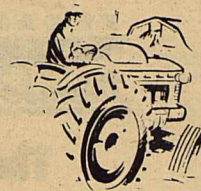

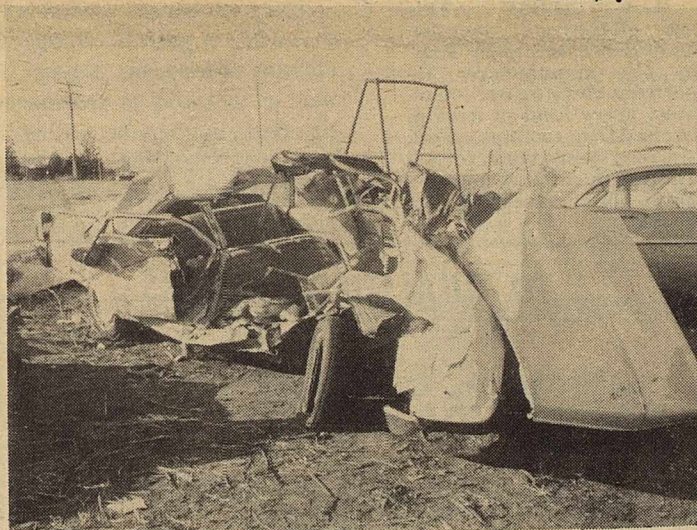

34 ESTIMATED TO DIE OVER WEEKEND

Austin - - - Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS Statistical services Bureau estimates that 34 persons will be fatally injured in traffic accidents in Texas during the 78-hour July 4th Holiday period.

The holiday period is considered to run from 6 P.M. Thursday, July 3rd, to midnight Sunday, July 6. During this time, the Department of Public Safety will activate a special "Operation Motorcade" and will place all available uniformed patrolmen on duty to enforce traffic laws in an effort to reduce accidents and assist motorists.

Speir urged all Texans to plan their holiday trips so as to allow ample time to drive without speeding or driving too fast for conditions. He also cautioned motorists to watch out for pedestrians, especially on beaches and parks, during the holiday period.

The DPS director also warned that the department will vigorously enforce state laws relating to driving while intoxicated.

"Drinking drivers are involved in 40 to 50 % of the fatal rural traffic accidents in Texas, and I urge all drivers to avoid the use of alcohol prior to operating a motor vehicle."

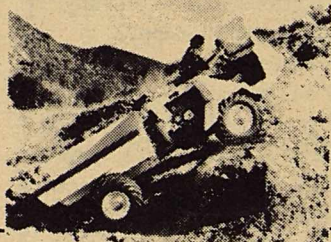

Sudie Thompson CHDA Says...

Slacks and related garments, such as shorts and pedal pushers have become increasingly popular in recent years. They are worn for housework, gardening and during leisure hours.

Patterns for slacks differ widely in their lines and proportions and are probably the most difficult to fit properly. Adjustments should be made before cutting.

Take measurements of hip, waist, instep and crotch length (taken while sitting by measuring from the side of the waistline to the seat of the chair). Also take the length from waist to ankle. When buying patterns for slacks look for one where the crotch is relatively short in front and relatively long in back.

Adjust crotch length by drawing a line across the pattern back at right angles to the grainline from the widest part of the crotch to side seam. Measure the distance from waistline to drawn line.

This should equal the length of your crotch measure taken in a sitting position plus 3/4 inch ease. If it is necessary to shorten the pattern, crease along the Easy Rule guide line and fold a tuck. Take out desired amount. Take same amount out of front. If pattern is too short, cut along the dotted line and spread the pattern the necessary amount using tissue paper and tape.

If the pattern is too big in the hips take a vertical tuck parallel to the grain line, avoid any dart markings. Continue the tuck the entire length of the pattern. If it is too small, slash the pattern vertically, parallel to the grainline, avoiding any dart markings, spread the tissue the necessary amount. Tape over paper.

If extra width is needed through the thigh area, it should be added.

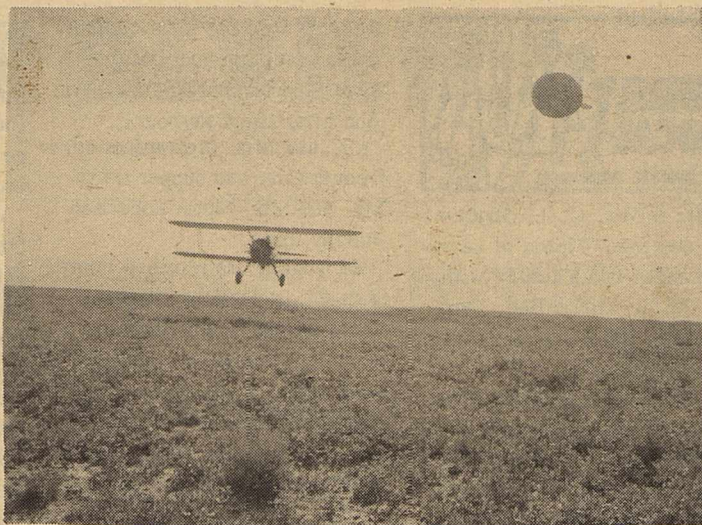

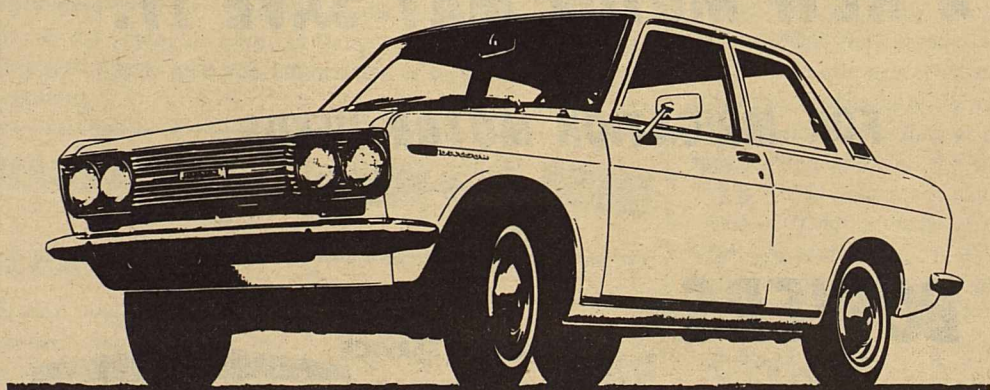

Brush control on the Robert J. Beasley ranch, aerial spraying of chemicals on Shinoak to reduce the competition for moisture and plant food has proven to be one of the best ways to increase the size of a ranch. Increased production can allow the rancher to continue to run the same number of cattle if he has been overgrazing or it can allow him to increase the size of his herd thereby making his ranch a profitable operating unit. The increase in grazing has ranged from 30 to over 100 percent where brush control and range deferral has been carried out. The cost this year for the aerial spraying was \$2.90 per acre and of course, you don't have to grow many bales of hay to get your money back. We think a fully growing season deferral is best because it gives the better grasses a chance to seed, grow new root systems, and increase in plant vigor. To leave a few head in a pasture is to overgraze the very best grasses and give the poor ones a rest thereby giving the best ones more competition. Some think to leave a few head in will take care of the weeds but cows have always eaten grass than weeds when given a choice. If you haven't started deferring a pasture yet NOW would be a good time to start, July, August, September and October are the months that our best grass make the most seed.

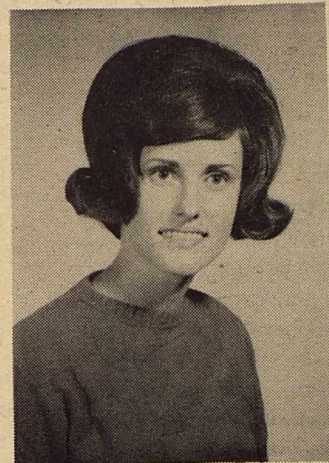
Attending the groom as best man was Oscar Henard of Plains. Billy Smart of Morton served as groomsman.

ing included Dr. L.S. Pope, Associate Dean of Agriculture at Texas A&M University; Dr. John E. Hutchison, Director of the Extension Service; Dr. Lowell Schake, Extension area livestock specialist; Dr. Robert B. Metzger, Extension area agronomist; Billy Wayne Clayton, State Representative and Executive Director of Water, Inc., and Dr. James E. Osborn, Associate Professor at Texas Tech.

Areas of economic emphasis vital to the development of the area were discussed by the speakers. It was also pointed out that animal agriculture is one of the most dynamic industries in the world today and is easily envisioned a two-fold increase in cattle feeding within the next five years and perhaps double again for the long range projection.

It was also pointed out that none of the potential production of the area can become reality without adequate water and it will be necessary to find sources other than those within our boundaries. It was discussed the need for legislation that will provide the water necessary to the increase in agricultural production in years to come.

In discussing cotton and other important cash crops in the area, it was emphasized that cotton has an economic importance unmatched by any other crop in the area, yet we must be ever alert to take advantage of other alternative crops or enterprises that more profitably fit the individual's farming system.

The election of officers and executive committee members was also part of the day's program. Officers elected were Donnell Echols of Lamesa, president; Ray Poage of Slaton, vice-president; and R.N. ed to the inside leg seams only. Add to the front and back at the crotch tapering to lower edge.

To make adjustments for large derriere will depend on the degree of the problem. The back darts may be made deeper and longer. Taper to 1 inch above the fullest part of the hip. This will drop the fullness to the place where needed. To compensate for the amount lost in making darts deeper, add to the side seams, taping from waistline to hipline. If more fullness is needed, increase the pattern at inside of leg seam on the back. This adds length and width to the back crotch without giving a baggy look.

For a flat derriere, fullness may be decreased by decreasing the size of the darts in back and then take out this amount at side seams, stitch side seams slightly wider, and take a wider seam

at inside of leg. Do not decrease seam allowance on front in seam.
