BOYS

Austin, June 7 - The twentyninth annual American Legion Boys State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the Campus of the University of Texas, got under way today as 750 high school boys from a 11 parts of Texas began registration Robert P. Walsh, Department

Commander, announced. Among those registering from Plains was Jerry Ray Brian who was sponsored by local American Legion Posts.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties - the Nationalist or Federalist, Each citizen then functions as a member of his party; he attends its precenct, county and state conventions and voted in its primary.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing."

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol on Friday morning where each elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day, followed by the Governor's Ball Friday

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 14, 154 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

The Breckenridge Boys Choir has traveled to the White House to sing for the President; to sing for the Texas Governor's inauguration; to New York to make 9 World Fair appearances; and numerous television shows, festivals, college campuses and clubs. The travel group of the choir is composed of 40 boys (grade 4-12) selected from approximately 100 choristers who begin training at age seven. The choir is much like a cathedral choir in that it utilizes the

clear treble voices of young boys and also the full rich tones of changed voices.

The choir will arrive by chartered bus late Sunday morning. All club members are asked to bring a salad to the Tsa Mo Ga Club house Sunday morning before or after church. The choir will dine together and any interested persons should take this et acquainted with the entire choir and their directors.

Rehearsal time will follow at the auditorium before the program at 3:00 p.m. The choir will continue on their tour Monday morning. The program will include relisious and patriotic numbers. All proceeds will go to the furtherment of the fine

FLAG DAY

The American Flag will be flown and the day of June 14th will be honored by many throughout our country on Flag Day. This day is not a legal holiday but was proclaimed as "Flag Day" in 1895 and is known as such by Presidential Proclamation.

The designation was obtained (according to Peoples Encyclopedia), mainly through the efforts of the American Flag Day Association and its first secretary, Dr. B.J. Cigrand of Batavia, Illinois.

June 14th is the anniversary of the adoption by Congress of the American Flag in 1777. It is well that this day be honored in the hearts and minds of the people of America, for many lives have been sacrificed in the defense of the honor of this great American Flag. This honor should be so imbedded in the lives of the living and be so revered that this Day of Days in America should not be treated as a day of revelry and vacationing, but as a day of respect and silent reverie of this great Emblem of this greatest of all Nations.

Though the Armed Forces of America have long had strict and stringent regulations regarding the respect of and the displaying of the Flag and many states have laws affecting use and respect to be paid the flag within their jurisdiction, it was not until 1968 that the United States Congress found it necessary to pass legislation regulating the respect that must be paid the American Flag within

It is regretable when we consider that our forefathers who first fought under this flag and so nobly honored and defended it were largely of foreign birth, but men with faith in this country that that flag represented, men who needed no laws forcing its respect--to think that these great men have fathered a generation so disrespectful that they must be forced to be respectful. Few of these children of disrespect are of foreign birth. They are the children of a long line of American families, whose fathers for all these generations have served America well and with honor.

Some place there must be found and corrected the cause for this degeneration.

Perhaps a proper displaying of the RED, WHITE and BLUE on this Flag Day will instill some respect in our young and some day result in the Patriotism of their forefathers.





LAUNDERING BLANKETS

By Sudie Thompson, CHDA

Now is a good time to get all those woolen, acrilan, orlon and electric blankets laundered and stored for next winter's cold nights.

western Public Service gave a talk to the Yoakum County Home Demonstration Club members on laundering blankets and pillows last Thursday, June5, in the Plains Club Room.

These are some points she brought out: Agitation and tumbling in washing are responsible for nearly all shrinkage in woolen blankets. She suggested the "soak method" along with some special drying directions. Using the soak wash method any extra soiled places should be pretreated by gently working detergent into them. Them fill the washer with warm water (100F.) and add detergent. Agi- shrinkage and harshness. tate until detergent is throughly dissolved. Turn off washer. Put blanket and soak 15 minutes, turning blanket over at end of 8 to 10 minutes.

Do not agitate washer during this period. Spin the water out at the end of 15 minutes. To rinse fill washer with warm water again and let blanket soak for 5 minutes. Spin blanket and

The drying instructions given were: Preheat dryer with 5 or 6 bath towels for 5 minutes. Use high heat if your dryer offers a Mrs. Vivian Liner from South- choice. Stretch both length and width of blanket (two people can stretch the blanket easier; however, one person can stretch blanket by pulling it over a line .) Place hot towels in folds of blanket. Place in dryer and dry on high heat for 7 to 18 minutes. Never allow the blanket to completely dry. Check at the end of 7 minutes by removing a corner of the blanket from the dryer and shaking until it is cool. If the blanket is still wet, continue to dry on high heat, checking every minute. Remove from dryer while some moisture is left in the blanket because overdrying of woolen blankets cause

The blanket should be stretched again. To fluff the nap, brush both sides of blanket with a wire bristled brush or nylon brush. Press binding with cool iron. Leave it unfolded until it is dry before storing for the summer.

Extra care is necessary for electric blankets because of the many wires and insulation. Follow the manufacturers instructions or use the above method except eliminate all stretching and pulling. Also use above drying method except eliminate stretching and brushing the blanket. For acrilan, Orlon and other synthetic fabrics use the manufacturers instructions or use the above method for washing woolen blankets but dry on medium heat.


