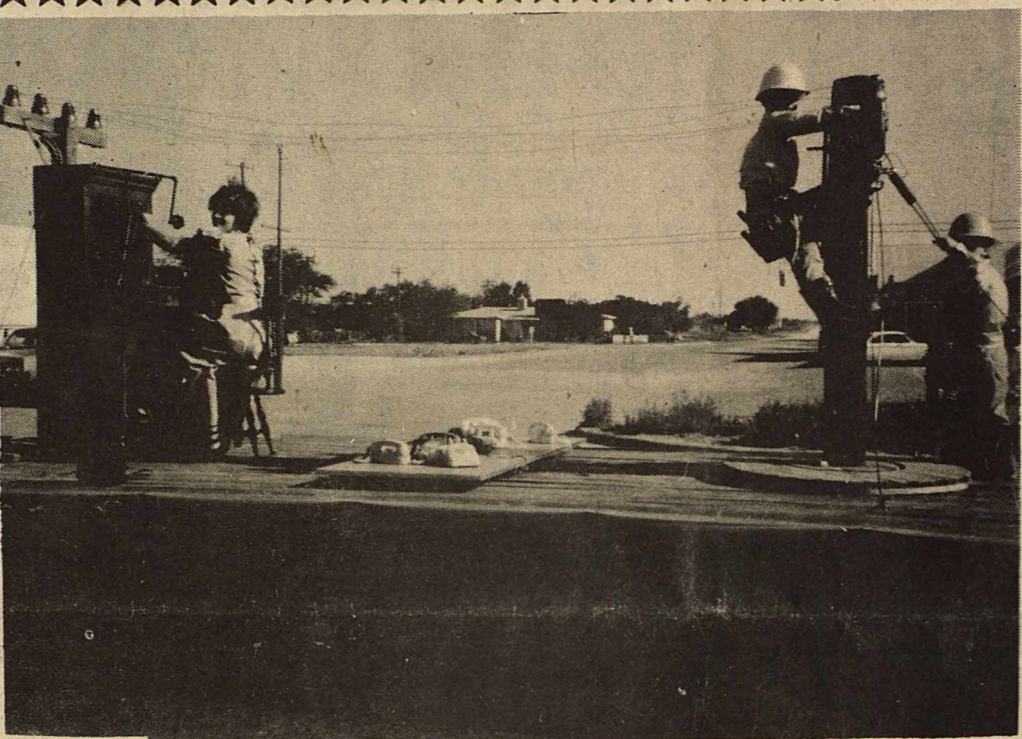

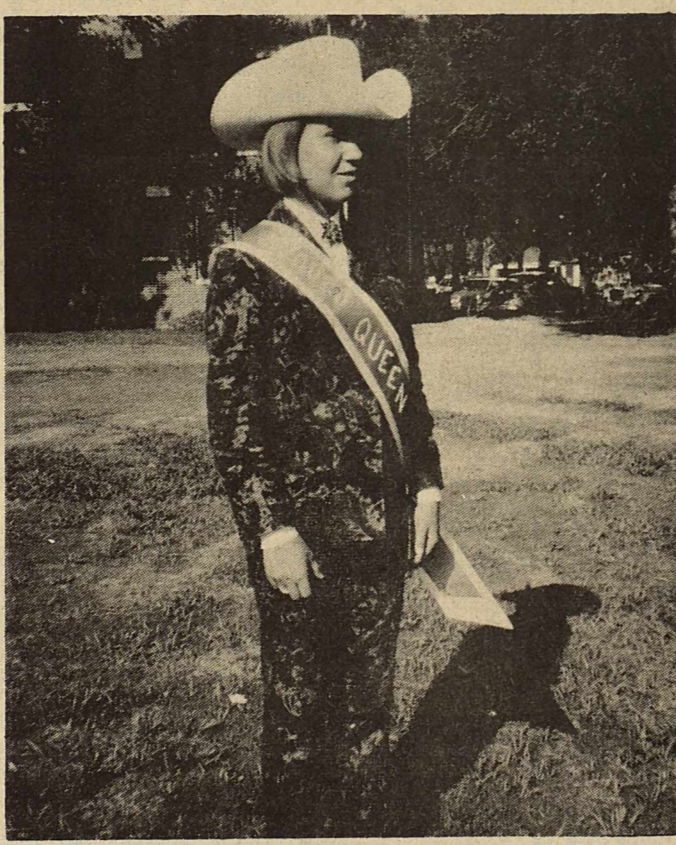

Hundreds Attend Annual Bar BQ

Hundreds of people went to the Tokio Co-op Gin's annual meeting last Saturday and enjoyed Bar B Q and visited before the meeting started. Door prizes totaling \$150.00 were given during the meeting.

Amos Smith, manager of the Gin reported that the meeting was considered a success by members of the association.

A. Pippin, president of the board of directors presided at the meeting. Visitors were introduced by Smith. R. E. Bearden read the minutes, and the audit report was presented by Hugh Thomas.

The election of directors was the last business on the program.

The Tokio GIs is one of the boosters of local economy, having a pay roll which passed \$50,000.00 last year. The gross income of the Gin last year was in excess of \$260,000.00. The Co-op enjoyed a net profit of \$43,581.58 in cash last year, and \$52,616.39 in stock. Net margin per bale was \$11.28, which was said to be very good.

Guest speaker for the opening general session on Tuesday, August 9, will be R.L. McMillon, Branch Manager, Business Men's Assurance Company of America, Abilene, Texas. The meeting will start at 8:30 a.m. in the grand Ballroom.

Conference workshops to be developed include Recent Trends in Swine Production, Beef Production, Developing and Conducting Agriculture Mechanic Programs, Leadership and Citizenship Training through the Texas Association of Future Farmers, Study of the Proposed Revised Lesson plans of Farm Electrification, Young Farmer Training and Assisting First and Second Year Teachers in Developing

and Conducting Local Programs of Vocational Agriculture.

Also on the agenda for the week is the annual association Awards Breakfast during which tenure awards will be presented to 10, 15, 20, 25, 30 and 35 year teachers. Awards will also be presented to Honorary Members, Legislators, District Public Relations Chairmen, School Administrators, and Members of the Press, Radio and Television.

Approximately 1200 Vocational Agriculture Teachers are expected to attend the meeting. The Vocational Agriculture Education program in the state is under the direction of the Division of Vocational Education Agency, with Mr. George M. Hurt, Austin, Director. Teachers meet annually for training in new developments and trends in Vocational Agriculture Education.

Terror struck near the State Line at the Tom Box place Saturday afternoon at about 4:40 p.m. when a twister demolished the trailer house of Mrs. Box's mother which sat about 30 feet from the Box home. The twister ripped the trailer house from its foundation and hurled it about 40 feet from where it was setting and demolished the modern mobile home.

Mrs. Box's mother had gone into her daughter's house before the funnel hit, and this is credited with saving her life. The tornado went on which sat about 75 feet from the trailer. The concrete slab which the pump house rested upon was littered dug up and broke apart, but several trunks with glass ware and paint on the remainder of the foundation.

The storm also destroyed fruit trees and did other damage to the Box yard, but the house was not damaged.

The twister proceeded about a half a mile to the Amarada Camp which is east of the Box home and did tree damage and blew down T.V. antennas.

At least two reports were confirmed that funnel clouds were seen near the State Line community of Bronco Saturday. One report said that two funnel clouds were watched at the time the twister hit pay dirt on the Box farm. Heavy rain and some hail was reported in the Bronco vicinity. The road to the Box home was under water the next day. Mr. and Mrs. Box are well known in the area. Mrs. Box is the correspondent for the Plains Record for the State Line News, and is active on the local and state level in Home Demonstration work.

Most of the possessions in the Mobile Home were lost, and salvage work was still in progress the next day to save personal belonging which were in the trailer.

Joint Meeting Asks For Sale Of Water System

A joint meeting of the City Council, Board of Education, and County commissioners Court was conducted at the school Tuesday night, and Bennett Reeves, engineer retained by the city, proposed in behalf of the City of Plains that the City purchase the county and school water systems. An appraisal of \$7,900.00 was placed on the school system by the engineer, and a price of \$26,400.00 was placed on the county system by the city.

The plan has been under consideration by the city for some while in order to improve the water system in Plains. If the city can make its planned improvement program, the insurance rates for the city residents will come down. Rates are among the highest in the state.

The Board of Education and the Commissioners Court met together after the city officials departed. It was learned that further study is desired by the board and court and that another joint meeting between the board and the court is slated for August 23rd.

City spokesmen said they believe the Board of Education showed definite interest in the proposal, but since the amount of the county property

is more, that the county will be more reluctant to negotiate until further data is available. The county and school will run a 7 day test to see how much water is consumed before their next meeting.

The matter was officially taken under advisement until the next meeting, of the two units of government. Meanwhile city officials are optimistic that a solution and agreement can be reached.

The net savings on 4 years operations total \$211,467.27.

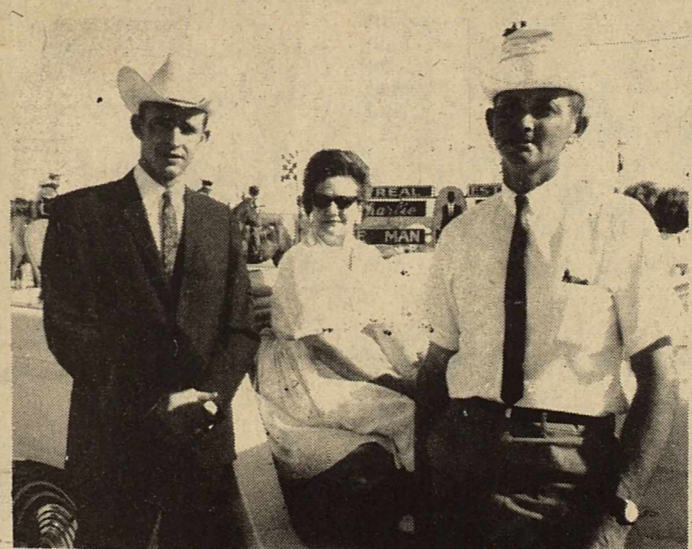
The gin was purchased in 1962 from C. E. & Verlon Hilburn at a price of \$127,500.00. The incorporating directors were Jimmie Cox, Foye Powell, H. W. Taunton, Russell Faulkenberry, Charles Roseberry, Bob Jones, and Loren Gayle.

Present Board of Directors are president Bob Jones, vice-president Loren Gayle, Secretary Earl Kiser, Treasurer Russel Faulkenberry, H. W. Taunton director, Jimmie Cox director and Foye Powell, director.

The total assets are \$285,800.08, while the new worth is \$222,297.77. Past seasons operation show a net profit of \$61,360.39. Approximately \$20,954.00 will be paid out in cash. The 4 year average savings is \$9.40 per bale of cotton.

The Yoakum County Co-op Gin is located several miles west of Plains on the Lovington, New Mexico road, and has some of the most modern equipment in the area to meet the needs of their operation, said Bob McCrory, manager of the Co-op Gin.

Members of the association invite residents of the area to come to the meeting Saturday.

Encephalitis is transmitted by the Culex Mosquito to horses and man.

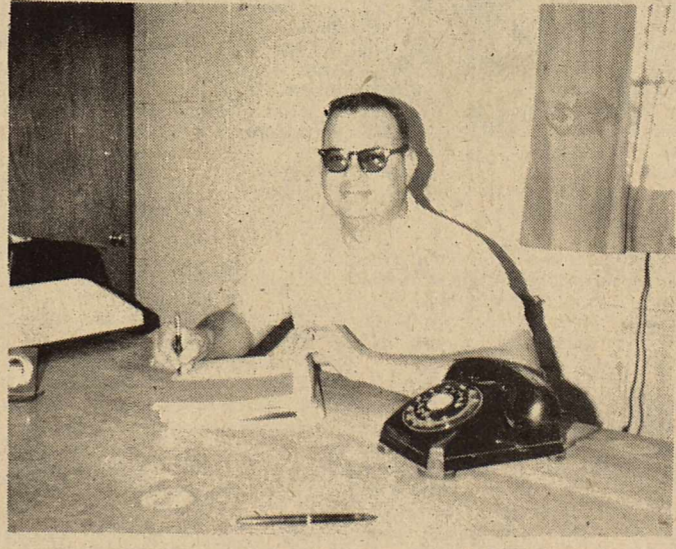

Pour out all collected water for it is a breeding place for the mosquito.

Avoid getting out after dark. Use repellent spray if out of doors any length of time. Hand spray around your doors and windows after dark.

Careless Clothes

What to wear? Choosing your costume for a particular occasion is not just a matter of fashion but also a matter of law. Should you be injured, careless clothing may jeopardize your right to collect damages by pinning a "negligent" label upon you.

Consider this case: A young woman, going for a walk on a wintry night, knew that the sidewalks were slick with ice. Yet she chose to wear very high heels. Sure enough, she skidded, fell, and suffered assorted injuries. But when she sued the city for damages, the jury decided she herself was guilty of negligence in her choice of footwear.



On the other hand, a woman who stumbled on a hotel stairway was held not negligent. The heels she was wearing were only moderately high—and the process of walking down steps did not demand any special precautions. Even choosing an unwise color, if not negligence all by itself, may at least tip the scales in that direction.

Was a hunter accidentally shot by a companion? It may count against the victim, legally, that he was wearing a grey hat exactly the color of a grey squirrel.

Was a motorist, changing a flat tire on a dark highway, struck by a passing car? It may be held against him that he was wearing a hard-to-see black jacket instead of an easy-to-see white shirt.

In addition to choosing your clothing with care, you are expected also to wear it with care. For example:

A woman passenger, emerging from a friend's car, shut the door on her own sleeve. Unaware of her predicament, the driver started forward, hurling the woman to the pavement. But a court later found no fault with the driver. The woman herself was negligent, said the court, for letting her sleeve get caught.

In another case, a man with foot troubles sued a shoe dealer for selling him shoes that were too tight. But the court turned thumbs down on his claim. The judge commented:

"He is the best judge of whether the shoes fitted or pinched. If the customer persists in wearing the shoes and allowing the pinching, he has himself to blame and none other."

So the newest wrinkle along the Potomac with some agency or agencies working on something called international cooperation is to spend \$100 million in U.S. tax dollars to teach people all over the world what causes babies.

The U.S. will now cooperate with any foreign government who wishes to train their people in birth control methods. The American taxpayer will foot the bill.

This is quite an astounding expansion of American foreign policy. It is doubtful when in his farewell address George Washington warned against foreign entanglements that he had in mind foreign mattresses.

If, as some claim, the growing world population is a problem in nation's lacking sufficient food supplies, and furthermore, if birth control is the answer to those problems, it is very strange, indeed, that the governments concerned do not take steps, instead of depending on the U.S.

Some 20 years ago, so-called foreign aid was started to help war torn nations get back on to their economic feet. Now, \$120 billion later, and after these former war torn nations are bursting with prosperity, there is a problem finding new ways to spend American taxes.

American bureaucrats became involved in foreign steel production, auto production, food production, and in fact all phases of economic activity until there is perhaps no more room to proceed.

So perhaps it is but a logical step for the bureaucrats to now become concerned with world wide sex. After all, what other human activity offers such promise of continued bureaucratic jobs, as sex will be in the world long after the American taxpayer is bankrupt.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Laws; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot; and proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board to acquire, construct or enlarge any reservoir or associated system or works which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

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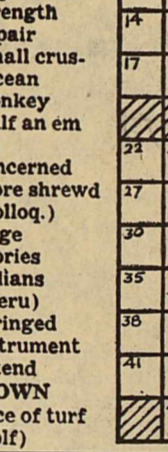

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment."

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized."

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred."

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an amendment to Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, to omit the requirement that members of the armed services vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by deleting the following language:

"Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

The text of this Section is shown below, with a broken line through the sentence which is to be deleted:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like man-

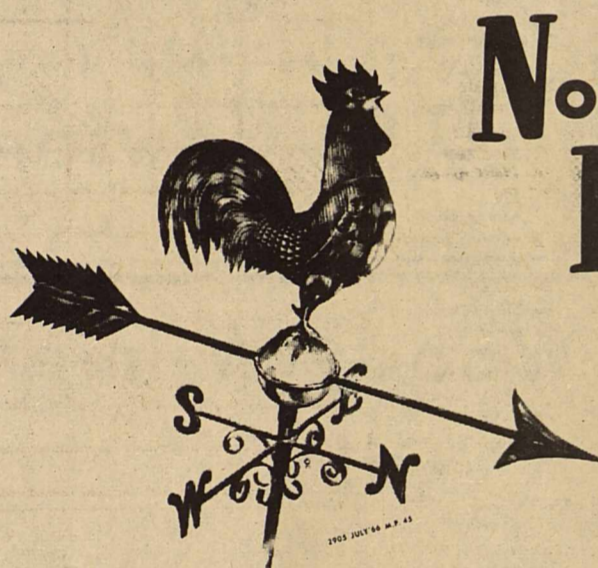
ner, the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Sec. 2. The only purpose of the amendment proposed in this Resolution is to make the aforesaid deletion. The adoption of this amendment shall not be deemed to have the effect of readopting the remainder of the Section, and if any other amendment to this Section, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this amendment shall not be construed as nullifying the change made by such other amendment.

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote." "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to allow members of the Armed Forces who are residents of Texas to vote."

Sec. 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 5. If the foregoing amendment is adopted, the proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Section, as amended herein and by any other proposed amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

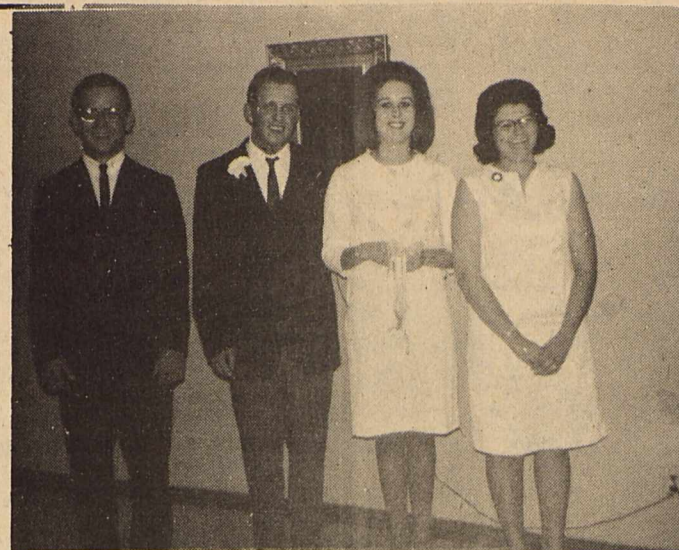

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIXTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to establish the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 3, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 3. The Senators shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new Senate shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the Senators elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the Senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of the second class at the expiration of four years, so that one half of the Senators shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Senators shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 2. That Article III, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Members of

the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of two years. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of years to which elected and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified."

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

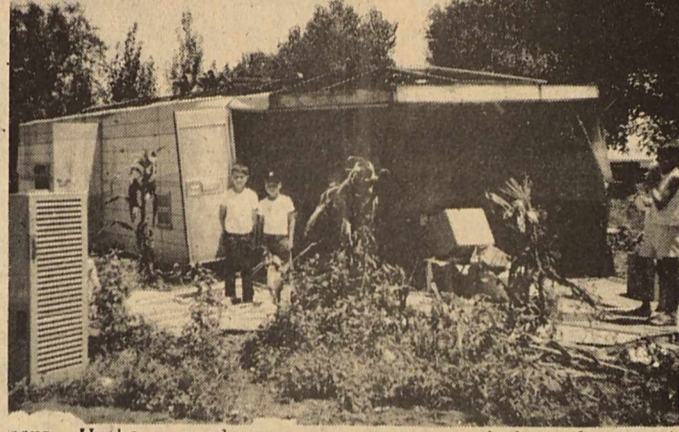
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing the date on which newly elected Members of the Legislature shall qualify and take office."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election and this Amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall have appellate jurisdiction coextensive with the limits of the state in all criminal cases of whatever grade, with such exceptions and under such regulations as may be prescribed by law."

"The Court of Criminal Ap-

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 69 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section, Section 63, to Article III; authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for the accomplishment of governmental functions within any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants by the consolidation of the functions of government or by contract between any political subdivision(s) located within the county and any other political subdivision(s) located within the county or with the county; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III, to be known as Section 63, reading as follows:

"Section 63. (1) The Legislature may by statute provide for the consolidation of some functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county in this State having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these political subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

(2) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions re-

quired or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. The term 'governmental functions,' as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of state-wide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide by statute for any county having one million, two hundred thousand (1,200,000) or more inhabitants to consolidate the functions of government and for such counties or any political subdivision(s) located therein to contract for the performance of functions of government."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or of full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November,

1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties using voting machines, the above provision for voting, for and against this Constitutional Amendment, shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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How Big is the Cotton Industry

While an estimate of the total investment in enterprises growing and processing cotton, and seed and manufacturing lint into textiles is subject to a wide margin of error, about \$22 billion will be a very conservative figure. Agriculture and the enterprises it supports comprise the nation's largest industry. Cotton is the most important cash crop, grown on some 850,000 farms from the southern tip of Virginia to the valleys of California. In round figures, the industry includes 6,300 gins, 1,500 raw cotton merchandising firms, 1,2500 cotton warehouses and compresses, 280 cotton oil mills and 1,000 cotton textile mills. An estimated 12 million people depend on cotton for their livelihood.
