Postal Rates Go Higher

Postmaster Jack Hayes reminded postal customers today that higher parcel post and catalog rates went into effect Saturday, October 19.

The rate increase averages 10.5 per cent and in most cases will mean an additional ten cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission in July.

Under the new rates the minimum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be raised from 50 cents to 60 cents.

Almost all parcels that are charged up to 41.10 under present rates will go up 10 cents. This accounts for more than 80 per cent of all parcel post, Postmaster Hayes pointed out.

There will be a 15-cent hike on most parcels now charged between \$1.10 and \$4, and a 20-cent increase on parcels now charged over \$4.

Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed.

Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per cent of operating costs, as required by law, Postmaster Hayes explained. The higher rates are designed to put parcels and catalogs, which are fourth-class mail, on a break-even basis.

Additional revenue is needed from parcel post and catalogs to offset higher costs resulting from pay increases approved last year for postal employees.

Operators of all cotton farms that did not have all the farm allotment under CAP or Soil Bank programs participated in the 1968 cotton program. One small allotment farm had .8 acre Marketing Quota Penalty cotton but was eligible for price support payment and the cotton produced will be eligible for CCC loan.

In December of 1949 (the year I came to Yoakum County) the 1950 farm cotton allotments were set up and the total allotment listed on the listing sheet was 8767.9 on 212 farms. In March of 1950 a new law was passed that gave Yoakum County a small increase in the 1950 allotment. In 1951, 52 and 53 cotton allotments and marketing quotas were announced for the 1954 year. Farmers again approved quotas and the 1954 farm allotment was set up based on the past 5 years history (county) excluding 1949. The total farm allotment for Yoakum County which was set up in December 1953 for 1954 crop was 27226.9 on 318 farms.

Marketing Quotas have been proclaimed and farmers have approved quotas for each year since the 1953 crop year. The ASCS County Committee with the Community Committees in multiple community counties have had the responsibility along with the many other duties of setting the farm allotments, and farm projected yields when necessary.

County Clerk Advises Voters On Voting

Voters in the coming general election who moved into the county on or after May 5, 1968, must vote in the county clerk's office by November 1, according to information received from County Clerk Ruby Heald.

Formerly, persons who moved from one county to another could not vote during the first six months after the change of residence, but a new law enacted last year now permits them to vote on all statewide offices, including President and Vice President, and on proposed constitutional amendments, but not on local offices and issues.

However, instead of voting at a regular polling place in election day, they must vote during a special time period in the county clerk's office in the county of their new residence. This period, which is the same as the period for absentee voting, began on October 16 and will end on November 1.

If the voter has lived in the same congressional, legislative, or judicial district for six months, he may also vote on that district office.

In order to vote, the person must be registered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year, and he should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot at the county clerk's office. However, if he has lost his certificate, he may vote after making an affidavit of its loss.

No reason was given for the three consecutive searches of the minor's automobile, according to the spokesman. The father of the boy also stated that his son was on his way home from work.

Cotton Office Has Opened

Brownfield's seasonal cotton classing office opened Monday, October 21, to receive Smith-Doxey samples. Donald R. Lewallen will head the office.

This was announced by John L. McCollum, cotton division southwest area manager, USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, Dallas.

A graduate of Sam Houston State University, Mr. Lewallen has been with USDA's cotton division eight years.

Starting as a cotton field representative in the Lubbock classing office, he has classed and supervised cotton classers and has been responsible for the maintenance and operation of the micromaire program.

1968 Cotton Allotment For Yoakum County

According to county office records for the year of 1968 Yoakum county had an effective cotton allotment of 41263.7 on 421 farms. This includes 12 48.3 acres of permanent IN transfers by ownership and purchase. 2533.3 was transferred in by lease and 40.0 acres released a-

llotment was received from the State. The cotton allotment acres put to an approved conservation use totals 7104.0 acres with 302.3 acres cotton allotment under CAP and Soil Bank contract which was not planted.

120.5 acres cotton allotment was planted and

lost due to hail and other weather hazards which was replanted to other crops. 60.7 acres was lost due to weather hazards and not replanted to other crops, leaving 33 676.2 for the planted cotton acres. It is estimated that approximately 300 acres of the 33676.2

Council Officers Are Elected

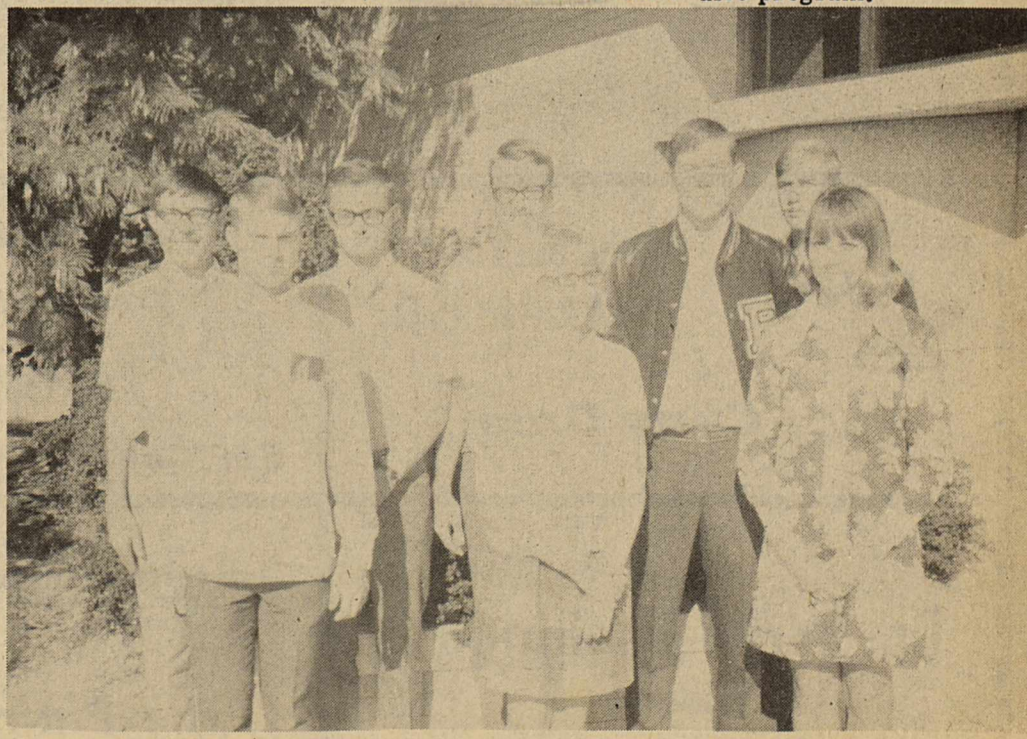
The 1968-69 Plains High School Student Council officers were recently elected in their first meeting.

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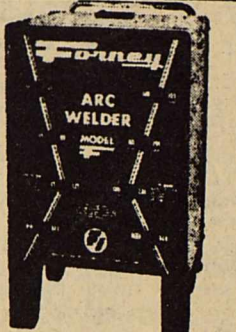

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NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTIES OF TERRY AND YOAKUM: BROWNFIELD CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF SAID DISTRICT, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID DISTRICT AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in said District at the time and places, and on the Proposition, as provided in the Order Calling an Election, duly passed by the Board of Trustees of said District, which Order is substantial as follows:

ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS: COUNTIES OF TERRY AND YOAKUM: BROWNFIELD CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board of Trustees a Petition signed by twenty or more persons praying that we

order an election in said District to be held within thirty days after the order of election for the purpose of submitting the Proposition hereinafter stated, in accordance with law; and WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees officially finds and determines that said petition is signed by twenty or more resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and that said Petition conforms with law in all respects;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF BROWNFIELD CONSOLIDATED INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election shall be held in said District on the 5th day of November, 1968, at the several voting precincts of said District, at the polling places, and with the election officers, as follows:

In Election Precinct No. 1 consisting of those parts of Terry County Election Precincts 1-12 and 1-15 located within Brownfield Consolidated Independent School District, at the Colonial Heights Elementary School, 1100 East Repto, Brownfield, Texas, with the following officers:

Jake Geron, Presiding Judge, Jess Bryant, Alternate Presiding Judge, Weldon Garden, Clerk, Mrs. Mack Ross, Clerk, Mrs. Joe Joplin, Clerk.

In Election Precinct No. 2 consisting of those parts of Terry County Election Precincts

1-1, 2-2, 2-6, 3-3, 3-7, 3-8, 3-9, 3-17, 4-4, 4-11 and 4-14 located within Brownfield Consolidated Independent School District and all of that part of Brownfield Consolidated Independent School District located in Yoakum County), at the County Treasurer's Office in the Terry County Court House, Brownfield, Texas, with the following officers:

Ray Anderson, Presiding Judge, David Nicholson, Alternate Presiding Judge, Mrs. Jack Brooks, Clerk, Richard Prigmore, Clerk, Jackie Cargill, Clerk.

In Election Precinct No. 3 (consisting of those parts of Terry County Election Precinct 2-13 and 2-16 located within Brownfield Consolidated Independent School District), at the Jessie G. Randal Primary School, 604 Tahoka Road, Brownfield, Texas, with the following officers:

R. V. Moreman, Presiding Judge, Bill Cowan, Alternate Presiding Judge, Mrs. Susan Jones, Clerk, Mrs. Mary Jennings, Clerk, James B. Willis is hereby appointed as the clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the School Business Office, 1001 E. Broadway, Brownfield, Texas, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A. M. to 5:00 P. M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official state holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting.

2. That at said election the following Proposition shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION Shall the Board of Trustees of Brownfield Consolidated Independent School District have the power and be authorized to issue the bonds of said District, in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$2,154,000, bearing interest at rates not to exceed the maximum permitted by law at the time of issuance of any such series or issue, provided that in no event shall such interest exceed the rate of six per cent per annum, with said bonds to mature serially or otherwise in such installments as are fixed by said Board of Trustees, for the purpose of the construction and equipment of public free school buildings in said District, and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor; and shall said Board of Trustees have the power and be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes sufficient, without limit as to

rate or amount, to pay the interest on and principal of said bonds, as authorized by Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session, as amended?

3. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid Proposition, which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION
