Old Landmark Coming Down

A landmark of Carbon is coming down and work is expected to be completed possibly this week by a crew out of Dallas which started work last week to dismantle the old water cower which was constructed tack in about 1940 by Swift Peanut Company. The water was pureped by an electric pump from a deep well to the tower which furnishe water for the employes which numbered around 50. Women were employed to han clean the peaouts as they were run out on a belt by machinery. But modern machinery replaced ne "hand pickers" several years ago.

The Gorman Peanut Company bought the plant several years ago and the machinery was sent to a plant in Durant, Okla, a part of the local plant, who found a use for the machinery. The buildings are used for storage of peanuts and also houses the office where peanuts are bought during the harvest. So Carbon is still a part of the County's largest resource, the Peanut.

The well will be on a pump and the water will be used by employes, but the familiar sight of the old water tower we have grown so use to seeing will be no more. It has beer said by former citizens who were returning to Carb n to visit and maybe traveled a long distance, that when they saw the familiar water tower they knew they would soon be to Carbon.

Short Season And Low Bag Limit For Duck Hunters

AUSTIN — Hunters disappointed over the short duck season and low bag limit may find some consolation in the snow and blue geese possibilities. There is every indication that there will be a heavy migration of these two species into Texas again this year, according to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The duck season will begin November 18 and close December 17, running for 30 days only, with a bag limit of 3 per day, and 6 in possession. The season is closed on redheads, canvasbacks and blackbellied tree ducks. Under the seasonal limits offered by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Texas could have had a 40-day season, for a 2 duck kill. However, the Commission felt that it would be better in Texas to increase the bag limit and shorten the season. This, in effect, will give hunters an opportunity for a better kill.

These dates were also set because, in surveys of recent years by the Commission waterfowl biologists, this was found to be the big success period of the season.

The goose season will be 60 days, beginning November 3 and closing January 1. The limit will be 5 a day, and 5 in possesion. This limit may include 2 Canadas or one speckled belly and one Canada. It may include, in addition, 3 snows or blues, or it will be possible to have 5 snows and-or blues with no specs or honkers.

The duck season will open at 12 noon the first day, and the hours will be from sunrise to sunset thereafter. The goose season will open at sunrise the first day, and will close at sun-



Have You Ever Been Hungry

Visualize a line starting from your front door, made up of the hungry of the world - many ragged and disease-ravaged, with pinched faces.

The line goes on out of sight over continent and ocean, around the world - 25,000 miles - and returns to your front door.

On and on it stretches, circling the globe not twice, not five times, but twenty-five, and there is no one in the line but hungry, suffering humanity. . .

If you drove ten hours a day, averaging fifty miles an hour, it would take you three and a half years to cover the length of the present line. What is more, as populations increase it is expanding over twenty miles a day.

The CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program) program of Eastland County is one answer to this program of hungry people. In this program everyone has an opportunity to help alleviate the needs of people around the world who are hungry.

Here is what is being done in Eastland County for the CROP program. In each community there is a chairman who will contact the farmers asking them to give any number of bags of peanuts to CROP. The peanuts will be tagged and left with the buyer and later picked up and placed in a warehouse until they are shelled and sent overseas.

If you do not have peanuts to give, then you can give cash. This may be sent to Mr. Lee Starr, Rt. 3, Cisco, Texas, or given to the Community Chairman.

Here is an opportunity for every one in Eastland County to have a part in making this a great outpouring of our goods for those who have not enough to feed themselves and their children.

A veteran West Texas Congressman, Omar Burleson of Anson, has been named by President Kennedy as a Member of the U. S. delegation to the United Nations' Fall meeting and, after considerable soulsearching Mr. Burleson has accepted the invitation.

Mr. Burleson, as down to earth as a field of grain sorghum, long has looked with a jaundiced eye at much of the UN operation. Like most of the rest of us, the Anson Congressman, now in his eighth term, has good reason to believe that the international debating society is far short of what it ought to be. Therefore, he has been critical of much of the doings of UN figures and has not hesitated to speak up.


However, Mr. Burleson decided that as a sometime critic of the UN, he could not conscientiously decline the request that he be part of the U. S. delegation during the approaching recess. "If we run away from the things we don't agree with, I'm not sure we have the right to criticize them," he said.

Mr. Burleson noted in his acceptance, however, that he will not go to New York and be any part of a "rubber stamp." He told the State Department be fore accepting that he would "cal 'em as I see 'em," referring to U. S. attitudes on UN matters, and the State Department people said that's what they'd want him to do. So Mr. Burleson will go to New York to be a reasonable, but in no way a vaccillating ,individual we're glad he's to be part of the U. S. UN delegation this autumn. His common sense point of view conceivably could level off some of the more "intellectual" approaches to UN problems as they affect this country and we know for sure there will be at least one firm voice on our delegation fighting all the way It will be interesting to watch the gentleman from West Texas
