CONSOLIDATION PETITIONS ARE PRESENTED TO COUNTY JUDGE

Scott Bailey In Legislature Race

Scott Bailey of Cisco has authorized The Press to announce that he will be a candidate for representative of the new 63rd District in the State Legislature in the 1962 Democratic primary election.

Over 5,000 Due To Participate In County Voting

Approximately 5,000 persons will be eligible to vote in Eastland County when voting time comes, according to a report here. Some 4,185 poll taxes have been sold, to Eastland Countians, according to statistics of County Tax Assessor Collector, J. C. Allison.

Eastland led other county cities in sales with a total of 2,110. Other towns had the following sales: Cisco, 970; Ranger, 578; Gorman 438; and Rising Star, 89.

Deputy Ott Hern reported 277 exemption certificates issued, with a possible 1,000 eligible persons not picking up poll tax certificates.

Rev. Jopling Is Called By East Baptist Church

The East Cisco Baptist Church voted to call Rev. Don Jopling of Fort Worth as pastor of the church at the Sunday morning services on Feb. 11, according to a report today.

H. K. Neely, Sr., chairman of the pulpit committee, called Rev. Jopling Sunday, following the decision of the church, and reported that Rev. Jopling would preach at the East Cisco Baptist Church for morning and evening services Sunday, Feb. 18.

If Mr. Jopling does accept the position of pastor of the church, the Joplings will not assume the new position until March 1.

Rev. Jopling, a Fort Worth evangelist, was pastor of the local church for a few months about three years ago, leaving for reasons of health.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — How many veterans of the U. S. Armed Forces are women?

A There are about 416,000 women veterans of wartime service and some 34,000 women veterans with peacetime service only.

Representatives of the newly organized Eastland County Committee for Better Education met Tuesday in the office of County Judge John S. Hart to present petitions from six of Eastland County's nine independent school districts. The petitions request a consolidation election which may be held some time in March.

Presenting the petitions were Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, president of the committee, and Dr. James Whittington, also of Eastland, secretary of the committee and leader in the past two years of the movement for consolidation of county schools. Also attending was H. R. (Pop) Garrett, Eastland County School superintendent, from whose office the petitions will be sent to Austin for approval by the Texas Education Agency.

The petitions must be verified by District Attorney Earl Conon on the petitions; sent to the Texner as to the names appearing as Education Agency in Austin for approval; returned to County Judge Hart; and last, the county judge must call the election within 20 days after he receives the petitions from Austin.

Another organization in the county, the Eastland County School Administrators Association, has been organized for the purpose of studying consolidation problems and presenting the facts to the public. The final report has not been released from the group, of which Wendell Siebert, superintendent of Eastland schools, is president.

The six school districts that will be affected by the consolidation petitions are Eastland, Desdemona, Ranger, Olden, Carbon and Gorman. Other districts in the county are Cisco, Rising Star and Scranton.

Floor Plan For New Building Is Approved By CJC

The board of regents of Cisco Junior College has approved the floor plan and preliminary drawings for the new science building, President Grady Hogue of the college reported today. Voters of the district approved a \$125,000 bond issue recently to finance the building.

Mr. Hogue said that Architect J. D. Hinton of Snyder hopes to have plans and specifications ready by Feb. 15 for use in calling for bids on a contract to erect the building. The college plans to use the new science building next fall.

The college has applied for additional federal housing funds for use in building dormitories, Mr. Hogue said. Funds have been tentatively assigned to CJC pending completion of details of the project, including considerable paper work, he added.

"We are expecting another increase in enrollment next year and are seeking to be ready to meet the demands," Mr. Hogue said.

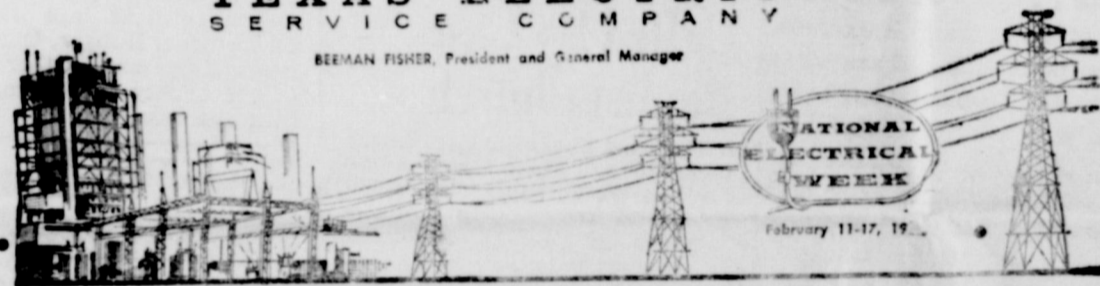

**Bailey Gives A
Report On Work
In Special Session**

The 3rd Called Session of the 57th Legislature will end this week. It has been one of the hardest working and controversial sessions in Texas history, it was reported by Rep. Scott Bailey of Cisco.

About two-thirds of the legislation requested by the Governor has been enacted. The major bills passed are: 1. An abandoned property law 2. A bill restoring Farm-Market Road funds. The remaining third of the action anticipated by this session consists of Small Loan legislation and some spending bills.

The bill dealing with the regulation of small loans was heavily amended by the Senate and has now gone to a House-Senate

Conference Committee which has been appointed to adjust the differences between the two houses.

Toward the end of the session the Governor saw fit to open the call for a large number of local and uncontested bills. There have been a large number of these introduced. They are now in committee or on the crowded calendars of either the House or Senate.

As the close of the session the possibility of these bills being passed is doubtful, Bailey said.

The press and radio have given this session excellent coverage in an effort to let the citizens of Texas know what their state government is doing. "All of us in the Legislature," Bailey said "appreciate the good objective reporting that has appeared."

Texas Veterans Due To Receive Insurance Check

DALLAS — Some 246,629 Texas veterans of World War I and World War II will receive \$12,507,900 in 1962 annual dividend payments on GI insurance, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas said today.

The dividend checks will be paid on the anniversary date of the policies this year as is the usual custom, Onstot said VA last year speeded up the payments in an effort to aid the national economy at the request of the President.

The VA official explained that the anniversary date is the anniversary of the date each individual policy became effective. By consulting his policy, each veteran would be able to tell when to expect his dividend check.

Dividends will average \$50 for World War II veterans and about \$70 for veterans of World War I, Onstot said.

The annual dividends are primarily a return to policyholders of part of the premiums they have paid since the death rate of veterans continues to be less than estimated in the mortality tables upon which the premium rates were set by law.

Nationwide, approximately \$225 million will be divided among almost 4.5 million World War II veterans holding participating National Service Life Insurance policies (NSLI) policies. Some 228,000 World War I veterans who hold participating U. S. Government Life Insurance (USGLI) policies will receive approximately \$16 million in dividends, Onstot said.

Savings Bonds Sales \$503,618 In This County

The citizens of Eastland County purchased \$503,618 in Savings Bonds during 1961. This represents 96.8 per cent of the county's sales goal, according to an announcement made by Guy Peyton Parker, chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bonds Committee.

The total bond purchases in Texas during 1961 were \$155,694,292 which represented 94.3 per cent of the goal of the state. Sales in Texas for 1961 represented approximately 2 per cent increase over 1960, Mr. Parker reported. Nationally, 1961 bond sales were 4 per cent above 1960 and at the same time, redemptions were 10 per cent below 1960, he stated.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

 Pershing Square in Los Angeles is, as far as I know, unique in the U.S.A. (London, of course, has Hyde Park) In Pershing Square, anybody can speak — and probably get an audience, though probably not large, unless he's pretty good as there are three or four harangues going on, so the listener is likely to saunter on to the next one.

Most of the speakers hold forth on religion — or maybe this was because it was Sunday when I was there — (summer, 1958). One preacher was holding forth and right in front of him — so close that a vigorous gesture would almost touch him — was a man reading a newspaper as calmly as if he were the only person in the park. Every now and then, he would turn the page.

The speaker across the park was a woman with prominent teeth and a guitar, who gyrated, a la Elvis. Another speaker was rapping organized charity and he drew heckling, also under-tone comment such as, "He don't know what he's talking about."

The biggest crowd was around a group of three singers, one of whom played a portable organ.

At a corner of Pershing Square is a cannon from "Old Ironsides." Someone had put unpopped grains of popcorn on the cannon and a white pigeon was perched there, eating — almost a dove of peace on the death-dealing weapon.

Under Pershing Square is a parking lot. There is a big billboard giving the charges. If you go in after 10 a. m. but before 4:30 p. m. (Pacific Coast daylight saving time), the rate is such-and-such. Before that or after that, it is different. Also on Saturdays, holidays and Feb. 29. It would take a C.P.A., or maybe an electric brain, to figure it out.

At one coffee shop, when you order eggs, you have to order toast, too — it's extra.

I had had an early glass of orange juice elsewhere but the waitress told me I would save money if I ordered the "special" — eggs, coffee, toast and orange juice — even if I didn't drink the juice, rather than order eggs, coffee and toast separately.

Life is getting more complicated all the time.

When Irving Bacheller, who became famous as a novelist, ("Eben Holden," "A Man for the Ages") was a young man, he met Joseph Pulitzer, the great newspaper publisher. Pulitzer asked, "What do you think of our editorials?" Bacheller replied, "I never read them." The publisher banged his fist on the table and said, "By Godfrey, gentlemen, I like that kind of talk" and hired Bacheller as Sunday editor.
