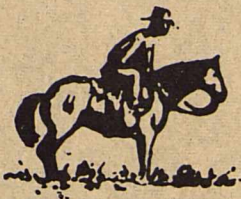

Cowboys Lost By One Point When Red Flags Flew Friday

Seagraves, the arch rivals of the Plains Cowboys, won a highly contested football game Friday night at Cowboy Stadium in Plains 22-21 in a contest which saw Plains come from behind in the last 18 seconds and close the gap to one point. Plains was out of time outs and asked the officials to give them the official penetrations of both teams in the game. The red flag flew and five long yards were stepped off against the Cowboys. The quarterback was then told that Seagraves led 4 to 3, and Plains was left no choice but to go for two points, which failed.

After the game, the officials were quoted as saying they were wrong, that Plains and Seagraves were tied on penetrations at 4 each, and that Plains was ahead on first downs. A kick for the point if made would have given Coach Rip Sewell's team a win. There was little doubt that Elmore could have kicked the point, since he is one of the finest extra point and field goal kickers in West Texas.

Plains still has hopes of winning or sharing a part of District 5A honors, because Seagraves must face unbeaten Tahoka and tough Coahoma. They will be an underdog in both contests. If the Cowboys can bounce back and upend the Tahoka Bulldogs and the O'Donnell Eagles, then they could still win district.

Coach Sewell's charges are well known for their ability to play a tough game when the chips are down, and the people in town still voice an opinion that they are the best in the district.

Many people who did not understand the situation were holding the Plains coaches in the capacity of the goats of the games. This was unfair and unjust, because when the officials gave their report of the way they listed the penetrations, any coach worth his salt would have gone for two points just like the Cowboys did. That is the mark of a championship team, where others would settle for a tie in the score. Two years ago when coach Royal at Texas was faced with a chance to tie Arkansas or go for the win he went for the victory. He lost, but the fans cheered him for this call. Rip Sewell did the same thing. Many in Plains are cheering that decision.

The win was the second straight in District 5-A for Seagraves and it puts the spot-

light on the Eagles battle with Tahoka next week. Victory for Seagraves would just about wrap things up, but Tahoka still has to play Plains and O'Donnell. Seagraves would still have to play Coahoma, which has lost two loop outings.

Plains scored the first time it had the ball when Joe Pierce romped over from the two and Elmore kicked the extra points.

Seagraves came right back to score as Clarence Law passed 21 yards to Harley Bradley to set it up and fullback Mike Bagley got it the next play when he went 21 yards up the middle. A pass for the points failed and Plains was still ahead, 7-6.

Melvin Francis intercepted a Plains pass on the Seagraves 10 and ran it to the Cowboy 25 and four plays later, Bagley went over from the three. Cummings ran the points and Seagraves had a 14-7 lead with 8:25 left in the half. The Seagraves fans grabbed a firm hold, but the Cowboys came right at 'em and took the lead. Elmore climaxed the drive with a 19-yard run and he ran the points to make it 15-14.

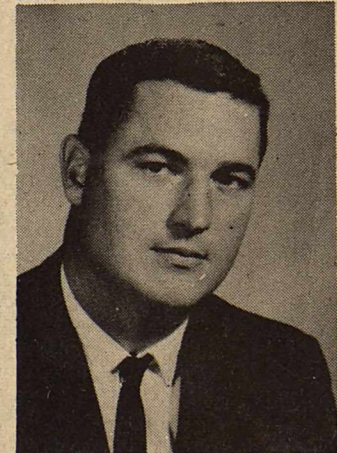
Seagraves forged ahead early in the fourth quarter when Cummings went over from the five with 7:58 left. Law faked a pitch to Cummings, kept it and went in for the two points - the winning margin.

Then came the heartbreak for Plains the called back touchdown, the blocked punt that resulted in the touchdown and the miscalculation on penetrations.

Bagley rushed for 153 yards on 23 carries and Elmore had 128 on 20 tries. Pierce had 102 on 24 attempts and between them, the two had 230 of the 242 yards the Cowboys made all night.

Dirt Gardeners 9th Annual Flower Show

Plains Dirt Gardeners Garden Club staged its Ninth Annual Flower Show on Saturday, October 22, at the Party House of the Yoakum County Park. The staging committee with Mrs. Wilson Duke, chairmen, carried out the theme 'Treasures of the Llano Estacado' with a display of a gilded treasure chest, crafted cotton, gilded fruits, vegetables and plants now growing on the plains.

'Treasures through the Years' was the title of the Conservation-Education section, displayed by Mr. Murrell Thompson and Mr. Wilson Duke, Yoakum Soil Conservation Service. The display showed grasses, plants, vegetables and crops of the plains in 1860 with an Indian as the only inhabitant. There was a display of the 1930 period and 1966 each showing the transition from the preceding period.

More than 70 flower arrangements entries were displayed in 14 assorted classes that carried out the theme. All members carried home blue ribbons from the more than 100 entries in the horticultural division with Mrs. W. M. Overton earning the green and white sweepstakes rosette for her entry of more than 30 varieties of chrysanthemums. Roses, berried shrubs, African violets, succulents, cacti, house plants, a couple of dahlias and one blue bonnet in flower completed the remainder of the horticultural show.

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Mexican National Man Electrocuted On Barron Farm Near Plains

Tragedy struck on the jim Barron farm about five miles west of Plains last Saturday morning when Noe' Rodriguez lifted an irrigation pipe to attempt to dislodge a rabbit and the aluminum pipe touched a live wire electrocuting Rodriguez and seriously burning another worker. Rodriguez was found at about 9:45 by the Barron brothers who rushed him to the Yoakum County Hospital where he was pronounced dead upon arrival. The other hand received third degree burns on his legs.

A spokesman from Singleton's Funeral Home in Denver City said the man was a Mexican National and that arrangements are pending upon notification of Rodriguez's next of kin. He is reported to be survived by his wife and parents who live in Mexico near the Big Bend region of Texas. The Mexican Consulate in Big

Spring was notified, and he is advising the relatives of the accident victim and seeking details for the man's burial. Rodriguez was 18 years old and was pronounced dead by Dr. Greenfield upon arrival at the hospital in Denver City. The spokesman at Singleton's Funeral Home said it sometimes take a week or 10 days to receive instructions for burial in these cases. The spokesman said that the man had no papers and that this further complicated the matter.

It was reported that the injured man is resting well and is satisfactory condition at the Yoakum County Hospital in Denver City. The burns were reported to have been severe in his case, but he was expected to recover.

The accident is believed to have occurred just before the Barron brothers discovered the dead man and his helper. They were rushed to the hospital within 15 minutes, but Rodriguez was already dead. It was believed he was killed instantly.

Man Rapes Own Daughter

Sheriff Olan Heath reported that Doroteo Jimenez Terez, 42 year old Plains man was arrested and charged with rape on October 16th in Plains. The sheriff reported that Terez allegedly raped his own daughter, Elida Terez, who is 15 years old.

The incident was reported to have happened at about 2:00 p.m. on that Sunday afternoon

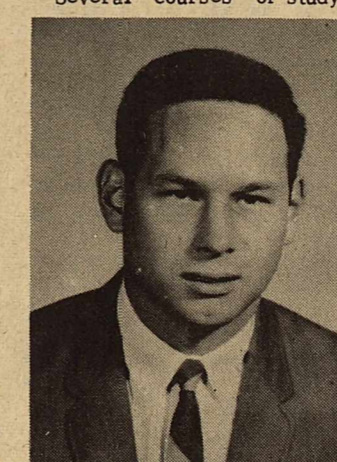
in Terez's car on a dirt road 5 miles south and two miles east of Plains. The girls sister and her mother reported the attack to Sheriff Heath who sent the girl to Denver City where she was examined by Dr. Greenfield. The physician confirmed that the youngster had been forcibly raped.

Sheriff Heath arrested Terez at about 4 p.m. on the same day, and charged him with rape which is a capitol offense in Texas. Terez is being held without bail, and is being lodged in safe keeping in the Lubbock jail. The sheriff reported that feeling is running high among the spanish people and the prisoner was moved to Lubbock for his safety.

If convicted, Terez could face death in the electric chair in the state prison in Huntsville. The case will be presented to the grand jury in December.

Local Teacher Got Institute Grant

Harmon Meixner, Plains Jr. High Science teacher, received a National Science Foundation Summer Institute Grant, which was offered this past summer at East Texas State University. Several courses of study
