jimmy Gray was second high point individual and Alton McGinty was in the top 20 of 92 entries in the 1965 show. Both these boys were on the District 2 team at the State Show in Dallas last August.

Each county in the district is limited to 10 entries in the

district show where the 15 top contestants will be selected to attend the 1966 State 4-H Horse Show in San Antonio in August of this year.

**Cruelty to Animals**

To brighten up a dull afternoon, two men tied an oil can to a dog's tail and set the oil on fire. At the time it seemed hilarious. But the men did not laugh when they were hauled into court and found guilty of cruelty to animals.

Few of us today would quarrel with the court's ruling. Yet, until comparatively recent years, cruelty to animals was not a crime at all. The common law did protect the property rights of an animal's owner, but did not protect the animal itself. Thus:

Suppose A abused B's horse. B, having suffered an injury to his property, could collect damages from A. But suppose B abused his own horse. Or suppose the horse was a stray, with no owner to be

concerned. Then the law kept silent. Nothing stayed the brutal hand.

But if the common law did not condemn, common decency finally did. In a striking shift of public opinion, cruelty to animals—in itself—has now been branded everywhere as a crime.

Economics has nothing to do with it. When a man was fined for turning an old horse out to starve, the court spoke not of the dollar value of the horse but of the moral outrage to one of God's creatures.

True, we may still inflict harm on an animal for an honorable reason. Thus we may kill an animal—humanely—for food.

"Otherwise," a judge noted, "one could not slaughter a pig or ox for the market, and man could eat no more meat."

Furthermore, we may hit an animal in self defense. A man who struck a frenzied cat, which had a death grip on his hand, was held to have acted within the law.

Also we may chastise an animal as a matter of training—or perform surgery on it as a matter of health. Nor are cruelty laws carried to unreasonable extremes. Surely it is no crime to swat a fly or bait a hook with a worm.

What the law does denounce is conduct that affronts the modern conscience. One court put it this way:

"Animals whose lives are devoted to our use and pleasure deserve kindly treatment. The dominion of man over them, if not a moral trust, has a better significance than the development of malignant passions and cruel instincts. Human beings should be kind and just to dumb brutes, if for no other reason than to learn how to be kind and just to each other."

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WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Under the laws of the land at present an illegitimate child is worth more than other children.

This somewhat whimsical situation was recently highlighted by an editorial appearing in the Union County Leader in New Mexico. The editor pointed out that under the Aid to Dependent Children, the government will pay out more than \$800 per year for the upkeep on an illegitimate child, but for a legitimate child, only \$600 income tax purposes, only \$600 is allowed to a family for each legitimate child.

The New Mexico editor also pointed out that under the Cuban refugee program a minimum of \$1200 per year is paid for each refugee child's upkeep, but if the child is attending school an extra \$1000 per year is allowed.

In addition the editorial states that in the Federal Job Corp, the government spends \$7000 per year per child.

And according to government figures, the VISTA program, (Volunteer in Service in America) spent \$3.1 million in the last fiscal year to turn out only 202 trainees, indicating that in this government agency the cost of training one child runs to more than \$15,000 per year.
