

# 'Help Prevent Crime' **Requests Sheriff Jimmy Rice**

An appeal is issued to Plains of the perpetrator." residents this week by Yoakum County Sheriff Jimmy Rice. He requests the assistance of all citizens in helping curtail the rash of thefts that have plagued Plains in recent days.

Sheriff Rice said a recent decision by the Supreme Court has placed a strain on the efficiency of the Sheriff's Department.

"If an employee works on a day off," he explained, "he is then entitled to one and a half bonus days off."

"This act has placed an enormous strain on the available source of manpower that we have to patrol the town and county. Coupled with the fact that the City of Plains offers no police protection, this leaves the town vulnerable too often to those who prefer to prey on others rather than seek an honest way to subsist," said Rice.

Rice said that honesty of Plains people have allowed them to live without fear of losing their possessions to those who prey upon others but that this trend is changing.

"Because the same deputy on duty has to cover all the rural area as well as the City of Plains, we are asking the townspeople to lend us their eyes and ears and to assist us in curtailing crime within our city and county," Rice asks. "If anyone observes any person

or suspicious activity within his or her neighborhood, we ask you to immediately report it to our office, regardless how insignificant it may appear. All calls will be followed up and we feel that this in itself will curtail or possibly lead to the arrest



Rice said the Texas Rangers and surrounding law enforcement agencies and other branches of law enforcement are involved in helping his department recover stolen items and curtail criminal activity.

"We sincerely and urgently request your help and cooperation in observing and reporting anything out of the routine," says Rice. "With your help we feel we can make Plains and the community a safer and better place to live. Without it, we in law enforcement are sorely outnumbered. The con-cept of Neighbor-Watching-Neighbor has proven to be one of the most effective tools of our trade. We encourage it to be a part of your daily routine."

Sheriff Rice suggests that persons seeing a suspicious vehicle in their neighborhoods should try to obtain the license number and immediately contact the Sheriff's office, 456-2377.







# **Farmers' Meeting** Will Be Held

A number of farmers in Yoakum County may be eligible to par-ticipate in the Conservation Reserve Program of the recently passed farm bill. Meetings will be held Feb. 25 in Lubbock and Feb. 26 in Abilene to help explain the program to area farmers.

The program is to take erodible cropland out of production and plant it to permanent cover, such as grasses, points out David Kight, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Extension Service working with the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) and Soil Conservation Service (SCS) is conducting five regional meetings across the state in late February to help farmers better understand opportunities in this program.

The meeting Feb. 25 in Lubbock will be from 9 a.m. until noon at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of the Lubbock airport. The center is on FM 1294, just east of I-27 at the Shallowater exit. The Abilene meeting February 26 will be from 9 a.m. until noon in the jury assembly room in the new courthouse.

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Farmers whose land qualifies for the program (as determined by land classifications by the SCS) will be eligible for annual payments over the 10-year life of the contract and cost-sharing on cover establishment practices.

According to SCS records, some 11.5 million acres of Texas cropland will qualify for the Conservation Reserve Program. However, only about 825,000 acres of that will be included in the program this year.

Farmers can check with their local SCS office to determine if any of their crop acreage is eligible for the program. A 10-day sign-up period will be held March 3-14 at county ASCS offices.

Once a farmer determines that his cropland is eligible for the program, he must submit a bid for the annual rent payment on the designated acres, Kight explained. Bids will be reviewed by county and state ASCS personnel, and farmers will then be notified as to whether or not they have been accepted. Annual payments will be limited to \$50,000 per producer.

More details about this new program also are available at the SCS or county Extension office.

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


# May Wedding Planned

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




