These fifty two boys and twenty four girls are representing fifty families in Yoakum County who have the desire to have their children learn about the livestock business.

The lambs and barrows will be weighed Thursday and the calves will be weighed beginning at 7:00 a.m. Friday. The judging will begin with the fine wool lambs at 1:30 p.m. Friday afternoon. The barrow judging will follow the lamb judging. The Calf judging will begin at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning. At 12:30 p.m. Saturday the awards will be presented to the exhibitors of the champion animals and the showmanship winners. The sale of all livestock is scheduled to begin at 1:00 p.m.

Exhibitors are reminded that all animals failing to meet the weight requirements will be the responsibility of the exhibitor. The management of the show is not obligated to help get them sold to any of the floor buyers. Animals not eligible for the sale must be removed from the barn after weighing in order to have the entry fee returned.

Two concession stands will be in operation all during the show where exhibitors and fans can get a full meal or refreshments. The Plains F.H.A. Girls and the Home Demonstration Clubs will be operating the concession stands.

A meeting of the directors was held Monday night and Mr. Johnnie Fitzgerald, Chairman of the Board, and Mr. Robert Rucker, General Superintendent of the Show, reported that plans were completed and that an outstanding show and sale would be held.

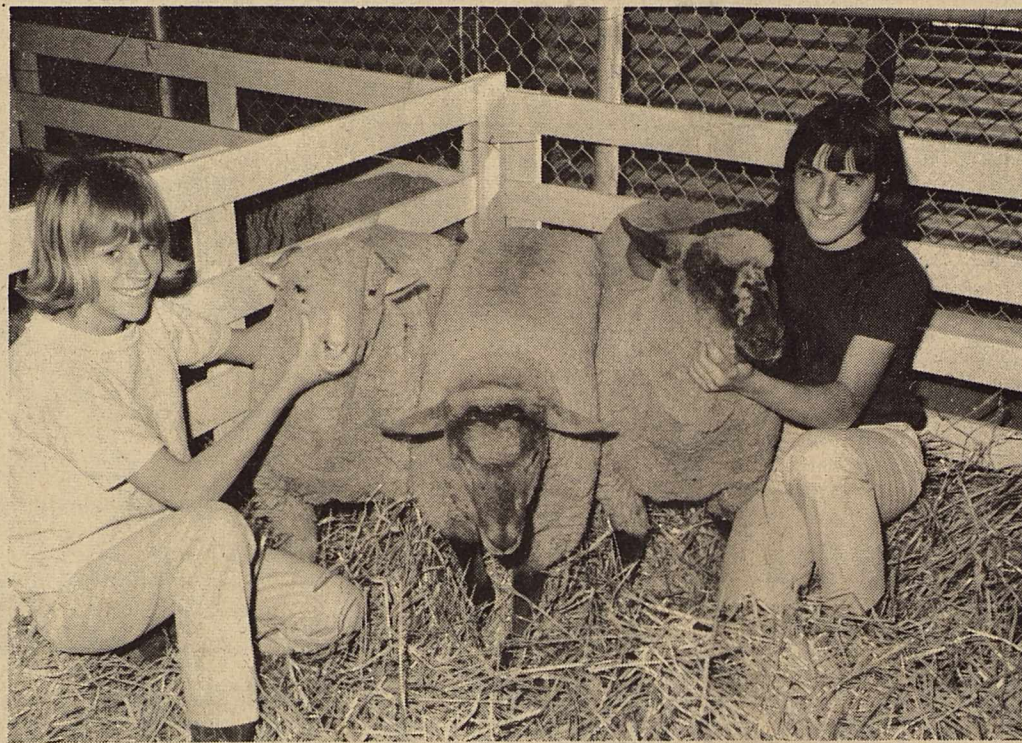
Tom Peabody urged all to attend the Annual Scout Exposition March 18th at the Midlton Building in Lamesa. Cecil Williams has the tickets for this.

## Rep. George Due Friday

State Representative Jesse T. George notified his local chairman, Harry Cayce, by phone Wednesday that he will be in Plains Friday for a meeting with his committee composed of local people for the purpose of discussing legislative problems and ideas. Mrs. Ruby Heald, Yoakum County Clerk, is the local secretary.

The meeting will be at five p.m. Friday at Alma's Restaurant. The public is urged to attend. All presidents of local civic and social organizations are extended a special invitation to attend the meeting. The ministers in Plains are also requested to be present.

Rep. George returns to his district during each session, and due to the difficulty of leaving Austin during the session, this will probably be the only home visit during this session of the legislature.

The local solon told Cayce that he is anxious to find out the local opinion on several important issues before he votes on them, and was hopeful that a large turn out of the people could be arranged.

Cayce urges all residents of the county who interested in their state government to be present. He further stated that if our representative cares enough about our opinions to

make a long trip from Austin then we should care enough to be there and offer some suggestions.

## F.F.A. Judge Team

Vocational Agriculture students and their advisor, Mr. Bo Stephens, returned late Friday night from the Southwestern International Livestock Show and Judging Contest in El Paso. Mike Wilkins, Billy Taylor, Robert Jones, and Carlton Wilkins showed animals at the show. Mike Wilkins showed the Reserve Champion Hampshire barrow of the show and sold his animal for \$1.20 per pound in the special auction. Robert Jones barrows placed 10th and 12th in the large class of light weight Hampshire barrows.

The Plains F. F. A. Livestock judging team composed of Alton McGinty, Wayne Box, Jimmy Gray, and Mike Wilkins placed 7th among the 48 teams entered in the contest. The boys placed three classes each of cattle, swine, and sheep in making their good placing with 1521 team points. Wayne Box was recognized tenth high individual of the entire contest with 537 points.

Mr. Stephens reported that he was real proud of his boys for their achievements while gaining the valuable practical experience that goes with their classroom education.

## George Stands Against Racing and Liquor Bills

(Austin) State Representative Jesse T. George, Yoakum Co. Austin legislator stated today that he will oppose measures before the 60th Session which would provide for the regulation, licensing, and taxation

of horse racing and pari-mutuel wagering in Texas. He stated that he also will vote against any proposals authorizing the sale of liquor by the drink in the state.

George reflected that 'In 1962 the voters of Texas expressed by referendum vote their opposition to pari-mutuel wagering in Texas. The five-county district which I represent cast 2,543 votes in favor of the measure, while 6,004 people opposed it. The citizens of Yoakum County expressed a sentiment parallel to those of my other counties, for here 561 votes were

cast for the measure, while 1,148 votes were in opposition.'

He continued, 'Though I realize that both pari-mutuel gambling and liquor by the drink would provide substantial tax revenues to the State, I believe that a representative of the people owes it to his district to reflect their majority views. My mail has run extremely heavy in opposition to both of these proposals, and I will reflect that attitude during this Session, as I did during the 59th Session two years ago.'

## Cowgirls Win D.C. Tourney

Coach Shirley Gross's defending champions, the Plains Cowgirls, brought home the bacon from the Denver City Volleyball tournament Saturday by upending a strong Phillips team in the Championship game.

The Cowgirls had to get by an impressive Ft. Stockton team to gain a birth in the finals. Phillips had to defeat a good team from Crane to win a final position. Plains won two out of three to take their second major tournament in the last two weeks.

The Cowgirls have been knocking over two A and three A schools like bowling pins in their bid to see as much action as possible before entering District Competition.

Plains will meet the Blackhaws of Phillips again in Plainview February 18th, and will play their first home game on February 20th against Seminole at 6:30 p.m.

The Cowgirls are keeping a fast pace to repeat for the sixth time as State Champs. If they are successful they will have broken their own record in setting the new one.

Home town fans are urged to be Cowgirl boosters and attend the games.

## ASC Says Half of Farmers Signed Up For Program

According to W.M. Overton, local ASC office manager, approximately 1/2 of the county farmers have signed intentions to participate in the programs and advance payments are now being made. The cotton payments for 1967 are some higher than under the 1966 program due to a small increase in payment rates and an increase in projected yields. The loan rate on middling 1 inch cotton will be 20.25 compared to 21.00 for the 66 crop.

The feed grain payments will be less for 1967 due to the reduction will be limited to 20 percent of the base as compared to 50 percent for 66. The tenant in the prior year was a cash-rent, fixed rent, or standing-rent tenant who did not live on the farm or receive 50 percent or more of his income farming. C. There exists between the operator or landlord and any tenant or sharecropper any lease, contract, agreement, or understanding unfairly exacted or required by the operator or landlord which was entered into in anticipation of participating in the program and has the effect of: 1. Forcing the tenant or sharecropper to pay over to the land-

lord or operator any payment earned by him under the program.

2. Changing the status of any tenant or sharecropper so as to deprive him of any payment or right which he would otherwise have had under the program.

3. Reducing the size of the tenant's or sharecroppers producer unit.

4. Increasing the rent to be paid by the tenant or decreasing the share of the crop or its proceeds to be received by the sharecropper.

D. Any other scheme or device has been adopted for the purpose of depriving any tenant or sharecropper of the payment to which he would otherwise be entitled to receive under the program.

Social Security and Employer Identifying Numbers: Any person who is eligible to receive payments under the 1967 programs is required to furnish this office with his social security number if he has not already done so. An employer's identifying number is required for trusts, estates, corporations and partnerships.

## History of I.O.O.F.

Frank Upton, local Oddfellow relates the following account of the founding of the I. O. O. F. lodge in the United States and Texas:

Mr. Thomas Weldey was the founder of the I. O. O. F. in the United States. Weldey was born in London England on January 15, 1793. He was initiated into the London I. O. O. F. at the age of 21 and went through all the chairs in two years. On July 30, 1817 he left his home land and landed in Baltimore Maryland on the 2nd day of September. He came west to practice his trade as a coach maker. He was an expert in making and tempering the heavy steel springs required on the vehicles of that day.

Wildey soon found work at his trade. In 1818 he met John Welch who was a fellow member of the I.O.O.F. and they became good friends.

They discussed forming a lodge. Several other men met with them and the Washington Lodge NO. 1 was formed on April 26, 1819. Mr. Weldey was elected Grand Master in 1837. While making his visits to New Orleans he received a petition to establish a Lodge in Houston. The Houston lodge was formed in 1838 and is still a working Lodge. At that time Texas was not in the Union.
