Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District was recipient of the "Goodyear Award" in general assembly at the annual meeting of

the Conservation District Directors in San Antonio.

Those attending were Loren and Velma Gayle, Edwin Livengood, Murrell and Helen Thompson, Dick McGinty and Bob White.

The annual meeting, held Oct. 7-9, is mandated by law to be held once a year to take care of the conservation business in the state.

The award received by the local district is the highest award for outstanding service and achievement that a conservation district can receive.

Chairman Loren Gayle said, "We are proud to have been chosen for this award and we are going to try to continue to give the people of our district the best service possible."

He was a trustee at-large for the Plains Independent School District several years.

A lifetime member of the Stamford Cowboy's Reunion Association, he served the organization as president.

He was a member of the Plains Church of Christ.

Survivors include his wife, Lucia of the home; four sons, Raymond and Nancy of Navajo, Az., Maynard Edd and Betty of Borger,

## Cowboys Take A Fall

Friday night, Oct. 11, was the first game of district action for the Plains Cowboys as they squared off against the Shallowater Mustangs in Cowboy Stadium. After four hard-hitting quarters, the result was a disappointing 17 point loss for the Cowboys. Collectively, this makes the sixth game of the Cowboy season and advances the 1985 record to 3 wins, 3 losses.

The first quarter was an explosive one for the Cowboys, as they came onto the field and quickly took the initiative. On the first play of the game, senior Mickey McMinn covered a Mustang fumble and gave Plains possession of the ball on the Shallowater 33. Starting from this point, the Cowboys executed a thirty yard drive, putting senior Billy Curtis in excellent position for the field goal that followed. Curtis split the uprights and the Cowboys were on top 3-0. As the quarter progressed, the Cowboys continued to bank on Mustang fumbles. The third turnover of the night once again found Plains inside Shallowater territory at the 35. This time, the Cowboys made the drive count as

quarterback Shane McMinn drilled the ball to Curtis for a 35 yard touchdown completion. And as the first quarter clock expired, the Cowboys led by a score of 10-0.

Coming into the second quarter, the Cowboys started to lose momentum against the Shallowater air attack. Taking advantage of the first Cowboy fumble of the night, Shallowater quarterback Davey Rhodes took to the air and found receiver Tim Lennon in the endzone for a 15 yard score. This bad break was the first in a long line of turnovers for the Cowboys. Next, with 5:01 left in the half, the Mustangs recovered another Cowboy fumble at the 35 and penetrated the endzone again. This time, a 35 yard pass to Lennon brought about the score and jumped the Mustangs ahead of the Cowboys 14-10. With the last minutes of the half winding down, the Cowboys weren't able to play catch-up and the buzzer sounded with a 4 point Shallowater lead.

Taking the field after the half, both teams were able to cut down on the number of turnovers, but penalties soon became a problem. In all, both teams were penalized

almost 200 yards during the course of the game. Also, as the third quarter began, the Cowboys seemed unable to stop the Shallowater passing attack. With 8:40 left on the third quarter clock, the Mustangs scored on a 30 yard pass play and upped their lead by 6 points. Adding a good extra point, the score stood with Shallowater ahead by 10. On the Cowboys next drive, they managed to fight their way up to the 38 yard line before having to punt. Taking the ball at the Cowboy 43, the Mustangs this time opted for a ground attack and managed to succeed as number 22, Johnny Revilla, carried the ball in for a touchdown.

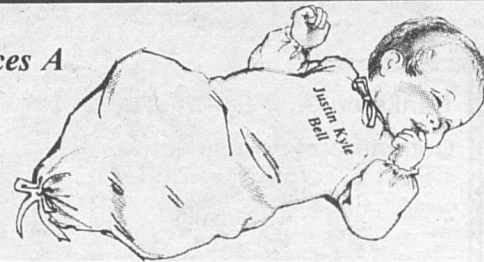
The third quarter came to a close with the Mustangs in the lead 27 to 10.

In the fourth quarter, despite two defiant drives by the Cowboys deep into Mustang territory, Plains could not manage to fight their way back into the game. However, the Cowboy defense did a good job of holding Shallowater's offense, and so the score remained unchanged in the last quarter of play. The final point tally of the game was Shallowater 27 and Plains 10.

Next week will be the second week of district play for the Cowboys as they line up against Tahoka in the Bulldog stadium on Friday, Oct. 8.

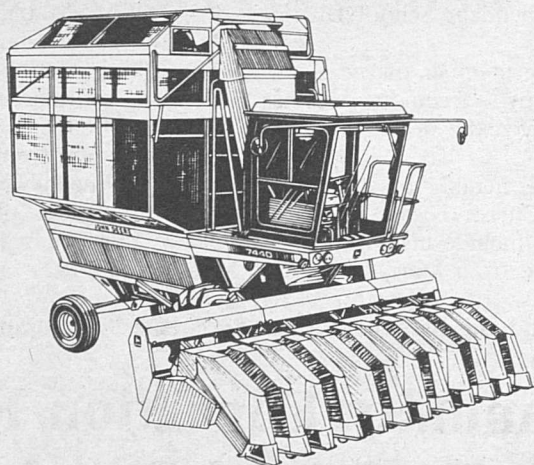

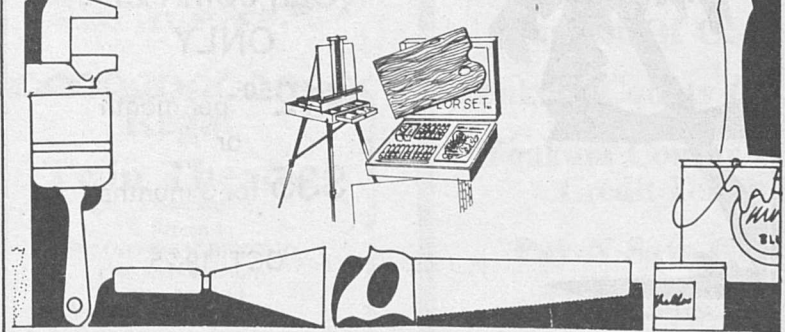

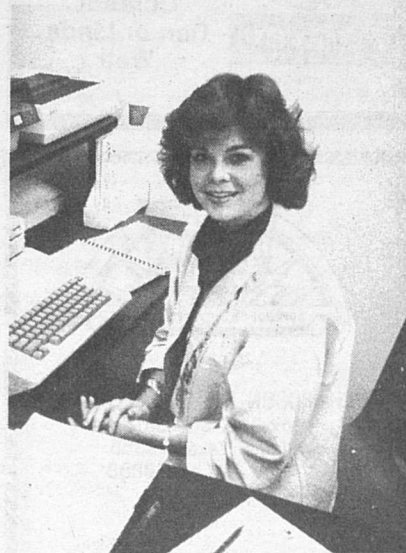

## High School Band Named 'Champs'

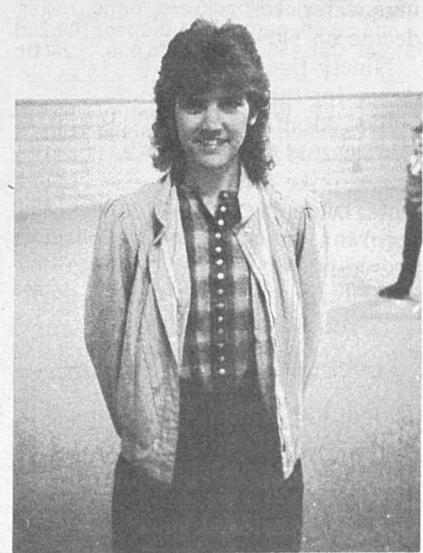

## 'Proposition I & II Needed' Urges Senator John Montford

Senator John Montford was in Plains Friday, Oct. 11 to speak to interested persons about the upcoming water bill which voters will decide on Nov. 5.

Ninety-five persons were in attendance for the dinner.

Sen. Montford was introduced by District Judge Ray Anderson.

He spoke to the group about the state wide water package telling them that it was very important that everyone get out to vote for the amendment.

"Proposition I and II on the ballot are needed. Texas has a great variety of water problems. Houston is sinking because of the ground water underneath the city. In the valley they've got problems, in East Texas, and in North Texas, they've got problems.

"We have never had a default on a water loan in Texas. Proposition I will fund every type of water project from building lakes and dams to constructing pipelines to get water from the wells to the cities, distribution centers, water purification

facilities, water towers, storage tanks, sewage systems...you name it, it is included in Proposition I.

"Just as important is Proposition II. That's a \$200 million water conservation fund for agriculture. Texas is moving to the cities. For the first time, we are able to set up \$10 million as a permanent trust fund for agriculture. It's a permanent fund designated for agriculture. It is dedicated for research, brush control, secondary recovery, injection wells, just about every idea in new technology to help our water problems. The conservation plan is designed to help all Texans. We need to pass it and we need to turn out and vote."



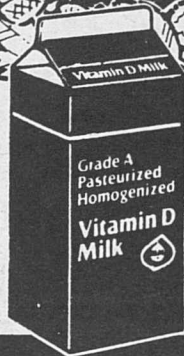

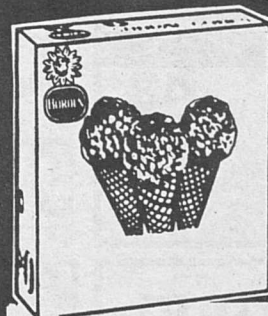
