



over Dewey McDaniel and Charles Freeman. Results of that race were McDaniel, 92; Freeman, 158, and Bro-





# Court Proposes Tax Reduction

A tax reduction for Yoakum County property owners has been proposed by the Youkum County Commissioners Court. As proposed, the reduction in the taxpayer's bill would amount to apporximately \$1

The Court proposed that the current basis of assessment be reduced from 16 per cent of true property value to 13 per cent and that the current tax rate be reduced from 80 per \$100 of assessment to 77 cents per \$100 assessed va-

Increased property value prompted the reduction pro-posed. Not included for proposed reduction is the county-'s 30 cents per \$100 of assessed value farm-market lateral road special tax. This rate is expected to remain the same.

The proposed reduction in rate and basis of assessment would mean a savings of mo-

average taxpayer. said that increased valuation, caused by oilfield waterflooding and secondary recovery operations, projected mineral reserves and increased oil allowables, prompted the proposal for the tax reduction. During the past year, figures showed the real value of pro-

perties in Yoakum County zo-omed from \$443,750.,000 to \$621,846,153. Because of the increase in

real values, the county can reduce the basis of assessment and tax rate and still gain additional revenues.

The Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 has contributed to the Plains Ind. School educational program. Under Title I of this program four ladies were employed to serve as teacher's aides. These ladies are: Mrs. James Futch, Mrs. Bob Graham, Mrs. Sidney Murphy, and Mrs. Roy-

ce Aikins.

The duties of these ladies are challenging --- to say the least. Duties range from clerical work to almost a responsibility given to a certified teacher.

In grades 5-8, Mrs. James Futch and Mrs. Bob Graham have served in several areas. One area that these ladies have helped improve is the Intermediate and Jr. High library. Under the supervosion of Mrs. Lattimore, these ladies have certainly helped to organize and keep our central library

maintained. Language arts teachers have used Mrs. Futch and Mrs. Graham in the areas of running trolled readers reading groups. Reading machines are being used more & more in the reading program of our school. Teacher aides give much assistance in this

Other areas Mrs. Futch and Mrs. Graham are involved in are: Bulletin board displays, grading papers with definite answer keys, keeping study halls, working with individualstudents with special problems (under the supervision of a teacher); and many other odd jobs that come up.

Mrs. Royce Aikins has been assigned to work with the first and second grade pupils. Her duty is to Mrs. Tippett's room. Mrs. Tippett has the Latin-American children who came to us with little knowledge of the English language. These

Mrs. Aikins; assistance is greatly appreciated and needed in this particular room. She also assists Mrs. Harvey and Mrs. Stotts' room with reading, mimeograph works, typing, grading papers, etc. Her other obligations are to the second grade teachers and pupils. She may be found helping with the Control Reader or other chores too numerous to mention.

Mrs. Sydney Murphey has been assigned to the third and fourth grades. Some particular rooms and teachers feel a real need for her services. She spends some of her time with the Control Reader. The remaining time she will be typing, grading papers, assisting with a few math problems. She has a very busy schedule.

The Plains Elementary Sc hool has been very fortunate in having quality in our teacher aides. We hope that they are here to stay.

One activity is the safety program which has contributed to the reduction of injuries to employees in cotton gins, Thompson said. The association will distribute over 300 safety awards to gins

this year. Other activities at the directors meeting will be a review of the Association audit and planning of meetings with ginners through-out the state during the summer months.


