

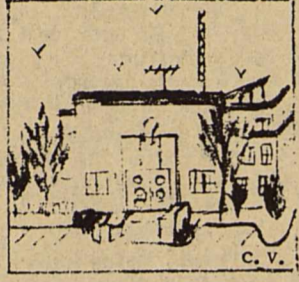

The rural traffic accident summary for Yoakum County during the first five months of 1968 shows a total of 17 accidents resulting in two persons killed, ten persons injured, and estimated property damage of \$8,730.

This amounts to a lot of needless damage. Sgt. A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol supervisor for this area, has provided some driving tips to help prevent accidents and they are:

1. Know and obey traffic laws and rules.
2. Maintain speeds consistent with legal limits and conditions.
3. Signal for turns in ample time and turn only from proper land.
4. Have yourself and your car under control at all times.
5. Be alert while passing, turning, pulling out and backing.

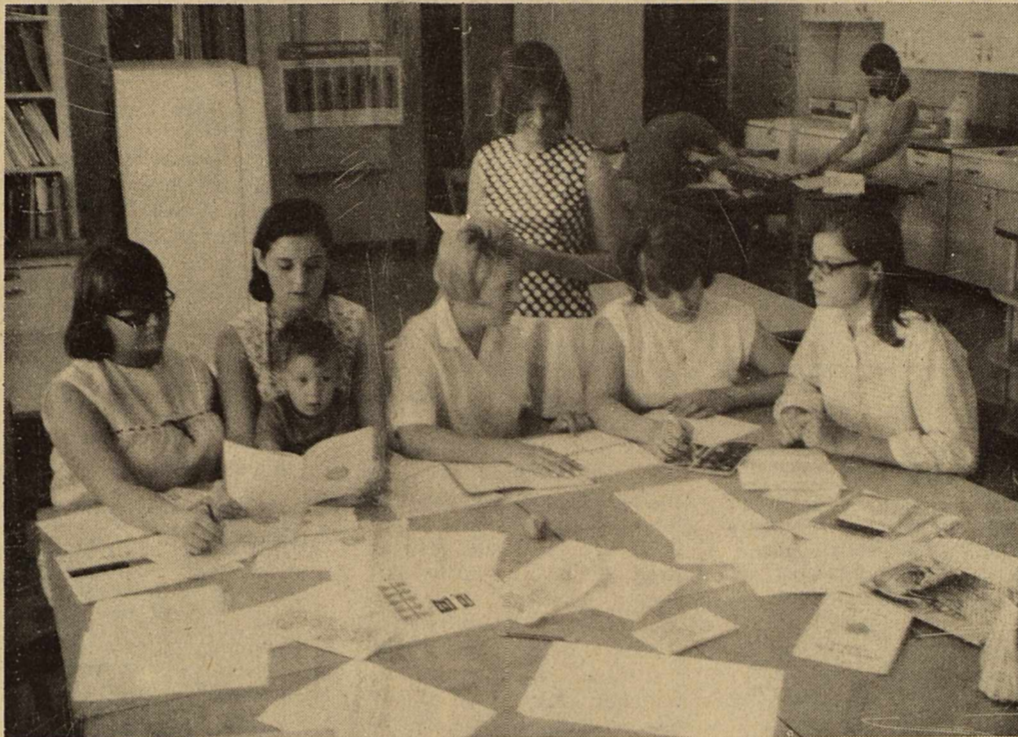

FHA PLANS FOR YEAR

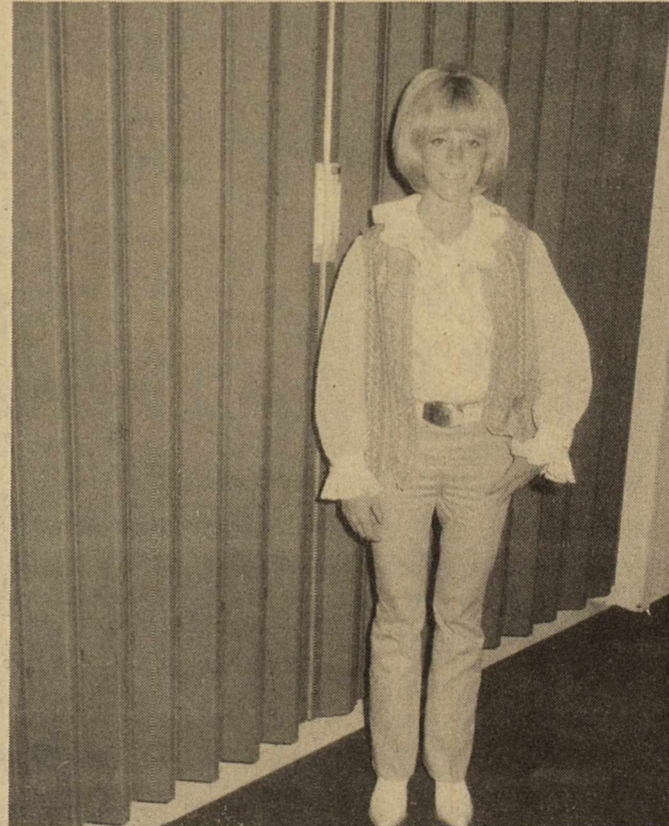

Highway Patrol Reports on Accidents

Two accidents were investigated this week by local Texas Highway Patrolman Joe Cox, giving Yoakum County a slight jump on expected holiday accidents for the long July 4th holiday.

An accident at 2:30 p.m. Friday was investigated by Cox at the intersection of U.S. 380 and FM 769 at Bronco. No injuries were reported but

extensive damage was done to both cars.

Involved in the mishap was a 1968 Ford sedan driven by Richard H. Davis, III, 19, of College Station and a 1968 Chevrolet coach driven by Janet Reynolds, 24, of Route 1. Davis, a student at Texas Tech was driving a car owned by Dr. Richard H. Davis, Jr., also of College Station. The

Chevrolet is owned by Alfred Lee Reynolds, Route 1.

Cox reported that both vehicles were traveling west on U. S. 380 with Mrs. Reynolds making a left turn onto FM 769. The accident occurred when Davis attempted to pass.

This report contains a series of hydrological maps and is accompanied by a general discussion of the ground water resources found stored beneath the surface of the ground in the area served by the Water District (Terry, Gaines, Yoakum and Cochran Counties.)

Bob Loe, president of the board of directors of the Water District, states that the report was prepared for use in the educational program conducted by the District. Free copies may be obtained by writing the Water District Office at Box 232, Brownfield, Texas, 79316.

President Loe further stated that he wished to express the appreciation of the Water District to Pioneer Natural Gas Company and Peoples Natural Gas Company for their help in sharing the cost of printing this hydrological atlas.

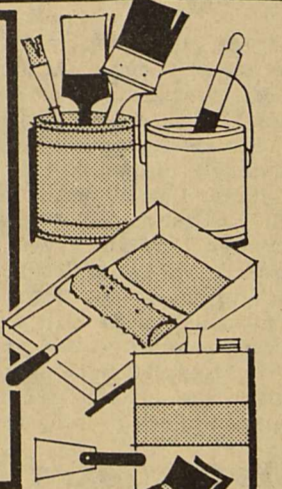

Persons involved in this accident were Tommy Lynn Iviey of Brownfield and Thelma Culwell of Plains.

Cox reported that while Texas drivers are well into 4th of July trips and outings, the Texas Department of Public Safety is in the midst of "Operation Motorcade", a five day vigil of tabulating and reporting traffic deaths in Texas. Captain J. W. Blackwell of Amarillo is the officer in charge of the Highway Patrol for this district.

Cox stated that the Motorcade went into effect at 6 p.m. Wednesday and will continue through 11:59 p.m. Sunday, July 7. It is estimated that 38 lives will be lost during this five day period.

In order to increase surveillance over the heavy holiday traffic, additional Department of Public Safety personnel have been assigned to assist the Highway Patrol. These patrolmen have been instructed to be alert for and direct their daughter.

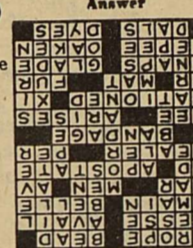

forcement efforts toward these violators that most often cause an accident. Every effort will be made to remove drinking drivers from the highways.

Speeding is another great cause of accidents and where radar control is available, a decrease in accidents is expected. Yoakum County has no radar system at the present. Cox also stated that the big hope for safe driving rests with the individual motorists, since police traffic surveillance cannot cover the entire street and highway system in Yoakum County.

COTTON TEAM STUDIES EXPORT PROGRAM

A cotton sales team recently returned from the Far East has predicted a boost in exports of U.S. fiber to Japan and 4 other countries provided adequate supplies of all staples and quantities are available at competitive prices.

The team was led by Horace D. Godfrey, Administrator of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Other members were G. C. Corright, Rolling Ford, Miss., and Claud W. Ayres, Vernon, Texas, producer representatives Roy B. Davis, Lubbock, Texas, cooperative representative; Carl C. Campbell, National Cotton Council, Washington, D. C. industry association representative; and Robert D. McCallum, Memphis, Tenn., cotton shipper.

In its report to Agricultural Secretary Orville L. Freeman, the team recommended that every effort be made to capitalize on the expanding marketing opportunities that will develop.

The sales team's objective was to help expand exports of U. S. cotton through discussions with government officials, cotton importers, cotton spinners, and others in Japan, South Korea, Republic of China, Hong Kong, and India. These countries annually spend about \$250 million for U. S. cotton, more than half in dollars. Exports to these countries comprise 50 to 60 percent of the U.S. total and 4 of the 5 countries are American cotton's best customers.

The team said the U.S.

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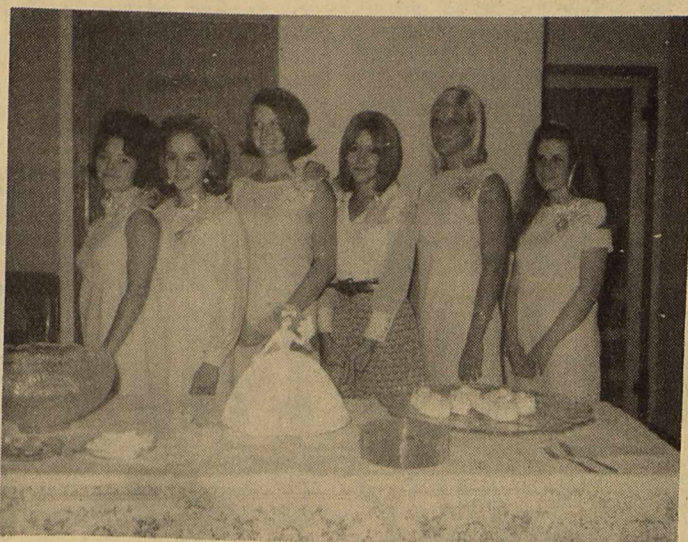

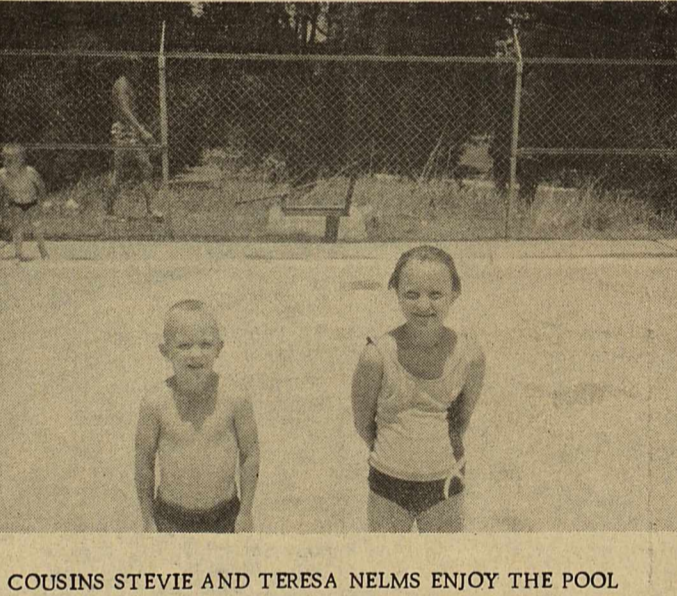
