



## Stars And Stripes Forever And Ever!!!

Can Tho, Vietnam (164th Cbt Avn Gp 10)--- "A funny thing happened to us on the way to the trash barrel, "reported Specialist Five Tom D, Warren of Plains and Specialist Five Stephen F. Pope of Austin.

Assigned as Port Calls Clerk and Chief Clerk of Officers' Records, respectively, for the 307th Combat Aviation(Phantom) Battalion at Can Tho Army Airfield, they were taking their turn burning classifiedmaterial and trash.

As the two specialist were removing the trash cans from their three-quarter-ton truck at the burning area just outside the main gate of Binh Thuy Air Force Base, a small group of Vietnamese gathered arou-nd watching. The soldiers placed the classified material into the burn barrel, lit them, then stood by until only ashes were left Next came the waste paper. Among this trash we-resome old "Stars and Stripes" newspapers.

" When the civilians saw the "Stars ans Stripes, " they became very excited, " said SPC 5. "One of them stepped forward and started speaking Vietnamese very rapidly, "Page continued. The apparent spokeman for the group kept motioning to

the papers and then back to the woods along the trash burning

Both of us could speak 'ti ti' Vietnamese, so we had no idea what he wanted. We tried using sign language but that just excited the little man even more, "SP5 Warren recalled. more, "SP5 Warren recalled. Finally in desperation, the civilian removed an issue of the "Stars ans Stripes" from the fire and ran off into the woods. "We thought 'what harm would it do to let him have a copy, so we let him go "Warren added.

A few minutes later just as they were about to return to the Army Post, Sp5 Warren heard someone running up behind him. As he turned around the Vietnamese who had taken the newspaper thrust something into his arms. Looking down at the long, round, heavy object that he now held close to his chest, Warren asked, "What the devil is this, a mortar?"

"That is a 75 mm recoilless rifle dud round! ", cried SP5 "Here", Warren said as he passed it to Pope.

"I don't want the blasted thing, "Pope said giving it back to his buddy.



Fertilizer Now

Fertilizer sales have been good this spring because farmers know the chances are good that they will get their money plus a good return on their investment. In talking with the local people who produce cotto and grain sorghum, we find that most of them are spending in the neighborhood of \$12per acre for fertilizer on land cotton and they say this practice is also a good investment. This practice that is fairly new is applying a smaller or similar amount of fert-

illzer to dry land grain sorgh-Fertilizer dealers tell us that they have sold more fertilizer for dry land grain sorghum this year than ever before. Some them are spending as little as \$3, 00 per acre while others are going up above \$5,00. In the demonstration work done on the B. E. Loyd farm for the past two years we found that fertilizer paid good returns in 1967. There was a mistake in arthimatic in the 1967 Demonstration Handbook and the agent needs to apoligize to Mr. Loyd because the report in the report in the handbook doesn't show as favorable as it should. He made 620 pounds more grain per acre on the fertilizer land and the handbook shows it of be 420 pounds. Producers who received a copy of the 1967 Crops Demonstration Handbook need to make some corrections on page 6. the 620 pound increase in yield sold \$1.70 cwt. would increase the gross returns by \$10.54 per acre. The cost Ir 22 lbs. of nitrogen and 11 lbs. of phosphorus was \$\$. 85 per acre. including the cost of application. His net return from fertilizer should have been \$5.69

per acre for the 1967 year. Mr. James Valentine, the Soil Chemist who talked to farmers last February at the meetings in Denver City and Plains, sta-ted that a light application of nitrogen should make our grain sorghum plants more drought resistant. He also stated that phosphorus should give an increase in yield on most of our sandy soils. He thinks that something like 30-20-0 applied before planting on dry land grain sorghum will give enough response to pay for the fertilizer and some additional returns at least four out of five vears. This is what we have set out to demonstrate on the Bill Loyd farm north of Plains, After two years Mr. Loyd is \$2.19

per acre to the good.

1961. Prior to spraying only shinoak grew in this area. This may be one of the best years to control Brush Shinoak or Mesquite we have seen in ure conditions as we now have, Over the years actual field triais as well as research has be-

en shown that far better controll of both shinoak and Mesqite have resulted when ideal growing conditions prevail at the time of the spraying. There was a time when it was thought that about all you needed was the spray and some one to apply it. We now know that both good conditions and correct applications are very important, There are many reasons why

the control of mesquite and shinoak are profitable. The main reason is the increase in grass or forage prosuction by better plants, one of the most expensive ways you can use the rainfall is to grow brush. The idea that without a beam crop or shinoak leaves the cattle would have been without anything to eat has long been proven wrong. It takes about 3,000 lbs. of water to grow a pound of mesquite leaves and beans and only 400 lbs. of water to grow a pound of grama grass. The same is true for shinoak therefore to use precious water for brush is a gross waste as far-as forge production is concerned,


The cost of brush controll is small in consideration for what is returned. In general about \$2,50 is charged per acre for both the chemical and the use of the plane to apply it, One spraying will last for three to five years, that is it will give good contol for that long. 


