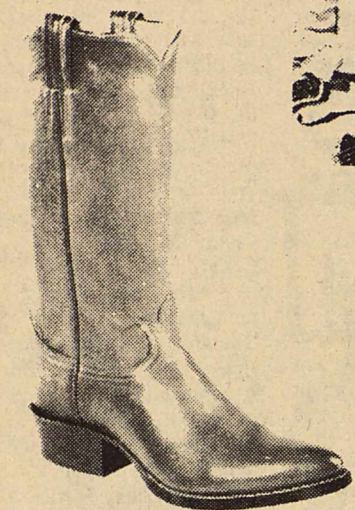

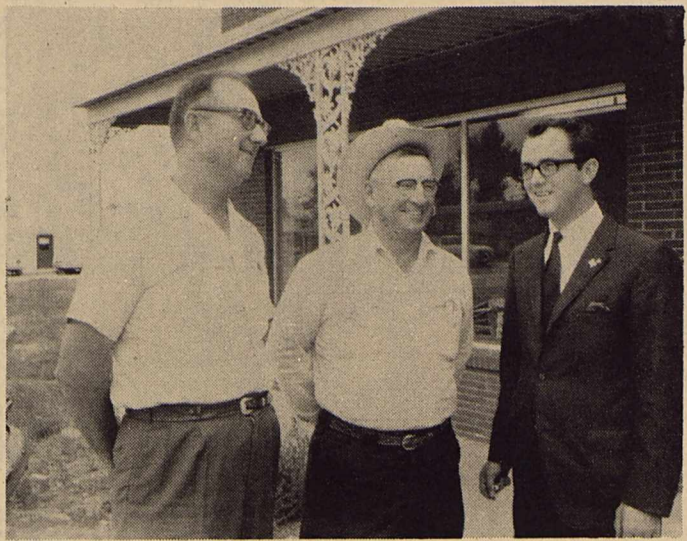

Ted Weaver filed for this office on September 1. He is twenty six years old and he is married and has a 17 month old son. Ted is a graduate of Levelland High School and attended South Plains College where he was President of his class. He then attended Texas Tech where he received his degree in government. He has taught school in Hale Center for one year and has taught in the Muleshoe school system for the past two years.

Weaver worked in the Texas House of Representatives as a Legislative assistant to Jesse T. George during the last session. He is familiar and interested in this district. He currently lives in and pays taxes in this district.
