

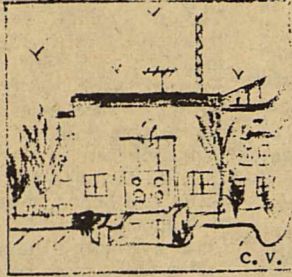

Patricia Hanks Crowned Cotton Queen In First Annual Ceremony by Judge Gene Bennett Recently

Miss Patricia Hanks, a petite 98 pound brunette with brown eyes, was named the first Miss Cotton of Yoakum County in ceremonies Saturday night. Miss Hanks, 18, was chosen from a field of seven contestants for the honor.

Patricia is a 1968 graduate of Denver City High School where she was quite active in FHA, FTA and the Pep Squad. She lists her hobbies as sewing and antiques furniture.

Runners-up were Eileen Presley, first alternate, and Sherry Savage, second alternate. Along with Miss Hanks the girls are from Denver City. Parents of the three are Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Hanks, Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Presley, and Mr. and Mrs. Forrest Savage.

Other participants were Charlene Gayle, Irita Wian, Gay trout and Kathy McPherson.

A good turnout was reported for the first annual event sponsored by the Yoakum County Women's Cotton Promotion Club.

Judge Gene Bennett did the honors of crowning the new queen and presenting bouquets made of 100 percent cotton products to the three top beauties. Mayor Roy Edwards pinned the winners ribbon on. Each contestant will receive a special engraved charm for their participation.

Judges for the event were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Blackledge of Lubbock, Mrs. Aubrey Russell of Lubbock and Mrs. Jewel Robinson of Levelland. Blackledge serves as an attorney for the Plains Cotton Cooperative and Mrs. Blackledge is the incoming president of the Lubbock Women's Promotion Club. Mrs. Russell is district home demonstration agent and Mrs. Robinson is the Hockley County Agent.

Johnny Fulton, announcer with KKAL Radio, served as master of ceremonies. Miss Jeanie Strickland provided background music. Special music was presented by Debbie Addison and a trio consisting of Sue Cleveland, Debbie Chad-

wick and Rojaana Harvey.

Mrs. Johnnie L. Fitzgerald served as chairman for the event along with Mrs. Carl Lowrey, president of the local club.

The girls modeled in sportswear and formal attire of 100 percent cotton before the judges and audience. They were judged for beauty, poise, gracefulness and ability to speak before an audience. Each answered a question concerning cotton.

The contest was open to all junior and senior girls of county high schools.

Miss Hanks will represent Yoakum County in the state contest held during the State Fair in Dallas. In case she is unable to attend the state meet, Miss Presley will go in her place.

The beet army worm has made a strong bid for the 1968 cotton crop in Yoakum County. The little green worm has caused approximately sixty percent of the cotton farmers to spend some money on their cotton crop that they had not planned for. He first made his appearance in castor beans about the middle of the month and by May 25 he was eating everything except cockleburrs. They seem to like corn and volunteer grain sorghum as well as cotton and careless weeds.

Methyl parathion and Dylox are being used to kill the worms but some insecticides have been used when weather conditions were unfavorable or rates were too low because poor results have been obtained in many cases. Methyl parathion should be applied at the rate of one pound per acre when applied with ground machinery and the dosage should be increased by fifty percent for aerial spraying. Methyl parathion usually contains just over four pounds of active ingredients per gallon, so for aerial applications the recommended amount would be one and one-half quarts per acre. This amount of materials plus the cost of application is going to increase the cost of a cotton crop by about \$3.00 per acre. If Dylox is used the dosage rate is two pounds of active ingredients per acre, and farmers are reporting that Dylox is more expensive than Methyl parathion.

Farmers who took advantage of the skip-row patterns of planting this year are having to apply insecticides on the blank rows in order to get the desired results. The two in and one out pattern of planting is a moisture saving method of farming but it increases the per acre cost when it is necessary to apply insecticides. Insecticides are dangerous to people as well as insects

and materials that kill by volatilizing into a poisonous gas should be respected. Farmers are warned not to enter the field where Methyl parathion has been applied for twenty-four hours after the application has been made. Most of the material volatilizes during the first two hours, but it is much better to be safe than sorry.

Bookout Wins Election Contest

A total of 1237 voters cast their ballots in Saturday's special run-off election in Yoakum County with Preston Smith, James A. Joy and Raymond Bookout winning with good margins.

Preston Smith led over Don Yarborough with 1019 votes to 213 for the governor's race. James A. Joy received 743 votes over Jack Hazlewood's 461 votes in the Court of Civil Appeals Seventh Supreme Judicial District Associate Justice place.

Incumbent Raymond Bookout, commissioner of precinct # 3, received 205 votes over opponent Barron Blair's 72. Smith will face Republican Paul Eggers in the general election in November.

Saturday's number of voters was comparatively light to the 2,297 that turned out May 4 for the first primary.

Cotton Acres Total 41, 274

Cotton Re-Plant Facts Given by ASC Office

Final Yoakum County Cotton Allotment total is 41,274 acres. This includes the original allotment of 37,740 acres plus the transfers in by sale, lease release, and ownership, minus the transfers out. The 41,274 acre allotment is established on 421 farms or tracts. The farm operators have signed intentions to divert approximately 7000 acres of the allotment from cotton to an approved Conservation use, leaving approximately 34,274 acres to be in cotton for the 1968 crop year.

Loss of Cotton by Natural Disaster: Should any farmer lose his cotton by natural disaster, after it is late to replant, they may request the county ASC committee for approval to plant the cotton land to another crop and if approved the cotton price support payment will be made on the destroyed cotton crop. The state ASC Committee has established June 15, 1968 as the final date a producer is required to plant cotton in order to earn price support payments if the proper request is filed and approved by the ASC County Committee.

We hope all cotton farmers will have all their cotton acreage. However, if the crop is lost by natural disaster, to late to replant, requests should be filed at the time of the loss with your local ASC office giving the facts in the case so the county committee will have the correct information and have the opportunity to release the land for another crop. Farmers that have signed applications in both cotton and feed grain programs and lose their cotton to late to replant cotton may want to cancel out of the Feed Grain Program and

plant the cotton land to feed grain.

Caster Beans On Diverted Land: Part or all of the acreage diverted in excess of the 20% of the total effective feed grain base and part or all acreage of the cotton at the 6¢ rate may be devoted to castor beans, by giving up 50% of their diverted acre payment. To comply with the cotton and feed grain programs, the 20% feed grain diverted and the 5% cotton diverted cannot be planted to Caster Beans.

Former County Resident

District Attorney Nugent Gunned Down

Funeral services for Donald Miron Nugent, 41, brother of Plains resident A. D. Nugent, were held at 2 p.m. May 28 in the First Methodist Church of Kermit. Burial was in the Kermit Cemetery.

Nugent, district attorney of Winkler County, was killed in a blaze of gunfire May 25 in Kermit. A second man, Woody T. Smith, 42, also of Kermit, was killed.

Other survivors are his wife, the former Miss Martha Jane Savage of Denver City whom he married Sept. 10, 1949; a son, Jay Kenneth of the home; two daughters, Gloria Lynn and Linda Lou of the home; mother, Mrs. Annie Nugent of Corpus Christi; three other brothers, R. G. OF Odessa, Bryon M. of Big Spring and James W. OF Corpus Christi; and one sister, Mrs. Sally Moore of Corpus Christi.

Nugent had been district attorney at Kermit for the past 3 1/2 years. At the time of his death, he was facing a Ju-

ne 1st run-off election in a bid for second term as district attorney.

In what appeared to be a routine disturbance call to police, erupted in the shoot-out which claimed the lives of the two men.

The complaint concerned a man, standing in his backyard, shooting at a dog with a gun at about 10 p.m. Saturday. It was reported that Smith threatened officers with a gun when they arrived to investigate. The officers telephoned Nugent to see if they would need a warrant. Nugent advised them that he would help them at the scene.

When Nugent arrived, he talked Smith into coming out of the house. Reports said that after Smith came out, Nugent called for the police to come forward. When they did, Smith shot Nugent. Nugent returned the fire.

The district attorney died later Saturday night at Memorial Hospital in Kermit.

A native of Iowa Park, Nugent moved to Denver City with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. J. Nugent, in 1941. He entered Denver City High School as a freshman then.

During high school he was a member of the Mustang Band. He played football in 1943 and 1944. He was named All-District center in 1944. He received his diploma in 1946. Nugent was a veteran of World War II, serving as a radioman in the United States Navy, a tour of duty which interrupted but did not end his high school education.

He was a 1957 graduate of the University of Texas. Before moving to Kermit seven years ago, he had resided in Coppas Cove.

Nugent was a director of Girls Town USA, and was a member of the Kermit Community Church, of Masonic Lodge 1258 at Kermit, and of the Texas State Bar Association.

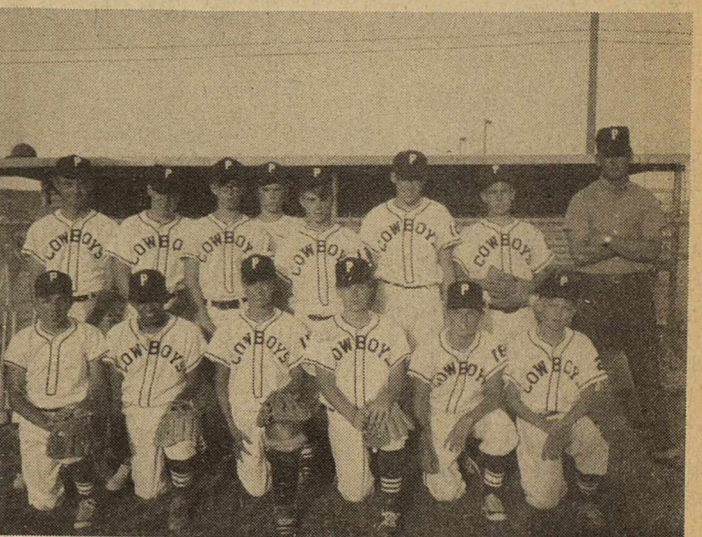
Nell Addison and Mildred Brassfield placed for low net and low gross, respectively, for the championship.

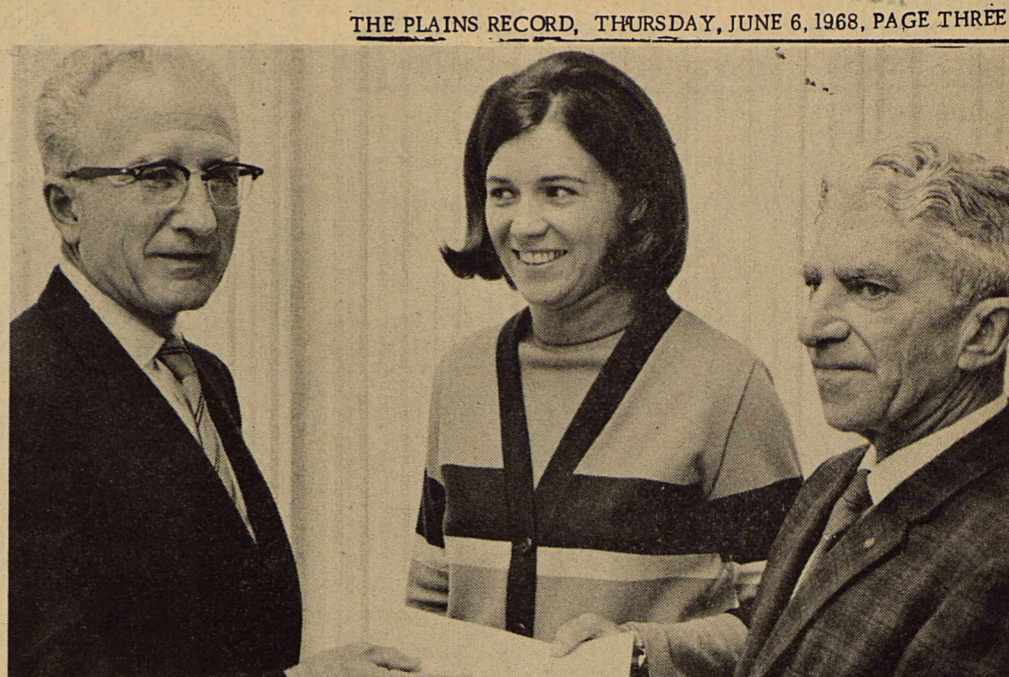

SURVEY SHOWS GOOD RESPONSE

The American Cancer Society announced today it had received 66,864 replies to the Cancer Education Survey recently conducted in conjunction with its annual residential crusade.

Dr. B. N. Squyres, Medical Chairman of the Yoakum County unit of the Society, said the survey card consists of six questions for women and five for men. The questions concern specific health practices that, when observed, could substantially reduce the number of cancer deaths in the county.

Dr. Squyres said, "Last year a similar survey revealed that many people are having proctoscopic examinations, a diagnostic test to determine the presence of cancer of the colon and rectum." He continued that more women are having the Pap test and are practicing breast self examination. Still another part of the 1967 survey, devoted to questions about cigarette smoking, showed that 58% of the men and 71% of the women do not smoke, and of those who once smoked, more men than women stopped smoking.

Dr. Squyres explained that the cards are now being returned to offices in each of the fifteen areas and five largest cities of Texas. The American Cancer Society will announce the results of this year's survey as soon as the questions are tabulated. A study of the results will be made to determine the degree of change in people's health habits, and new education programs will be initiated to inform the public of what should be done to protect themselves against cancer.

Dr. Squyres urges everyone who has received a survey card to complete it and return it as soon as possible. Contributions to the American Cancer Society may also be mailed to the same address as on the survey envelope.

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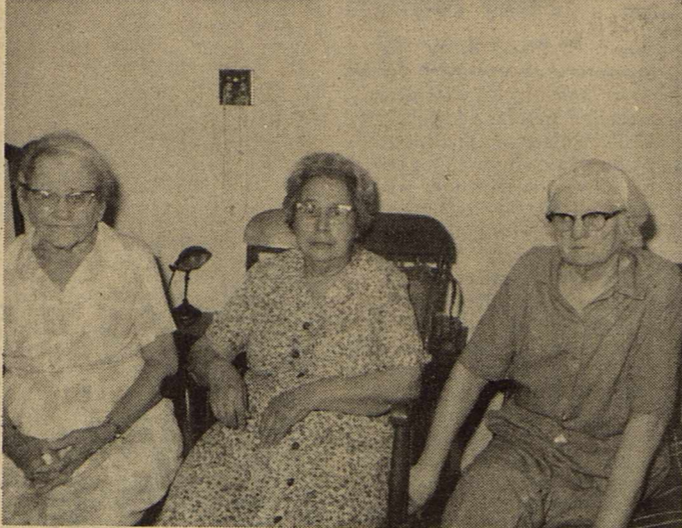

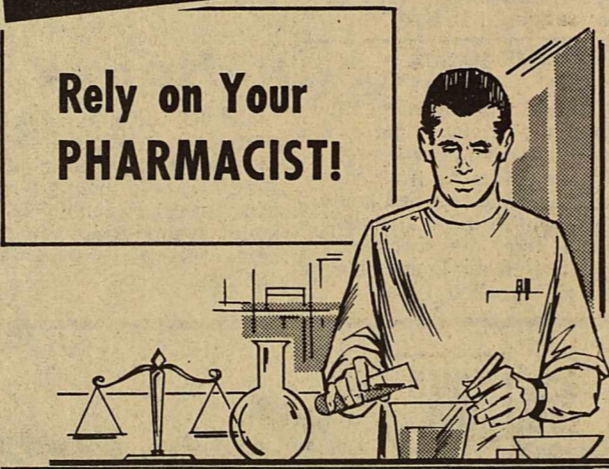
