Ordinary, the fellers ars, would leave such items up to their old lady, but the storekeeper had got a memerandum from the Food and Drug Administration through the Department of Health, Education and Welfare advising on the new requirements fer Guvernment approved cherry pie.

On account of most of your readers, Mister Editor, probable buys a cherry pie now and then, I borrowed this Guvernment memerandum fer my little piece this week. I don't know how much it cost the taxpayers to git out this information on cherry pie, but I would guess around the \$20,000 mark. I'll skip the first half of the memerandum and just put down the second half so's the wimmen folks can be safe and sure in this matter.

"Subsection (B): The number of cherries per ounce of a pie, as required in paragraphs (A) (1) of this section is determined as follows: Remove the filling and cherries from the pie and distribute evenly over the surface of a 12-inch diameter U. S. No. 8 sieve (0.094-inch openings) stacked on a U. S. No. 20 sieve. Wash the cherries and cherry fragments free from adhering material with a gentle water spray. Drain the cherry contents on the No. 8 sieve for two minutes in an inclined position (15-30-degree slope). Do not discard the contents of No. 20 sieve. Transfer the whole cherries to a pan and determine the weight of all whole cherries. Count the whole cherries and calculate the average weight per whole cherry. Collect the cherry fragments from both the No. 8 and No. 20 sieves. Weigh the cherry fragments and calculate the whole cherry equivalent based on the average weight per cherry. The number of whole cherries plus the number of whole cherry equivalents is the total number of the cherries in the pie. Calculate the number of cherries per ounce of net weight of pie. If the total is less than 2.7 cherries per ounce it does not qualify as cherry pie under the Food and Drug Administration."



Voter Registration In

January 31 closes the statewide (2) by persons who become 21 newspaper campaign organized years old after January 31, 1968, newspaper campaign organized by Secretary of State John L. Hill to promote voter register ation in Texas.

Hill has organized the registration drive in his capacity as chief election officer of the state, a title which the Texas legislature conferred on the Secretary of State last year, along with placing upon him important new responsibilities in the administration of the state's election laws. In commenting on the drive, Hill said that one of his purposes is to publicize new laws affecting voting rights, which otherwise might go unnoticed by the average citizen.

One of the new laws enacted in 1967 makes registration necessary, for the first time in Texas history, for persons over 60 years old who live in rural communities and towns under ten thousand population. Heretofore, persons over 60 were required to register only if they lived in a city having more than ten thousand inhabitants. Texas voters must register annually. The 1968 voting year will begin on March 1, 1968, and will end on February 28, 1969. The registration period for the 1968 voting year began last Oct. first and will end on January 31, 1968. Any citizen of Texas who now possesses the necessary qualifications for voting or who will attain them by February 28, 1969, may register during the

current registration period.

Registration certificates will be

mailed before the beginning of

the voting year on March 1 to persons who apply by mail. Voters may also register by applying at the county tax assessorcollector's office or at a registration substation.

The husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter of a voter may act as the voter's agent

in applying for registration if the relative is a qualified voter in the same county. Except for these listed relatives, which do not include those related by marriage, no one may act as ag-ent for another in applying for registration.

Voters who have not already applied for registration are urged, to cut out the application form which appears in this paper, fill in the blanks, and mail it to the county tax assessor-collector without delay. For the information of families needing more than one application blank, this form will be reprinted during this month. Additional forms may also be obtained from the county tax assessor-collector.
