

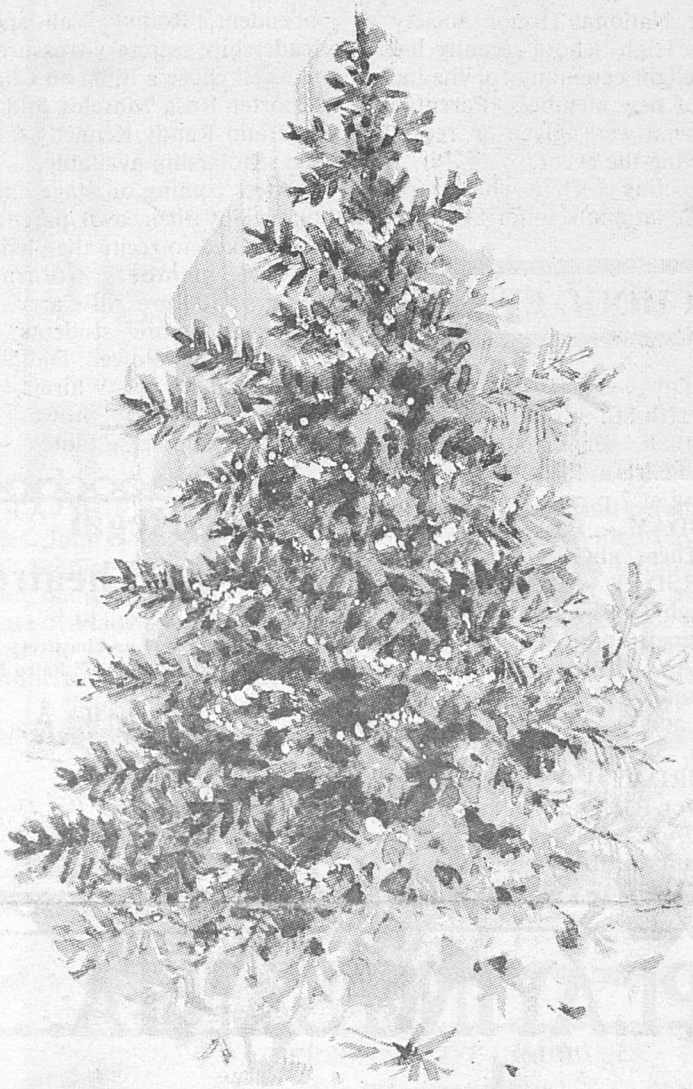

Christmas Tree Lighting Planned For December 11

An old fashioned "Christmas Tree Lighting" has been planned as an annual event for Plains. Persons throughout the community have been involved in the preparations for the big event that will begin at 6 p.m., Wednesday, Dec. 11.

Chamber of Commerce president, David Bunch will flip the switch promptly at 6:40 p.m., setting aglow the myriad of lights adorning the 10' Scotch pine tree that is to be planted in Pioneer Plaza.

Judge Paul Cobb will serve as master of ceremonies for the program. A community choir, under direction of Denis King, will lead everyone in singing of Christmas carols. Plains High School Band will play Christmas selections under the direction of Bill Shipp and Bill Strickler.

The Rev. Louis Crenshaw will read the Christmas story from the Scriptures of the Bible.

Weather permitting, Santa Claus will make an early stop in Plains to greet the boys and girls.

Eighteen persons attended a planning session Wednesday afternoon to finalize preparations for the event. Jim Barron was moderator. Barron and Edwin Livengood helped with the selection of the tree, which has been donated by Wesley and Barbara Harris of Harris Nursery.

Co-ordinated by the Chamber of Commerce, the Christmas Tree Association, will host the tree lighting event. The City of Plains, represented by Viola Walker, will donate the needed electricity.

David Bunch of Lea County Electric and City electrician, Rick Wickersham, are in charge of wiring and connecting the lights. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Young donated lights to decorate the Plaza.

Committees named included Debbie Rushing, Shirley Bunch, Kay Chandler and Janice McGill, decorating the tree; Carolyn Culwell and Delores Davis, program coordinators; and Janelle Brantley, representing The Plains Pride, was named Publicity Chairman. Candy Seaton volunteered her services in removing and storing of decorations and lights after Jan. 1, 1986.

Children in kindergarten through fourth grade at Plains Elementary School will present handcrafted ornaments to be placed on the tree.

The T.E.A.M.S. (Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills) test was given to all junior students on Oct. 1 and 2, 1985. The examination was divided into two sections, math and language arts and was administered by Arlon Alexander. The Texas Education Agency requires that a student must pass both parts prior to receiving a high school diploma.

Of the twenty-six students taking the math section of the test, twenty-one scored mastery. Twenty-five students took the language arts section with twenty-three scoring mastery. Mastery is considered to be correctly answering seventy percent of the questions on the examination. Plains I.S.D. will provide remedial instruction to all students who do not master all parts of the T.E.A.M.S. test.

The Texas Education Agency projected that seventy-six percent of the students in Texas schools would master the language arts section of the test, and seventy-five percent would master the math. In Plains ninety-two percent of our students mastered the language arts and eighty-one percent mastered the math portion. These percentages are above state projections, however we will not be satisfied until we have one hundred percent mastery.

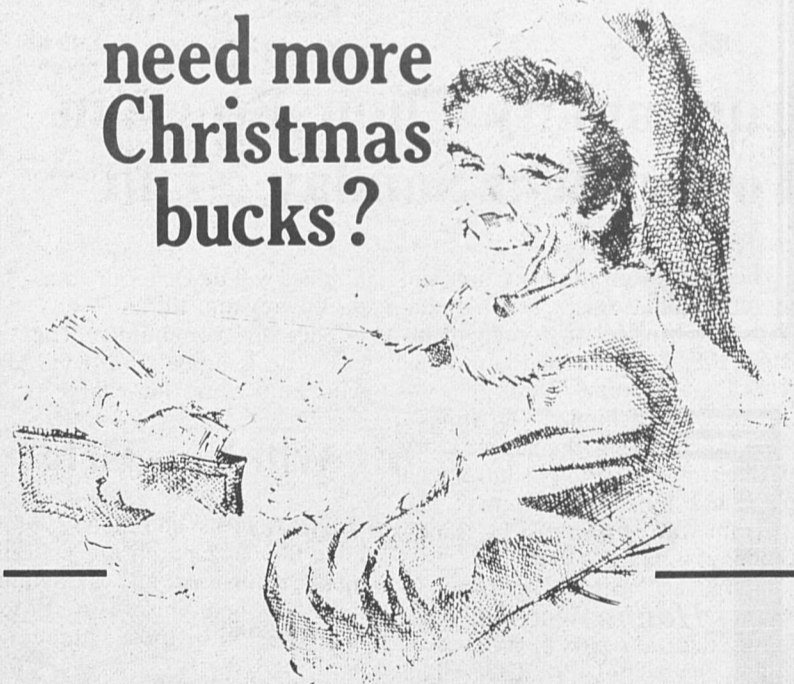

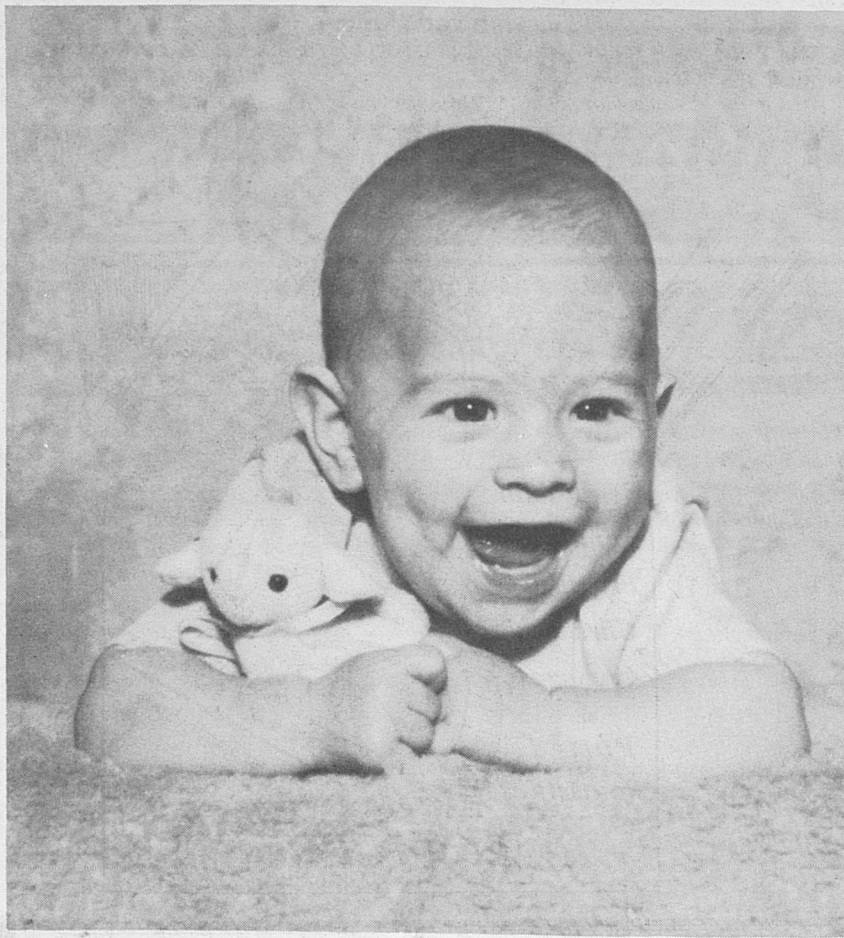

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR OIL & GAS WASTE DISPOSAL WELL PERMIT

Whirlwind Enterprises, Box 120, Plains, Texas 79355 has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to dispose of produced salt water or other oil and gas waste by well irrigation into a porous formation not productive of oil or gas.

The applicant proposes to dispose of oil and gas waste into the Pennsylvanian and Wolfcamp, O.M. Nelson Lease, Well Number 1. The proposed disposal well is located 5 miles west of Plains in the Bahaney NW Devonian Field, in Yoakum County. The waste water will be injected into strata in the sub surface depth interval from 5800 to 11,200 feet.

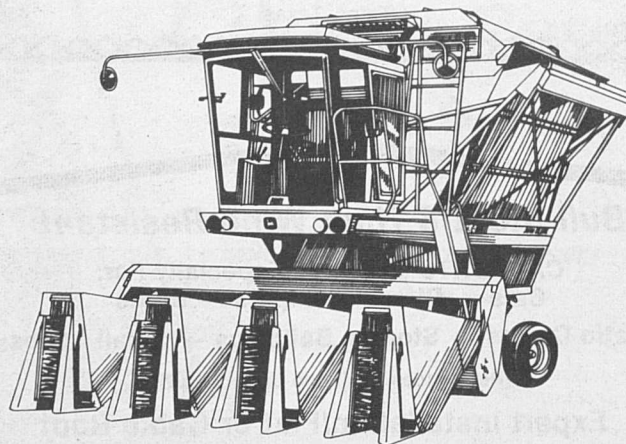



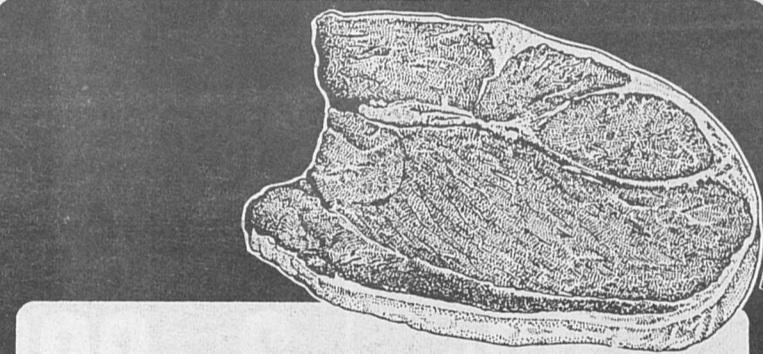
