needs and aims.

Mrs. Seay stressed that the Democratic way of life and the maintenance of morals has to be protected and nurtured in our homes. With the Supreme Court ruling on what constitutes obscenity, there is no legal way to prevent this kind of literature and other material from being circulated.

Two of the major Federated club sponsored projects have been completed. The Cultural Resources Survey for the State of Texas with more than 550 towns and every county in the state being reached in the comprehensive survey. This far exceeded the hopes of the Texas Fine Arts Commission and resulted in its establishment as a permanent organization. Also concluded was the successful campaign for the passage of Traffic Safety Legislation.

One excellent project voted by the Executive Committee and District Presidents for 1967-68 is to place historical markers to outstanding women.

This is a joint project with the Texas Historical Society Committee and can honor a woman in many categories. The goal is one marker per county. The goal is high, but Mrs. Seay reminded us that "the essentials of life are: some task to do, someone to love, and something to hope for."

Mrs. Seay told of the plans for the International Friendship Garden and Pavilion to be built between Brownsville and Matamoros, Mexico. A grant of \$125,000.00 has been made from the state. Hopes for same federal grant is held and the balance to be raised by club women by August, 1968.

Although pleased with progress made and grateful to the people who have made it possible, the theme of her message left little doubt that we can be complacent and survive.

Her 'Quo Vadis' (Where are you going?) is food for thought.

Cotton Sewing Contest

Members of the Yoakum County Cotton Club have scheduled a "Sew It With Cotton" contest to be held in the Plains School Cafeteria at 3:00 PM November 18.

Horace McQueen, farm news director of Lubbock's KLBK television station, will be guest speaker. Prizes will be awarded in each division and entertainment will be provided by Yoakum County 4-H members.

General rules of the contest include: models must be five years of age or older; all materials must be of 100% domestic cotton (not imported); rhinestones, sequins, etc., will be accepted as trimming; no bonded cotton allowed; 100% cotton lining must be used; inner linings and inner facings do need to be all cotton; appropriate accessories may be used; items of entry must be made especially for this contest; and one may enter more than one division.

The five divisions include (1) juniors, ages 12 to 18 years, dress up dress; (2) juniors, ages 12 to 18 years of age, school dress; (3) adult, dress up dress; (4) adult, casual or school dress made by an adult and modeled by someone else; (5) adult, tailored garments such as suits and coats.

The contest is limited to members of the Yoakum County club. All women of the area who are interested in the promotion of cotton may become a member whether they live in Yoakum County or not. When a club is organized in their home county, they may transfer membership if they wish. Dues are one dollar.

Let's Cook With Peanut Butter

Men have dug into the depths of the earth and soared into the realms of outer space — and all in search of energy. Energy can be yours by merely lifting the lid off a jar of peanut butter. Does this sound fantastic? Well, it's true. Peanut butter is a quick, wholesome source of unharnessed energy. Once you get a taste of this creamy delicacy, you will find yourself craving more and more of this protein-rich food. Take time out to acquaint yourself with peanut butter.

Children are already familiar with the newer crunchy styles. This warehouse of energy is as much a part of a child's life as playing cowboys and Indians. Make sure that you have plenty on hand for him to crunch. Don't limit peanut butter to sandwich combinations. It's spreadability has a hankering to spread to desserts and even to main dishes.

Turkey stuffings are checked full of crunchy surprises

when peanut butter is used. Here's how you prepare PEANUT BUTTER TURKEY STUFFING.

You will need:
3 1/2 quarts day-old bread cubes
2/3 c. finely chopped onion
1 t. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
chopped giblets
2-1/2 c. milk
1 c. crunchy peanut butter
1/2 c. raisins

Combine bread cubes, onion, salt, pepper and giblets in a large bowl. In a sauce pan, heat the milk, peanut butter and raisins, stirring constantly until the peanut butter is soft. Pour peanut butter mixture over the bread and toss lightly with a fork. Stuff turkey or other fowl lightly, taking care not to pack stuffing too tightly. This yields stuffing for a 12 to 16 lb. turkey.

Here is a delectable recipe for PEANUT BUTTER DATE COOKIES. You will need:

4 c. flour
1 t. baking powder
1 t. salt
1 t. cinnamon

1 c. margarine
1 c. firmly packed brown sugar
1 c. chopped dates
1/4 t. baking soda
1/2t. nutmeg
2/3c. granulated sugar
2 eggs
1/2c. peanut butter

Sift flour with baking powder, soda, salt and spices. Cream peanut butter and margarine together. Gradually stir in sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Gradually add flour mixture, mixing to blend. Mix in dates, which have been sprinkled with 1 tablespoon additional flour. Shape into four rolls about eight inches long. Wrap in plastic food wrap, waxed paper, or foil, chill well in the refrigerator. When ready to bake, cut into thin slices and bake on an ungreased baking sheet in a moderately hot oven. (about 400 degrees F.) for 5 to 8 minutes. Yield: 6-1/2 dozen cookies. Unbaked cookie dough may be stored in the refrigerator for several weeks. What an aid in getting a delicious dessert together on short notice!

Buy a supply of peanut butter now. The U. S. D. A. Consumer and Marketing Service reports that it is plentiful supply.

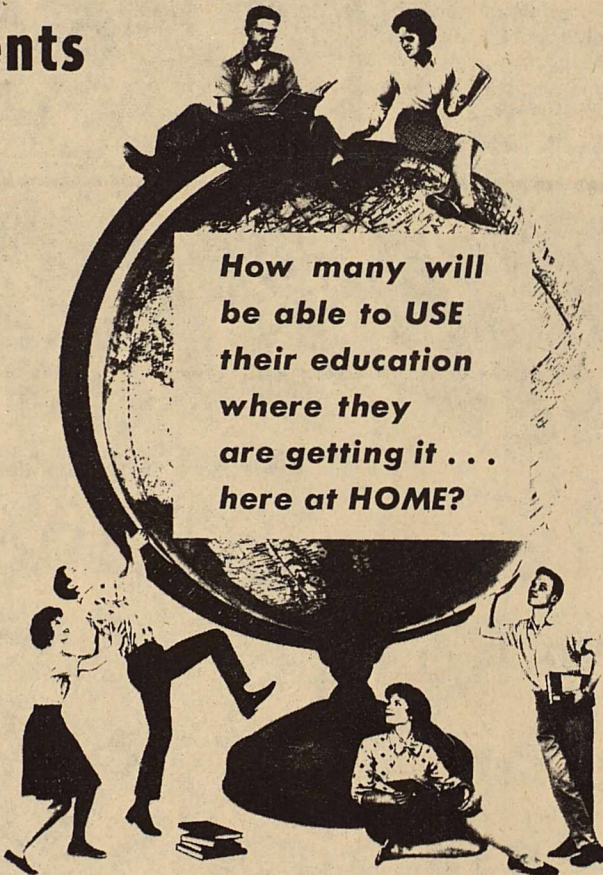

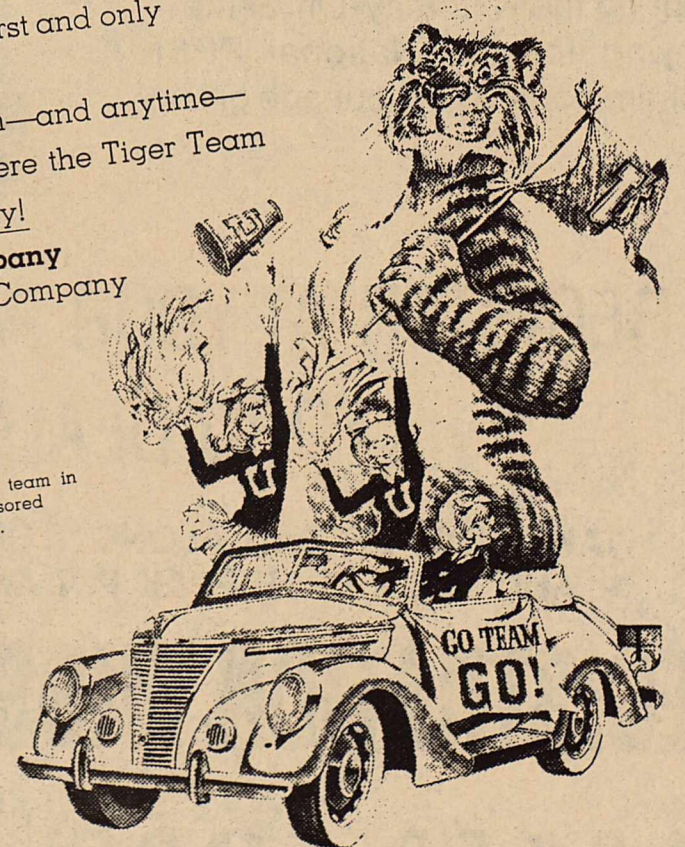
