Eastland County showed an increase of 15.2% in number and 21.8% in amount of monthly social security checks from December 1960, to December, 1961, according to figures just received by R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

1867 persons received \$122,257 in retirement checks for December, 1961, and 122 persons received \$10,334 in disability payments.

728 wives and dependent husbands received \$24,096 in retirement claims and 28 others received \$1,057 from disability claims.

278 children received \$12,934 from claims on a retired or deceased parent and 28 children were paid \$981 from claims on a disabled parent. 383 widows, dependent widowers, and parents received \$22,234.

At the present time, social security benefits total over a billion dollars a month to just over seventeen million beneficiaries. Tuley gave these reasons for the rise in beneficiaries: (1) more persons in the aged group; (2) age qualifications now 62 instead of 65, and (3) less social security credit now needed for eligibility to retirement or survivors benefits.

Figures for the first four months of 1962 show that 242 persons in the Ranger area talked with H. L. Weatherly, field representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration on the 8 visits made to the City Hall here. This compares with 225 for the same period of 1961.

Weatherly says that the 1960 and 1961 amendments made it advantageous for all persons to file their social security retirement claims soon after age 65 even if still working. And, if not earning more than \$1200 per year, a person should file at age 62, or be certain why he doesn't.

Everyone should check into just what social security can mean for him and his family, when that 65 birthday rolls around, for checks are due many persons whose annual earnings surpass the \$1200 figure by a considerable amount, Weatherly concluded. The next visit to Ranger will be on May 16.

The Cisco airport road was one of the three new Farm-to-Market projects approved

The three churches in Carbon have recently undergone extensive improvement. The Church of Christ has been enlarged by sixteen feet across the entire front which provides almost twice as much seating capacity in the auditorium. Two extra classrooms have been added and the entire exterior have been sheet-rocked and painted. The furniture and floors also have had a new coat of paint. Plans are being made to paint the outside later.

The Baptist Church members have completed work on the entrance of their building. A new cement porch has been laid, new steps have been made and banisters have been placed on each side of the steps. Two new doors have also been put up which adds much to the attractiveness of the entrance.

The Methodists have completed some painting on the interior of their church which makes the building much more attractive and they have also done extensive repair to the roof.

for Eastland County this week by the Texas Highway Commission, according to an announcement by District Engineer E. M. Pritchard of Brownwood.

The Cisco project, which had been sought by Chamber of Commerce committees in two appearances before the Highway commission, will be 3.3 miles in length. It will leave Highway 380 two miles north of Cisco and go west passed the airport to Lake Cisco, crisscrossing the mountain to serve numerous cabins and homes on the lake shore.

Buddy Haun, Eastland County resident engineer, told the Press that plans for the projects are now in preparation and that bids are expected to be sought within a few weeks.

Commissioner Carl Lamb, who has been active in seeking the project including going to Austin twice and to Brownwood several times, reported that construction work likely will begin this summer. He said the road would serve many people.

An additional 3.0 miles is approved for FM 2731 which will complete the presently designated road from U. S. 183, about 5 miles north of Rising Star, west to FM 569 near Sabanna Church.

Also approved is a road from FM 101 east of Morton Valley, north to the Stephens County Line to tie in with the extension of FM 1852 approved also.

This is a total of 9.7 miles of new roads in Eastland County, and it is estimated these improvements will cost \$164,000.

Cisco Jr. College Builds Dormitory

Kinard and Beck Construction Co. of Abilene was the low bidder for a contract to build a new boys dormitory at Cisco Junior College at the bid opening Thursday afternoon at the cafeteria, according to a report by President Grady Hogue.

The Abilene firm's bid was \$86,950 for the job. A total of 11 bids was submitted, the highest being \$113,535.

The contractors said they would begin moving in equipment this week and that work would be underway within ten days. They added that local labor would be hired as far as possible.

The contract specified 210 working days but Mr. Hogue said they believed the building would be completed in considerably less time. The bid did not include legal and architect's fees. Mr. Hogue expected the total cost, including equipment, to run between \$110,000 and \$125,000.

The structure will be 40 feet wide and 217 feet long and will contain quarters for 70 boys. The building will be of brick and tile with terrazzo floors. Financing was accomplished through a 40-year FHA loan.

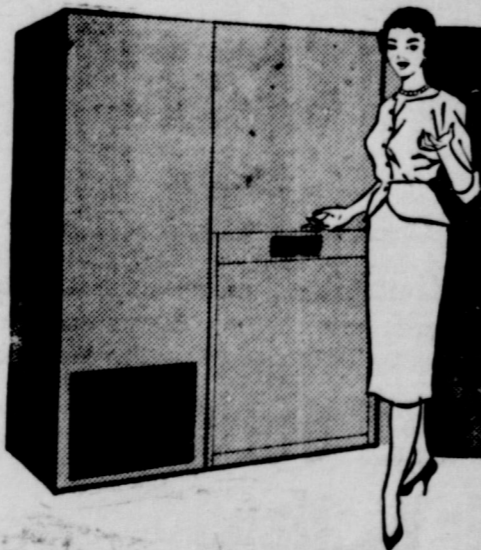
