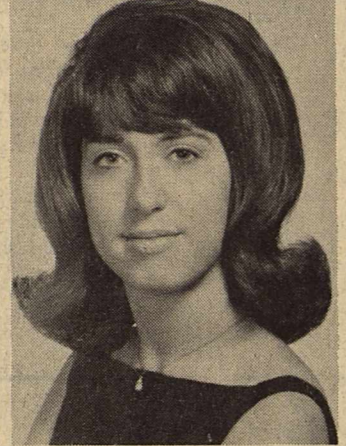

Plains High School Sets Senior Graduation Tuesday

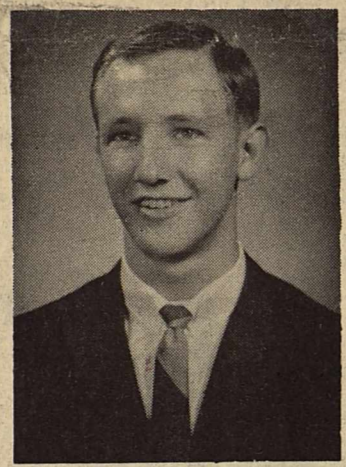

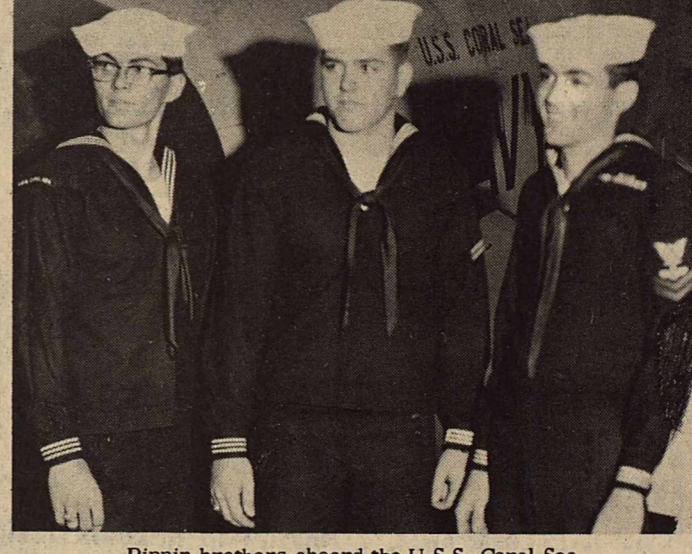
Tingle also announced that new uniforms are being ordered for all four teams this year. New sponsors were obtained for the Little League uniforms.

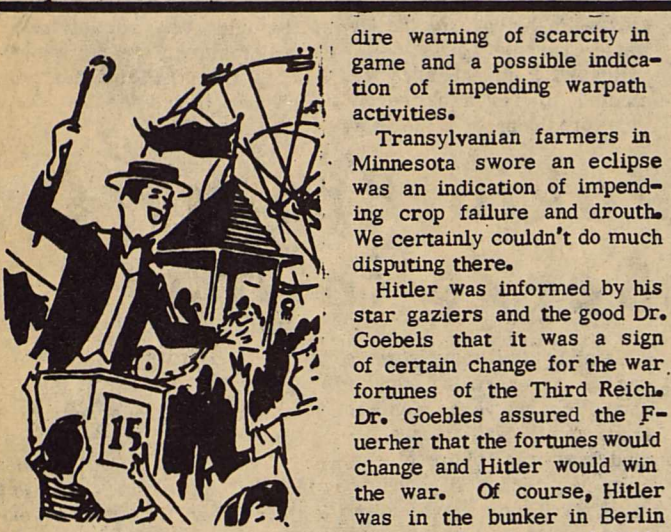

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CAYCE'S CORNER

Tuesday morning I was returning to town from the farm when I observed an eclipse of the sun. Thinking immediately what eclipses have meant to people of the past and various superstitions attached; I was first reminded of the ancient Egyptians. Of course, the Pharaoh and his subjects thought that Ra, the Sun God, had skipped out on them. This caused pandemonium on the Nile. Soldiers flung themselves upon their swords, maidens jumped into the jaws of crocodiles, and Egyptians undertakers drank their own blood.

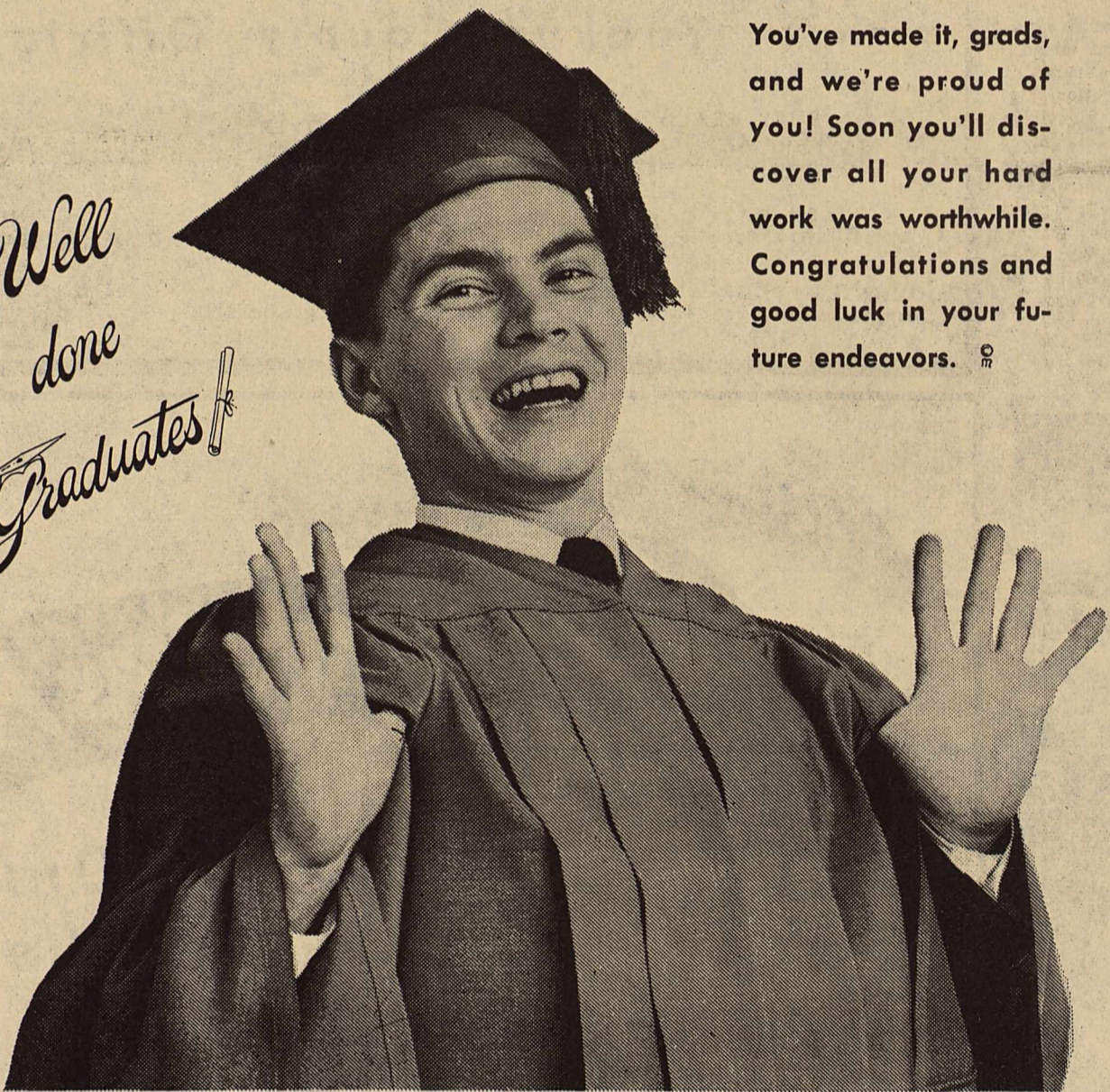

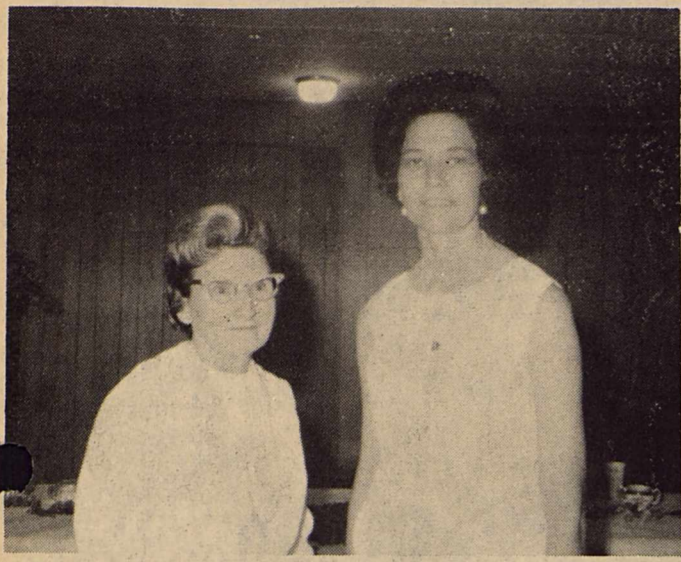

Dr. J. W. Trent, head of the Language department at Abilene Christian College, arranged the tour which left the states on June 3, 1965 and returned on July 15, having completed forty-five days.

The tour was motivated by a desire of Abilene Church of Christ congregations to learn the extent of the religious movement in Spain and other Spanish speaking countries. The Treants and Mrs. Womack visited in the homes of missionaries as well as natives of these countries interested in the spread of the gospel.

The tour covered 18000 miles and used fourteen airlines. Mrs. Womack saw in these countries great contrast in the way the people lived. There is no middle class. There are only the rich and the very poor. Also we go from state to state here freely and in South America, which is composed of nations, some smaller than our states, customs and inspections and passports had to be contended with. The slides were very beautiful and interesting and we thank Mrs. Womack for taking time to show them with us.

Music and a medley of songs from movies were presented by a talented local group of young people. The medley included, Down Town,

Love is a Masquerade, Dear Heart, Mame, and others.

Mrs. Wayne Davis gave an interesting Review of Accomplishments, for the club year. She expressed the clubs appreciation to the program committee headed by Billie Ellundell, for planning the excellent programs on the variety of subjects.

Twenty - six members and their Senior Citizen guests were present.
