Trackmen Capture District, First Championship Since '68

Plains High School cindermen captured the district track championship last week in the Cowboys Class AA farewell. Plains will be competing in Class A beginning with the 1986-87 school year.

The Cowboys' championship was their first district title in 18 years. The district championship was last won by Plains in 1968.

Trailing by 70 points after the field events, the Cowboys raced to the title in running finals.

Earning berths into regional competition were 1600 meter relay runners Mike Diaz, Randy Kennedy, Roy Caballero and Billy Curtis with a first place district win. Their performance was clocked at 3:34.2.

Joe Rivera will be running the 3200 and 1600 meter runs at regional after winning both events in district competition. His times were 10:55.3 and 5:05.1, respectively. Roger Rivas finished second in the 1600 with 5:15.6 to also nail down a ticket to regional.

Caballero and Diaz will compete in regional 800 meter runs, also. They finished first and second with 2:09.1 and 2:09.8, respectively.

Curtis will also be competing in regional 110 hurdles and 300 hurdles, Martin Barrientes in 110 hurdles and Bryan Baldwin in 300 hurdles. Curtis won first in both events with Barrientes and Baldwin taking runner up spots.

In the 110, Curtis finished 14.7; Barrientes, 15.8 and Baldwin placed 4th with 16.1. In the 300, Curtis ran 42.5; Baldwin, 43.8 and Barrientes, 44.0.

Two PHS Juniors **To Attend Meets**



Bids Accepted From 155 Farmers

Bids on only 31,298 acres of land in Texas were accepted by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Conservation Reserve Program for 1986. Bids were accepted from 155

The state was divided into seven bidding pools. The highest bid accepted for pools 1, 2 and 3 were \$35 per acre on 26,251 acres. These three pools made up the western half of the state.

Bids of up to \$40 per acre were accepted for pools 4, 5 and 6 on 3,511 acres. This area includes South Texas, the Texas Blacklands and East Texas.

Bids up to \$50 per acre were accepted for pool 7 on 1,536 acres; this pool covers the Coastal Prairie and the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Nationally, bids were made by 44,480 farmers on 4.8 million acres. Some 10,307 bids were accepted on 838,356 acres. Accepted bids ranged from \$5 to \$90.

Cropland that is in Land Capability Class VI, VII and VIII or land that appeared to be eroding at greater than 3.5 times the tolerance level at sign-up time is automatically accepted. Land that appeared to be eroding between 2.5 to 3.5 times the

tolerance level was declared questionable; Soil Conservation Service personnel will determine final estimated erosion rates on a field by field visit to this land.

Any questionable land that is determined to be eroding at an estimated rate of more than three times the tolerance level with an acceptable bid will be placed in the

In determining estimated erosion, SCS personnel use the Universal Soil Loss Equation for water erosion and the Wind Erosion Equation for wind erosion.

SCS conservationists are now in the process of preparing conservation plans on land accepted in CRP. Cropland will be planted to grasses and legumes, wildlife plantings, windbreaks or trees.

For land accepted into CRP, farmers will receive their per acre bid annually shortly after October 1 for ten years. They will also receive 50 percent cost-share assistance for establishing permanent vegetation or trees.

The sign-up period for the 1987 reserve is scheduled to begin May 5.

Students Practice Job Application



First step was to select a job inwhich each was interested. Then the students wrote letters of application to go with completed application forms. Resumes were also prepared.


