Candidates for District Attorney are Warren New and Linda Lowrey. Mae Barnett will be opposed by Stella Garner for the District Clerk's post. Ruby Bruton is unopposed in her re-election bid as County Clerk.

## Expansion \& Remodeling Completed At Plains Jr. High

Parents of junior high students and all other interested persons are invited to visit the recently completed renovation of Plains Junior High School building. Jimmy Conner, principal, extends the invitation.
Students have been using the new facility the past six weeks. All that is original in the structure are the exterior walls and terrazzo tile floors in the main east-west corridors.
Reconstruction began in November 1984 by Monterey Construction of Wolforth. Architects were BGR Architects and Engineers of Lubbock. Total cost of the project, completed this week, was \$816,996.
South wall of the building has been extended eight feet to provide an additional five classrooms and commons area near students lockers. That area is furnished with tables and chairs for study and social activities. Offices and the teacher's workroom have been enlarged.

## Irrigation Analysis Need Cited By Edwin Livengood

A good yield at the end of the year is often determined by the amount of stored soil moisture at planting time. If the plant root zone is filled with soil moisture at planting time, it will get crops off to a good start as well as provide a large portion of the total water needs of the crop during the growing season, according to Edwin Livengood of the Soil Conservation Service.
If soil moisture conditions are not at field capacity, farmers should make every effort to maximize the harvest of precipitation between now and planting time to fill the soil profile with water

Toward the end of the growing season, crops grown in this area utilize more water per day than most irrigators' wells have the capacity to
supply. Stored soil moisture can make up the difference, and thus return tremendous dividends at harvest time.
The SCS is now making appointments for irrigation system evaluations. Anyone wishing to know how to make his irrigation system more efficient, should set up a time for a complete irrigation analysis, Livengood said.

2 \#2 cans cooked dried blackeyed peas
OR:
3 c frozen blackeyed peas, cooked 1 c salad oil
$1 / 4 \mathrm{c}$ wine vinegar
1 clove garlic or garlic seasoning
$1 / 4$ c thinly sliced onion (I prefer green onions and use the tops also) $1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$ salt
pepper to taste
Drain peas and place in a pan or bowl, add remaining ingredients, and mix. Store in a jar in refrigerator; remove garlic clove after one day - at least 2 days before serving - up to 2 weeks
Red Kidney beans could be substituted for the blackeyed peas.

Peel 1 lb raw shrimp; wash well and put in a pan and cover with: 2 T finely chopped parsley
2 cloves garlic, minced
1 c salad oil
Leave in the refrigerator all day and night, too (if time allows). When ready to serve, place on a shallow pan with the oil that clings to them and broil 3 mins. on each side. Salt lightly. (VERY LITTLE)
Be sure not to overcook as they will be tough. If small shrimp are used just broil 2 mins. on each side. Serve speared with toothpicks.

Sift flour, baking powder, salt and soda together and add to liquid and fruit. Mix well; add nuts. Bake in greased loaf pan at $350^{\circ}$ for $50-60$ mins. Cool in pan.

## Restricted Use Classification

## Labeled On Certain Chemicals

Certain granular formulations of pesticides containing any one of five active ingredients - aldicarb (Temik), carbofuran (Furadan), disulfoton (Di-Syston), phorate (Thimet) and terbufos (Counter) have recently been classified as restricted use pesticides by the Environmental Protection Agency Some, possibly all, of the pesticide products subject to the classification action that are currently available locally may bear restricted use labeling. Restricted use pesticide products may be used only by or under the direct supervision of a certified applicator.
Yoakum County producers who anticipate use of any of the granular formulations of the five active ingredients affected by this action and who are not currently certified may wish to qualify for certification as private applicators. A producer of agricultural commodities may qualify for certification as a private applicator by submitting a completed questionnaire to the Texas Department of Agriculture following a review of training materials, according to David Kight, County Extension Agent. Materials for use in obtaining private applicator certification through home study may be obtained at the county Extension office.
Producers, previously certified as

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private applicators, who no longer hold their private applicator certificate may direct inquiries regarding reissuance of the certificate to the Texas Department of Agriculture. Forms for use in making the inquiry are also available at the County Extension Office. The information given herein is for educational purposes only. ## Section Of US 82

To Be Resurfaced
A 14.9 mile section of US 82 from US 380 in Plains to the New Mexico State Line will be resurfaced soon under a contract approved today by the State Highways and Public Transportation Commission.
The work is part of a $\$ 3.7$ million project to improve 190 miles of highway in the highway department's 17 -county Lubbock District, and is a result of improved state highway funding, according to department officials.

A few years ago, the amount of this type of resurfacing work was next to nothing due to lack of funds," said William M. Pope, highway department district during 1986."

The resurfacing, known as a seal coat, protects the road from water and ice damage, and also improves skid resistance. The work on US 82 is scheduled for this summer, and will be done by High Plains Pavers, Inc. of Plainview.
