



They pay no taxes on their benefits and on an individual basis, each probably qualifies for food stamps and medicaid benefits as well. Several local farmers are installing underground irrigation pipelines and regulating reservoirs or gathering systems. Some of those installing pipelines are: John Freeman, Bill Moore, Alton Billings and Tommy Billings. Ronnie K. Johnson and I. L. Smith are also installing gathering systems.

A. E. (Dick) McGinty has just completed 40-50 acres of brush control (grubbing mesq-

uite) on his home place. Some are getting ready to spray shin oak within the next few days. Donald Orr, Robert Beasley, Kenneth Engle and others are making arrangements to begin spraying shin oak within the next lo days.

Great Plains contracts are being worked out with B. I. Sm. ith and Tommy Hicks at the present time. New Soil and Water Conservation District plans are being prepared for Deroy Anderson on the J. E. Nance farm. Also a new conservation plan on the I. A. Ev ans farm north east of Plains operated by Billy Bagwell is being prepared.

New conservation plan maps have been ordered for L.O. Smith, Hudson Estate, Forrest Reeves farm and others.

Many local farmers have begun pre-planting irrigation, but due to the high winds the past 3-4 days irrigation wells have been closed down.


Produce at Economic Prices
