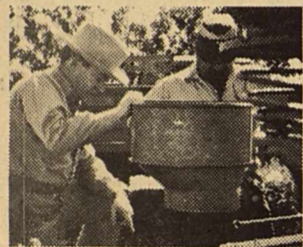

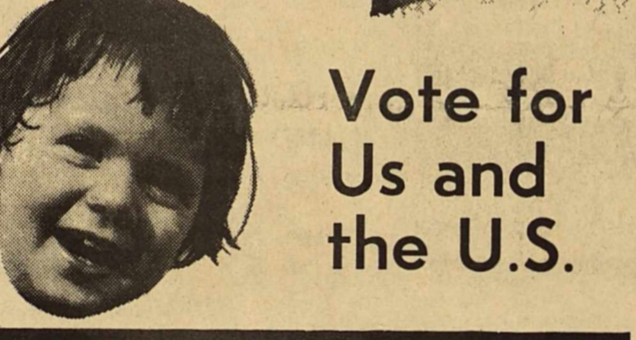

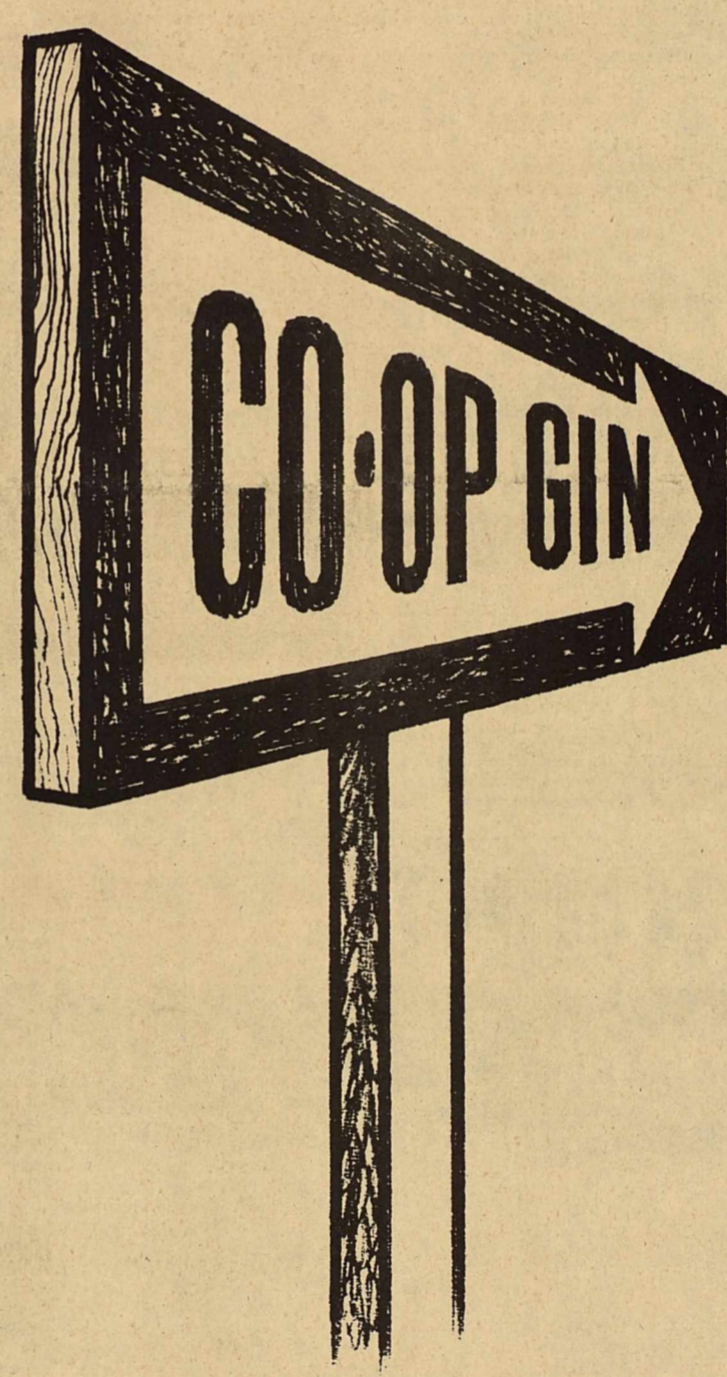

In the meantime, those of us here at home must do everything possible to assure full support for our fighting men.

Many Texans are defending freedom in Southeast Asia. Both as a Senator representing Texas and as a member of the Armed Services Committee, I feel it incumbent upon me to have the best possible knowledge about what needs to be done to end this conflict.

Therefore, at the earliest opportunity I intend to return to the combat zone to be with

(FROM BELOW) our boys there, to convey to them the support of all Americans, to study their needs, and to bring back another report on our progress there.

I believe Texans expect their Senator to go wherever necessary to represent them. Whether it be to our schools, businesses and oil fields, into our farm pastures and ranchland, or into the combat areas.

I'll do just that.

I know we all remember the success of the Texas Gift-Lift to Vietnam during last year's Christmas season. This year many additional transport facilities are in operation to Southeast Asia, and there is not expected to be any emergency shortage of space for gifts. However, all of us need to cooperate in getting packages to our men overseas.

The deadline for regular mail to Vietnam is November 10. The air mail deadline is December 10. Just to be sure, it would be wise to get your mailing done even earlier than that.

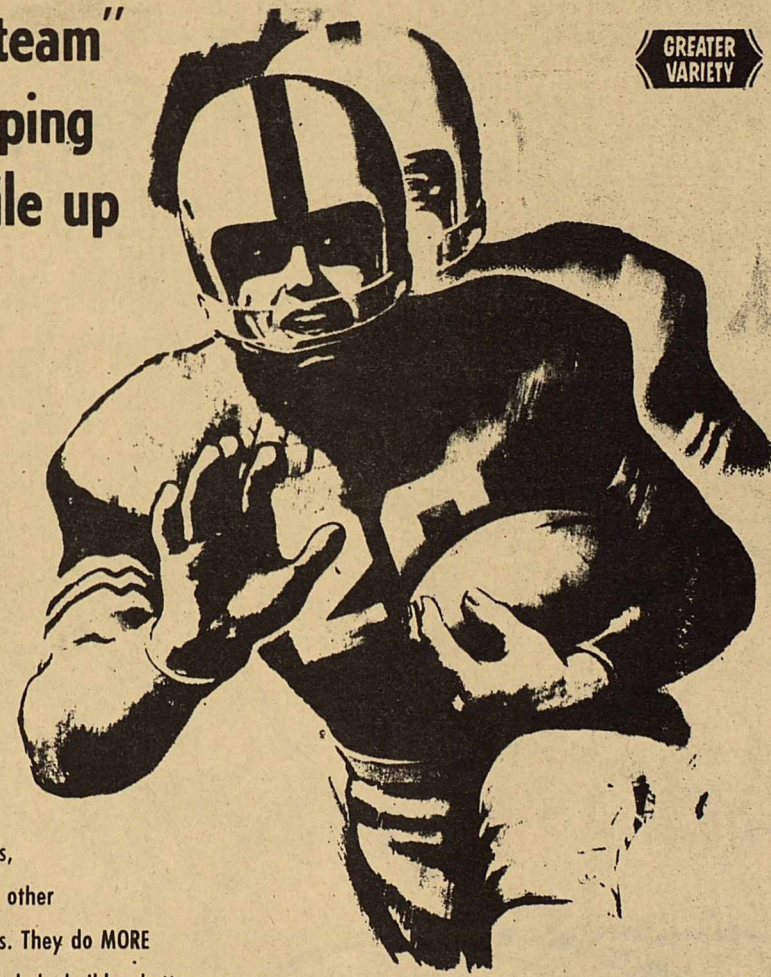

Pretty weather is fine on cotton but small grain, cover crops need a rain. Some irrigation farmers are beginning to water in order to save the crop. Grain sorghum harvest is well along and in a few places land is being prepared for next year's crop or to blow! Some are shredding stalks while waiting on the cotton to completely open and of course that is a good way to loose moisture. Some are finding after the stalks are shredded they don't have enough moisture to plow and they are in trouble. Maize stalks will hold needed moisture, as much as on to two inches, catch snow, help prevent wind erosion and save money if you will leave them on the land standing. There is one land that needs plowing but there is more that needs protection from wind erosion in our District. Some good examples of using crop residue for wind and moisture erosion control are, T. J. Bearden, Charles and Bill Faust, H.W. Taunton, Lee Roy McCravy, Robert and Bobby Chambliss and Johnnie L. Fitzgerald. How about you, are

The only way for this program to be successful is for every stockman to be on the alert and cooperate with this program.
