# History Of Livestock Assn. Given In Review Today

The Yoakum County Agriculture & Livestock Improvement Association was organized January 14th, 1952. The plan of action was discussed over a period of some two months, and after several meetings the By-Laws were drawn up.

On March 28th, 1952, a meeting was called to order and the first election of eleven directors was held which consisted of Gene Bennett, Bill Powell, Rusty McGinty, Roy Fitzgerald,

Glen Moorehouse, Olan Cox, A.G. Brantley, Bob Lowe, W.M. Taylor, Ty Field, and Pat Henard. From this slate of directors the first officers were elected as follows: President Gene Bennett; Vice-President, Bill Powell; Vice-President, Rusty McGinty; Vice-President, Roy Fitzgerald; and Secretary, Glen Moorehouse.

The first actual County Exhibition and Fat Stock Show was

held the 3rd week end in February, 1953. This stock show went over and was accepted very well, thus setting the stage for an annual 4-H and FFA Livestock Show every year since that time in Plains, Yoakum County, Texas.

The Livestock Show has been blessed every year even more than the year before through the wonderful cooperation of the association directors, citizens and businesses of the entire county, the Commissioners' Court, county agent, ag teacher, and a host of friends from neighboring counties throughout the state, even as far away as Harris County (Houston), and New Mexico.

Another high light and primary reason for the success of this annual show and sale is the fact that Colonel Hank Matthews of Anton, Texas, with his great congeniality, enthusiasm, and appreciation for fellowmen has been the auctioneer from the very beginning, and there is no way that we can express our appreciation for this great West Texan.

Gene Bennett was President of the Livestock Association from 1952 through March, 1963, a total of 10 consecutive annual livestock shows. Pat Henard was a fine president in 1963 and 1964. Johnnie Fitzgerald made great strides as president in 1965-66. Pat Henard was president again in 1967, and now since March, 1968, Gene Bennett is back at the helm as president for 1969 show and sale.

The changes and developments have been many since the first show was held at the "old county bus barn" behind the Plains school buildings. Now with the fine facilities we have had since 1954 (through the cooperation of the tax payers and Commissioners' Court) we have one of the best livestock exhibit units in the country, for which we are proud.

There is one thing certain, we never know from one year to the next what the results will be, but with the continued good will of the public, cooperation and team work of the directors, top projects from the young exhibitors, untiring efforts of the county agent, ag teachers, and parents, along with the magnificent work of Hank Matthews, the auctioneer, we will have another fine livestock show and sale in 1969.

Gene Bennett, present president of the Yoakum county Agriculture and Livestock Improvements Ass'n. Mr. Bennett is one of the founders of this association and has been a continuous board member or acted as president since then. He was the first president and served as such 11 years and through 10 consecutive livestock shows. He is secretary treasurer of the local Rodeo Ass'n, and is the present County Judge of Yoakum County. Where ever there is a program for improvement and progress in Yoakum County, most likely Gene will be in some way associated with it. It is through this type of loyal devotion and dedication and leadership that this county has developed and progresses. Those who attend the Association's show this year will be seeing much of Mr. Bennett as he works with this years show.

## Over \$800 Expected To Be Given At Show

Over \$800.00 is expected to be given to the exhibitors of steers, barrows, and lambs in the 1969 Yoakum County Junior Fat Stock show. The Yoakum County Livestock and Agriculture Improvement Association has been able to give cash awards to each exhibitor for the past sixteen years. This money is made possible through the sale of memberships to the Association at \$5.00 per year.

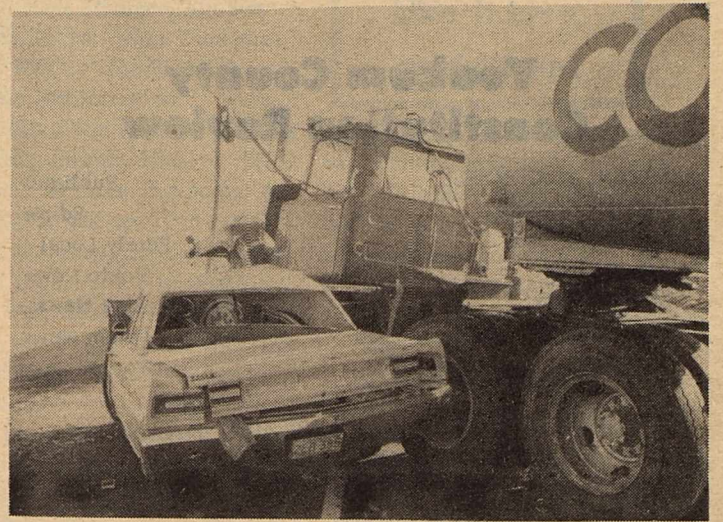
In each class of lambs the premiums paid are: \$7.50 for first place, \$5.00 for second place, and \$2.50 for every other animal in the class. In the barrow division, the premiums are a little higher. First place receives \$12.50; second, \$10.00;

third, \$7.50; fourth, \$5.00; and all others in the class, \$2.50. In the beef calf division, the premiums are still higher with first place receiving \$25.00; second, \$20.00; third \$15.00; fourth, \$10.00; and all others in the class receives \$5.00.

The number of animals estimated to be in the show this year are 19 beef calves, 100 barrows, and 64 lambs. When they are divided into three classes of calves, five classes of barrows, and four classes of lambs the resulting total is \$810.00.

## Two Dead In Car-Truck Crash

Two lives were lost as a result of a truck and car collision which occurred at 9:05 AM Tuesday Feb. 11, 69. The accident occurred four miles west of Plains near the intersection of US Highway 380 and Farm Road 1622.

A gasoline transport tank truck, owned by the Cotton Distributing Co. of Lovington, N. M. and driven by Charles Dewey Robinson, traveling eastward met in a head on collision with a late model Plymouth 4 door sedan car which was reported to be traveling west. The two occupan-

ts of the car were killed in the crash. The driver of the large truck was apparently uninjured.

Those killed were Wm. Leroy Waldron, 45, and his wife Marion Lucille Waldon, 42, of Waseca, Minn.

It is reported that the car swerved to their left in front of the truck rendering it impossible for the truck to avoid the collision. In the collision the car was turned completely around heading it east in the same direction of

## Busy With 4-H'ers

Due to the increased interest in the 4-H club the program has changed much in the last 16 years. At that time the County Extension Agents met with the members of the organized clubs in meetings held in the schools of their community. Then with the small membership it was possible for the agents to work directly with the members but as the membership increased and the number of 4-H projects increased it became necessary to make some changes. So the clubs began meeting at night or after school and local volunteers were enlisted to work with the organized clubs and the new project programs.

The responsibility of the extension agents today is to train the volunteer leaders so that they may carry on the work once done by the agents.

At the beginning of the year of 1969 there were over 70 of these volunteer adults working

with the 4-H program in Yoakum County.

Mr. White, Yoakum county extension agent, has taken a great interest in this phase of his work and the fine organiz-

## Is Rebellion Respectable?



Is there an effort underway to make rebellion respectable?

As dissident students, non-students, and the "dedicated revolutionaries" on some college and university faculties do their utmost to disrupt our society, some are now praising their attacks on the "establishment" and declaring that the rebels may some day be acclaimed as heroes.

In line with this thinking, a nationally syndicated columnist wrote recently, "When you read about the first years of the Christian church as reported in the New Testament, you discover that many of the faithful spent more time in prison than in the pulpit."

### What Were They Doing?

The question is: What were these faithful men doing that led to their being thrown into prison—rioting, shouting obscenities at the authorities, seizing or destroying property that did not belong to them, inflicting physical harm on those who disagreed with them?

Of course not. They were not engaging in any of these presently popular methods of expressing dissent.

Why, then, were they in prison?

Their offense was preaching the Gospel and delivering people from the oppression of Satan.

Authorities of the Roman government, seeking to stamp out Christianity, persecuted the early Christian leaders.

Let's not smear the memories of the great Christians of that early era by equating their imprisonment for preaching Christianity with the jailing of those whose claim to fame is that they have succeeded in disrupting the operation of a college where other young people are attempting to secure an education.

Next of kin were notified by the Texas Department of Public Safety. No further details were available at this time.

### No Justification

Nowhere in the Scripture is there justification for unlawful and unruly acts such as are being committed on the campuses of our colleges and universities by the militant minorities that would impose their will on the properly constituted authorities.

On the contrary, the Bible is clear in its teaching that those who would please God should "live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world."

The revolution which Jesus advocated was a revolution of heart and mind, resulting in an internal change in the individual who adopted the way of Christ as his own.

It is impossible to imagine the early Christian leaders taking part in some of the demonstrations which have in our days been adorned by the presence of some clergymen—men of the cloth who have chosen to lend the weight of their influence to disruptive and unlawful activities.

No doubt, there are inequities in the operation of some colleges. No doubt, some changes should be made in their policies and practices.

Where there are inequities, they should be corrected. But this must be done in a peaceable manner, without resort to violence.

The teaching of the Bible is the direct opposite of the doctrine which is being proclaimed—and practised—by the rebels whom some are seeking to justify.

We have been assured of getting the representatives here, provided enough interest is shown. If we can receive a reasonable response indicating your questions and interest within thirty days, we can proceed with our plans to procure the government representative. Please send your response to:

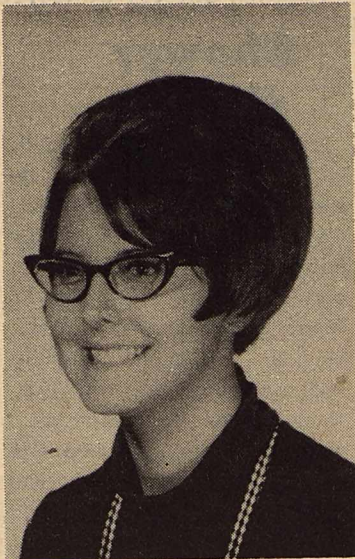

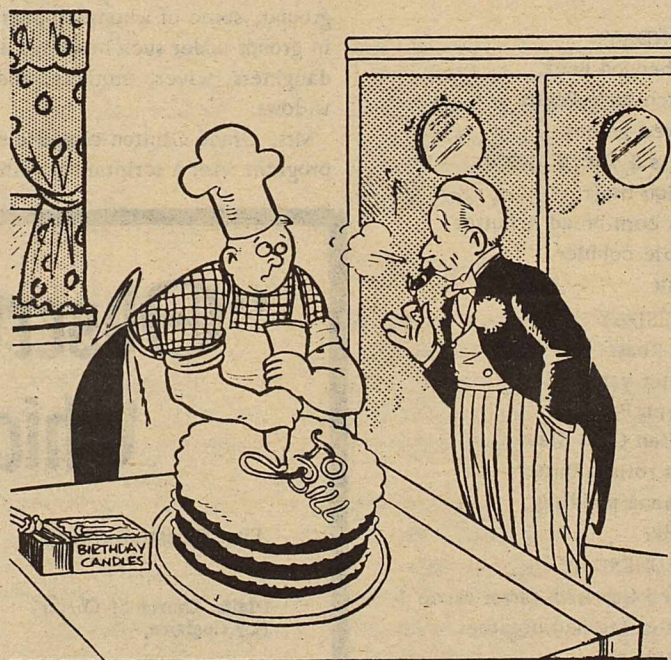

## Women Of Bible Topic Of Study

Mrs. J.M. Tippitt and Mrs. Polly Rushing were hosts to a regular meeting of the Tsa Mo Ga Club, held in the Club House, Monday evening at eight o'clock. The entertaining suite was tastefully decorated in the Valentine motif.

The President, Mrs. Bob Blundell, presided at the business meeting. A letter of resignation from Mrs. Dickie Green was read and accepted, with regret. The members voted to observe Friendship Day. The program for the evening was on Religion. Mrs. Robert Chambliss, program Director, opened the discussion with, "You can almost trace light and darkness in the Bible by the women themselves," a quote from Edith Deen's book, "All the Women of the Bible". Mrs. R.B. Jones and Mrs. R.K. Field then reviewed the Book. Mrs. Jones talked on this the first comprehensive book ever written on ALL of the women of the Bible, who form a feminine portrait gallery unsurpassed in the world of literature, whose influence and their times give the book

Mrs. Jones said "Here is new and abundant material for every one-- the ordinary reader who loves story and drama-- the teacher and the preacher eager for new subject matter--the writer on the lookout for new characters, or new slants on old-- the Bible student who wishes to extend his knowledge. Each major biography is identified by Bible chapter and verse and prefaced by a key passage of scripture. While attempting to re-create these women, so that they might be seen as real beings, Mrs. Deen had one purpose; to try to understand and interpret their spiritual experiences, their faith and their relationship with God. The lives of the women of the Bible made patterns of light and darkness. The book divided itself quite naturally into three parts." Mrs. Jones reviewed Section I-- containing Searching Studies of more than fifty women in the foreground, and Section II comprising alphabetically arranged sketches of the more than one hundred and fifty women in the background. Mrs. Field then reviewed Section III, other sketches, describing more than one hundred nameless women in the background, some of whom appear in groups under such headings as daughters, wives, mothers, and widows.

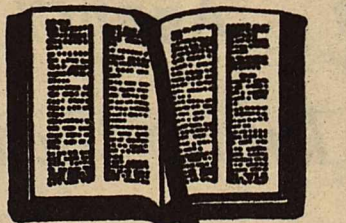

## Measle Survey Set For County

The Plains Independent School Board and the Yoakum County Health Department are jointly sponsoring a measles survey for children from one year old, pre-school, first, second, third, fourth, and fifth grade students to determine if they are protected against measles.

Measles epidemics can be avoided if unprotected children, especially pre-schoolers and those attending school, are properly immunized. Children who have previously had measles or measles vaccine are already protected and do not need the vaccination.

Free vaccine for measles will be given in the Plains Elementary school from 9:00-11:00 A.M. on February 19, 1969. All children between the age of 1 year and fifth grade, inclusive are eligible for this vaccine.

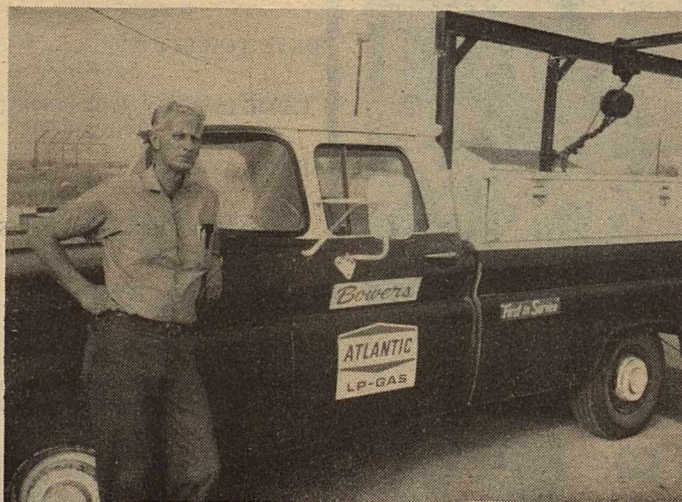

She has been a member of 4-H for nine years and will be exhibiting sheep at the show next week.

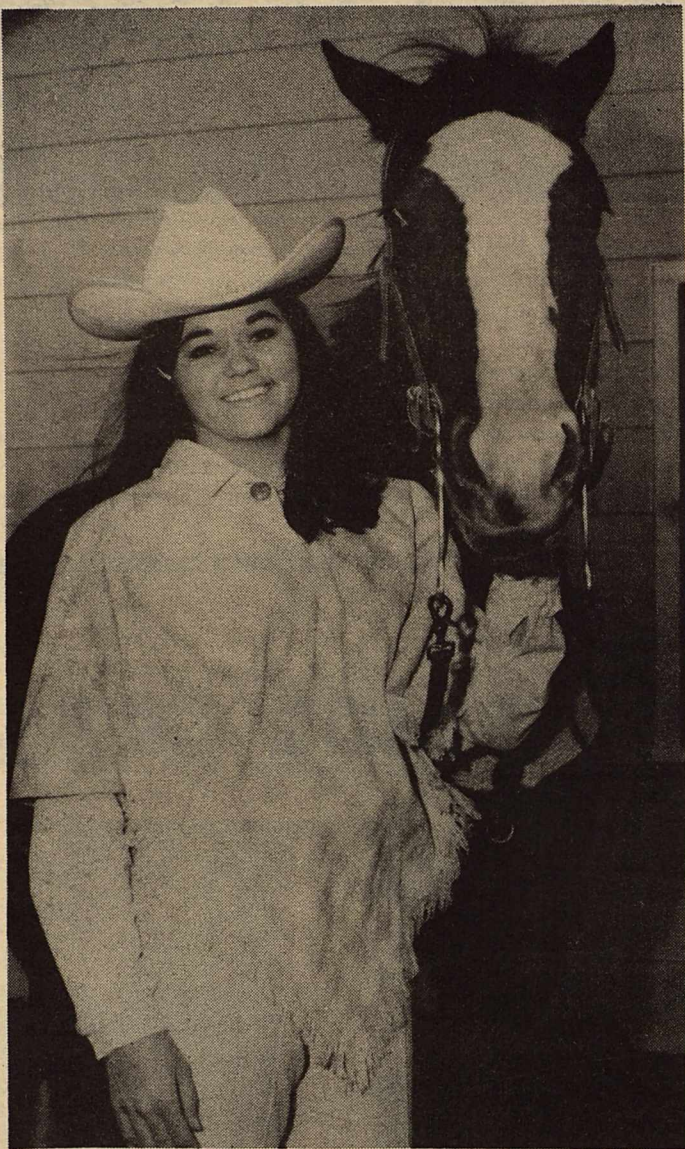

leyball team and has been a cheerleader during her high school years. She is also active in the Student Council, Drama Club, Science Club and band.

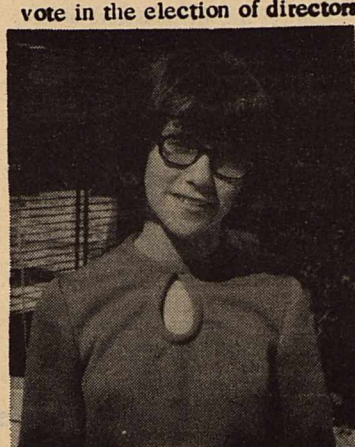

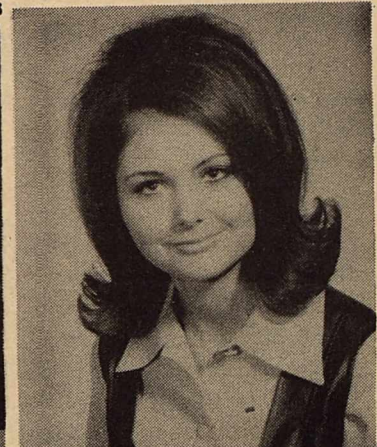

Barrows must weigh between 190 pounds and 250 pounds, and calves are required to weigh at least 700 pounds and not more than 1,150 pounds.

The lamb judging begins at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, but there is no way to tell exactly when the barrow judging will begin. The barrows will be judged immediately following the completion of the lamb show. On Saturday, the beef calf judging is scheduled to begin at 9:00 a.m.

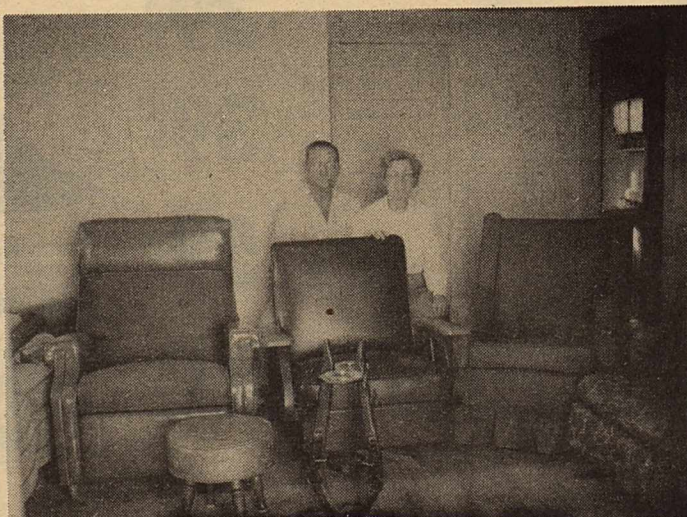
