Pole Uprooted Minor Damage Caused By Sunday Twister

A twister near Plains Sunday was added to the list of Mother Nature's Whimsical Moods for the month of March.

After days of high winds, balmy sunshine, snow and ice, the twister was spotted at 2:30 P. M. about four miles west on Highway 380.

Yoakum County Sheriff Olan Heath and Deputy Bill Jones related the twister cut across Highway 380 over to Highway 314 and was headed toward Leveland before it dissipated.

The only damage was an uprooted power transmission pole near Mrs. Murphy Luna's ranch.

The sheriff's department, along with City Policeman Bobby Kinsey and Vance Gloner, traced the funnel in separate

cars until it disappeared. While only a trace of moisture was reported in Plains Sunday, the storm could be followed by means of a six-mile-wide path covered by two inches of hail stones. No hail damage was reported.

Measurable moisture was received in Yoakum County Sunday night and Monday in the form of snow and sleet.

Drifts were reported to be four and five feet deep in parts of the county west of Plains.

Relating pictures were made by Deputy Bill Jones while tracing the twister. He reported he was approximately one-half mile from the cloud scene at the time the pictures were made.

Livestock Group Sets Membership Meeting

The general public is invited to attend the meeting of the Yoakum County Livestock and Agriculture Improvement Association to be held in the District Courtroom on Monday night, March 25. Pictures of the 1968 show will be seen and the annual business of the association will be conducted.

All exhibitors in the 1968 show are urged to be present to receive their portion of the prize money contributed by the Plains State Bank. Each exhibitor will receive a check of at least \$2.50 and some will be for as much as \$5.00, depending upon the kind of animals they brought to the show.

Everyone who has paid the \$5.00 membership fee for the coming year will be entitled to vote in the election of directors. Five or six of the directors on the eleven man board have completed their two, two year terms, and their vacancies will be filled during the election at this meeting.

Breeding animals have been donated each year to be awarded to the exhibitors of the champion lamb, the grand champion barrow and the grand champion calf. Those who want to donate these animals will be given an opportunity to volunteer their donations on the night of March 25. Showmanip and other awards will also be donated for the 1969 show.

The members will be invited to make suggestions for improving the show, and the new board of directors will meet and organize as soon as the membership meeting is over. Mr. G. W. Cleveland, the chief salesman of membership receipts, will be on hand with his receipt book to sell memberships to anyone who wants to pay their dues. Two hundred memberships at \$5.00 each will bring the necessary \$1000 required to finance the 1969 show. One hundred forty-eight mem-

bers have been sold and the association needs fifty-two more members in order to be able to put on the same caliber of show they have been sponsoring for the past sixteen years.

The showing of the 200 slide pictures will begin at 8 P. M. Almost every exhibitor will be able to see a picture of himself and his animal, as Mr. Bob Graham the official photographer, had very few dark pictures and very good coverage of the show.

State Library In New Service

The Texas State Library will offer a new service to all Texas citizens beginning around March 15, 1968. At that time public libraries throughout the state will begin participation in the Texas State Library Network.

Because no one library can own all the materials that its patrons need, this service will allow each public library to submit requests for material and for information to other public libraries.

Public libraries serving communities of 25,000 or less will be able to telephone a designated, larger public library when this service is needed. If the larger library is unable to supply the materials, or needs of its own patrons, it will telephone the Major Resource Center Library serving the area. Should the Major Resource Center Library not have the material or need material for its own patrons, the request will be referred by telephone to the Texas State Library.

The collection of the State Library will be searched when necessary the request will then be submitted in turn to each of the other nine Major Resource

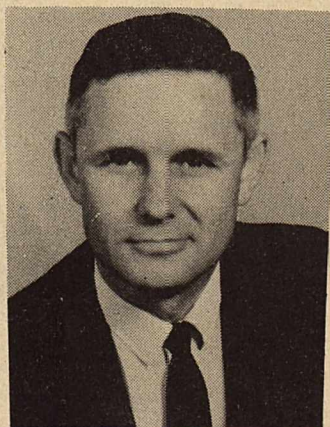
He will undergo from two to four weeks of individual combat training and then, after leave at home, will report for his first Marine Corps assignment.

Mrs. Bob Blundell, the program director introduced Mrs. H. F. Barnes which gave a very interesting biographical sketch of the water. Within a very short time many samples had been brought into the Home Demonstration office. The Sanitarian took these samples and after the water was tested reported to the office, and the user of the water. The wells in which bacteria were found were treated.

As of December 1967, approximately 175 wells have been tested, and 45% were found to contain harmful bacteria.

Mr. Adams is advising that the wells be tested again for safety.

The following is from Mr. Adams: "Suitable water for drinking purposes seldom occurs in nature. Rain and snow waters become contaminated quickly by dust, insects, animals and man. Some of the organisms into water by these means cause typhoid fever, para-typhoid fever, bacillary, and amoebic

of private wells and found over 70% to be contaminated. Midland County had so many bad wells they required all cesspools to be replaced by septic tanks. Their water has improved. Our records show that we test from 15 to 20 wells a month, with about 45% showing contamination. Since a lot of wells we test are known to be bad, I estimate that only about 20 or 30 percent of our total wells would test bad. This figure would increase with our growth in population. We can prevent a lot of this by proper location and construction of wells.

The well should be located 150 feet from stock and poultry yards, privies, cesspools, septic tanks, and absorption fields. It should be located so that flooding and the entrance of surface water are prevented. Water formations located less than 10 feet from the ground surface, or wells drawing water from rock formations that are creviced or channeled should not be used for domestic purposes, until several tests have shown the water to be safe. Even then tests should be run a frequent interval as polluted water may travel long distances through crevices in the rock. I think that some of our wells are contaminated by polluted water traveling in cracks in the caliche and entering the water

straight through an abandoned well or seismograph hole which have not been properly sealed. Abandoned wells should never be used for the disposal of sewage or other waste. I understand Mr. Cox, my predecessor, once had to go to court to stop an individual who was polluting the community water supply by running sewerage into an abandoned well.

The well should be cased from the water bearing formation to at least 18 inches above the finished concrete floor of the well house and should extend at least one inch above the pump or motor base. If possible it should be developed with a larger pump than the one to be used as in irrigation wells to reduce pumping of sand. It should be pressure cemented around the top ten feet of casing to prevent contamination from top water, snails digging under the concrete and falling in, etc.

One man told me that he cemented the top 20 feet of his well to prevent a cesspool water from getting in. We occasionally find dead animals in wells that are covered with a six or ten foot concrete floor. Evidently they dig under and fall in between the casing and the outer wall of the well. The top plate should have an inch pipe with a plug in it to chlorinate the well.
