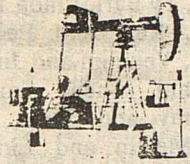

Absentee Voting To End Oct. 31

Persons planning to be away General Election Day Nov. 4 may begin absentee voting Oct. 15 and will continue through Friday, Oct. 31. Absentee ballots may be cast from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays at County Clerk's office in the Courthouse.

Denver City Community Building will be set up as a branch office for absentee voters with Pearl Prewitt serving as deputy clerk.

Voters must present their yellow registration certificate whether voting absentee or voting on election day.

Director Election To Be Held Oct. 6

The Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District will be having a Director Election at 8 p.m. Monday, Oct. 6 in the Library in Plains, according to C.L. Gayle, chairman of the District Board.

The election will be for two directors to serve in Zones 1 and 2 of the District. These zones cover approximately the south one half of Yoakum County.

David Turnbough and R.M. (Bob) Jones are currently serving as directors in these two zones. Turnbough was appointed by the board to replace Henry May after May's resignation. Jones has served as a board member for approximately twenty years, continued Gayle.

New state laws concerning Director Elections state that a director must own land in the zone he or she represents and must reside within the District, which is Yoakum County in our case, added Gayle.

A change, he said, in the law now permits all Yoakum County residents who are 18 years old or older who own farmland or ranchland within the county to vote for election of directors in any of the zones.

"We want to encourage all eligible voters who meet these qualifications to come and vote. We definitely need solid people to represent us in these turbulent and changing times in Agriculture," concluded Gayle.



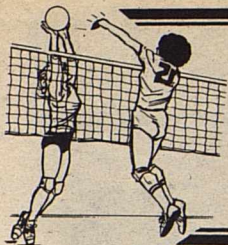

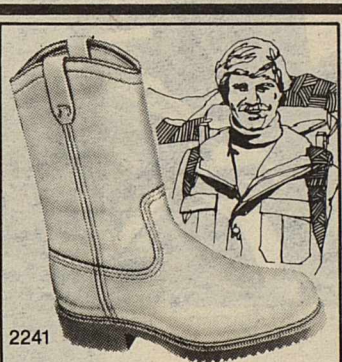
Encouraging the girls to keep up their good work, Coach Pierce added that "working with this group of girls is a real challenge, because their such competitors."

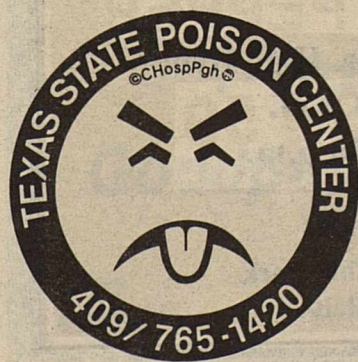
Reunion & Festival To Be Held In DC

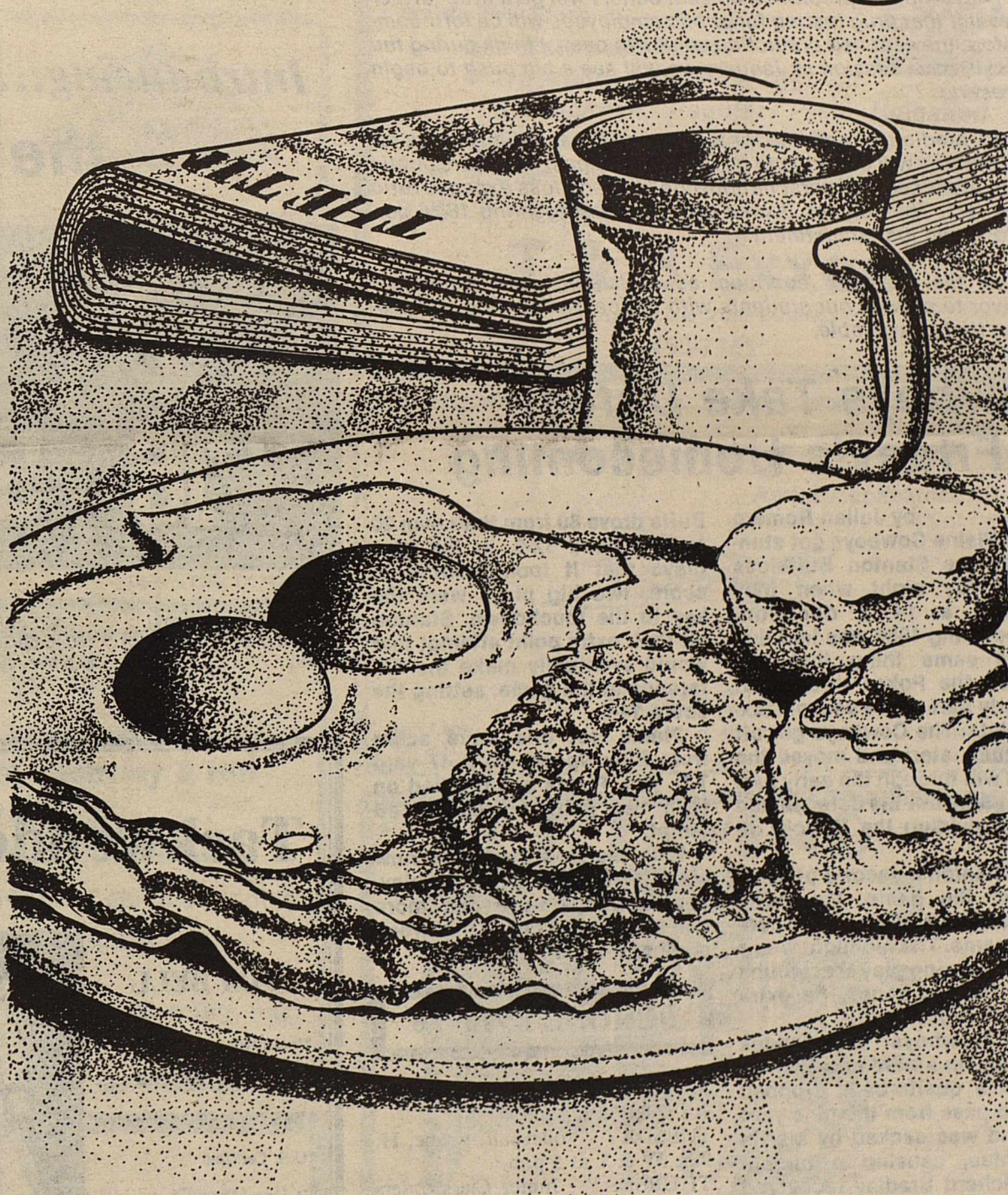

From The Superintendent's Desk

DEAN ANDREWS



During the past several months we have tried to address every school issue that would have an impact on our school district. I have tried to present data to keep each of you informed as to the operations of our school.

Several weeks ago we talked about seat belts on school buses and I can now report that New York is the first state to require large school buses to be equipped with seat belts. Under the terms of the New York law, seat belts will be required on all school buses manufactured for use in New York after July 1, 1987. I predict that within the next five years, you will see the same type law for Texas schools. A seat belt company might be a good investment!

Since I have made a prediction on seat belts, I will go a little further and predict that drug testing for public employees will be forthcoming before the seat belt prediction comes to pass. I think during the next legislative session in January we will see a big push to begin drug testing.

The third prediction, and last for this week, is that liability costs for public entities will continue to go up. Over the past five years public entities produced the worst nationwide loss and loss expense ratio for insurers. The policies issued produced a staggering 188.6 percent loss and lost adjustment.

And so the changes continue as legislators and educators endeavor to provide our students with the best education and protection that is available.

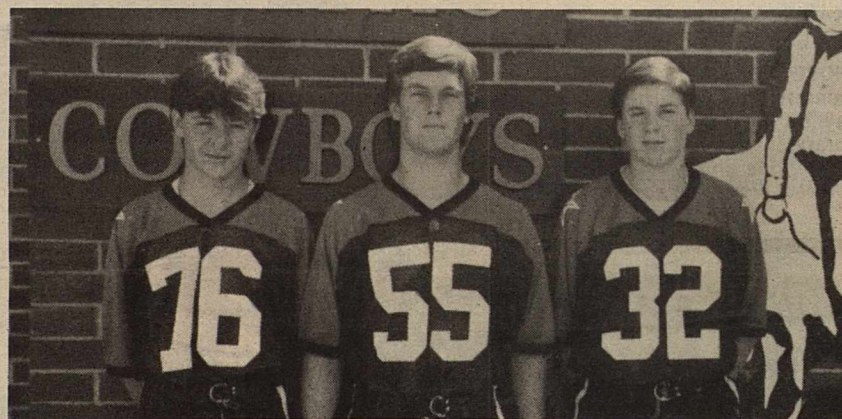



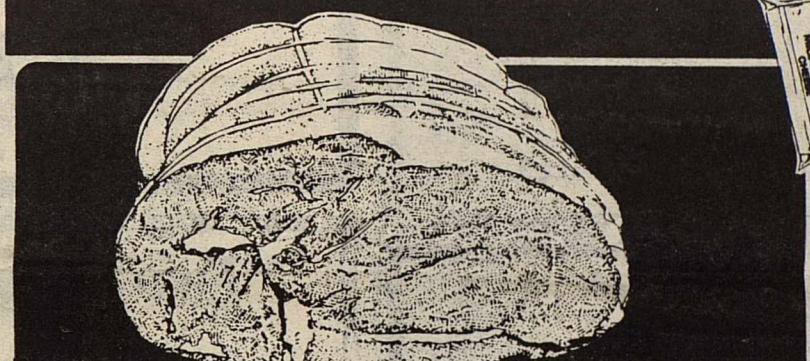
