Wolverines Win First League Game On Penetrations Friday

In the Wolverines' first conference game of the season played with Strawn there last Friday night, the score ended 26-26, but Carbon moved the ball farther for penetration counting, to hand Strawn a defeat in the 6-man game.

In the first quarter Weldon Cook made a 30-yard run and later with a 10-yard run scored. No other scores were made in the first quarter.

Strawn scored in the second quarter, but failed to make the extra point, making the score 6-6. When Strawn kicked off to Carbon, Eddie Frasier snagged the ball and darted for a 65-yard run. On the next play Marvin Cates ran 20 yards for another TD.

Cates later intercepted a Strawn pass to put the ball back on Carbon's side. The Wolverines

lost the ball back and Strawn ran another TD and scored extra points.

With the help of a fumble Cates picked up and ran 30 yards to carry the ball over the goal line. Strawn scored after receiving the ball from Carbon and made extra points, putting the score at 20-18. Cates ran it over again for Carbon and kicked the extra point. Strawn scored again but failed on extra.

The game ended with Carbon on the one-yard line. Weldon Cook received an injury to his collar bone which had been injured in a previous game, and will be out for the rest of the season.

We play Lueders here Thursday night, Oct. 19, and this is expected to be another good game.

Leon Watershed Plan Submitted To Congress With Administrative O. K.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Omar Burleson has announced that Administrative approval has been given the Northeast Tributaries of the Leon River Watershed plan. This is a watershed protection, flood prevention project embracing 202,830 acres in Comanche, Erath and Eastland Counties, in the areas of Cow, Armstrong and Besley Creeks, tributaries to the Leon River.

In accordance with Public Law 536, the Secretary of Agriculture

has submitted the plan to the Agriculture Committee of the House of Representatives for final consideration and approval. In view of adjournment, it will be the first of the next session before the committee will be able to take it up.

The estimated total cost of the project is \$3,025,952. Of this amount federal money in the sum of \$2,365,831.00 is provided, with the balance of \$660,121 to come from local and other funds.

Local sponsors of the project are the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District, Palo Pinto Soil Conservation District, Erath County Commissioners Court, and Comanche County Commissioners Court.

Brazil Man Visits County To Study Production Of Peanuts

ERafael M. Ruiz of Campinas, Sao Paula, Brazil, was in the Rising Star area last week, studying peanut production, harvesting methods, drying and storage in this county.

The itinerary worked out for him by County Agent J. M. Cooper was designed so that he might see as much as possible in four days in the county. It included Rising Star where he inspected peanut harvesting equipment at the Shults Implement Company with Bob Shults as instructor. He also visited a farm nearby where he saw peanuts being harvested with a combine.

With Cooper he also visited several peanut farms near Carbon and Gorman. In the latter city he visited with officials of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Ass'n and inspected drying shelling and storage facilities at the Gorman Peanut Co.

According to the county agent, Ruiz is with an agricultural experiment station in Brazil. He also owns and operates a small coffee plantation.

Fluent in English, Spanish and Italian as well as Portuguese, the native language of Brazil, Ruiz came to the U. S. in June and was to leave in late October. He studied English in high school.

Eastland County School administrators voted to go on record as opposed to the proposed high school consolidation plan at a meeting in Gorman Thursday night, according to Dean Kirk of Gorman, secretary of the group. Mr. Kirk added that seven school boards of the county have gone on record against the plan.

Very little Brazilian peanuts are made into peanut butter or candy. His people are fond of eating them roasted, however.

Motor Vehicles Safety Inspection Begins In State

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, suggested today the start of fall "is an excellent time to have motor vehicles safety inspected" in preparation for hard winter driving.

The new 1962 Texas Vehicle Inspection Sticker is now available at the 5,000 official inspection stations in compliance with orders issued by the Texas Public Safety Commission. The order states that all vehicles coming under the provisions of the Vehicle Inspection Act must display the new sticker by April 16, 1962.

Garrison said that during the past three months mechanics at inspection stations over the state have undergone an intensive training program on the inspection of vehicles under the law.

"There have been no changes in the Inspection Law from last year," he explained, "but we have reexamined every mechanic in the program to be certain vehicles having a defect that was a causative factor in motor vehicle accidents have steadily decreased."

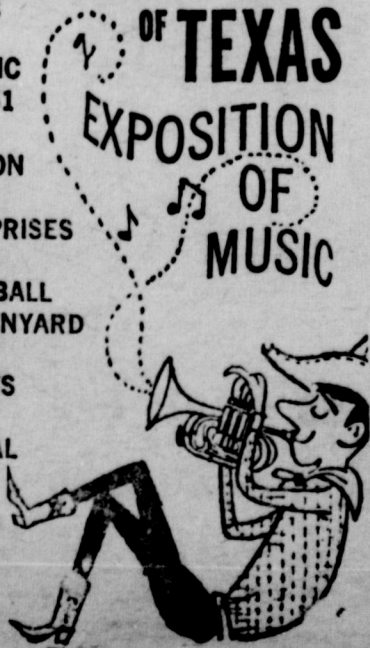

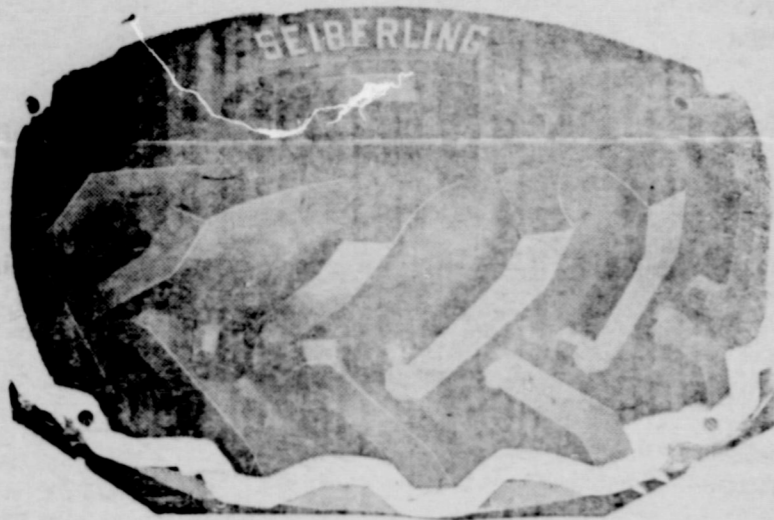
