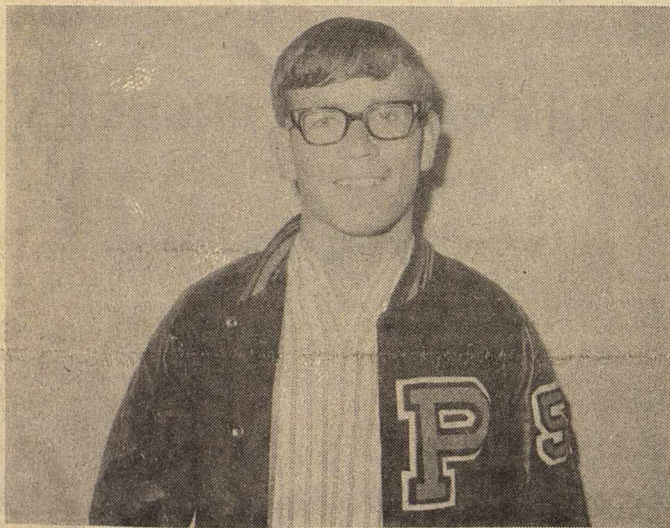

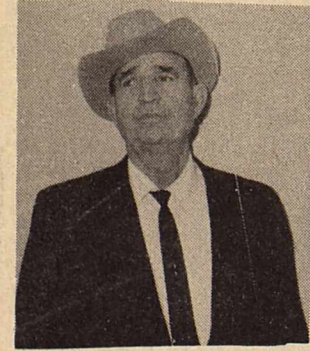

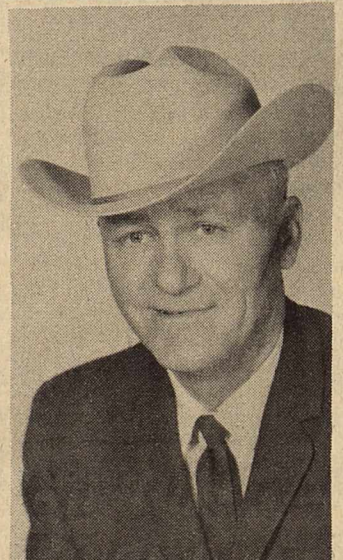
### OFF THE RECORD

### Yoakum Co's 2nd Fatality

R. G. Medlin, 53, of Tahoka was dead on arrival at the Yoakum County Hospital Saturday morning about 9:00 a. m. after his butane truck jackknifed on FM Road 1939 in south Yoakum County.

A leak resulted from a broken hose connection, but the truck did not catch fire or overturn. Medlin was born in Durant, Okla., and had lived in Lynn County since 1918. He had worked the past 22 years for Witt Butane Company of Tahoka. Services were at 3:00 p. m. Tuesday in the Sweet Street Baptist Church in Tahoka with Rev. Shelby Bishop, pastor and Rev. Ray Cunningham of Wells Baptist Church officiating.

Burial was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home of Tahoka.

Survivors included his wife; two sons, Wendell D. and Robert L., both of the home.

The fatality was the second for Yoakum County this year and the twelfth for the south plains.

### Farmers Meetings Set February 22

Two farmers meetings will be held on February 22 according to information received from Leo L. White, County Agricultural Agent. An afternoon meeting in Plains and a night meeting at Denver City will give Yoakum County farmers an opportunity to get some up-to-date information about production practices, crop diseases, fertilizer use, and irrigation.

The Plains meeting will be held in the Boy Scout Hut and Lions Den located eight blocks north of the courthouse. This meeting begins at 2:30 p. m. A second meeting is scheduled for 7:30 p. m. in the Community building at Denver City. A team of four Extension Service Specialists will be bringing the information at these meetings. Two meetings have been scheduled in order to give every producer in Yoakum County a better opportunity to attend without too much interference with farm work. Every farmer and interested individual should plan now to attend one of these meetings on Thursday, Feb. 22.

Dr. Robert Berry, Plant Pathologist, will discuss diseases of crops; Mr. James Valentine, Soil Chemist in charge of the Soils Laboratory at Lubbock, will present information of fertilizers and their use; Dr. Robert Metzger, Area Agronomist, will show slide pictures and explain about new production practices used in producing cotton, grain sorghum, and oil seed crops; and Mr.

Wayne Keese, Agricultural Engineer, will handle the part of the program pertaining to irrigation. Keese is from College Station and the other members of this team are located at Lubbock with offices at the South Plains Research and Extension Center. These men have nothing to advertise and nothing to sell except better farming methods and a desire to be of assistance to the producers.

In order to get the 1968 crop year off to a good start, White suggests that you bring your questions and your unsolved problems to one of these meetings and make full use of this team of specialists. These men have a large territory to cover and a heavy schedule and we are fortunate to have them in Yoakum County on this date. Mark your calendar and make every effort to attend the meeting most convenient for you.

needed and the most efficient means of obtaining that assistance will be made. Arrangements for needed treatment or service will be made by the Easter Seal Society.

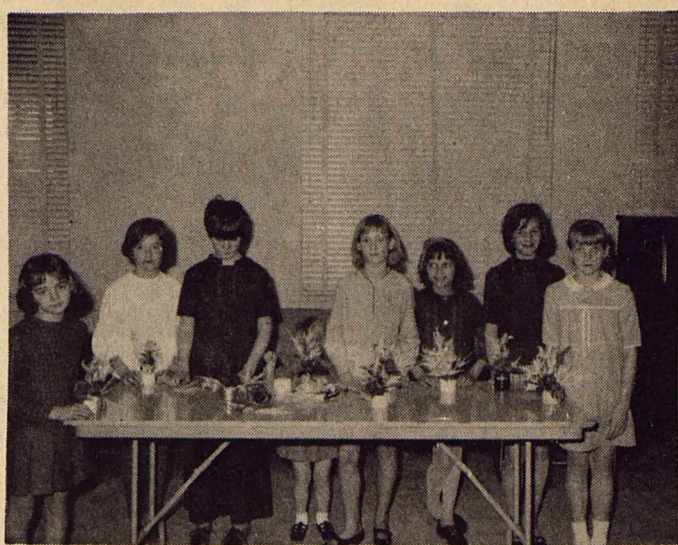

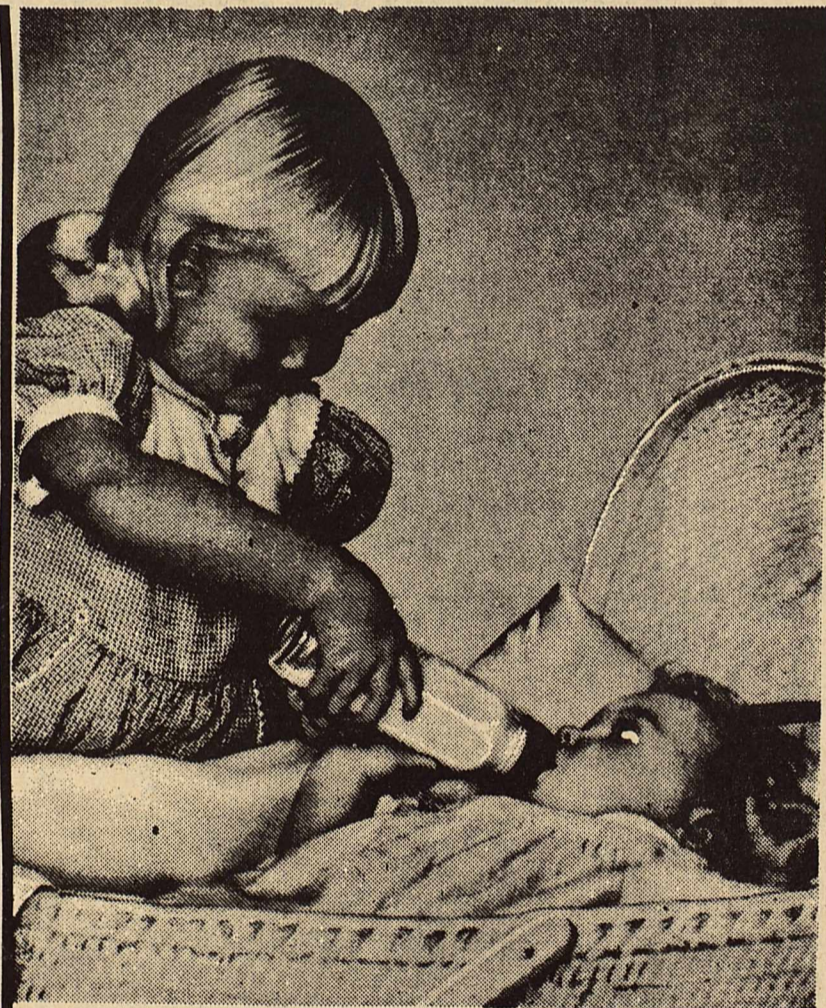

# Terry County Couple Returns To Turkey For Two Year Stay

There aren't many people that I know who wouldn't be thrilled at the thought of Far-away-places. Did you ever wish you could pack up and travel and as one cowboy put it "See the sights, the electric lights and watch the automobiles roll by."

Well, I have been talking to a couple who did just that and got paid a salary at the same time. I am speaking of Mr. and Mrs. Duane Anderson, presently on their way back to Diyarbakir, Turkey, for two more years.

Now you say, "that's too far away!" But I say, "Who cares?" The Andersons traveled by jet from Lubbock to Houston and on to Amsterdam, Vienna and Istanbul. How's that for luxury?

The couple traveled into Old Mexico and decided right then and there that it was the life for them. Anderson is a combination operator with Halliburton Company and volunteered for overseas work and this landed him in Turkey for two years.

When the thought of Turkey

comes up I think of the Far East, Constantinople (Istanbul), mud houses, women with veils on their faces and these things are in Turkey but as far as Mrs. Anderson is concerned, no mud house for her. They live in a modern trailer house

with a generator for electricity and running water.

Turkey reminds me of shish-kebab, camels, water buffalo and olives. And these things are to be found, but the favorite of Mrs. Anderson is the highly seasoned, spicy shishkebab (it took me a day to learn the correct spelling) and borek, a French like pastry wrapped around beef and rice.

And to get the ingredients for shishkebab or any other kind of food, a daily trip to the open market place is required. There you can find vegetables (mostly tomatoes, olives and potatoes), meat (beef, mutton and water buffalo) and above all watermelons. This area is known as the watermelon capital of the world.

Anything else that you may want to buy is to be found in

small stalls or stores around the market. In some shops you find pieces of jewelry, hand-made of gold and precious and semi-precious jewels. These are very reasonable in price and being hand-made, unlike any other found in the world.

For entertainment the employees of the oil companies can visit a small military base and attend the movies, bowl and swim.

Like many a man, who is crazy about sports (hunting and fishing), Anderson found himself in heaven, when on a weekend trip into the mountains they found an abundance of mountain trout. Their camp is situated on a plains area at the foot of the mountains and most of the industry is centered around farming that takes place along the Tigris River. On their weekend excursions they have seen many ancient ruins and on their vacation this summer they hope to make a longer trip to the Holy Lands.

The Andersons speak well of the Turks and they say that they are a hard working people and

about 90 percent of them are of the Moslem faith. Because of the social differences required of them by their religion, they cannot mingle freely with the people in their home and this makes it difficult at times to understand them even though they speak the language.

The better educated people come from the Western part of the country and schools have a mandatory requirement that the children go through the eighth grade.

Whenever any one leaves their home state or country there is always something that they miss and both of the Andersons lists Texas hamburgers and of all things, celery, because it is unknown in Turkey.

Anderson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Anderson of Tokio and Mrs. Anderson's parents are Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Hope of Malakoff. When the couple is home on leave most of their time is spent visiting their families in the two towns.

Far-away places may be nearer than we think and if we can't go, why not take the journey in our thoughts and go along with the Andersons.

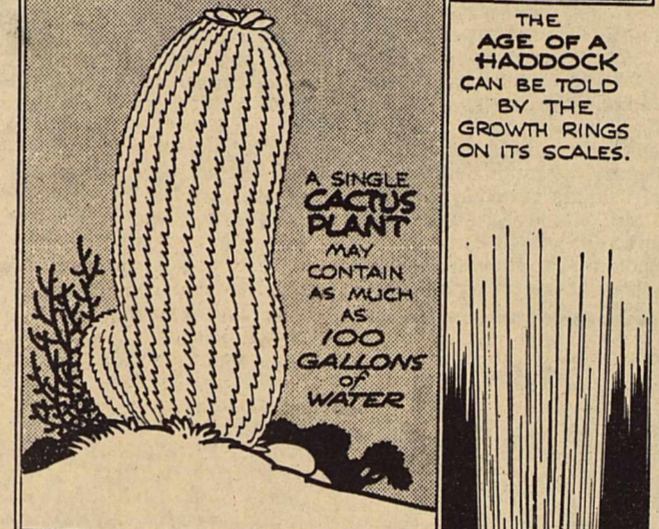

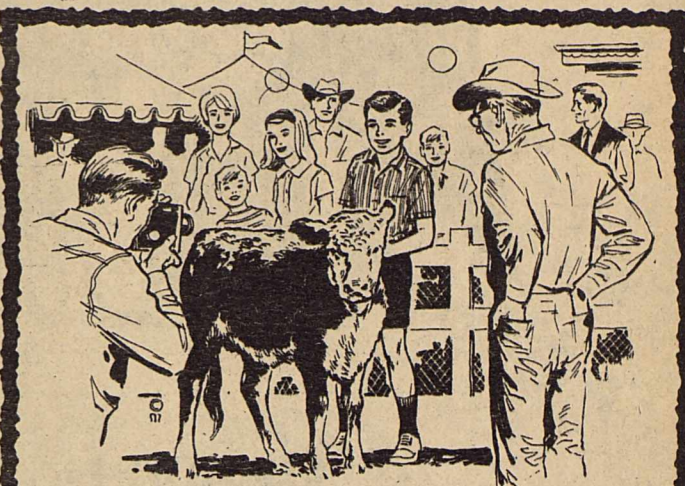

Farmers that wish to comply with the 1968 feed grain program must divert and put to conservation use as much as 20 per cent of their farm's total feed grain base plus the farm's conserving base, if any, must also be diverted to a conservation use. Whether the farm is large or small farmers may earn payments for diverting more acreage than 20 percent minimum; in total up to the larger of 50 percent of the base or 25 acres; provided the 25 acres is not more than the base.

For diverting the 20 percent a price support payment will be made at the rate of 53 cents per hundred weight for grain sorghum based on the planted acreage up to one-half of the farm's feed grain base times the established yield. Price support payment rates are the same for all counties. Price support payments will be divided among all producers as they share in the 1968 feed grain crop. The normal division of feed grain crops in this county is two-thirds for the tenant and one-third for the landlord. The payment for diverting the additional acreage above the 20 percent minimum will figure approximately 98cents per hundred weight times the projected yield.

Farmers may according to the regulations participate on one farm without enrolling any other farm. However, the benefits from the participating farm will be reduced or eliminated if anyone grows feed grains (corn or grain sorghum) in excess of the feed grain base on a farm in which they (the husband, wife or minor children) have an interest. This is true even if the other farm is rented out in any manner. Corn or grain sorghum which has no feed grain base will be considered excess grain.

Farmers that wish to take part in the 1968 feed grain program must sign their "Intentions" with their local ASCS office during the period of Feb. 5 through March 15. At that time

they should discuss with the county office personnel the farming plans on any other farm in which they or their immediate family have an interest. They also should discuss the land that is eligible to be classified as diverted land.

Farmers with both wheat allotment and feed grain base may substitute wheat for feed grains or feed grains for wheat, by signing up in both programs; devoting to conserving uses the acreage diverted from feed grains, maintaining the conserving use acreage (if any) and otherwise meeting provisions of both programs. However, substitution of feed grains for wheat will reduce the acreage eligible for feed grain diversion payment, acre for acre until reduced to zero.

No crops may be harvested from diverted acreages and may be grazed only during the authorized grazing period. A list of approved crops for diverted acreages and conserving uses for Yookum County will be mailed to each farm operator who signs to participate in the program. Advance payments as we have made under the past programs have not been authorized as of this date.

Pages from a February Notebook

On February 3, 1917, the United States government severed diplomatic relations with Germany. Passports were given to Count Johann H. von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, and his official staff. On the same day, President Woodrow Wilson appeared before a joint session of Congress to explain the government's action. Four days later the Senate, by a vote of 78 to 5, adopted a resolution approving the president's action.

Millard Fillmore, born February 7, 1800, has been referred to as "the president nobody knows". Born in a log cabin in Cayuga County, New York, a few miles southeast of the little city of Moravia, Fillmore became the 13th U. S. president. Despite the fact that he was a most interesting character and also that several events of importance happened during his Presidency, Fillmore has been the subject of fewer biographies than any other of our chief executives. The country is indebted to Fillmore for the extension of the national capital, the cornerstone of which he laid on July 4, 1851; and for extension of contemporary knowledge of the West through various exploring expeditions which he authorized. He sent Perry on the expedition

which opened the ports of Japan to the world and established diplomatic relations with that country. He carried out a policy of non-intervention in affairs of foreign nations, suppressed filibustering expeditions to Latin American countries and with equal firmness extracted from other countries respect for the American flag.

"This is the soldier brave enough to tell the glory-dazzled world that 'war is hell'."

These words are from a poem by Henry Van Dyke. They were inspired by an equestrian statue of Gen. William Tecumseh Sherman, unveiled in 1903 at Fifth Avenue and 59th Street, New York City. Sherman was born February 8, 1820, and achieved fame in the Civil War for his "March to the Sea." The phrase "War is hell" is inseparably linked with Sherman, although he could never remember saying it. It was vouched for by John Koolebeck, of Harlem, Iowa, an aide-de-camp, to Gen. Winslow in Grant's army, before Vicksburg. Koolebeck claimed he overheard Sherman say it while watching his 15 Corps cross a pontoon bridge over the Pearl River.

## 1967 COTTON LOANS

Several hundred 1967 produced bales of cotton has been placed under CCC loan by Yoakum County cotton farmers. Producers have through April 30 to place cotton under CCC loan and cotton may be redeemed any time prior to August 1 by paying the principal plus interest. To be eligible for a loan the cotton must have been produced by the producer and not have been previously sold. Also to be eligible for CCC loan cotton must be wrapped in specification bagging or the bagging identified with an exemption tag. As reported in a news release and a county office newsletter dated October 12, 1967 it is the farmer's responsibility to see that their cotton is wrapped in approved bagging if they want to pledge their cotton for a loan. Cotton placed in the loan and later found wrapped in ineligible bagging will be returned and the producer will be required to redeem the cotton by paying the principal, interest and other required charges.

Loans may be obtained at the local ASCS office or either bank in the county. Producers that do business with banks in other counties may obtain loans through their bank. In placing cotton under the loan both tenant and landlord and lien holder (if any) must sign the loan documents. Tenants with power of attorney to sign for their landlord may pledge their cotton for a loan by signing for the landlord.
