15 COUPLES DIVORCED IN 91st DISTRICT COURTS DURING 1961

Eastland County last year, that's about 15 above the average for a year, 91st District Judge T. M. Collie said this week.

Major cause of divorce in this county, according to records, is cruelty — both on the part of the woman as well as the man. Only six cases were brought on other grounds. Each of these six involved liquor or drinking. One divorce was granted for a rather obvious reason — the man was married to another woman at the time of the marriage in question.

"Hunger Insurance" For Disaster Victims

Hurricane Carla, with thousands of Texans left homeless and hungry, was one of the big news events of 1961. It's history, now. But lessons learned in accommodating evacuees from the ravishing wind can well prove invaluable in future catastrophes.

Take the matter of food. Our nation's agricultural abundance

is no longer "surplus" when it becomes part of disaster feeding operations, points out the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Efforts of local, county, state and federal individuals and organizations, all working together, helped to minimize personal hardships.

The funneling of more than 1.6 million pounds of food donated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to state and local welfare agencies for use in feeding Carla victims is a case in point. In a way, it was a routine job for USDA's Food Distribution Division. This agency of the Agricultural Marketing Service handles food all year long for the Direct Distribution and National School Lunch programs.

Yet, a lot of machinery has to swing into action, quickly, to provide food for storm victims. Even before the vicious coquette called Carla swished her skirts through Gulf Coast areas, in September, the federal-state food distribution setup was ready.

Under the two USDA programs,

foods are enroute to all parts of the nation, continuously, so there is always an abundance in or near any spot that might need emergency feeding. In the case of Carla, much was in warehouses at Houston, Beaumont and Corpus Christi. The 3,000 Texas schools participating in the National School Lunch Program also had good supplies.

All of this food was made available, as soon as needed, to local officials, Red Cross, Salvation Army and other disaster agencies. County authorities could get USDA foods for hurricane victims merely by applying to the Texas Department of Public Welfare. As in normal operations, USDA makes food available, but it is up to local workers to put it to use.

No one hopes a similar disaster will recur — but it could. And if it does, our nation's food distribution system, combined with the great abundance of farm products, will be ready to provide "emergency hunger insurance," again.

Deep Plowing For Root Rot Control Is Demonstrated

Over 5,000 Texas cotton farmers are reducing cotton root rot by deep plowing. They deep plowed more than a quarter million acres during 1961 according to year-end reports by county agricultural agents.

Farmers in many counties have carried out result demonstrations which showed positively that deep plowing does reduce root rot, said Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Best results were obtained, he explained, when deep plowed soil was allowed to dry for ten days to two weeks during summer or early

fall when soil moisture was below normal. Shorter drying periods have given a degree of control but are somewhat unreliable, Smith said.

Affected areas should be plowed and large amounts of organic matter turned under during the hot, dry season. Plow depths of from 6 to 18 inches are recommended, depending upon the soil type and equipment available. Mold-board or disc breaking plows are satisfactory for doing the job, the specialist said. Drying the soil for a reasonable period kills the root rot fungus by drying and killing cotton roots and those of susceptible weeds, Smith explained.

The reports from the counties showed that losses ranging up to 75 percent had been reduced to

less than 5 percent by deep plowing. Eradication is not usually complete because the fungus may penetrate the soil to a depth of 8 feet, Smith added.

Local county agents can supply additional information on root rot control practices, and Smith suggests a visit.

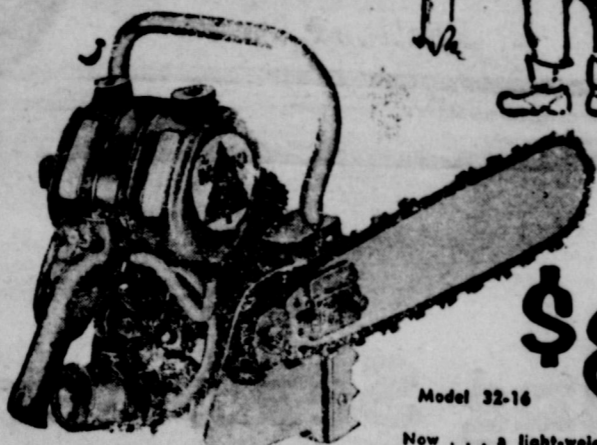
