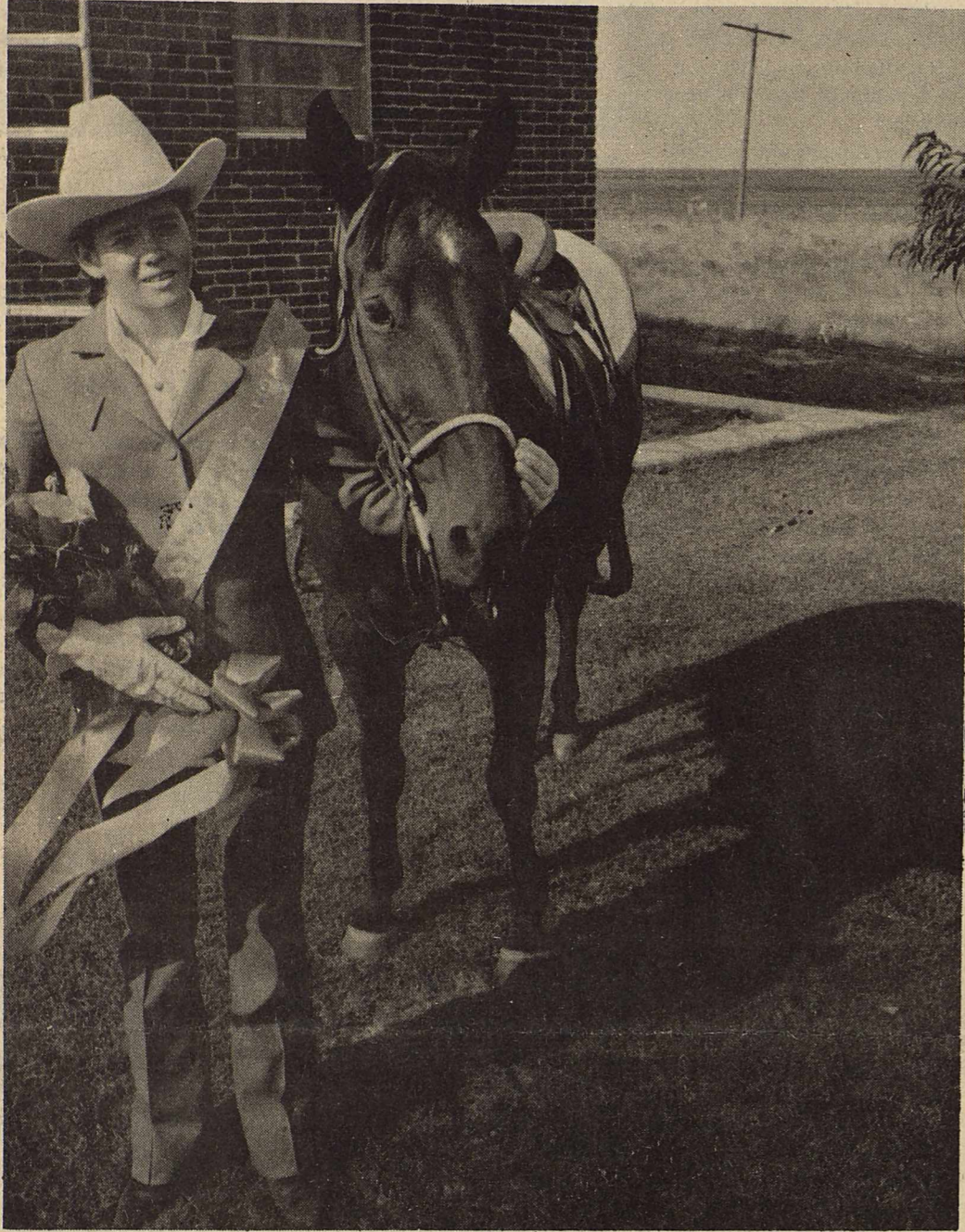

Many Yoakum County people will again gather at the Stanford Park in Plains, Texas for the annual Old Settler's Reunion.

This will be the 18th year for this happy gathering. In previous years the Reunion has been held in conjunction with the Rodeo staged by the Yoakum County Rodeo Association.

This year the Rodeo was prevented by the "Vee" horse quarantine.

Tho the Rodeo stock to be furnished by Red Whatley of Crosbyton were vaccinated in time to be clear of the quarantine for the Rodeo, the local horses were not and the out of state contestants were prohibited by the quarantine. Without these entries, it was impossible to conduct the Rodeo as planned.

On opening night of the 1970 Rodeo, 120 horses were engaged in the Grand Entry. Also the Plains Quadrille Team are an important part of the entertainment program.

Never the less, the Old Settler's Reunion has always been the keynote of the annual celebration.

The park is in splendid shape for the affair and a fine barbecue dinner will be prepared for all.

It is felt that these improvements will contribute much toward efficiency of the Plains School System.

Horses Innumized Against Vee

Four veterinarians worked in Yoakum County during the past week and vaccinated over 600 head of horses, mules and burros. The bulk of the horses were vaccinated by Dr. A. J. Mabrey of Seminole and Dr. Tim Faulkenberry of Brownfield.

The immunization program, a "Crash Program" to halt the spread of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis, was considered 99% complete in Yoakum County at 7:00 p.m. Saturday when both neighboring vets headed toward home after spending most of the afternoon here.

Figures from the veterinarians and the local people who worked with them show that 686 head were vaccinated. We know this figure includes 32 head that were just across the county line in Terry County and an undetermined number in the Denver City area that are in Gaines County. We feel the figure of 600 plus is a conservative estimate of the total number of horses in Yoakum County. At the end of the past week, we knew of only nine horses that had not been treated.

In order to get this work done in such a short time, it was necessary to have the full cooperation of horse owners, veterinarians and "line-up" men.

It was really amazing how the word could spread so fast from one horse owner to another. When central vaccination points were designated, there was no possible way to get word to everyone. The Plains Arena was

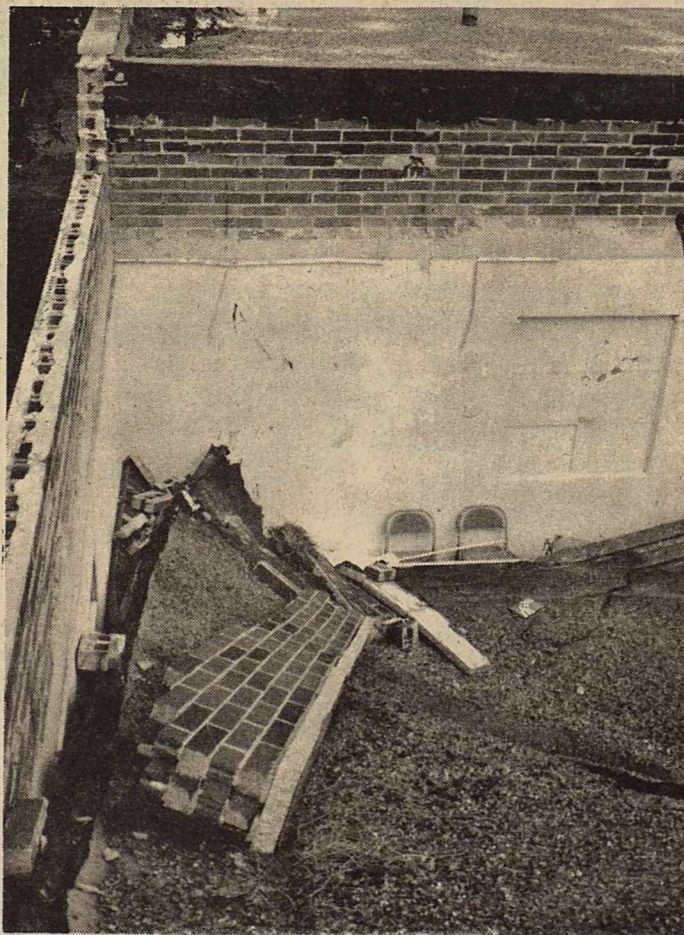
at 9:30 Monday night for 9:30 a.m. Tuesday and 78 head of horses were brought in. The Denver City Arena was designated as a central point at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday for work at 9:30 that night and about 100 horses were brought in. Seventy three of them were treated before the supply of vaccine was exhausted.

Dr. Mabrey was in the county on Wednesday and about 90 head were treated at the Bennett Ranch and surrounding territory and the Denver City areas. Dr. Faulkenberry treated 46 head on Tuesday and 135 head on Thursday by driving from farm to farm and covering a large part of the county.

Both veterinarians worked in their home counties on Friday but they were back on Saturday afternoon and treated another 76 head.

The county agent would like to say "THANKS" to all those people who helped with this program. Many telephone calls were made and many messages were carried to those who could not be contacted any other way.

To this date, the county horse owners have not reported any sick or dead horses. Horse owners are urged to watch their animals closely and report to the agents office 456-3003, any animals having symptoms of sleeping sickness. Movement of horses will resume after the fourteen day waiting period and horses traveling in Texas should be accompanied by the certificate signed by the veterinarian showing the description of the horses and the date they were immunized.



Church Roof Falls In

Humorous remarks are often heard regarding the "church roof falling in" and the causes thereof. But it was no joke when young Rickie Liles rushed to the phone at the First Baptist Church in Plains and reported just such an incident to his mother, Mrs. Ben Liles, church secretary.

Rickie had been doing some janitor work at the church when he heard a crunching and crackling noise. He went to investigate and as he opened the door in a class room on the north side of the building the roof came crashing in - closing the door before him.

A severe wind and rain storm had just ensued in which about one half inch of rain fall had caused a heavy accumulation of water on the roof, causing it to collapse. The thoughtfulness of Bro. Jim Mosley, pastor of the church, when he shut off the air conditioning fans perhaps averted a greater catastrophe. It was learned a few minutes later that a one inch gas line running through the roof had been severed when the roof fell. Immediate cut off of the utilities avoided the possibility of fire.

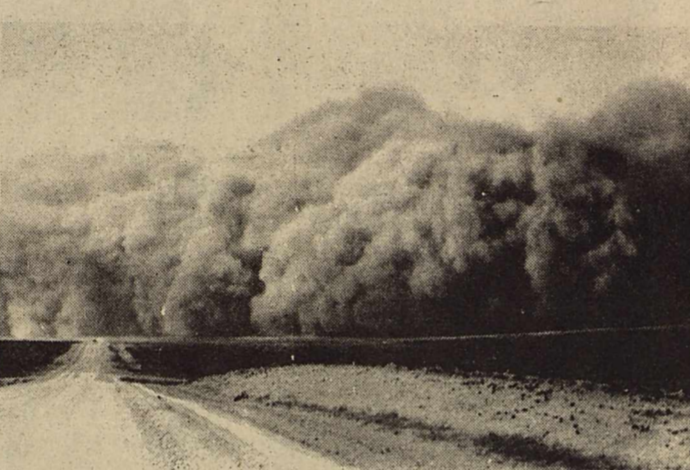
Friendly Chats with

It did not lighten up to where driving was safe that night, but people who were out, began going places in an hour or so. This was made not over 10 minutes before it hit."

On the second picture, she wrote: "This was taken 3 blocks from our house and about a minute before it hit. The light part was yellow and red as the sun was shining brightly. The dark was a deep blue and black. The wind was 55 miles per hour and it really put dust into everything. I know it covered at least 150 mile front and was a real dust storm for several hundred miles Southwest of here."

Canning Green Beans

Do you have a surplus of fresh green beans? Can you buy them at reasonably low cost?

To enjoy their summer goodness the middle of this winter, try canning them now, suggests Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition specialist.

First, prepare the beans just as you would for cooking. Snap or cut into one or two inch pieces, or leave whole if you prefer.

Pack the raw beans tightly in clean jars to one-half inch of the top. Pour in boiling water, covering the beans until one-half inch space is left at the jar top. You may add salt -- one half teaspoon per pint and one teaspoon per quart. Wipe off the jar sealing surface and close according to the lid type used. Follow the manufacturer's directions.

Place closed jars of hot beans on a rack in a pressure canner with one and a half to two inches boiling water in the bottom.

Be sure to use the rack to hold jars off the bottom of the cooker. Fasten the canner lid securely. If the lid has clamps, tighten opposite clamps moderately first, then go back over the whole, set tightening each pair as much as possible. Tighten only with your fingers.

Leave the petcock open until steam escapes steadily for 10 minutes; no air should be left in the cooker. If air remains, the vacuum formed draws liquid off the beans.

Close the petcock when the steam has escaped. As soon as the pressure reaches 10 pounds begin to count processing time. Maintain uniform pressure by adjusting the heat or by carefully moving the canner.

Process snap beans 20 minutes for pints and 25 minutes for quarts.

After processing, remove the canner from heat, allowing it to cool until the pressure gauge registers zero. Gradually open the petcock and remove the cover. Leave beans in the canner about 5 minutes, then place them right side up on the rack far enough apart for quick cooling. Avoid placing in drafts or on cold surfaces to prevent jars from breaking.

The quality of the canned produce will be no better than the quality of the fresh produce. In other words, use only high grade beans for canning. If you do this and follow directions, carefully, you should obtain olive green beans with fresh-cooked flavor.

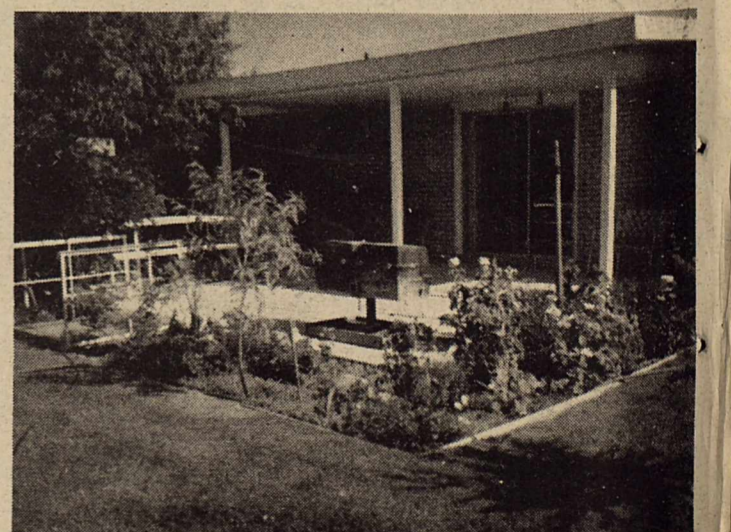

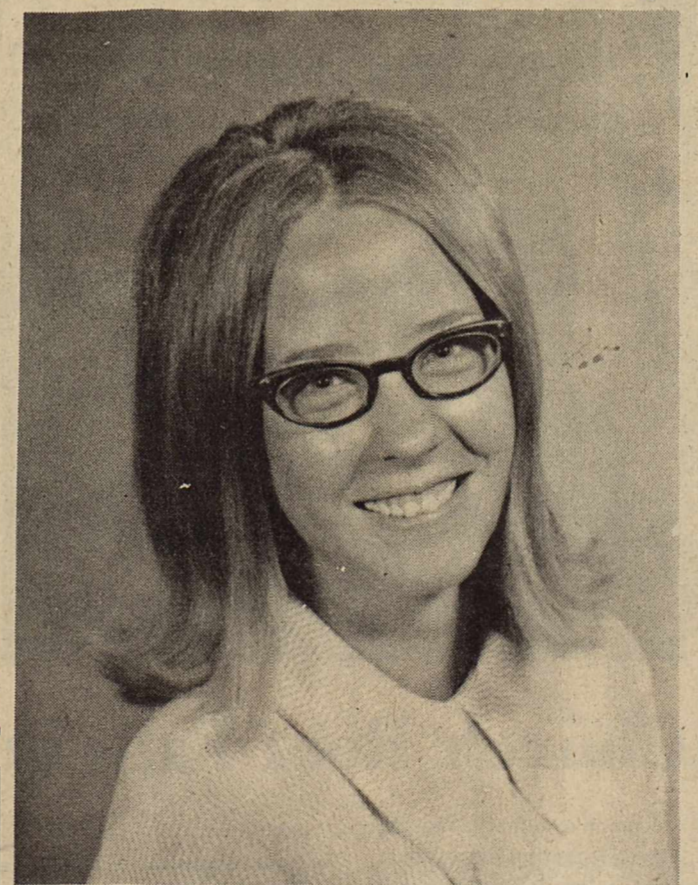


Wedding Coming Up

AUSTIN -- Details of a new program which will provide free 1972 automobile license plates to some disabled veterans were revealed today by the Texas Highway Department.

The program was set up by an act of the 62nd Legislature. To qualify, an applicant must:

- Be a Texas resident;
- Be a veteran of the armed forces of the United States;
- Have a disability rating of 70 per cent or more;
- Be drawing compensation from the Federal government as the result of service-connected disability.

A qualified veteran is entitled to register one passenger car or light commercial vehicle with a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of one ton or less for his own use without paying the proscribed registration fee. There is a statutory fee of \$1 which must accompany each application.

Specially designed license plates will be issued with the letters "DV" appearing as either a prefix or suffix to the license number. The words "Disables Vet" also will appear on the plates.

Vehicles with Disabled Vet plates will be exempt from paying parking fees charged by any governmental authority other than the federal government. This includes parking meters.

The license plates will not be available until the beginning of the 1972 registration year. The law provides that the disabled veteran must make application by October 1 preceding the registration year for which the plates are requested.

All Disabled Vet plates will be issued directly from the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

As a prerequisite, the veteran's disability rating must be verified by the Veteran's Administration or the branch of the armed forces from which he draws his disability compensation.

Also, the Texas title to the vehicle must be issued in the name of the veteran.

Application forms and instructions may be secured from the Texas Highway Department, Motor Vehicle Division, 40th and Jackson Avenue, Austin, Texas 78703.

Internal Revenue Service

Unfortunately the drought has forced many livestock owners to sell a part or all of their herd. The Internal Revenue Service provides a modified form of tax relief on the sale of livestock due to a drought. You are not required to pay taxes on any profit that you make on the sale of your herd (provided your sales for the year are in excess of normal sales) if you re-invest within two years with the same type of herd. An extension of this period beyond two years may be granted by the Commissioner of Internal Revenue Service in exceptional cases. Publication 225, the Farmers Tax Guide, spells out all the requirements on drought sales of livestock on pages 36 through 40. Local county agents and Internal Revenue Service offices have free copies of the Farmers Tax Guide available for you. IRS advises farmers considering a drought sale to obtain a Farmers Tax Guide and carefully check the rules in advance.

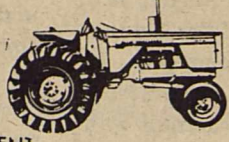

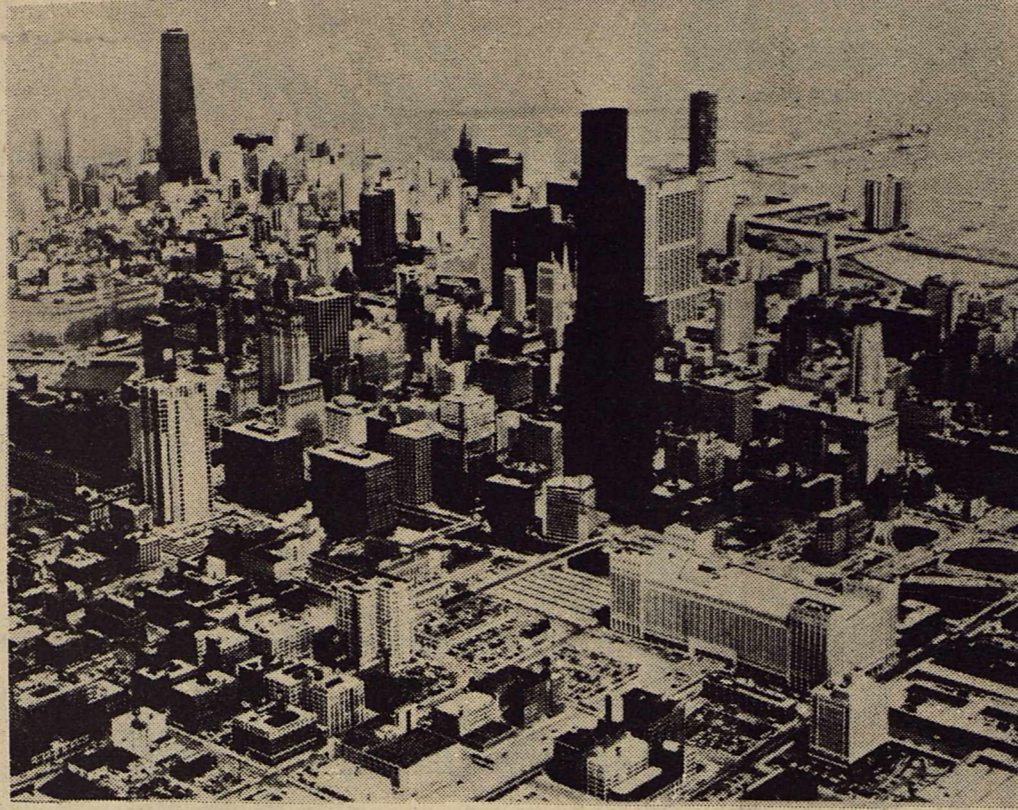

Chicago's 'Big John' needs Sears' catalogue

CHICAGO — Big John is going to have something to look up to.

Big John is the name Chicagoans have affectionately given the 100-story John Hancock Center and the something he'll be looking up to is the \$100 million, 109-story Sears Tower now under construction.

Foundation work on what will be the world's tallest building is well under way, with completion of the over-all project scheduled for early 1974.

A total of 201 caissons are in place, including 114 to bedrock 100 feet down. First steel is expected on the site toward the end of summer.

At 1,450 feet, Sears Tower, at the west edge of Chicago's downtown section, will far surpass any buildings standing today, under construction or on the drawing boards.

Slated for second place in the skyscraper derby is the World Trade Center in New York City, which, when completed, will rise 1,350 feet above street level.

The Empire State Building, currently the tallest at 1,250 feet, will slip to third place. Standard Oil of Indiana is putting up what will be the fourth tallest structure in the world and the second tallest in Chicago at 1,136 feet.

And in fifth place, the Hancock Center which, at 1,127

feet, now ranks as Chicago's tallest. Actually, the Empire State Building will still have some claim to fame because, with its television antennas, its total height is 1,472 feet.

There will be no TV antenna atop Sears Tower — at least no one is talking about one at this time — because the building itself will be as tall as it can go without causing the Federal Aviation Agency a kingsized headache.

FAA officials note that Sears Tower will rise 2,049 feet above mean sea level, the same as Big John with its two TV antennas. If either building were one foot taller, all aircraft cruising over Chicago would have to fly 1,000 feet higher than they do now.

"It would be a very significant foot," said William Marcks, chief of the air space division in the Chicago area FAA office.

When Sears Tower is completed, it will become the world's largest private commercial building with more than 4.4 million square feet. Chicago's Merchandise Mart now holds that title with 4.2 million square feet. Only the pentagon is larger with 6.5 million square feet.

The Tower will be the new national headquarters of Sears which long ago outgrew its 17-building complex on the city's West Side. Sears massive catalog order plant will remain in the old facility.

Ultimately, the Tower will

provide work space for 16,500 persons, including 7,000 Sears employees. Sears will occupy slightly more than half of the available floor space, with the remainder set aside for rental to commercial and office tenants.

Boutiques and restaurants will be on the street level and three lower levels, and an observation deck will be housed on the 103rd floor, 1,350 feet up.

The 102 high-speed elevators, including 14 unique double-decked units, will zoom workers to their jobs. Sky lobbies are planned for the 33rd-34th and 66th-67th floors. The double-decked elevators will serve two floors at the same time.

Sears Tower will be sheathed in black aluminum, punctuated by bronze-tinted windows that will create "a feeling of depth."

Designed by Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, an architect partnership founded in Chicago in 1936, Sears Tower will have a 49-story base, with three "step-backs" at the 50th, 66th and 90th stories.

One problem which Sears Tower is likely to bring about concerns television transmission. It is feared the building, because of its immense size, will interfere with the reception of local stations which transmit their signals from atop Big John.

The interference could extend as far as the suburbs, with a total blackout feared for some areas.

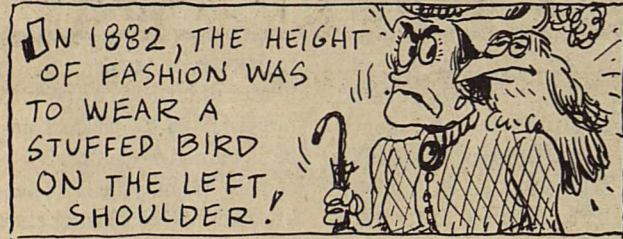

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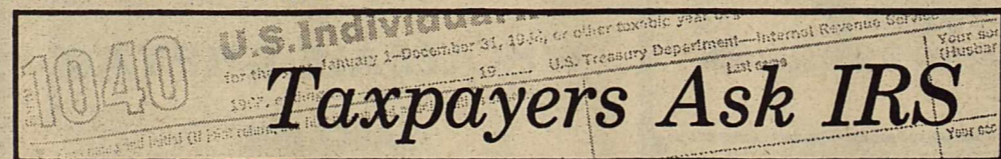

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) More than a month ago I requested that tax be withheld on my pension, but I've noticed no change in the amount of my pension check. Doesn't my old firm have to start withholding immediately?

A) The payer of your pension does not have to begin withholding until three months after you filed your Form W-4P, Annuitant's Request for Federal Income Tax Withholding.

Although withholding is optional on your part, the payer must comply with your request to withhold tax.

Q) I do a lot of traveling on my new job. What kind of records should I keep?

A) Your records should show amounts, dates, destinations and business purpose. A diary or similar record, supported by items such as canceled checks and paid bills, is acceptable if entries are made

when the costs are incurred. For more information obtain a copy of IRS Publication 463, Travel, Entertainment and Gift Expenses. It's available free from your local IRS office.

Q) Can I still deduct my stock market losses dollar-for-dollar from my capital gains?

A) Yes, these losses can still be used to offset capital gains. However, if you have a net long-term capital loss, each \$1 of the loss can be used to offset only 50¢ of ordinary income. A net short-term capital loss can still be used to reduce ordinary income on a dollar-for-dollar basis. Net capital loss deductions are generally limited to \$1,000.

Q) I saw a notice on the bulletin board at work that some people may not have enough tax withheld this year. How do I find out if I'm one of them?

A) Estimate your 1971 tax liability and the amount of tax that will be withheld based on your current withholding. This can be done from tables the IRS has given your employer. If you should find more withholding is needed, you should claim fewer exemptions and, if necessary, have additional dollar amounts withheld. You can do this by filing a new exemption certificate (Form W-4) with your employer.

Q) Is it true that I can claim a credit on the tax I pay on the gas and oil I use for my boat?

A) Yes. When you file your return next year, you may claim a credit of 2¢ per gallon for gasoline and a credit of 6¢ per gallon for lubricating oil. Be sure to keep adequate records to substantiate your credits. When you file your return use Form 4136 to claim the credit. IRS Publication 378, Federal Gas Tax Credit or Refund for Non-highway and Transit Users, may be helpful. Send a postcard to your local IRS office to obtain a copy.

ORDINANCE NO. 54
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF ORDINANCE NO. XII, DATED SEPTEMBER 22, 1952 OF THE CITY OF PLAINS TEXA, RECORDED ON PAGE 38 OF THE ORDINANCE BOOK OF SAID CITY; AMENDING CERTAIN SECTIONS AND ESTABLISHING NEW RATES FOR THE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE, TRASH AND RUBBISH AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF

WHEREAS, the collection and disposal of garbage, etc is necessary to protect the public health and welfare and improve the appearance of the City and;

WHEREAS, after thorough study and consideration the Mayor and City Council of Plains, Texas deems it to be in the best interests of said City to make revisions of the above named ordinance;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF PLAINS, TEX AS:

SECTION 1 Section 16 of the above mentioned ordinance, dated September 22, 1952 be amended to hereinafter read as follows:

There shall be charges assessed and collected from each household, firm or corporation possessing a City water tap within the City limits of Plains, Texas for the collection and disposal of garbage, trash and rubbish. Said service charges to be a part of the regular monthly utility bill and subject to the rules and penalties as set forth in Ordinance No. 52, dated April 28, 1970 and recorded on page 219 of the ordinance book of the City of Plains, Texas.

SECTION 2. Aforesaid charges to be as follows:

Family residence, per month - \$2.00
Commercial - \$3.50

Customers to furnish barrels for containers which are to be placed adjacent to alley or street so as to be accessible to the collection truck. Above charges are to cover day to day usual accumulation. Removal of extraordinary accumulations such as old abandoned appliances, cars, trees, limbs and other trash, the charges to be negotiated with the sanitary Superintendent.

SECTION 3 Owing to recent additional requirements by the State Health Department relative to pollution, the environment, etc., the Mayor and City Council having declared an emergency; that this ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction and take effect and be in full force this day of its passage.

Passed at a regular meeting of the City Council of said City, this 27th day of July, 1971.

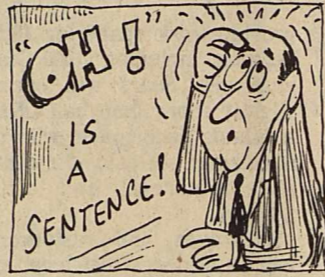
