"The expenses of this school consolidation referendum will be borne by the six different school districts involved and not by Eastland County," Judge Hart wrote. "The Attorney General has ruled that the county cannot legally bear the school consolidation expense. We are, therefore, returning the \$50 check to you and should we receive any further contributions toward said expense, we shall return same to the senders."

Any contributions to the election expense should be sent directly to the six districts, Judge Hart told The Press.

Eastland County Voters Reject

School Consolidation

A two-year fight over proposed school consolidation in the six school districts in the eastern half of Eastland County climaxed Saturday when voters rejected consolidation by more than 6 to 1.

The total vote in the six districts — Eastland, Ranger, Olden, Gorman, Carbon and Desdemona — was 3,542 with 487 voting for consolidation and 3,055 voting against it. The span of disapproval ranged from about 3-to-1 at Eastland to 20-to-1 at Gorman. The vote Saturday was the heaviest vote in a school election in the known history of the county.

The proposal did not gain approval in any of the six districts. Each district had to approve the consolidation to make it binding.

The Consolidation was defeated by an overwhelming vote in Carbon. The vote was 334 against Consolidation and 24 for consolidation. This vote shows how the citizens of Carbon and surrounding communities are behind our school and request that it remain as is.

700 ENTRIES ARE EXPECTED IN COUNTY LIVESTOCK SHOW

Approximately 700 entries have been promised for the annual Eastland County Livestock Show March 30 and 31, according to an announcement by County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Members of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association met Feb. 15 in the Conference Room of the Texas Electric Building in Eastland with Ross Wilson of Gorman, president, presiding.

Ben McKinnis of Eastland, general chairman for the show, announced Sig Faircloth as parade chairman. The Eastland County Sheriff's Posse will provide trophies for all parade winners in riding groups, commercial floats and marching bands.

McKinnis reported that fat lambs led the entries with 266. Fat hogs were next with 139 entries. This is the largest list of entries in the history of the show and McKinnis said a record \$2,000 in prizes would be given to the winners.

It was reported that temporary arrangements would have to be made for the overflowing entry list as present facilities will not accommodate the animals. However, the program will be solved in time for the show, McKinnis said.

Clint McCain of Eastland and Tommy Toland of Cisco are on the Buildings Committee. They have recommended a wall be erected on the north and east of the judging area as a weather protection for the crowd. This

is eventually to be covered and made into a pavilion.

The livestock show is held each year at the Sheriff's Posse-Livestock Association facilities on the shores of Lake Eastland, a mile north of town.

McKinnis announced the following appointments for the show: Vernon Humphries of Eastland, assistant to McKinnis; Park Plambeck of Cisco, superintendent of hog division, assisted by Charles Veale of Ranger.

Don Bradford of Ranger, superintendent of sheep and goat division, assisted by C. E. Bridge of Olden. Superintendent of Williamson of Olden, beef and steers, Joe Criswell, assisted by Jerry Chaney. Official sifter and classifier of hog and sheep division, Travis Allen, Callahan County agent, Baird.

Judges: Breeding beef cattle, H. A. Moseley, breeding swine division, T. W. Colby, Abilene Christian College agriculture department; sheep, Jack Hancock; fat steer and fat barrow, Bob Morford, buyer for Gooch Packing Co., Abilene; goats, Garland Coody, Breckenridge; dairy cattle, Curtis Richardson, Denton.

James Wright is chairman of the public address system and will serve as announcer for the show, as he has for several years.

D. S. Buchanan, owner of Eastland Auction, Co., has offered his facilities, a mile east of Eastland, for the sale of the animals immediately following the show.

**April 15 To Be
Deadline To Get
Auto Inspection**

AUSTIN—Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced there will be no extension of the April 15 deadline for inspection of all motor vehicles in Texas.
"The April 15 deadline this year falls on a Sunday, a day when most inspection stations are closed," Garrison noted. "We are not asking these stations to remain open on that day, and, under the law, there can be no extension of the deadline."
He said approximately 2,000,000 vehicles in the state remain to be inspected during the remaining 10 weeks of the 1962 inspection period. He urged motorists to get their inspection

stickers early, pointing out that as the deadline approaches waiting lines will begin forming.
"We would like to point out that the purpose of motor vehicle inspection is to discover any defect that might become a link in a chain of events leading to an accident," the DPS Director said.
"It is encouraging to note that since the inspection program began in 1951, vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in fatal accidents decreased from 13 per cent to three per cent."
Under the law, persons operating vehicles without the 1962 inspection sticker on and after April 16 are subject to arrest. Authority to enforce the provisions of the Texas Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in the patrolmen of the Department of Public Safety, Sheriffs and their deputies, and city policemen.

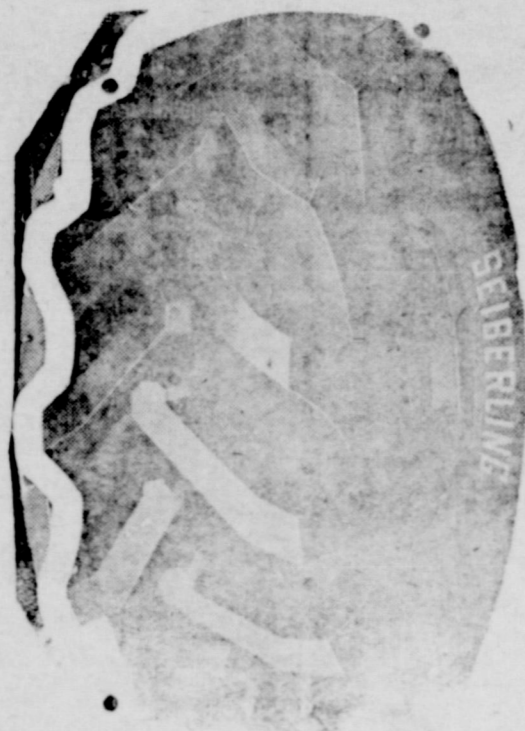

January Savings Bonds sales in Eastland County totaled \$66,116 according to Guy Peyton Parker, chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee. This figures represents 12.7 per cent of the 1962 sales goal of \$520,000.

Total January sales in Texas were \$15,310,631, which is 9.3 per cent of the 1962 state goal of \$165,100,000.
