## BASIC CREAM PIE

$2 / 3 \mathrm{c}$ flour or $1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ cornstarch
$11 / 2$ c sugar
$1 / 2 \mathrm{t}$ salt
4 c scalded milk
6 slightly beaten egg yolks
4 T margarine
1 t vanilla
2 baked pie shells
6 stiffly beaten egg whites
$1 / 2$ c sugar
Mix flour, sugar and salt. Gradually add milk. Cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils and thickens. Remove from heat, add small amount to egg yolks. Stir into remaining hot mixture. Cook 1 min., stirring constantly. Add butter and vanilla. Cool and pour into baked crusts. Variations: Slice 2 bananas in each pie and pour filling over; 2 c coconut to filling; Chocolate - increase sugar to 2 c and add 2 squares chocolate.

## SHRIMP SALAD

2 c deveined shrimp or 2 c fresh shrimp
1 c chopped celery
$1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ chopped onion
$1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ chopped green bell pepper
3 c cooked macaroni, drained
2 boiled eggs, chopped
Mix all ingredients. Add salt, pepper and mayonnaise to taste.

## BATTER BREAD

2 T sugar
1 pkg yeast
1 c warm water
1 t salt

2 T melted shortening
2 eggs
$13 / 4$ c flour
$1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ oatmeal
1 T dry powdered milk
Dissolve yeast, sugar and salt in
cup of water. Add eggs and shortening. Mix dry ingredients and add all together. Spread in a greased cake pan or baking dish. Pour melted butter over batter and let rise 1 hr , then bake at $350^{\circ}$ until done.

## BANANA NUT CAKE

$11 / 2$ c sugar
$1 / 2$ c butter, melted
$1 / 2 t$ salt
1 t vanilla
2 bananas, mashed
4 T buttermilk
1 t baking powder
$1 / 2$ c pecans
2 eggs
2 c flour
1 t soda
Sift dry ingredients. Beat all liquids and bananas together. Add to dry ingredients and beat with mixer well. Bake at $325^{\circ}$ until done.

ICING
2 c powdered sugar
$1 / 4$ c melted butter
1 banana, mashed
$1 / 2 \mathrm{c}$ pecans
Mix together and spread over cooled cake.

Check Alfalfa For Alfalfa Weevils

This is the time when producers need to examine their alfalfa for the presence of alfalfa weevil larvae, cautions David Kight, Yoakum County Extension Agent for agriculture.

Unseasonably warm weather has resulted in the alfalfa weevils appearing a couple of weeks early this spring.

With the beginning of warm spring weather, overwintering female weevils begin laying eggs. The young larvae which hatch out are very small, yellow-green in color and feed in the growing tips and developing buds. Older larvae are green with a white stripe down their back.
"We expect to have our peak alfalfa weevil activity around April 1st in our area.
If larvae numbers are high enough to reach the economic threshold, one properly timed application should give control. Treatments should be applied in alfalfa two to six inches tall when two or more larvae are found per plant or when 30 to 50 percent of the plant terminals show weevil feeding damage. Plants 7 to 14 inches tall should be treated when 25 or more weevil larvae per square foot are present. Several effective insecticides are registered for alfalfa weevil control.
The alfalfa weevil has only one generation per year and is only a pest of first cutting, said Kight. After the larvae finish feeding, usually by mid May in our area, the larvae spins a net-like cocoon on the plant or in the soil debris. The adult weevil emerges from this cocoon and leaves the field. The weevils stay out of the alfalfa fields all summer and re-enter them in the fall. The adults overwinter in the field and the cycle then repeats itself.
Since the larvae are a pest of first cutting, it is sometimes possible to cut a little earlier than usual and avoid chemical treatments. Cutting results in exposure and a lack of food which kills many of the remaining larvae. Winter grazing by livestock helps reduce weevil populations also. For more information on this subject and other information pertaining to agriculture, 4-H and Home Economics, contact the County Extension Office.
