It is to the Texas State D partment of Health for maintaining good public health. For more than 50 years the TSDH has been responsible for the prevention or control of water-borne diseases through the administration of programs designed to assure proper means stes. In addition, programs were established to protect pub'ic water systems from contaminants and to encourage owners to provide adequate treatment plants operated and maintained under the supervision of "Certified Operators" in order to assure safe drinking or domestic-use water. In Texas today more than a thousand sewage or domestic wastewater treatment plants are in operation and more that 3,000 populated areas are served by public water systems. Though waterborne disease outbreaks 'typhoid, amoebic or bacillary dysentery, hepatitis, and others)have not been traceable to impr

Membership in the American Academy of General Practice for at least six years was the basic qualifications for these doctors to take the exam. The Academy requires members to complete 150 hours of approved postgraduate stu-Yarborough-Rooney legislation schools and teaching hospitals to set up quality family practice departments and programs to produce highly-qualified family doctors as quickly as possible. The shortage of primary physicians had been widely recognized as a basic shortcoming in the American medical system. The bill defines family medicine as "those certain principles and techniques and that REGULAR - OIL SPRAY - ELECTRIC MOTOR certain body of medical, scientific, administrative and other knowledge and training which specifically equip and prepare a physician to engage in the practice of family medicine." Among major provisions of the bill is that an Advisory Council on Family Medicine be set up to assist the Secretary of H-EW to award grants. THIS council would review all grant applications and recommend approvals to the Secretary.
