Clear Up Bad Water In Plains

The County Health Officer reports that there are a few cross connections which have been found in Plains which are connections from potable water sources and sources of private supply which has been connected. Health Department regulations require that there be an air space between the two systems used. Kyle Adams, Health Officer, explained an example of a cross-connection is a private well tied in with a city system.

The Health officer reports that the school is now on the city water system until the chlorinators are operative in the county system, making it a potable system.

Health sources also pointed out that other forms of cross connections can be found where there is no air space between the fill faucet and possible water level in sinks, bathtubs, and livestock watering tanks.

A local business has taken the necessary steps to make its system potable and a livestock watering float has been corrected, it was learned from other sources.

1968 Cotton Program Told By Local ASCS Official

According to W. M. Overton, local ASCS office Manager, official notice has been received concerning the 1968 Cotton Program, and the manager stated that the program had been announced.

To be eligible for price support and diverted acre payments, at least 5 percent of the effective allotment must be diverted. This compares with 12.5 percent for 1966 and 67; with an option to divert an additional 30 percent. For diverting the 5 percent, a diversion payment of 10.76 cents time the projected yield will be made; for diverting additional acres, a payment of 6 cents per lb. will be made. The price support payment which is made on 65 percent of the allotment will be 12.24 cents. This compares with 11.53 cents for the 1967 and 9.42 cents for the 1966 program.

The skip row regulations will be the same as in 1965; two rows cotton and two rows blank will be 50 percent cotton and two rows cotton and one blank will be two-thirds cotton. Based on 35% participation in the program, with the same yield and allotment, the total payments under the cotton program will be approximately 8.5 percent less than under the 1967 program and approximately 5 percent more than under the 1966 program.

Notices of farm acreage allotments will be mailed to operators of cotton farms prior to the referendum. If marketing quotas for the 1968 upland cotton crop are disapproved by the farmers, the allotment program will remain in effect, but there will be no acreage diversion program and no price support payments.

Wranglers Blank Eagles

Coach Bob Cross's 7th & 8th grade Wranglers kept the slate clean last Thursday, and downed a good Seagraves jr. high unit in both instances to remain undefeated and unscorred upon this year.

The Wranglers travel to Morton today and will be out to keep their victory string going.

The seventh grade downed Seagraves in the first game 27-0, while the eighth grade defeated the Warbirds 14-0. This was the first year that a Plains eighth grade has managed to come out on top against Seagraves.

In the seventh grade game, quarterback Joey Lowe brought the team to the scrimmage with constant threats of scoring from David Sewell and Tony Chandler, with a power punch delivered by J. L. Neal. The line was impressive in working for their backs to find

ample running room. The final result was that Seagraves was unable to stop the charging of the Plains backs, and the seventh grade garnered an impressive victory over the Eagles.

In the eighth grade game, quarterbacks Ronnie Raines and Tommy Beal alternated duties in calling the signals. Halfbacks Shelly Simpson and Randy Fitzhugh kept the momentum going with the help of fullback Mike Cayce. On the first play of the game, Fitzhugh raced around right end for paydirt, but the glory was denied as a costly clip cost the T. D. In the second quarter Mike Cayce bulled his way to the goal and scored for the Wranglers. Fitzhugh made the run for the pair of points, and the Wranglers were in front 8-0. Fitzhugh made the second, and what was to be the last

Wrangler score of the day, and the try for extra point failed.

It looked like the Warbirds would break the Wrangler jinx late in the 4th quarter as they gained a first and goal from inside the four. The big Plains line came alive, and as the whistle blew to end the game, the Eagles were thrown for a loss. It was not an easy win for the Wranglers, as the Birds blocked two kicks and remained a threat in the second half.

Cowboy fans were brought to their feet time after time Friday night at the big Homecoming game, as they watched their Cinderella team come from behind to win what could be the most decisive game of the year by branding a fine Coahoma Bulldog team 24-22 in a photo finish. Coach Rip Sewell's Cowboys now look to Seagraves with the hopes of defeating the number one team in the state Friday night. It will be Homecoming in Seagraves Friday, and the Cowboys will be there to make every attempt to avenge a point defeat suffered last year to the eagles. If Plains is able to down the Eagles, the District championship could become the reward.

Plains and Seagraves have played two common foes, and the Cowboys defeated both Sudan and Farwell by a bigger margin than Seagraves. The experts will install the Eagles as the favorites, but the experts haven't seen the Cowboys play, so our guess is the Cowboys by a least six points.

The Plains-Coahoma game was almost even in every respect with statistics pointing it out. Plains outgained Coahoma 339 to 303. Coahoma had 17 first downs 17-16, while the Bulldogs intercepted one pass, but fumbled three times into Plains hands.

In the first quarter, the Bulldogs were able to make a sustained drive and Dean Richter hit pay dirt from the two, and carried for two points to put the Bulldogs out in front 8-0.

In the second quarter, the Cowboys drove to the Coahoma four, where Gregg Jones ripped through to score. He carried the ball for two, and the game deadlocked at 8-8, and late in the second quarter John Loew booted a 27 yard field goal to put the score at 11-8 in favor of the Pokes.

On the last play of the second quarter after an impressive goal line stand, which saw Billy Taylor rush through and throw Ken Gregg for a loss, and holding the Dogs on downs, Gregg Jones raced 88 yards to score, and

John Lowe converted with a kick to give the Cowboys an 18-8 halftime margin.

In the third quarter, Coahoma gained the momentum again, and Ricky Evans blasted to paydirt on a 40-yard run to put the score 18-14, Plains.

On the first play of the fourth quarter, Ricky Evans paced 13 yards to gain the advantage for Coahoma by a 22-18 margin after the two-point conversion was made.

With only two minutes left, the Cowboys went out in front to stay with a Jones touchdown. The point after the touchdown failed, and the score stood at 24-22.

Gregg Jones has gained a total of 1282 yards this season and has scored 104 points to become the leading scorer in West Texas and is first in the state in yards gained.

Both the six Constitutional Amendments, and the candidates for the House of Representative seat will be on the same ballot.

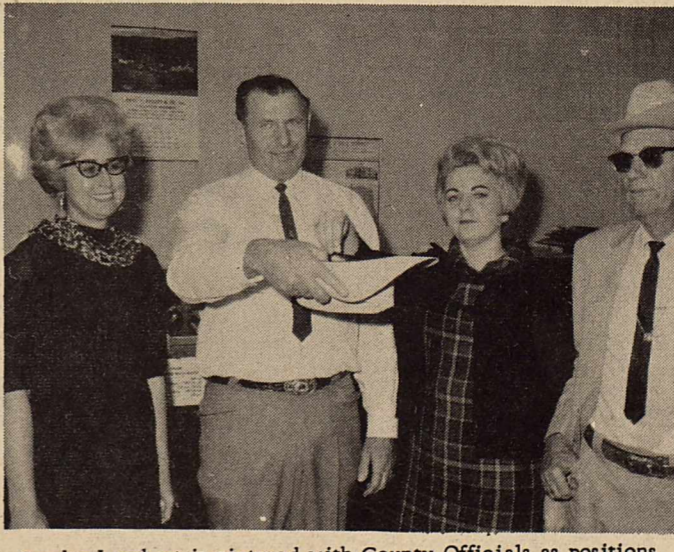

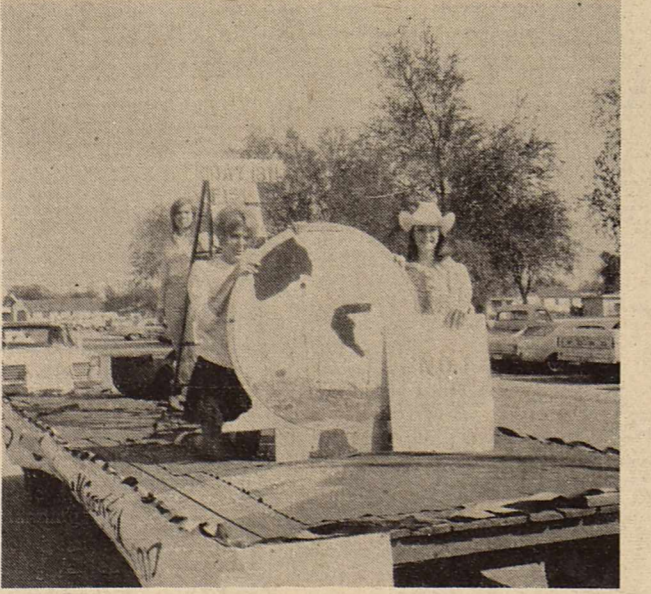


Sandra Lambert is pictured with County Officials at positions on ballot are drawn for in representative election.

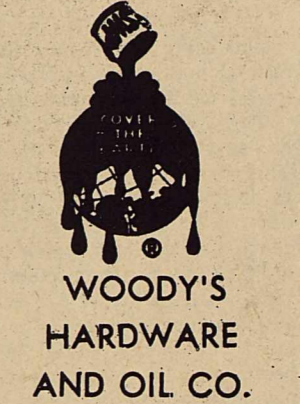

St. Romain, chairman of the Yoakum County Historical Survey Committee as well as all members of the county committee have been invited to represent their county at the 1967 Annual Meeting of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee and the Texas Historical Foundation, its private affiliate.

The meeting will be held at the Moody Convention Center in Galveston, October 26 thru 28. The joint membership of the two organizations totals more than 3,000 members in 254 county committees.

The county committees will be competing for several annual awards at the meeting. These include "Best Committee Newsletter", "Best Program of Work for 1967", "Best Historical Scrapbook", and "Best Publication of Local or Regional History". Awards will also be presented for the "Best chairman of a County Historical Survey Committee".
